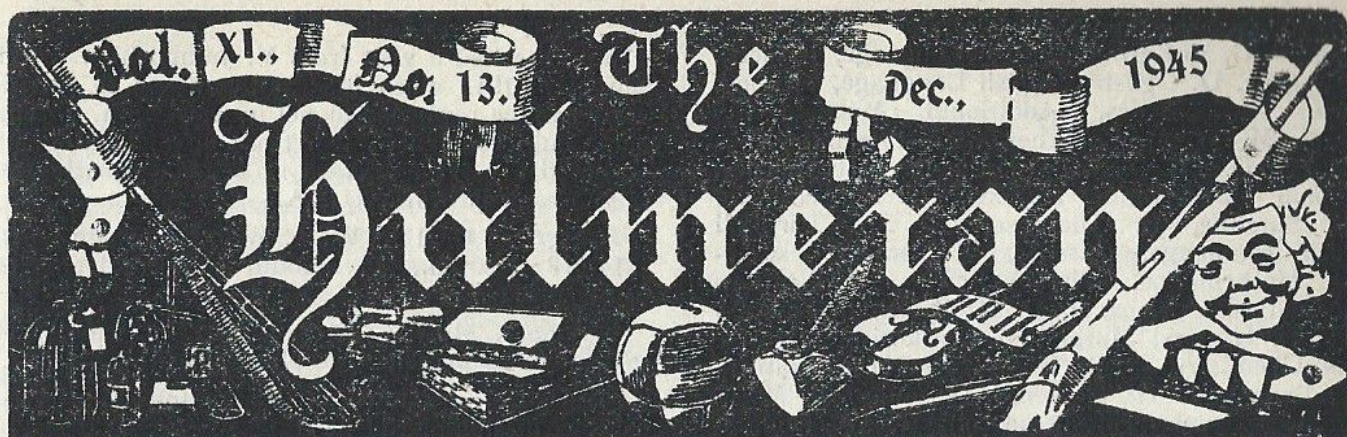

Speech Day.

Speech Day, this year, was held on the afternoon of Wednesday, July 25th, and the fine summer's day drew a large crowd of parents, friends and Old Boys, filling the Hall to its utmost capacity. Canon Woolnough, Chairman of the Governors, presided, while Dr. Stallybrass, President of Brasenose College, Oxford, presented the prizes and gave the address.

In his report on the work of the School during the year the Head Master, Mr. Trevor Dennis, after recounting the successes of Old Hulmeians in many spheres, proceeded to speak of the work and the various activities of the School itself. He mentioned the successes in the School Certificate and the Higher School Certificate examinations, and spoke of the large increase in the number of boys attending the School. Games on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons were well attended, and mention was made of the good work done by the School at the war-time summer Harvest Camps. The speaker then made reference to the successes of the J.T.C. in the Certificate "A" examinations, and to the excellent report received from the War Office on the occasion of the annual inspection. He ended with a tribute to all who had helped with the work of the School during the year.

After distributing the prizes, Dr. Stallybrass addressed the School. He spoke with pleasure of his direct interest in the School as a result of the Hulme School's Scholarships to Brasenose College, and urged the value of the Classics as a medium of education. The speaker insisted that every boy should use the School to develop his talents, no matter in what direction they might lie, and he should look forward to pursuing a life of work and usefulness regardless of financial gain. Nor should a boy allow himself to be too much distracted by outside pleasures which had little connection with his work.

The proceedings ended with a performance by the School Orchestra, conducted by Mr. Williams.

Demonstrations in science and exhibitions of art and woodwork attracted many visitors.

Flookburgh Harvest Camp.

For the sixth year in succession the School provided a camp of schoolboy harvesters and foresters in the Cark, Cartmel and Holker districts of North Lancashire. The camp opened on August 1st in the Camp School belonging to the Keighley Education Committee on Humphrey Head, and closed down on September 12th.

From the first day to the last the service of every boy was in demand, sometimes in several places, and no camp organiser could wish for better camp weather or a better working party.

7,657 hours, 257 more than the previous best, were worked in the six weeks with a party of 28 boys in the first week, 29 in the second, 29 in the third, 28 in the fourth, 27 in the fifth and 25 in the sixth, and every kind of farm work was splendidly done. The willingness of the boys to take full advantage of the excellent weather (they worked on both V.J. days), resulted for the first time during the war years in the harvesting of all the grain on the farms on which the boys worked. In addition, we helped with the threshing on all the farms. The boys who worked on forestry were always willing to give a hand with the harvest or the lifting of potatoes in the evenings and on Saturday afternoons, and their help was very much appreciated.

Much of the work was heavy, but was cheerfully tackled, and a visit to any farm might find a boy driving a tractor or working a corn binder, dipping sheep, hedging or ditching or loading a cart with corn and, in every case, a farmer pleased and grateful.

The workers were again excellently served by a camp staff who never spared themselves to provide

meals at any time of the day or night. Our Quartermaster, Mr. Gatley, who stayed the whole six weeks, was efficiency personified, and again seemed to thrive on the minimum of sleep. The work done in the kitchen by Mrs. Barber, Mrs. Hope, Mr. Ginever, Mr. Williams and Mr. Wardle was excellent, and the health of the camp was a tribute to the efforts of the kitchen staff, who appreciated the vote of thanks spontaneously made by A. Salmon after the last evening meal at camp.

The camp also passed a vote of thanks to the orderlies, J. W. Breadon, J. P. Clapham, J. R. Chambers, J. Fleming, R. A. McMillan and B. B. Taylor, who all worked three weeks.

We were very pleased to receive a visit from the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of Manchester (Alderman W. P. Jackson and Mrs. Jackson), who had lunch and tea in camp and saw some of the boys returning from work. We also had a visit from the Director of Education of Keighley, Mr. E. Ratcliffe, and Mr. W. Harrison, the Lancashire War Agricultural Committee's Labour Officer.

Once again we have to thank the Keighley Education Committee and its Director of Education for the privilege of using their Camp School and equipment.

Every boy has received, in addition to free board and lodging, rail and cycle fares, 13/- a week for his services.

Worcester Harvest Camp.

With the need for workers as urgent as ever this year, the Worcester Agricultural Committee again asked us to furnish all the help we could, and at the same time offered to appoint us to another district if we thought we would like a change. However, as the farmers at Eastham were expecting us, and, indeed, were counting on our labour to see them over the harvest, we decided to make the Memorial Hall at Eastham our headquarters for the fourth year in succession. The Agricultural Committee had suggested that, in view of the scarcity of fruit, it might be better to restrict our numbers, but a preliminary visit to the farmers in the district encouraged us to keep to our usual figure, and we started off with over sixty. Such was the demand for our services that work could have been found for at least twenty more boys. The harvest, which was above the average, ripened early, and, with the fruit being more plentiful than expected, there was more work

than we could undertake. It was, therefore, all the more unfortunate that the weather was the worst we have ever experienced during our six camps, and the rain was so persistent that at one time the question arose of curtailing the camp. All this, of course, greatly reduced our hours of labour, and, instead of reaching our target of 12,000 hours, we had difficulty in just topping 10,000 hours; even so, we were over 1,200 hours short of our last year's figure. Yet, in spite of all the adverse conditions, the health of the camp remained very good, and it was remarkable to note the cheerfulness with which all went about their various tasks. Whenever the weather permitted—and sometimes when it didn't—all went out to their farms. The jobs we were called on to do varied considerably, but whatever the work it was tackled willingly. Particularly would we like to commend for their zeal and keenness the more junior members of the camp, some of whom were under canvas for the first time; their work and their readiness to help showed they realized what was expected of them. It was this spirit that greatly helped to overcome all our difficulties towards the end, and achieve what, in the circumstances, was an excellent result. Another feature of the camp deserving of comment was the excellent work of some of the junior sixth form and the fifth form boys as leaders in charge of working parties.

It was very satisfactory to hear at the end of camp the very favourable remarks of the farmers on the good work done by the boys. Perhaps the best commentary of all was the hope, repeatedly expressed, that we would come again next year, and one or two even went as far as to say that, by our work, we had made ourselves indispensable to them for their harvest.

During the camp we were pleased to have two visits from Mr. and Mrs. Dennis, while another welcome visitor was Mr. Parren, who stayed with us for a week and made himself more than useful. Other two former members of the Staff, Miss Slater and Miss Harris, joined us, and their willing help was much appreciated. The thanks of the camp are due to them and to Miss Green for her efficient and untiring efforts in the dining room, to Miss Williams, whose first camp it was, for so cheerfully and competently carrying on with the work in the kitchen, to Mr. Jecny for his capable work in supervising the cooking for three weeks, and to Mr. Barnett and Mr. Moritz for their ready and able help in many departments. Special mention should be made of the work of R. P. Handford who stayed with us the whole time and performed most efficiently behind the scenes.

We were glad to have a visit from G. Wilkinson, who came to spend a week-end with us.

Our best thanks are due to Mr. J. Kershaw (O.H.) for the great help he gave us with our transport.

The camp was arranged by Mr. Anderson.

1st XV.

The 1st XV., possessing, perhaps, the most uniformly fast set of three-quarters the School has had, began the season in promising style. Against strong teams, although their defence was not perfect, their attack was at times very good indeed, and they combined well to score some excellent tries. The forwards, too, have done good work in the open, and, though they scrum well as a rule, have not mastered the art of heeling quickly enough or often enough both in the "set" and "loose" scrums, and have therefore limited the chances of the backs. The whole XV., just as they have played teams varying considerably in standard, have themselves also lacked consistency except, perhaps, in their capacity for making simple avoidable mistakes, which, though brought to nought against a weak team, have proved disastrous against a fast, hard-going side. This was illustrated in the Merchant Taylors' match, particularly, where our opponents were quick to take advantage of these slips and turned what might have been a narrow victory into a decisive win. A stricter observance of the following few simple rules would improve the chances of this team: (1) Get possession more frequently; (2) tackle more quickly before the opponent can get moving; (3) never lob passes (this fault has led to "intercept" tries being scored by our opponents in almost every match); (4) never part with the ball unless the potential receiver is in a better position than the one in possession.

Altogether this is a fast, hard-going side, capable of good football, but they have let themselves down occasionally by careless errors.

The Old Boys fielded a strong and enthusiastic team whose personnel was varied from time to time during the match. Despite flashes of individual brilliance amongst their outsiders, they were outplayed in the scrums.
