Thew Books.

COLOUR IMPRESSIONS. By Douglas Knoop, M.A., Lecturer on Economics in the University of Sheffield. London University Press. Pp. 99.

This book, by an Old Hulmeian, is a Report to the Trustees of the Albert Kahn Travelling Fellowships, on the results of a journey round the world, July, 1913, to July, 1914, and indicates by its picturesque title the questions in which the writer chiefly interested himself on his tour. These were various aspects of the relations of white to coloured races in the countries visited, which included Egypt, India, Ceylon, Java, Singapore, China, Japan, and the United States. He gives us a very interesting general survey of these problems, and one feels, after reading it, that even when the present war is over, and a settlement reached,

a multitude of difficult questions will stand over for future generations to tackle. Of especial interest in the light of recent developments are Mr. Knoop's pages on the English occupation of Egypt, and the westernisation of Japan.

SWIMMING. By Champions of the World. London: Simpkin, Marshall, & Co.

The chapter on the Breast Stroke in this handbook is written, in collaboration with another champion, by an Old Hulmeian, Mr. Percy Courtman, whose qualifications for dealing with his subject are given on page 7. He holds the A.S.A. Breast Stroke Championship for 1907-8-9-12 and 13, and the World's Record for the stroke for 400 and 500 metres, and he represented Great Britain at the Olympic Games in 1908 and 1912. He is now serving his country in the 6th Manchester Regiment. His chapter on the breast stroke, which is a necessity in lifesaving, and the one most generally practised, gives careful instructions, with a view to minimising the retarding of movement during the recovery under water. It is well illustrated by photographs taken from above the swimmer.

Lectures.

Two very interesting lectures have been given to the School this term. On June 15th, Mr. J. Cumming Walters spoke on "Charles Dickens." He dwelt on the author's keen observation of men and things, and showed how he had employed the vast material thus obtained in picturing the characters which live in his pages. There were over two thousand of these creations, many of which are like familiar friends to readers of Dickens. The lecturer gave many illustrative passages from Pickwick, which were much enjoyed. We hope to have him with us again during the winter.

The centenary of Waterloo, June 18th, was celebrated by a very instructive lecture from Professor Tout. He showed that the Battle of Waterloo was of importance more because it marked the end of a vast struggle, than for its effect in the decision of that struggle. He pointed out many correspondences with the present war, and showed that Waterloo teaches us lessons that are valuable to-day.

The Athletic Sports.

The sports were held on the afternoon of Ascension Day, May 13th. The weather was fine, but very cold. By the request of the boys, the money usually expended on prizes, except for the events for those under 11 years of age, was set aside to be devoted to War Funds.

A short exhibition of drill was given by the Fourth and Third Forms, under the direction of Mr. E. A. Tessier. The Worrall Shield for champion house was again won by Heywood House, with a total of 88 points, Dalton coming second with 64. The Gaskell Cup for the championship in open events was won by W. L. Holden, of Heywood, who was first in the 100 Yards, Broad Jump, and Hurdles, and gained points in the Half-mile and Cricket Ball. Holden has established a record in winning all four Challenge Cups, which he has taken in succession, from the China Cup in 1912, to the Gaskell in 1915.

Old Hulmeians and the War.

We publish a second list of the Roll of Honour, which adds 48 names to the 239 which appeared in the first (revised) list in our last Three or four of these have been invalided out during training, 21 have been wounded, and five, we deeply regret to record, have been killed in action.

A. J. H. R. WIDDOWSON.

Second-Lieutenant A. J. H. R. Widdowson, and South Lancashire Regiment, was missing after the Battle of Mons, and is believed to have been killed in action. He entered the School in September, 1902, and left at the end of 1903.

EDWARD TAYLOR.

Second-Lieutenant Edward Taylor, 18th (Queen Mary's Own) Hussars, who was killed in action on May 13th, was at the School from January to December, 1900.

MURRAY D. BLAIKIE.

Private M. D. Blaikie, 6th Manchester Regiment, was killed during May through the blowing up of a trench at the Dardanelles. The trench was occupied by ten men and all were buried, but with the exception of Private Blaikie, all were rescued. Up to the time of his enlistment he was in business with his father, Mr. W. V. Blaikie, of Whalley Range, and was well known in Manchester business quarters. He was the second of three brothers, all of whom came to the school, and his younger brother Frank is now training with the Public School Battalion. Murray Blaikie entered the School in September, 1895, and left in July, 1899. He was a fine football player, and was also on the second cricket team. He played outside right in the brilliant football team of 1899, and afterwards for the Old Hulmeians.

ALFRED MEAKIN HOBDEY.

Private A. M. Hobdey, 6th Manchester Regiment, was killed in action at the Dardanelles, on June 13th. He was the youngest of six brothers, five of whom were at the School. He entered in School april, entered in September, 1903, and left in April, 1907, when he went to King William's College, Isle of Man Isle of Man. He was a good athlete and won

the China Cup for Under 14 competition at the Athletic Sports in 1906. Two of his brothers (one an O.H.) hold commissions and are now serving.

WOUNDED.

The following have been wounded since our last number appeared: -

Lieut.-Colonel A. F. Maclure, member of the School Committee, 7th Lancashire Fusiliers, was wounded in the arm at the Dardanelles early in May, but is now, we are glad to say, nearly recovered.

Lieutenant F. C. Bentz, M.B., R.A.M.C., has been wounded in the chest at the Dardanelles.

Lieutenant R. H. Brewis, 8th Lancashire Fusiliers, was slightly wounded on June 7th, and is now, we believe, quite recovered.

Private T. Johnston, 6th Manchester Regiment, is in hospital at Malta. He has been slightly wounded, and is doing well.

Lieutenant J. B. Leech, 7th Lancashire Fusiliers, was wounded in the back and thigh at the Dardanelles on June 12th. He was seriously ill for a time, but we are glad to hear that he is now progressing favourably. He is on his way to England.

Private R. Le Ricolais, 79th Regiment French Infantry, was slightly wounded in France, but has recovered and is now at the front.

Second-Lieutenant G. Cecil Lovett, Royal Marines, was slightly wounded by a bullet which grazed his head, but is now at the front again in the Dardanelles.

Private L. Norbury, 6th Manchester Regiment, who joined soon after the outbreak of the war, has been wounded in the cheek, arm, and shoulder, but is progressing satisfactorily. He is one of the older generation Hulmeians, and played cricket, football, and lacrosse on the first team in 1891 and 1892.

Lieutenant A. H. Tinker, 7th Manchester Regiment, who was slightly wounded in the back by a sniper, on May 18th, at the Dardanelles, is now quite well again, and is resting at the base.

Second-Lieutenant F. B. Turner, 8th Lancashire Fusiliers, was slightly wounded in the head at the Dardanelles, but is now, we believe,

Lieutenant E. Wallwork, 8th Manchester Regiment, has been wounded in the right hand at the Dardanelles. He is now on his way to England. He got his commission in 1913, and went out to Egypt last September.

K. Williamson, A.B., Hawke Battalion, R.N. Division, has been wounded in action at the Dardanelles.

Lieutenant A. D. Thomson, 6th Manchester Regiment, has been invalided from Egypt, through eye trouble.

Lieutenant R. J. McNicol has been slightly wounded in the head at the Dardanelles, but has now quite recovered.

Private N. Fletcher, 6th Manchester Regiment, was slightly wounded in the knee while serving in the trenches at the Dardanelles. As septic poisoning set in, he was sent down to the base, and had a narrow escape whilst being carried out, a bullet passing through his trousers. He is now improving.

Rifleman P. Humfrey, 9th Rifle Brigade, has been wounded.

Private F. Jefferis was slightly wounded in the leg on May 29th at the Dardanelles. He has now quite recovered, and expects to be sent to the front again.

The news of Lieut. H. G. W. Irwin, 3rd South Lancashire Regiment, is good. readers will remember the account he wrote of his being wounded and taken prisoner in the retreat from Mons. He writes home that he is fit, and could do his mile some time back. He has now been moved from Münden, where he was very badly treated, being given only three slices of sour black bread and a little fish each day, to Bischofswerda, in Saxony, where he is very differently looked He can buy decent food, but it is expensive. His greatest trouble is the monotony and the lack of news.

H. Lomas has been wounded at the Dardanelles, but is well again, and expects to be

sent to H.M.S. "Queen Elizabeth."

We understand that Capt. F. N. Peak and Pte. G. V. Barker have been wounded at the Dardanelles.

The Charge of the Manchesters, June 4th.

A letter received from Private C. W. Murphy, 6th Manchester Regiment.

Since writing last we have passed through some terrible times, but they are such as cannot

be described on paper. We have been in the

firing line all the time, with the exception of five days, and we had some losses even then. The worst came last Friday when the whole line attacked the Turkish position. There was a bombardment of their trenches of one hour. One of our companies was in the front, and the other three in the second line—we were in the latter. The first went over their parapet, latter. The first went over the first Turkish galloped across, and collared the first Turkish

We then got the word and over we went. The Turks had now got in their second line, and there was a hail of machine gun and rifle fire as we advanced. We soon got past our first line, then on past the entanglements to the Turks' lines. We had a rest behind the trench, and then over we went. We drove them out of four lines, one after the other, with the bayonet, and did not fire a shot. was detailed as a grenade and bomb thrower, but did not do much in that line. Our company advanced past the last line of trenches out into the open, and began digging in. We were unsupported and had to retire, but went back again. I was in one of the trenches and stayed there for some time, when we went to man the forward trench.

The charge was a brilliant one, and I got through all right, but it seemed a miracle that

anyone could live through it.

The Turks shelled our trench at dusk with lyddite and drove the chaps on the right of our battalion out of their trenches. Then they began with shrapnel, and it was terrible. One by one we trooped down a gulley and manned another trench. Our battalion suffered heavily, and we have lost five out of six officers in our

company.

We were in the trench all night and the Turks got round and enfiladed us with a machine gun and rifles. The chaps dropped all round, but I again scraped through. I was amongst those ordered to go outside and lie at angles with the trench to beat them off, but we could not get a proper field of fire. I crept down into a stream and met our C.O., Major Worthington, and as I was speaking he was wounded slightly in the neck. I then got some water and went back to the line, where we stayed a day. I was sent with a message to Head-quarters for reinforcements. I got there safely, and after delivering it had some food and a little sleep. I was then going back with a party to the front line when we heard they would be coming out of it. I stayed in these trenches until they came. I have now been two days out of the line. You will be learning all about us in dispatches, as we are told that we shall be mentioned. We are expecting to have a rest somewhere or other before long, and then we shall feel better.

A lot of chaps I know have been killed and

wounded, but I have pulled through. It is a terrible thing to miss the men who, a few days ago, were all around. We shall be glad when we can get a good wash and change our things. We get plenty of tobacco and some cigs., but can always do with the latter. It is very hot out here, and we have rather big thirsts at times.

Adilitary Training Corps.

We are pleased to be able to report progress in the matter of our recently-formed Corps. Last Whitsuntide we spent a week in camp at Alderley Park, and have every reason to feel satisfied with this our first experience of life under canvas. The bright sunshine and pleasant surroundings inspired us all with a cheerfulness which the arduous duties of orderly and the monotonous tramp of sentrygo availed little to damp. One day we paid a visit to the Manchester Grammar School Camp, a short distance away. Here we were entertained very heartily, and, after a game of "podex," which is a sort of mountain cricket, played with a leather ball and a club, we came away much impressed by the hospitality extended to us. On another occasion we went a short night route march, returning to camp with the dawn.

The general marksmanship of the Corps continues steadily to improve, and there are now four or five members in the running for the Challenge Cup to be presented at the end of term. The most successful so far have been Craig, Orr, A. W., Nesfield, S., and

Lord.

We hope to have the uniforms before the end of the term. They are already on order, and before this magazine is issued will probably be to hand. They will mean much to the success of the Corps.

On July 10th we had a full half-day devoted to drill and shooting practice. It is pleasing to note that in this direction also there is great improvement, the movements being executed more smartly and with much greater accuracy.

There still remains the question of rifle drill. It will be necessary before long to obtain rifles for drill purposes, as this must form an important feature of our future pro-

This difficulty will probably be gramme. overcome during the next term, when we shall very likely be able, if not to buy, at least to obtain the loan of service rifles.

CRICKET NOTES.

From the point of view of the bare statement, "played 11, won 5, lost 1, drawn 5," it would seem strange to claim that the past season had been anything more than mediocre, but when we consider that the standard of our opponents has been quite as high as hitherto, it will justify our observation that the season has been well above the average.

This good result is no doubt largely due to the general keenness of all the members of the team. Out of the five drawn games three were in our favour.

On the whole, the batting has been good, there being five totals well over 100, while the individual totals are similarly good. Woollam, our most prolific run-getter, has scored so far practically 200 runs, and three others over 100. Up to now he heads the averages with 19.4.

Palmer comes second in the averages, but he has not maintained the form with which he started the season. Powell and Walker have done well with the bat, although the latter has been rather unlucky on several occasions. Burton, who commenced his first cricket season at the School this year, well deserved his position on the First XI. He has proved his worth as a capable defensive batsman in several games, but as a fast scorer is rather weak.

We have been fortunate in possessing good opening bowlers, but have suffered on occasions from lack of good change bowling. who holds the best average at present, namely one of 8.8, has bowled consistently well from the beginning. Powell and Neill, who have higher averages, have done most of the bowling, and in most matches acquitted themselves very well. Holden, as a fast change bowler, has been successful, but what we need in this line is a really slow bowler, and almost in every match the want has been felt.

The fielding has been changeable, and, on whole, poor, although the behaviour against St. Bede's, when we suffered our first defeat, was more than vindicated in Bowdon College away match, when four excellent catches were taken in addition to good ground fielding.

Up to the present the team has compiled 1,086 runs for the loss of 87 wickets. gives an average of 12.47 runs per wicket. The corresponding numbers for last year's season were 1,211 for 127 wickets, with an average of 9'5 per wicket.

The Second Eleven has had a most successful season under the able captaincy of Walker, J. M. Opening the season with a drawn game against Bury, against whom Holmes scored 28 and Humphries 34, they next accounted for Bowdon in a very summary manner, Orr scoring 33 and taking six wickets for 8 runs.

St. Bede's were next tackled and disposed of for 28 runs, Walker taking six wickets for 14 runs and scoring 25; Humphries, C. A., with a hard-hit 33 also helped to swell our total. A new fixture with the Cowley Schools, Helens, only served to show the excellency of our team. Our new visitors being disposed of for 18, the lesser lights in the batting line were sent in first with disastrous results, 7 wickets

July, 1915 going down for 4 runs. Holmes, and Cartwright, however, scoring 79 between them deprived St. Helens of what they thought would be an easy win. The next game against Manchester Grammar Third, was drawn. Bolton were next most soundly beaten, Orr taking 9 wickets for 18 runs, and Walker scoring an excellent 44, Humphries, C. A., also making a merry 30. This form being kept up. St. Bede's suffered very badly, and could only score 26 against our 142, Orr making an excellent 50 not out, and Walker securing 6 wickets for 7 runs. In the two games against St. Bede's, the captain secured 12 wickets for 19 runs, and as an example for future second elevens the team scored 296 runs in the two matches played that week. The last match against Stand was abandoned through rain, after we had disposed of 4 of their players for

Without turning up records of previous seasons, this year's second team must be one of the best that has represented the School, and Walker, J. M., the captain, has played a big part both in the matches and at practices in bringing the best out of the team. Orr, A. W., with his excellent bowling and steady, patient scoring, Humphries, C. A., and Holmes, with their different styles of batting, have given the captain excellent support.

The practices have been well attended, which is, perhaps, the cause of the team's success.
