

Editorial.

HE bulk of the contents of this our Summer Number is furnished, as usual, by the doings of our representatives in the Cricket Field. We hope this news will again be of interest, not only to the few who read there the record of their own performances, but to many less distinguished or more youthful players, and even to those whose only part in the school games is that of the spectator. This year we have a most satisfactory account to present. Doubtful as their prospects were at the start of the season, the First Eleven have gone successfully through a long programme of foreign matches, in which the only defeat sustained has been at the hands of the Old Hulmeians, which we managed to retrieve in the return. This success has been due, not to any individual brilliance, but to the general merit of the team. There have been no sensational scores, but the batting averages point to steady and uniform play, and compare very favourably with former years.

bowling we have been rather weaker than usual, and the fielding has often left much to be desired. The Second Eleven have fallen somewhat from last year's record, and though they have a balance of successes in their favour, have twice been defeated by teams certainly their inferiors in size. This team contains some members who promise well for next season, but who, to fulfil that expectation, will have to throw themselves heartily into the game and practise it at all points. They certainly will not do so by loafing about the nets till their turn comes to bat, and discovering immediately after their innings that they have an important engagement to keep elsewhere.

In the present number we have for the first time the pleasure of recording a distinction won by an Old Boy in the honours school of a University. We congratulate Saxelby on being the first Hulmeian to enter the ranks of graduates, and hope that many of us will follow the path on which he has taken so distinguished a lead.

School Motes and Mews.

THE Midsummer Examination has been conducted by the following gentlemen, appointed by the Governors:—Mr. J. G. Tuckey, M.A., in Languages and English; Mr. J. B. Cohen, Ph. D.; Mr. F. T. Swanwick, M.A., Lecturer at the Owens College, in Mathematics; and Mr. F. G. Jackson, Second Master of the Birmingham School of Art, in Drawing and Writing.

The Gaskell Challenge Cup, which was generously presented to the School last year by the Misses Gaskell, will be awarded for the first time at the Sports this summer. It will be held for one year by the winner of the highest number of marks in the open events and in the handicaps, according to a scheme of marking settled in the Games Committee.

F. M. Saxelby has obtained a first-class in the Mathematical Honours School of the Victoria University for the degree of Bachelor of Science, and has been recommended for the University Prize of £25. He has also gained a sizarship at St. John's College, Cambridge.

We are glad to see that A. G. Baker is coming to the front in cricket. He has joined the Manchester Club, and has been chosen once to play for the first eleven, for so young a player certainly a distinction.

A pair of leg-guards has been presented to J. O. Hulme for his score of 61 not out, against Broughton School Second.

It being understood that the Old Boys were greatly in need of a tent for their new field, a subscription was started this term among the boys in the School, and the necessary amount having been collected, a tent was presented by them to the Old Hulmeians Club.

A substantial scoring-box, made this term under Mr. Dorrans' instructions in the School workshop, supplies a long-felt want in the field.

As the result of the recent examinations for the Corporation Technical Scholarships, the following, among other recommendations have been made to the City Council:—Owens College Day Scholarship of £60 per annum: G. P. Varley; Municipal Technical School Day Scholarships of £30 per annum: F. Collier and L. Norbury.

Next Term begins on Tuesday, September 13th, at 9 o'clock.

CRICKET NOTES.

We commenced this season with a very full card, containing fixtures with four schools whom we had not met in previous seasons, St. Bede's College, Parkhurst School, Buxton, The King's School, Chester, and Lymm Grammar School. We very much regret that the matches with St. Bede's had to be abandoned on account of the weather. Parkhurst School has given us two good games, the second one especially, in which we only managed to secure a victory by the smallest of majorities, namely, one run. The Chester match afforded us a very pleasant afternoon in the time-honoured city, but the school has not a strong team this season, and we won both matches rather easily.

The team has again been captained by Shorrocks, who has fulfilled this responsible but often thankless office to everybody's satisfaction. In energy and perseverance he has set his men an example which some of them would have done well to follow more closely. He has been well seconded by W. B. Smith. This season, for the first time, a bat has been offered for the best average in the practice games. We are sorry, however, to acknowledge that this has not produced the keenness of competition which it was expected to do.

On one occasion we were favoured with a visit from Alec Watson, the County bowler. If he only realised how much the exhibition of first-class bowling was appreciated, he would be amply repaid for his trouble. We sincerely hope that he will repeat his visit next season.

The members of the Second Game, though not nearly so regular in their play as could be desired, have yet given spasmodic signs of life in the form of respectably-attended sides games. Of late they have improved, under the management of Jeans and Young. The Third Game, under the captaincy of R. G. Clarke, has generally mustered in sufficient force to play sides games both at twelve and four, and occasionally on half-holidays. The game contains some very promising young players. The Fourth Game has been, as usual, full of vigour, but the standard of play has not been so high as it was last season. This, however, can be well accounted for by the youthfulness of most of its members. Hudson has been regular and painstaking in his duties as captain.

CHARACTERS OF THE FIRST ELEVEN.

SHORROCKS, E. (Captain).—An excellent and self-sacrificing captain. Bats steadily and owes his good average entirely to it, as he is not a brilliant hitter. Smart in any part of the field, bowls well and with his head.

SMITH, W. B. (Vice-Captain).—A steady bat with considerable hitting power, but has hardly done himself justice in matches. He has rendered good service behind the wickets and has been according to his wont a useful and energetic vice-captain.

CLASSEN, H. R.—A very smart fielder and has done good service with the bat, playing medium-paced bowling with ease and freedom but is never quite at home with fast bowling.

FORD, H.—Bats in excellent easy style and has come off well in matches. He despises however the indispensable conscientious practice, and this must necessarily retard his progress. He is a sure catch, and with a little more energy would make a very good all-round man.

NORBURY, L.—A very steady bat, but has hardly made such high scores as was expected. He has of late however had considerable success with the ball, proving extremely useful on two or three occasions. He has also filled the difficult post of longstop very satisfactorily.

Saxelby, S. W.—Is a very useful man. A hard hitter, though perhaps it would sometimes be more advantageous to keep the ball nearer terra firma. He is a valuable fielder in the "country."

SCLATER, J. R. P.—Has several times bowled very well with great results, but unfortunately his bowling is not consistent, utterly failing at times. He is a very fair bat, and when set plays with vigour and hits well.

MUTH, H. B. L.—Has occasionally done execution with the ball, but he does not supply our want of a consistent bowler. He bats fairly well and is a good fielder.

HULME, J. O.—Shapes very well at batting and gives good promise. Fields very smartly and returns well; he has also bowled with a fair amount of success.

ELLIS, W.—Bats vigorously but without style, and ought to practice forward play. He catches well and is valuable in the field.

WHITWORTH, G. L.—Bats in good style and is very promising. He has not yet had much chance of distinguishing himself as a member of the team, having only had one or two innings. His activity in the field leaves much to be desired.

CHARACTERS OF THE SECOND ELEVEN.

Tyson, J. C. (Captain).—A steady bat, though sometimes falling into a "poky" style. Has kept wicket well, and done his best as captain.

CLARKE, L. C.—A good and careful bat. Fields well at cover-point.

BOOTH, V. S.—A very hard but risky hitter; bowls well at times, and a good field, when awake.

VAN DER VEEN, H.—The best all-round player. Promises well with both bat and ball especially the latter. Has a very nice action, which may develop into something really good, and uses his head.

YOUATT, E.—Bats well at the nets but his nerves sometimes fail him in matches; fields excellently and will some day make a good bowler if he takes pains.

WRIGHT, J. H.—Bats vigorously at times and bowls well.

Lowe, F. H.—A fair bat, but his fielding might be improved.

GREEN, C. J .- A very steady bat; fields well.

PRICE, H. H.—A very hard but unwise hitter. Should remember that it is much safer to hit the ball "along the floor" than to sky it.

Sмітн, S. A.—A fair bat; good longstop.

Swinn, C. G.—A promising bat, and a fair fielder. Has not played much this season.

Shorrocks and Norbury punished their bowling severely and profiting by several "let-offs" carried the score to 93 before Shorrocks was bowled for 43. Ford made 13 in good style and lost his wicket through misunderstanding the umpire who had decided in his favour an appeal for run out. His excellent score included one six and five threes. Sclater and Smith then put on 22, Sclater making nearly all the runs. Saturday, May 14th, v, Old Hulmeians. Played on our ground. For this very interesting fixture we had a bright but rather cold afternoon. Winning the toss, Shorrocks started our innings with Norbury, but against the bowling of Baker and Rowe they did but little, and after their departure wickets fell fast. Sclater, with Saxelby, made an effort to put a better face on our prospects, raising the total to 25 for seven, and Hulme and Lowe made a creditable stand for the last wicket, though the scoring was chiefly done for them by "Extras." They put on II and the innings closed for 37. For the Old Boys Lowe and Bennett went in first, the attack being shared by Sclater and Muth, to the former of whom Bennett fell a victim when the score was 5. Baker came in and began to score, but lost the company of Lowe and Rowe at 15. With Barrett, however, a long stand was made by Baker, and in spite of bowling changes, Hulme relieving Sclater, and Shorrocks going on for Muth, the two were not separated till our total had been passed and the Old Boys' score stood at 41, when Shorrocks bowled Barrett for a valuable 7. Rickitt drove the first ball he received from Hulme for four, but was soon bowled by Muth who had resumed in place of the former bowler. The score was now 50, and Wright and Payne left without any increase of that total. Youatt joined Baker who was shortly afterwards caught off Shorrocks for an excellent 17. Saturday, May 21st, v. Parkhurst School, Buxton. Played at home. Our start was disastrous, Norbury and Classen being both bowled first ball with the score at one. Ford came to Shorrocks' assistance, and the two brought up 16 when Shorrocks was bowled. Smith was run out, but Saxelby made a long stand with Ford, and did not leave till 34 had been added, when he was bowled for 13. Ford did not stay much longer, being caught and bowled for 22, after being missed twice off consecutive balls. The score was gradually raised to 73 for which our innings closed. When Parkhurst School went to the wickets, the ball showed itself decidedly superior to the bat, the innings being chiefly remarkable for the number of maidens bowled, and the number of failures to score. Wednesday, May 25th, v. Woodlands School. Played at home. There had been heavy rain early in the week and the pitch was saturated. But though the scoring was low, the match was eventful and interesting. Shorrocks again won the toss, and decided to put his opponents in first. Against his and Sclater's bowling, Lings and Dunn were the only batters who did anything. It was decidedly a bowler's day, as was further shown in our 1st innings, when S. Milne took nine wickets, performing the "hat trick" upon Norbury, Saxelby, and Smith. Six wickets were down for 11, or 7 runs behind, when Fielding joined Ford, and by plucky play they passed the Woodlands score, and we were 9 to the good when

the innings closed, Ford being not out 14. In their second innings Dunn again distinguished himself, bringing the score up to 22 for five, after which no resistance could be offered to Shorrocks' fine bowling, the last five wickets falling without adding a run. With 14 runs to make, four wickets were down for 6, when Smith joined Ford, who for the second time in the match played admirably at a critical point. This time Smith did most of the scoring, and the runs required were got without further loss. Ford's batting in both innings was excellent, and in marked contrast to that of the rest of the team, which was much weaker than usual. Shorrocks came out with a wonderful bowling analysis, taking in both innings 15 wickets for 16 runs.
