### Editorial.

OFTEN as we have grumbled in this column at unfavourable weather, we feel quite safe in saying that we have never in the annals of the School had such good cause for complaining as in the present number. To the long series of wet Saturdays, which footballers all over the district have come to regard as a matter of course, and even a subject for grim merriment, we can add most of the Wednesdays as well; and if a stray fine day has fluttered down, like a leaf from some angel's album, it has generally come somewhere else in the week. Not

only have football and lacrosse suffered, but even the cricket season has been nipped in the bud by the unkindly elements. The First Team football and lacrosse matches have generally been played out even in the wet, but the School field has so often had to be closed that the interest in the winter games has been almost killed.

The Football season ended with a fairly even record of wins and losses, with just a balance of matches in our favour; with which, under the unfavourable circumstances, we may rest content till next season. In Lacrosse, the team's record of eight wins and two drawn

games to six losses hardly represents the rapid improvement which is noted by all who have watched their play, and is indicated by the fact that three of their defeats were sustained in the first four matches of the season. The game is much indebted for this advance to Mr. BARBER'S able example and enthusiastic coaching.

The Old Hulmeians Football season, after a brilliant start, has ended somewhat disappointingly, owing to the break-up, for unavoidable causes, of the powerful combination which represented the Club before Christmas.

The Old Boys Lacrosse has well maintained its high position in the League, and has furnished contingents for the County and North of England teams. Their "A" team have a first-class record behind them, and made a doughty fight for the Junior Cup.

We record in this number the first Old Hulmeians' dinner, which proved a great success, and will, we hope, be the precursor of many pleasant reunions, serving to keep Old Boys in touch with their School and with one another.

There will also be instruction in the art of rescuing the drowning, in preparation for the competition next September for the medals offered by the Humane Society of Salford. Twenty silver medals have already been gained by boys of this School, and we hope there will be a keen competition this year.

## The Hulme Lads' Club Collection.

This year's collection on behalf of the Hulme Lads' Club amounted to £51. 58. 10d. This is £2. 7s. more than last year, and the best collection we have yet made. The School may fairly be congratulated on the result, particularly as it is in a very true sense the outcome of a common effort. There were not more than a dozen boys in the School who did not take some part in this year's collection. We hope that next year there may be none at all.

Of the £45. 10s. 10d. actually collected by the School this year, £26. 7s. 5d. was the proceeds of the collecting cards, and £19. 3s. 5d. of the Form collections. Fifty-seven boys took out cards this year, compared with 79 last year, and 81 in 1900. The amount realised by the cards was about £3 less than last year, and £5 less than in 1900. Here, then, we have an opportunity for a further increase next year-by bringing the card total up to the level of two years ago. We are glad to note that this year a considerable number of collecting cards were taken out by boys in the upper part of the School.

The total of the Form collections, £19. 3s. 5d., is an increase of nearly £3. 10s. on last year's collection, which, it may be remembered, was itself an advance of £7 on the previous year, and far the best we had yet made. The example set by Latin Third and Second and Latin First Forms last year has been largely followed by the other Forms, and we have reason to be well satisfied with this part of the

collection.

The largest individual collection, £7. 11s. 6d., was made again this year by French Second, and they are closely followed by Lower Modern Fourth with £7. 7s. 11d. Having regard to the numbers in the Forms, Science Fifth with £4. 11s. 6d., and Classical Fifth with £2. 6s., are not far behind. The largest Form collections were again made by Latin Third and Second £4, and Latin First £3. 7s.

# Old Hulmeians' Football,

1902-3.

The final half of the football season has turned out for the Old Boys anything but the success which was experienced during the first half. Almost immediately after the last report in the December number of The Hulmeian, ill-luck, in the form of a robber of the forward line, set in, and remained till the end of the season. When February arrived the First Team found themselves with only one of the original forwards left, namely, Blaikie; two had left to make fortunes in other lands, Corbett had decided to retire from football life for the present, and Swindells was forced to abstain from the game on account of a serious injury to his knee. The back division, fortunately,

remained intact; but when the poor quality of the reserve forwards from the Second Team made itself too evident, it was found necessary to bring a full-back and a half-back forward, and so we have the story of almost the complete disorganisation of the team. It really has been a great disappointment to all interested in the club's doings, and it is earnestly hoped that next season will see a large increase in the number of playing members. It is difficult to see why this should not be so, in view of the fact that the club, if properly supported, can assure its players really good, enjoyable games on a splendid ground against gentlemanly teams.

When the Second Team has been able to turn out in anything approaching full strength it has always come off the best, and this only serves to increase the regret that the number of playing members is so scarce.

## Old Bulmeians' Lacrosse, 1902=3.

At the end of the season 1901-2 the Old Boys held the third place in the Second League, two points behind Harrogate. The close

of the present season sees them again in the third position, but this time only goal average keeps them out of the second place. Monton are top with 28 points, while Rochdale and the Old Boys have 24 points each. Their records are very similar, 11 wins each, three losses each, and two draws each; but goal average, Rochdale 150 to 68, Old Boys 147 to 72. This just puts Rochdale into the second place.

Two of the Old Boys' lost games have been lost by the odd goal, while the third, a very severe beating by Urmston, was when Hobbins was away assisting the County, and Van der Veen, Birtwistle, and Goodier were also absent. Even if the Team is not at the top of the League. however, the fact that they are coming to the front is shown by Hobbins and Jefferis being chosen to represent Lancashire at third home and left defence in all the county engagements, viz., against Cheshire, Essex, and Middlesex; whilst Hobbins has achieved the greater distinction of a place on the North Team against the South on Lord's Cricket Ground, London, helping to turn last year's South victory into a win for the North this year by 11 goals to 5. Hobbins, Jefferis, Buckland, G., and Oddy were also chosen to represent the Second League at third home, left defence, right attack, and point against the Third League, the Second League representatives winning by 28 goals to 5.

The "A" Team have done remarkably well never better in the history of the club. Their results are 18 wins, 3 losses. The first 17 matches were all won with ease, and two of their three losses were when playing very short of their usual team, the third being in the Final for the Junior Cup against Ashton First. Their goal average is 234 goals to 54. In getting through to the final of the Lancashire Junior Cup—the same trophy the First Team won in 1898-9—the team did what no other Second Division "A" team has ever done before. They were only beaten there by a team, Ashton First, who were head and shoulders above any other club in for the cup. In the semifinal especially they showed good form, beating South Manchester "A" by 8-3, after being 2-1 behind at half-time. The whole team,

from goal to first home, is first-class, and with a bit more weight and experience many of them should do very well.

### FIRST TEAM MATCHES.

December 27th, v. ROCHDALE, at home. League match.—The game was very fast, both teams displaying good lacrosse. At half-time the Old Boys had a lead of 4—2. In the second half Rochdale equalised, but the Old Boys took the lead, and held it till just on time, when a long lob went through and again equalised the score at 5—5.

Mauldeth wiped off one of these, and tried hard to equalise, but the end came with the Old Boys winners by 4—3.

Just before half-time the Old Boys held a lead of 5—2, but Blackley wiped off two of these. The second half was played in blinding rain, but the Old Boys were always the better side, getting through on two more occasions. Final score, 7—4 for the Old Boys.

North attack, but it was some time before the home attack got going. When they did, however, nothing could stop them, and playing in irresistible form got 11 goals in about 20 minutes. Half-time score, 11—3. On resuming, North again attacked, and brought up the score to 11—6. In the last 20 minutes the same thing happened again, and the Old Boys got eight more goals, some of them being beauties. Final score, 19—6.

For a time Bolton kept level, but were finally run off their feet, Hobbins and Buckland, G., in particular playing a splendid game, giving Van der Veen plenty of chances, which he nearly always turned to the best possible account. Up till half-way in the second half the game was very even, the score then being 5—4 for Monton, but in the last few minutes the Old Boys rather broke down, the final being 9—4 against.
