Overview

Autumn Term

In Art and Design Year 11, students focus on developing their coursework portfolio and preparing for the externally set assignment (ESA). The portfolio, which is a worth 60% of the overall grade, showcases their creative journey through research, experimentation with materials and techniques, development of ideas, and the creation of final pieces. The ESA, released in January, provides a theme or starting point for students to respond to with their own creative interpretation through a series of preparatory work and a final 10-hour exam. Students explore themes, concepts, and stimuli to generate ideas for their artwork. This involves research, experimentation, and critical analysis of their own work and the work of others. Students experiment with a wide range of materials, techniques, and processes. This could include traditional mediums like drawing and painting, but also extends to 3D work, digital media, photography, printmaking, and mixed media.

Students choose a starting point and develop their response through research, experimentation, and the creation of preparatory work in their sketchbooks and other supporting materials.

Assessment

In GCSE Photography, students are assessed on four key areas: research and contextual investigations (AO1), refining and developing ideas through experimentation (AO2), recording ideas and observations (AO3), and presenting a personal and meaningful final piece (AO4). The final grade is determined by a 60% coursework component and a 40% externally set assignment with a 10-hour controlled test.

Externally Set Assignment (ESA) worth 40%

In January, students receive the ESA paper from the exam board, which contains a variety of starting points. Students choose a starting point and develop their response through research, experimentation, and the creation of preparatory work in their e-portfolios. Students must use the work of photographers and other craftspeople to gather information and link to their own work to create a personal response which will be produced in a 10-hour practical exam. In the exam, students will edit images they have taken in line with their starting point. They will evaluate and annotate as they progress through the controlled test and be able to analyse each edited image.

Assessment

The GCSE Photography specification is assessed against four assessment objectives:

Developing ideas through investigations, demonstrating critical and contextual understanding.

AO2:

Refining work by exploring ideas, selecting and experimenting with appropriate media, materials, techniques, and processes.

AO3:

Recording observations, insights, and ideas relevant to their chosen area of study.

AO4:

Presenting a personal and meaningful response that realises their intentions, demonstrating understanding of visual language.

Spring Term

10-hour exam – usually at the end of April/beginning of May.

All work from year 10 and 11 should be handed in for marking as the 10-hours begins – no work can be completed on the portfolio when the exam has started.

Assessment

- Both components are marked out of 96, with Component 1 contributing 60% and Component 2 contributing 40% to the final grade.
- Teachers use the assessment criteria provided by the exam board to assess student work against each of the four Assessment Objectives.
- Schools submit their assessed work to the exam board for external moderation, ensuring consistency in standards.
