Witter at outside centre is a most elusive runner and slipped six tackles (and my sight) to score a memorable try against Bolton School. The regular wingers were Cook (The Chef) and Knowles, both quite nicely balanced runners with good pace. 'Knowlesey' drew many an exasperated gasp from me this season. Such was the occasion when he received the ball on the wing, that he could never bring himself to let go of it, even when he was tackled! More seriously, his defensive qualities saved us many points throughout the term. Aslam and Whiteley shared the full back position. Aslam is a useful player with the ball in his hands whilst "The Pipsqueak's" attitude was evident from the first game when he demolished a centre who actually was twice his size - real courage and determination. Brocklehurst served as a utility back and played in a variety of positions: he is possibly the most balanced runner we have but needs to tighten up his defence if he is to fulfil his potential.

A lot is written in the press concerning the way the game should be played. Good scrummaging has become very unfashionable with the alickadoos, who wax lyrically on the beauty of back play, and who obviously ran everything from anywhere. The reality of rugby at U12 level is that one must make the most of the resources available and find a pattern of play to suit these resources, instil a sense of keenness and team spirit and go out to enjoy Saturday mornings. The team played ten matches the most in one term for a long time - and I believe that, whilst they may not be the "prettiest" team to have represented the School, they are certainly some of the most committed and enterprising players I have had the pleasure to coach. They have made my season a hugely enjoyable one (and I am sure spectators would echo this). It will be interesting to see how the team fare as U13s when all their opponents will have had two terms of rugby experience.

Many, many thanks to Messrs. Seddon, Mallinder and Dunn for their assistance with coaching, to James White for being an excellent captain, to the parents and families who once more have followed the U12 team wherever we have roamed giving fantastic support and to the squad who made it all worthwhile - despite an awful lot of holding my head in my hands in disbelief and horror at the start!

There is no doubt that the team of '89 was one of the most talented and athletic that the School has produced. The fact remains, however, that the season ended disappointingly with the Lancashire Cup Final being lost by the narrowest of margins, and then defeat by Wilmslow being followed by our exit from the Timperley Floodlit Competition at the semi-final stage. The match against Hulmeians in which we scored only 3 goals completed a miserable fortnight in March which saw all our hopes of glory come to nought.

It would be wrong, however to give the impression that the season was a poor one. To reach the last weeks of the term with the prospect of emulating last year's team in their unique achievement of winning Lancashire Cup and Floodlit Trophy still intact, meant that the side had played some fine lacrosse and made great strides both as individuals and as a team.

An excellent start against Cheadle 'B' was followed by a real hammering from Mellor's 'A' team, complete with internationals and County players. The side worked hard after this lesson in teamwork and finishing, picked themselves up, and began to produce some fluent attacking play in the win against Oldham.

One of the early season features of our play was the outstanding development of the back three as a defensive unit in front of the excellent Jones in goal. Griffiths had an excellent game against Cheadle, but Jordan and Herring's understanding between each other was exceptional as they knitted together and learned to read the game with greater maturity. They also began to temper their naturally aggressive desire to win the ball from attack men with a little discretion and judgement as to when to do it although the return of the "dangerous brothers" in the Cup Final was to prove costly.

Veitch's arrival as the junior member of the midfield added flair in front of goal and introduced into the team another fine facer of the ball. Chow was rapidly showing that commitment and pace, and the willingness to support players in all areas of the field were essential

qualities to have in the team, along with Chudleigh's speed and aggression on the groundball, and Clark's strength. In the attack Savage was the dominant influence, as he brought his proven First Division skills to bear, alongside the potential of Roden's quick hands and Ginger's reach and finishing power.

And so Rochdale felt the full force of these improving team skills as they struggled to clear the ball throughout our cup-tie with them. In this game Davidson fairly burst onto the first team with a performance of power and determination which, added to his excellent handling skills, saw him stake his claim to a permanent place on the team. Well though he played however, he never quite repeated this devastating form as the season progressed.

The following week the quarter final match against Hulmeians 'A' was played at the Memorial Ground and the team again raised its performance to new heights. The defence took a stranglehold on an accomplished and experienced attack, and the midfield riding again caused our opponents major problems. In the attack Ginger and Roden were growing in stature and Savage was scoring some outstanding goals. The running and marking, and ground-ball work against a star-studded Hulmeians midfield were all features of our play contributing to a fine win. In the last quarter however, as Hulmeians had a real do-or-die revival, it was Jones in goal, pulling off marvellous point-blank reflex saves, and catching long shots to clear over the top, that gave us the winning edge.

The disaster in the friendly against Heaton Mersey Guild did not diminish progress more than momentarily and we sailed through a thrilling first quarter of our Cup Semi-final crashing in six goals with only one in reply from the shell-shocked Oldham team. The rest of the game was evenly contested as Oldham raised their game, but our tremendous opening salvo gave us a six goal lead that we never surrendered.

Against Sheffield, on the Tour, the team showed further improvements and were unlucky not to beat our First Division opponents. Oxford proved to be a tough team physically but our riding and team defence gave them nothing at all, and the pressure that these two

aspects of the game put them under meant that the goals had to come and we ran out winners more comfortably than the score suggested.

The Hitchin game was a rather disorganised affair, but nonetheless a pleasant occasion and we were well looked-after despite beating our hosts on a muddy, bumpy field.

The unbeaten Tour meant that we approached the Leeds game confidently and our win in the Floodlit against a Mellor team intent on revenge for last year's Final defeat, set us up well for the Lancashire Cup Final. This match was a thrilling one, but the straight defence was too intent on unloading its attack men, and the straight attack did not capitalise on the many chances they made, and so in the end we lost by the narrowest of margins. We still played good lacrosse, however, and competed in a sporting manner despite the pressures of such a close finish in such a big game. Mersey Guild proved worthy winners on the day although narrow the winning margin was a fair reflection of the game.

With a comfortable win at Stockport Grammar and a creditable performance at Wilmslow (now in the First Division) to console us in our loss, we came to end of the season, a team that was much improved on the raw, and rather immature outfit which had lost so heavily to Mellor 'A' on the second Saturday of our season.

To win Cups and Trophies at this level, however, you need to learn a lot of lessons in the very short time that the School season affords. This year's School 1st X learned much, but not quite enough to transform the season from a good one into a really vintage one.

In midfield Jameson's natural ability and competitiveness blended well with the tireless running of Wolstencroft, while Buckley and Daley showed some real attacking flair and, like Jameson, an eye for the goal. In defence, Walker, Naylor and Partington (when not on First Team duty) were sound, but the defensive unit never developed the understanding and teamwork necessary to stop good attacking teams. Mullins in goal, was always a cut above the rest of the team, but knuckled down to contribute his undoubted First Team quality to the side.

On the debit side, however, there was always a lack of cohesion and teamwork, with some players preferring to prove their own personal points to themselves or the team, instead of contributing to the side's overall performance. More support for each other on the field and more commitment to learning in practices and coaching sessions could have made the season a much better one in terms of results.

The classic example of this was in the match against a rather good Poynton side, after two defeats at Stockport Grammar's hands. The game was a tough one and Poynton played hard and wanted to win. Only when the chips were down in the last quarter and the School really played as if it mattered to them, did they get going. In the end Poynton were left hanging on to the slenderest of advantages, and the School were left wishing they had started playing a little sooner.

There is a lot of talent amongst the players of this year's Second Team, but they must look to develop their skills, but more so their tactical awareness and team play if they are to make First X players next season.

UNDER 15's LACROSSE

Only one game lost - the last and most important one! The season commenced on January 7th at Cheadle. The half-time score was 12-2; therefore goalkeeper Bone was transferred to Cheadle for the second half. The final result was 12-2, an indication that our finishing was not nearly sharp enough. The following game at Stockport was called off on the Friday though the Saturday was a glorious day. The Juniors and Schools Cup against Sheffield got under way late and marked the return of Bratt after injury. Blackshaw tried out some revolutionary new footwear - a boot without a sole! A sound performance against a weak but determined Sheffield side resulted in a 17-1 victory. Stockport Grammar School away was lost to the weather resulting in the next game being the cup quarter final against Stockport. What promised to be a tight game was disappointing as Stockport were beaten 11-2. Teamwork at last started to develop and handling skills had improved immensely thanks to some intensive practice on the tennis courts. Half-term and then snow meant the next match was the cup semi-final against our own Under 14's. Unfortunately age seems a great barrier when you are fourteen and the Under 14's did not do themselves justice. The game against Cheadle showed how winning games is not necessarily good practice. Teamwork had fallen away, a win was expected without any effort, everyone wanted to score - a poor performance resulted in a 4-4 scoreline at half-time. Guidance was provided following a glance at the Alex Murphy coaching manual. The second half was a completely different story and gave some indication of the standard that could be reached if challenged. The fifth game of the season was at home to Stockport who promptly scored after 30 seconds. This was just the motivation needed and with the fast break working well an excellent 15-3 victory was completed. Thanks to Glen Mullins for refereeing the game; it is rewarding to see youngsters putting something back into the sport.

The final of the Juniors and Schools Cup was played in pouring rain at Didsbury Cricket Club, immediately before the Flags Final. The game had to be over by 2.00 pm, meaning extra time was impossible. However, one official pointed out that Timperley were clear favourites and extra time would be unnecessary. Selection had been difficult as the Under 15's had a strong squad and being underdogs suited us fine. School were much stronger in midfield and gained plenty of possession. A man-up move brought a goal from Williams followed by a good team goal finished off by Moss. Early in the second quarter the game should have been sealed up but the referee failed to notice Cunningham's shot bounce off the back support of the goal. Timperley then got more into the game and their excellent attack enabled them to pull back to 2-2 and go into a 3-2 lead. The game continued at a remarkably high standard considering the torrential rain. Williams equalised but again Timperley went ahead 4-3 and then 5-4 with on~two minutes remaining. This was the time for Moss to show a cool head and score on a fast break. Unfortunately extra time was not played, so after being presented to the Mayor of Stockport a replay was arranged. The squad can be proud of their effort, determination and skill that went into this particular game with the major strength being the groundball strength, power and drive of the midfield players.

The final replay was at Timperley and a disappointing game ended in a 7-4 defeat. School failed to score despite many man-up opportunities and plenty of possession. There were far too many deliberate fouls in the game even resulting in a Timperley defender being 'fouled out' of the game. I am not impressed by the 'over celebration' of goals scored, or the cynical defensive fouls creeping into Junior Lacrosse.

Once again the Under 15 Lacrosse players have a great deal of potential; further development will depend upon the attitude of each individual. Bone is an excellent goalkeeper who will benefit from playing more pressure games. He must also work hard to improve his clearing. The defence were sound and worked as a unit to show great improvement throughout the season. Unfortunately Anish Mehta had a knee injury that restricted his movement but he showed strong defensive qualities in the true Cheadle tradition. Stansfield and Sutcliffe improved their handling while Wilson showed how much he had improved in the Juniors and Schools Cup Final. The midfield showed a great deal of determination and adapted to the 13 man squad system. Jong Kim is a powerful player who turned in two impressive performances for Lancashire Under 15's. The attack combined well but need to sharpen up their shooting. Williams and Ladd were both able to beat defenders whenever they wished but often failed to finish off a move with a goal scoring shot.

Bone, Wilson, Mehta, Kim, Ladd and Holder were selected for Lancashire Under 15's who defeated the South and Cheshire for the first time in seven years.

On reflection the team only had two hard games all season both Cup Finals against Timperley. The potential is present in all the players - who will be keen enough to continue to improve to National standard?

The Under 14's had the usual problem at this level in that most club sides tend to be organised as under 15's teams and hence most of the opponents were older and bigger than the School team. Only in two matches was this difference in size and maturity evident. In the other matches the School competed well and often came out on top. It was particularly pleasing for the team to reach the semi-final of the Juniors and Schools Cup Competition, a competition that this team will be able to compete for next season.

If the team is to win this competition next year then it must improve as a whole while the players must develop individually. The following comments are made with this in mind:

We had the luxury of two goalkeepers this season and it was difficult to choose between them. Both Connor and Mason played well at times but also had off days. It is this inconsistency, particularly with ground shots, that both players must strive to overcome.

The defence was built around Foster who was the model of consistency and has an excellent temperament. He should, perhaps, be looking to use a longer stick next season. Foster was usually accompanied by Asgher and Jones in straight defence. The former could learn much from Foster with respect to attitude and temperament, while the latter needs to improve his mobility. Both Asgher and Jones could find their places in jeopardy from Arora.

Six players normally shared all the hard work in midfield. Baama combined his playing and captaincy roles well, leading by example. Reichl and Whiteley both worked hard but found some of the bigger opponents a handful and will obviously benefit next year. Bury and Sum both used their strength and fitness well but must improve their vision, rather than just ploughing on with heads down. Veitch has the most natural ability in this department, having a good eye for an opening, but he needs to increase his work rate to become more effective.

In attack four players usually competed for the three places. Eckersley and West both have the knack of putting the ball in the net but do not work hard enough, particularly when our attack breaks down. Buckley and Sunderland both worked hard. The former needs to start scoring more goals while the latter needs to concentrate on getting closer to the crease when feeding from behind.

Of the players who did not play regularly, two showed the potential to force themselves into the team. Arora has already been mentioned as a likely straight defence player, while Wood has the ability to get into the team either in midfield or attack. His natural left-handedness would add an extra dimension to the team.

I would like to thank all the players for making the season an enjoyable one and several parents for their regular and welcome support. Finally, thanks also go to Andy Booth, captain of Old Hulmeians 1st X, for giving up many Saturday mornings to help with the coaching and refereeing.

We were fortunate to possess quite a few tireless midfield players. Individuals must move off the ball to move individual defenders and create uncertainty in the minds of the opposition. These aspects will take time to master, although there was certainly a big improvement made as the season progressed.

This development was highlighted in our three fixtures with Stockport Grammar School. Initially, early in the season, we were soundly beaten; we met them later in the Cup Competition and in a very close fought and thrilling match just lost; finally in the last game of the season we beat them quite convincingly - a fitting end to a good season.

I was very pleased with the general attitude of all players and with the development of several lesser players. I can certainly see the team going from strength to strength as they progress through the School.

May I finally thank the parents who supported regularly throughout the season and who helped with transport when it was required.

Over the Christmas holiday, three coaching sessions were arranged for all interested boys, and over twenty appeared at each session. Three, who have older brothers in the School, had practised some lacrosse previously, but, to the rest, it was a completely new sport. It was soon apparent that there were many good athletes, and a large number quickly learned the initial skills of picking up, catching and throwing. The first three weeks of the Term enabled further skills to develop, and specialist positions to be considered. The final session included 23 boys, most of whom appeared good enough to take part in a full match, and it was difficult to reduce these numbers.

Stockport Grammar School provided the first opposition, and a close game resulted. We went into an early lead, before losing it, but came good in the final quarter. The teamwork was not as it might have been (not surprising for a first match!), but good individual performances came from Nick Reading in goals, Chris Gleave in midfield and Dominic Stansfield in attack.

The second match, at Mellor, was on a small, sloping and muddy pitch, and against a side with two very good midfield players and two tall defenders. We were a little overawed, and found it difficult to penetrate the opposition defence, but it was only in the last quarter that we lost the match, as the midfield tired.

The final game before half term was played in complete mud at Stockport Grammar School. Although our teamwork had improved, conditions prevented too many fluid moves. Goals seemed short, until strategic substitutions and fresher legs helped us gain a comfortable win.

After half term, we again met Mellor, and tried different tactics in order to overcome the problems we had previously encountered. We kept one player almost constantly on the crease in attack, and one more behind goals to give the feed. When they received the ball, each worked efficiently, but neither received enough of the ball and, when the pass came, it was usually too late. Our midfield ran with the ball too long, and Mellor were much more sharp on the break. One major tactic that this group of boys must learn is the quick break. When a defence is difficult to break down, the midfield must move quickly, the ball must be passed early to the attack and shots on goal must be made before the defence can assemble.

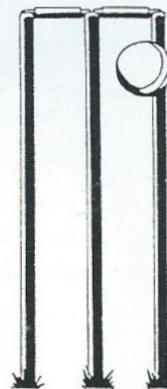
In our next match, against Heaton Mersey, all the preparations paid off, and all players played well as a team. The quick midfield passing produced many openings on goals. The defence held well, the midfield trio of captain Chris Gleave, Dominic Stansfield and James Brocklehurst was excellent, Iain Cooke's feeds were very effective, and Philip Sidebottom and scored TEN goals. It is many years since an Under 12 team had scored over twenty goals in a match, but we did this time, and against a team that was of a reasonable standard.

At the end of the season, the team had two opportunities to play on the difficult surface of Timperley's astroturf. They took part in an Under 13 6-a-side tournament, winning one of their four games, putting up a very good performance in others, and enjoying the experience. The final match, against Timperley's Under 12's, saw heavy rain make the surface slippery. Tyrone Berkeley's strength in defence helped the rest of the team push forward, the midfield worked hard, and the resulting win was more convincing than the score suggested. The team again played well, and gained many compliments about their endeavour, their skills and style of play.

For the coach, this turned out to be the most enjoyable season for some years, with a splendid bunch of boys who worked, trained and played hard together. In Nicholas Reading, another top-class goalkeeper appears to be developing, and James White and Tyrone Berkeley were both very strong in defence, with support from James Crawshaw. The midfield of Chris Gleave, Dominic Stansfield and James Brocklehurst was very quick and skilful, but must pass the ball early. Iain Cooke and Matthew Whiteley did not score enough goals in attack, but did feed others well. Philip Sidebottom showed that he can score goals, but needs to make a greater impression on the whole

game. A great future looms for this team if all practise hard and continuously, and, preferably, join a Junior Club in order to maintain the training. Thanks to the many parents who constantly supported, encouraged and assisted with transport. Thanks, especially, to Messrs Warnes and Stansfield for their specialist help with training and coaching, and to the U.S. coaches who helped at some lunch-time sessions.

The loss of eight senior cricketers from the 1988 side might have been expected to produce a season of simply re-building and hopes for the future with little in the way of results. In fact the team of 89 had an excellent season, without suffering the occasional disasters that can usually occur even in the best of seasons, and the term was full of not only good, but tremendously exciting cricket.

The excitement began soon after the beginning of the season, and following defeats at Bury and Arnold, when we had Bolton School with eight wickets down and only 79 on the board.

The two earlier games had exposed some basic weaknesses in the side. At Arnold against Aga's left arm slow bowling, valuable lessons were learned and the willingness of the team to practise and learn from their mistakes was shown when later in the season, against similar bowlers, the side thrived. The defeat at Bury was not too dispiriting. Wood, promoted from the Under 14's, batted grittily on a wicket that could be most generously described as sporting, and, when we had struggled against the unreliable pitch to reach 151 for 5, Jordan made a good declaration to leave a reasonable chance of bowling the Bury side out. In the event the Bury openers (both Lancashire county Schoolboys) were let off the hook by the unfortunate Daley who had the misfortune to be behind a straight slip chance, and under a skier, without his customary wicket-keeping gloves on. The Bury lads made the best of their good fortune, and our bowlers helped them by bowling short. Thus we suffered our second defeat.

The following match was against King's School Macclesfield who had perhaps the best batting side in depth that we met all season. Jordan's captaincy was of the highest order on this day. He handled his bowlers superbly, read the batsmen well, set near-perfect fields, kept the pressure on throughout the innings, and with the help of a wicket from Kapadia in his first over each time he was brought back into the attack (on three occasions), bowled Macclesfield out for 178.

Our reply began disastrously, and we slumped to 25 for 5. However Partington seemed intent on carrying his bat, after being called on to open in Wood's absence (at Old Trafford scoring a century in the Lancashire U15 Final Trial, North v. South match) and Jordan joined him at five wickets down to put together a hundred partnership and leave us wanting forty off the last eight overs and with five wickets standing. For the first time in the innings Macclesfield were contemplating the real prospect of defeat, but Jordan was adjudged lbw and was followed back to the pavilion by two unlucky batsmen who had to come in to a run chase, in fading light, and so we had to settle for a draw.

A tame draw against Q.E.G.S. Wakefield was followed by our first win of the season, which saw the precocious talent of Wood blossom fully for the first time on the 1st XI.

Jordan, again, led his side in positive and determined fashion, and had Lytham struggling at 160 for 7, but the initiative slipped away from us, and after 59 overs King Edward's declared, leaving the School to chase 188 in what was to be about 40 overs. Wood and Jordan gave every impression of going for a ten-wicket victory when the score was 120 for 0 in the first 55 minutes, but when Jordan fell Ridings was there to ensure that the momentum was not lost. In the end Ridings was out with eight runs needed and Wood needing nine runs for his hundred. Abrahams tried manfully to score no runs without throwing away another wicket, but despite his efforts the win came, with Wood two short of the magical three figures.

The Parents' fixture once again prompted the School to display their fielding talents to the full and the tight bowling of Jordan and Kapadia was shown to its best effect with excellent catching and ground fielding from the whole team. Exciting run chases against Stockport Grammar and Sedbergh, where a marvellous innings from Ridings, and Kapadia's increasingly mature swing and seam bowling, had put us in a possible winning position, were overshadowed in terms of excitement by the match at home to Birkenhead.

Wood and Ridings once again got the team off to an excellent start. 96 runs were put on for the first wicket but we failed to capitalise on the foundations laid and were eventually bowled out for 182.

Birkenhead were always in the hunt and chased the runs sensibly, but Jordan never lost his sense of purpose and as the last over began all four results were possible, as Birkenhead needed six to win and the School needed 2 wickets. With only one ball remaining Tilston made a rare lightning reflex stop at short leg to run out the last man and win the match.

The glorious weather that we had enjoyed until the Sedbergh match suddenly disappeared as we played ourselves into a position to beat M.G.S. for the first time in several years. Tilston, building on the promise he had begun to show at Sedbergh, and Wood, yet again, saw us to 133 for 3 before wickets began to tumble, but then Jordan and Hollingworth, racing for the declaration, reduced the wilting M.G.S. fielders and bowlers to overthrows and recrimination, as they put on 57 in 25 minutes of cheeky running between the wickets, and chancy hitting over the infield. We declared an 211 for 6, leaving our opponents two and a half hours to get the runs. The rain came with their reply at 77 for 2 but with the prize scalp of Crawley falling to Hollingworth, and the game evenly poised.

More excitement came at Crosby on a damp wicket as Merchant Taylors' struggled against the conditions to only 102. The School fell behind the run rate but determined to chase the runs right to the end and in the last over it was left to Doney to save us from defeat, eleven runs short.

The XL Club match saw us in another last-over finish, again batting second. Abrahams put us in a winning position—23 runs needed, with 4 wickets standing and 5 overs left. Wickets tumbled however, and with debutant Ladd and leg-spinner Edwards as the last pair at the crease, and only two overs left, a win for the School was a long-odds bet. The final pair were equal to the task, however, and with one ball to spare Edwards smote the four runs needed, to walk from the field victorious, with his partner, who had already taken five wickets in the XL Club's innings.

A low-scoring game at Bradford on another drying wicket provided more excitement, although in the end we could not take the wickets necessary to back up Partington's fine performance with the bat. Bolton Abbey again under-estimated us as we made an excellent 160 on another damp track. And then tigerish fielding and straight bowling put them so far behind the asking rate that they had to take what proved to be fatal chances, in their vain attempt to chase our total.

The match against the Staff was Ridings' finest hour. At Sedbergh he had taken risks to try to get a win for the team, and had been out, caught in the deep eight runs short of his hundred. A more selfish player might well have settled for a draw in the circumstances, and made sure of his own personal glory. His great contributions to every aspect of the team's success were recognised in the penultimate match when he scored an imperious hundred full of power and glorious shots. The Staff lost important wickets to Kapadia, whose hundred wickets taken for the First XI are testimony to his craft and technique as well as his endeavour, and the match fizzled out with the stout, if boring, resistance of Mr Shaw, and the experience of Mr. Blight, ensuring a draw.

The last match seemed to sum up the whole season in many ways. The batting was adequate, even promising, but only a couple of players fulfilled their promise. The declaration typified the positive captaincy and leadership from three senior players which had been evident throughout the year. The Old Boys chased the total unrelentingly, and the almost customary last-over finish left seven runs needed by Hulmeians and two wickets needed by the School. The tension mounted as a single and then a four were scored, then Ladd capped a marvellous performance with his sixth wicket, two balls needed or two runs. Scores tied, one ball left. And a scampered single to give the Old Boys a win (for once) ended a splendid season with the narrowest of defeats.

The following players formed the 1989 1st XI: I. P. Jordan (Captain), A. S. Partington (Vice-captain), J. P. Abrahams, A. K. Doney, J. Edwards, P. W. Goodall, R. K. Hollingworth, S. V. Kapadia, A. K. Scott, N. J. Ridings, L. E. Tilston, N. T. Wood, I. A. Brassell, C. J. H. Chudleigh, M. Ekstein, P. Daley, M. Kapoor, A. A. Khan, A. R. Ladd, and N. F. Taylor also played.

Finally, the season cannot be summed up adequately without reference to A. Haffner, the team's scorer. However, simply to give him that title, diminishes the role which he has played as a member of the 1st Team squad. His "Bill Frindall" scoresheets were a mystery to us all, in April, but when he had patiently educated us in their use, the dimension of understanding it gave to our performances was tremendous. Balls faced, from which end runs were scored, details of how out, chances given or dropped, runs per hour, runs per 100 balls, and the amazingly detailed "where the runs were scored" charts that he produced provided great interest and satisfaction to all the team, and put the final touches to an excellent season.

My thanks also go to Gallagher who cheerfully turned up as 12th man and scorer and was equally happy to either play or score as the requirements of the team dictated.

The Under 15s, Cricket contained some familiar faces from the Lacrosse season. Bone was now the wicket keeper rather than the goalkeeper, Ladd an opening bowler, Cunningham a punishing batsman, Mehta a spin bowler and Lambert ... could we get him to bowl straight?

We at last had a summer term with cricket weather and dry wickets. Bowlers had to bowl accurately and batsmen had only to be patient to ensure a good score. The Under 15s have a squad of eighteen players all with some degree of talent. Unfortunately few fifteen year olds have realised that the other vital ingredient to cricket success is between the ears. Both in the nets and in matches batsmen want to thump every ball. They have to learn to be patient, and wait for the bad ball. The games that have been lost have been on account of impatience and poor strokes leading to a collapse of the batting. Cunningham has plenty of time to play the ball, and scored 50 against Manchester Grammar School because he managed to discipline himself. Time at the crease is a vital part of building the confidence to bat against any side on any wicket. Burton tries hard and improved steadily through the season, scoring 51 in the final match against Bradford Grammar School. Mehta also scored 50 in the last match and showed his potential throughout the season, though he must learn to move his feet. Bone has a good technique but lacks the power to play a big innings. Nevertheless he is a good wicketkeeper and has been able to steady the innings on several occasions. Ranawickrema has a great deal of natural ability (he says it is in the genes!) and has made important contributions both with the bat and ball. Holder is a very good fielder, sound batsman and proved an adequate wicket keeper when Bone was injured. Ahmed and Sutcliffe deserve a mention, especially for their defiant last wicket stand at Birkenhead. As the last pair they managed to bat for 30 overs, scoring only 8 runs but enabling W.H.G.S. to draw the game.

Captain Andrew Ladd was also the major striker bowler, taking 25 wickets in the season. He bowls fairly quickly and, more importantly, accurately.

Lambert was lucky to gain a place in the side early in the season but by June he was opening the bowling. He is slowly learning the importance of accuracy and once he has the confidence he will be able to bowl quickly. Ranawickrema can swing the ball and picked up wickets throughout the season. Mehta can turn the ball but still does not have perfect control. Ahmed and Ayoob bowled well at times but are still liable to lose control of line and length. Many other players in the squad have practised diligently but have not had the chance to show their ability in the team. They must all continue to play cricket, improve their technique and enjoy the game. Mr. Timm highlighted the strengths of the team in his match report following the win at Lytham. Results this season were a considerable disappointment. At the beginning of the season there had appeared on paper to be a number of sufficiently talented cricketers in the year group which would take the team to a highly successful season. The only victories, however, were in the Harold Bailey Trophy against relatively poor opponents; in the third round we came up against Manchester Grammar School, a team probably not containing many more better players, and lost most emphatically. The truth is not that we had an unlucky series of matches; in general, we deserved the results that we obtained. How then, was it possible for a team of several good players to lose so often? Most U14 teams containing two or three very good players will win more matches than this team did, with the necessary help of reasonable performances from the rest of the team. N. T. Wood, almost certainly the best player of the U14s, was unavailable for all matches except for two of the Harold Bailey matches (he was rightly playing for the School first eleven) but P. D. Warren surely made up for the loss of Wood by his outstanding form when batting, bowling and fielding.

If the players are good enough, then other factors must be considered as at least contributing to the large number of defeats: the captaincy, for example. Perry Warren's captaincy at first revealed some weaknesses in field-placings but this is not unusual for this age-group. In any case, if the bowling is inaccurate no field-placing will be adequate. Sometimes Perry did not use his bowlers properly: for example he tended to bowl himself too long and was reluctant to try his spinners early on, before the batsmen began to see the ball well. He was, however, handicapped by the absence of O. Asgher and F. J. Baama for some of the early matches. Also, in Perry's favour, one has to mention that his bowlers too frequently let down the side by bowling inaccurately and far too often batsmen played atrocious shots before they had settled into their innings. The most important reason, though, was a poor team spirit. By this one does not mean that the players were not happy playing together—they usually were —

but that there was a mental immaturity which prevented the players from cohering. The signs of this lack of a feeling of collective effort were shown early on: poor attendance at winter nets and a reportedly bad attitude at the weekly net practices. Another indication of this is the poor attitude towards keeping the score (whether on the scoreboard or in the scorebook): rarely can there have been a side with such a careless attitude towards these important duties.

The standard of fielding was fairly good and had shown a considerable improvement by the end of the season. Fred Baama had a particularly good long throw-in from the deep. From the beginning, there was evidence of a sense of the need to back-up behind the wicket-keeper or the bowler. Occasionally, there was a blight of dropped catches and slip-catching was not often up to standard. The wicket-keeping was relatively weak. J. A. Daniel was the principal exponent and he coped well with wayward fast bowling but he lacks natural talent for this demanding position: the ball tended not to remain in his gloves for long, to the despair of the faster bowlers. His fluency of movement against slow bowlers was insufficient, as was his self-confidence. A. J. Howarth did the job for a few matches but his enthusiasm did not match his ability—he is better used as an attacking close-in fielder.

Perry Warren's batting was indispensable: he scored three not out centuries for the School and rarely failed in the other matches. He combines a keen eye with good technique and an immense determination which sometimes reached the point of ruthlessness. Perhaps his team-mates felt too much dependence on him and when (if) he was dismissed, lost confidence in their own ability to build an innings. Nevertheless, they are lucky to have such a good model to imitate. Usually, after a long innings, he had to be capable of an equally long bowling spell. His greatest weakness was to start bowling wides and no-balls, but this should not detract from deserved praise for his excellent standard of genuinely fast and aggressive bowling. Fred Baama was also a success as an all-rounder and, with Omar Asgher (bowling) and Julien Daniel (batting), can count himself as among those who made the greatest progress during the season. S. Arora and M. T. Rhodes are obvious talents but are not yet dependable as batsmen because they still lack concentration and the ability to decide when to make an attacking stroke. Sunny Arora improved as a bowler and is now a good first change, once Warren or Asgher needs to rested. Arora, Rhodes and many others of the team could learn something from the team's newcomer, S. J. Dearden, who entered the team late and showed considerable promise. His strength is that he is keen to learn: he already has a good defensive technique and he has shown a high level of independent judgement. Howarth and N. A. Whiteley, while lacking so far the skills of those already mentioned, are beginning to show some understanding of what cricket requires of them: D. B. Connor and B. J. Rimron are also enthusiastic and good team members. H. A. F. Slack suffered an unfortunate injury which curtailed his season just when he needed more experience—he, too, lacks good judgement when batting.

The following also made important contributions to the U14 team: R. S. Smith, D. B. Radiven, S. Sobani, C. Bury and K. W. E. Jones.

I should also like record my gratitude to Mr A. M. Blight, Mr G. D. Saddington and Mr I. J. Shaw for giving occasional assistance in umpiring.

This has been perhaps the best season for senior tennis that I have known. Of eighteen matches played, the highest number ever, the 1st. VI won eight and drew two. A team of four boys represented the school in the Midland Bank and Glanvill Cup Competitions, and fifteen senior players took part in what came to be known affectionately as "WIMBLECON '89", the most ambitious tennis tour to date, to play against some of the toughest opposition in Surrey. In all respects, the team has given a good account of itself, and the future looks even brighter as a result of this term's performances.

There were many players available to the First Team, some of whom had played at this level for at least one previous season, and others who made their debut this year. Of the regulars, Captain Ben Lee and Vice-captain David Berman have distinguished themselves by winning a total of forty-two out of fifty-eight sets played. At all times, they have led by example, inspiring and encouraging the team to play at the highest level of its ability. Their attitude and conduct, on and off court, have been exemplary, and they have richly deserved their awards of Full Colours.

The value of having fixed, regular pairings in doubles cannot be overstated. Only by playing together on a regular basis, can two individuals develop the understanding and confidence in each other which is required to win points in what must surely be the most aggressive and tactical form of the game, if it is played well. It has been a pleasure to watch the first pair, battling against high odds and overcoming them by force of will, and on occasions, sharing their disappointment, when, despite their best efforts, the opposition played better.

Other players who have contributed to the successes this season are R. W. Buckley and P. J. Davies, of whom the latter returned to the side late in the term due to a shoulder injury sustained whilst playing rugby last term. S. P. H. Larkin and S. J. Richardson have also proved to be a valiant, winning partnership. It is encouraging to know that this side will remain essentially unchanged next year.

It would be unfair not to mention Robert Levene and Simon Harrington, who have played some fine tennis for the 1st VI. Levene, who was without a regular partner for most of last season, played with R. Buckley in some early matches, until the return of P. Davies. Harrington appeared as a new member of the squad at the start of term, and has made an invaluable contribution to the side. Others, whose contributions have been no less valuable are, A. Reece (Captain of the Seconds), B. Arora, T. Wright, S. Howell and J. Meadows.

As regards facilities, our long-awaited Playdeck Courts appeared at the start of June and their professional appearance and superb playing-surfaces have given a much-needed boost to the status of school tennis. It is expected that the remaining two old courts will be resurfaced within the next two years. The addition of floodlighting in September, will allow the use of the outdoor courts well into next term, weather permitting. The training programme for next season will also begin in September, when Mr. Colin Petch will again take charge of the coaching sessions; I would like to thank him most sincerely for the work he has done with this side for the last eighteen months.

It remains to be seen what the effect of all this will be, but I feel confident that when the time comes to write next year's report, there will be more good news in store.

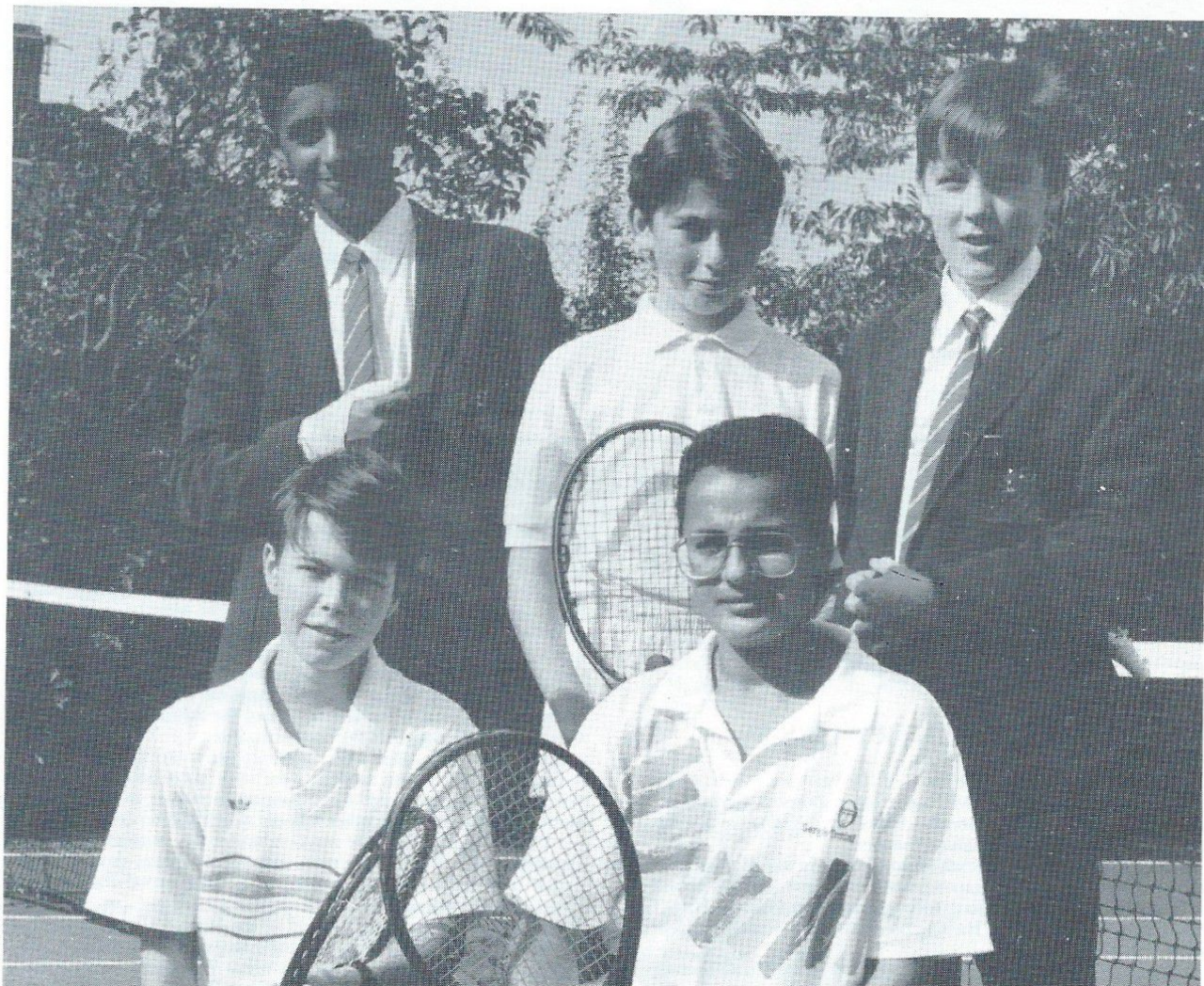

THE PARENTS' & PUPILS' COMPETITION THE BURDEN TROPHY

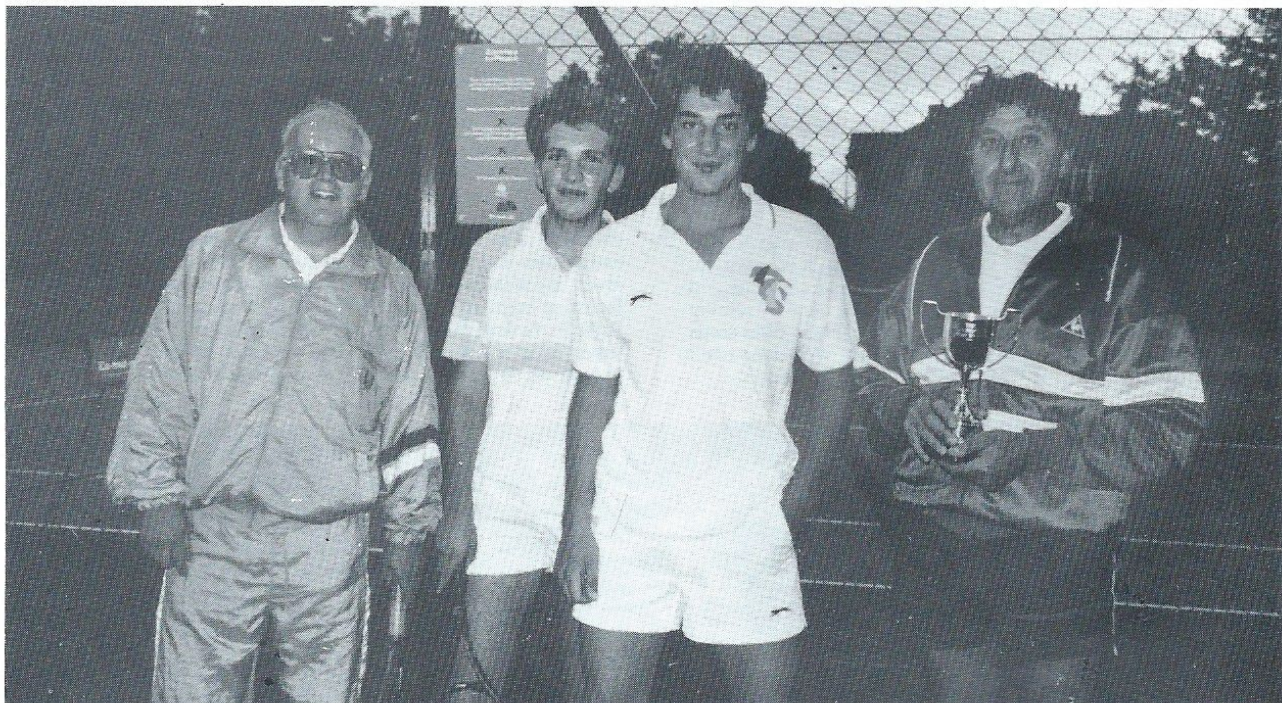

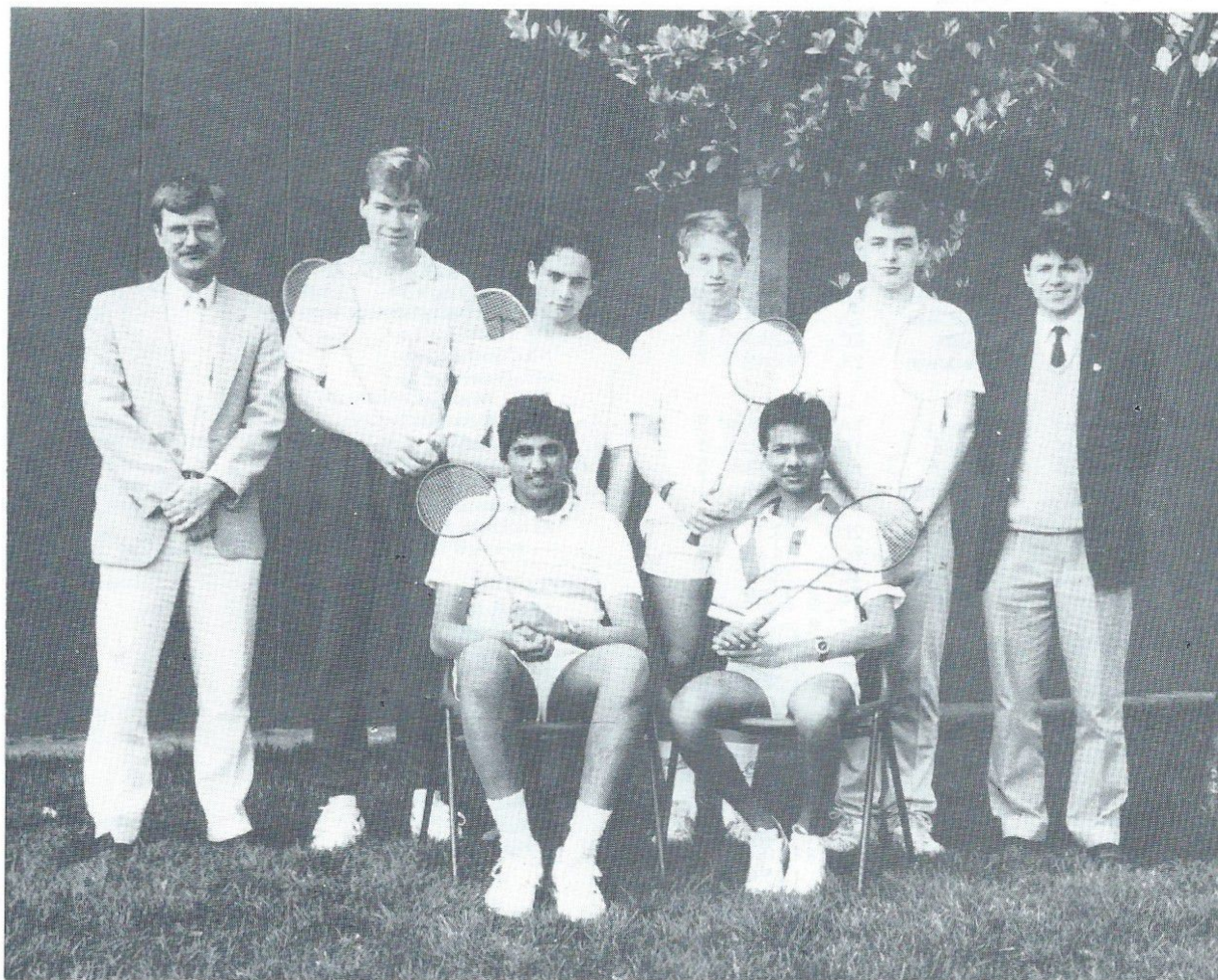

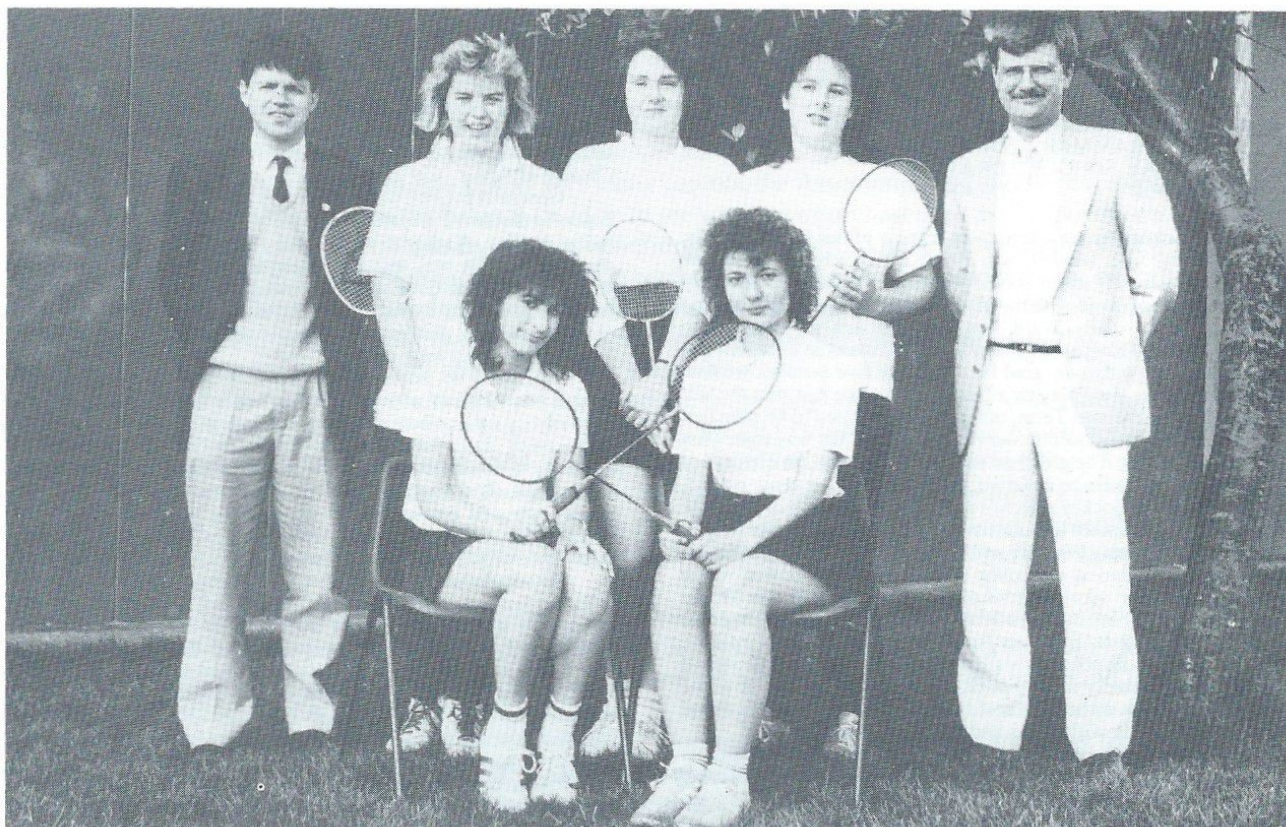

CHAIRMANS REPORT

Thanks to excellent support from School and very many parents, the Association had another excellent year. The result is that, besides retaining a healthy balance (read on to see why!), we purchased for the School the new Satellite TV Receiving Equipment now in full use and already benefiting many pupils. We also printed School Athletic Vests, which I'm told resulted in an immediate improvement in performance; Lacrosse equipment for the benefit of young or occasional players; Lacrosse shirts for the new 3rd X; and a new hull for the School Hovercraft. Taken together with expensive book purchases and the two minibuses we have bought for School in recent years, this shows the direct value to a very wide range of pupils of the Association's activities.

In parallel with our fund-raising activities we have had the usual busy social calendar - the Headmaster's Talk, Cheese and Wine with the Staff, the joint Dinner Dance with the Old Hulmeians, a Quiz for all ages, plus cricket matches, tennis and badminton. My thanks are due to all my committee, especially our Secretary Sue Wilson, the outgoing Treasurer Bev Pardoe, the Social Secretary Liz Bull and the Christmas Fair Organiser Pat Phillips. Thanks also to David Mee for arranging the Grand Draw, which raised £1000.
