### Editorial.

It is customary to preface this column with a few lines of abuse of the weather. This time, perhaps, the less said about it the better. In fact, all our available stock of wit or sarcasm has long since been expended upon this very trying subject. ### Drize Day.

The School Prizes were distributed on July 30th by Mr. C. A. Cripps, K.C., M.P. for the Stretford Division, in which the School is situated. The Central Hall was crowded some time before the meeting began, and the interval was employed in the singing of familiar songs from "Gaudeamus."

The HEAD MASTER, in his annual statement, said :-

"The history of the School during the past year, the seventeenth of its existence, offers little for special comment. But one event has touched us most deeply, the retirement from the governing body of Mr. Herbert Philips, the vice-chairman of the governors since 1893, the treasurer of the School from the beginning, and ever its warmest friend. The services he has rendered the School during the most critical period of its existence are inestimable; by his counsel, his guidance, his ready assistance in every form, he has placed it and myself under the deepest obligations.

## OLD BOYS' DINNER.

"We have been reminded in another and a more agreeable way that the School is adding to its years and passing out of its infancy. For a long time past the Old Hulmeians have united in maintaining flourishing football and lacrosse clubs, and have held in connection with them many successful festive gatherings of a minor sort. In February last they tried a higher flight, and held their first Old Boys' dinner. There was for a first attempt a very satisfactory muster of some 70 or 80, considering how widely scattered the Old Boys are. It is confidently expected that this dinner will become an annual institution, will be attended by ever-increasing numbers, and will form another centre of union for Manchester Hulmeians.

#### HONOURS LIST.

"The distinctions gained by pupils of the school during the past year are more varied than usual. In our most important competitions, that of the Lancashire County Council, a Science Scholarship of £60 for three years has been awarded to W. F. Oldham (third on the list), and the Commercial Scholarship of D. Knoop has been renewed for a fourth year."

Fifteen Exhibitions of the value of £15 had been won, the first places in the Commercial Exhibitions and Junior Commercial Exhibition being taken by J. Charnley and L. C. Clarkson.

"During the last eight years the School has obtained in the county competition 15 Scholarships and 133 Exhibitions, of the aggregate value of £4,465. At Cambridge A. du T. Pownall has been placed in the Second Class of the First Part of Theological Tripos; F. Norquoy (bracketed first) in the Third Class of the First Part of the Mathematical Tripos; and L. A. Bradbury has won the Greek Testament prize of the first year at Emmanuel College. In the Victoria University G. W. Foster, B.Sc., has been awarded a Fellowship in Science of the value of £100; W. H. Evans has taken the degree of B.Sc. with honours in Chemistry; R. Dickinson that of LL.B.; J. A. Jones has passed the Second Part of the final M.B.; and R. A. H. Atkinson, R. T. Slinger, F. C. Hudson, and F. G. Pell-Ilderton the First Part of the same degree. R. T. Slinger has also obtained the Royal Infirmary prize for Surgery. E. Classen has passed the Intermediate Examination for the degree of LL.B.; T. T. Foster, D. Knoop, and W. F. Oldham have been placed in the First Class of the Preliminary Examination. At the Owens College C. H. Saxelby, B.Sc., has received the Certificate in Engineering with honours in Pure and Applied Mathematics, and W. F. Oldham has been elected to the John Buckley Scholarship of the value of £30 for three years. E. Classen has gained the Samuel Robinson Prize in Modern Languages, the Gladstone Memorial Prize, and the English Essay Prize. D. Knoop has gained the Cobden Club Book Prize. Among miscellaneous successes, G. Barrett has passed the Legal Pre. liminary, T. Fischer that of the Institute of Char. tered Accountants, and J. Lindley that of the Royal Institute of British Architects. Dutton, M.B., Ch.B., has been appointed surgeon to the Manchester Southern Hospital.

MODERN LANGUAGES; THE WORKSHOP.

"Last year I drew special attention to Mr. Latham's approval of our system of teaching modern languages. During the year that system has been greatly extended in the School, and many of the boys in the higher forms have been entirely brought up on it. It is gratifying to find the examiner's opinion is again entirely favourable. In connection with Mr. Latham's reference to the drawing school and workshop, I beg to draw the attention of visitors to the exhibitions of work shown in these departments, which increases in educational and practical value every year. Of our many crying wants none is more urgent than that of a new workshop.

#### THE GAMES.

"Turning to the games, a very important side of our School life, it has to be confessed that while our winter games were up to a good average, the cricket of this season has been somewhat disappointing. Our representative teams have done very fairly, but the rank and file have not shown their wonted enthusiasm. There is some excuse in the very unfavourable weather with which the season began, still the School ideal, 'Good at work, good at play,' has not been quite maintained. With the attraction of our own ground, we should do better next year. To-day we make use of the levelled portion of it for the first time, and in perpetual and grateful remembrance of the benefaction of the late William Roberts, the income from which is applied to the maintenance of the School field, the portion on which we shall hold our athletic sports to-day will be henceforth known as Roberts' Piece. A sum of about £600 is needed for the completion of the work.

EDUCATION AUTHORITIES.

"The action of the new education authorities at this moment stirs the hopes and fears of all who

are actively engaged in the work of education. The School may be congratulated on the recognition given it by the electing bodies. It is represented directly on the Withington District Council Education Committee by one of my colleagues, Mr. E. G. W. Hewlett. Another, the Rev. J. F. Tristram, is vice-chairman of the Moss Side Education Committee, and the Lancashire County Council has done me the honour to appoint me as the Secondary school representative on their Education Committee on the joint nomination of the Incorporated Associations of Headmasters and Assistant Masters. The pressing work connected with elementary education will absorb much of the energies of the new authorities for the present, and it is premature to say anything about their action in secondary education. the hope may be expressed that, when they come to deal with it, they will not regard their functions as those of Technical Instruction Committees 'writ large,' but will give their strong support to that literary side of education which in itself is the most fruitful of all, and without which all else is barren. It stands in need of as great encouragement in scholarships and direct subsidy as is given to the scientific and commercial sides of instruction. In conclusion, I have once more the pleasure of publicly thanking my colleagues for their unfailing support and assistance. And I am glad to be able to speak of the high standard of conduct among the boys of the Hulme School."

Mr. C. A. Cripps, K.C., M.P., after distributing the prizes, said some matters in the reports which the examiners had presented had struck him as being important. One of the examiners had said he had been struck with the intellectual alertness of the boys, which he had gathered from the fact that the boys had expressed themselves in such good English. He thought the School could hardly have been paid a better compliment, for it meant that the boys' brains were clear to see the main points and to bring out their ability.

## NEED OF SECONDARY EDUCATION.

Speaking of education generally, he said everyone knew that at the present time the question of secondary and technical education was coming very much to the front. Technical education, it should be remembered, was only a subordinate branch of secondary education. It would be a

thousand pities if technical were ever to take the place of or supplant secondary education. In the new movement which was being made, they must preserve and encourage to the utmost schools which were doing the good work that that Grammar School was doing. It must always be recollected that education in its higher forms was necessary, although, of course, they all wanted it in its practical forms, too. It must produce a higher level of culture, and of intellectual abilitya higher atmosphere altogether, and they must never sacrifice that. He was not, of course, suggesting that technical schools were not of the highest value, but they must look for culture quite as much as utility from all education. delighted, he said, to hear that the Head Master of that School was acting on the Education Committee of the County Council, and that other masters engaged in the School were taking their part in the development of the educational system by being engaged with other educational authorities. He himself was for many years the chairman of a Technical Education Committee, and he knew that if the work was to be well done they must enlist the sympathy and assistance of the masters in the secondary schools, who were doing such good work for the county at the present time.

Mr. THOMAS PRICE, LL.B., Member of the Withington Education Committee, proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Cripps for his interesting address.

## The Athletic Sports.

The School has good reason to be proud of the annual Athletic Sports, the recurring success of which from year to year has become so much a matter of tradition that one hardly pauses to think about it. Everything which careful organisation, liberal support, and keenness in contest can do, combines to make the afternoon the most attractive in the School year. The only thing left to chance is the weather, and in that we are not often disappointed. Additional interest attached to the sports this year in the use for the first time of that portion of our extended playing field which is to be known henceforth as "Robert's Piece." The large company of spectators present were thus able to form an idea of the splendid provision for open-air sports which has been secured for the School by the recent addition. There was a large entry of competitors, the names of 230 boys appearing in the programme, and nearly £12 were taken in subscription moneys. In the work of collecting entry forms and fees valuable assistance was given by the form representatives. # old Bulmeians Football, 1903=4.

Since last season the Football Section of the Old Hulmeians has made an important departure not, however, a new one from their customary routine. Having been invited to offer themselves for election for one of the clubs forming the Manchester section of the new Lancashire Amateur League, the club officials found themselves face to face with a question which they could hardly take it upon themselves to decide without consulting the football playing members. The Old Boys had already some years ago joined an amateur league, the success of which was a very doubtful quantity. A meeting was therefore called last May of all members constituting the football division of the club, and the pros and cons of the matter were carefully considered with much interest by the members present. The clubs who would probably be members of the league in question were mostly those whom the Old Boys had been in the habit of playing against in past years, with the addition of a few other wellknown amateur combinations, and it was at once seen that, whereas these clubs would certainly be able, consequent upon the great attractive inducement which playing in a league club offers, to easily increase their playing strength, the Old Boys would have to be content with the average talent which they have from season to season, as their choice of players is limited to Old Hulmeians only. It is seen now that this surmise has been a correct one. Still, in spite of the fact that football players amongst Old Hulmeians have been apparently more or less scarce, and also that league matches are always more or less attractive to footballers, it was decided at the meeting in question to enter as experiment first and second teams for the two divisions of the Manchester section of the league. The decision was a wise one. A considerable number of Old Boys sprang up in all directions, and offered themselves for membership-in fact, so many that some third team fixtures have been arranged and played, although the third team is, of course, rather weak. Still it has been a matter of great encouragement to the excellent committee elected that such a large number of players are at disposal, and if this increase holds arrangements will certainly be made for planning out a second football ground on the Old Boys' field next season.

With regard, however, to the league matches played up to the present the results are very disappointing. Out of six matches played, the first team has managed to capture one point and the Second Eleven none at all. What was prophesied at the special meeting held in May has turned out The league clubs have considerably strengthened themselves both in play and in weight, especially in the latter, and the Old Boys have always found the opposing team too heavy for them. There is, however, ground for encouragement. At times the First Eleven have played really splendid games, which made spectators wonder how it was they are not doing better in the league. A letter has been received from the secretary of Bolton Park Road, a well-known amateur club, expressing sympathy with the Old Boys' position in the league table, and also speaking in very high terms of the manner in which the team had played the previous Saturday against Bolton Park Road. It had been a great surprise to them, and they were ready to prophesy much better things if the team kept together. We may say that Bolton Park Road won this match a few minutes from time by a penalty goal, and also that the Old Hulmeians were only playing 10 men for half the time.

The first team forwards are very light, though the recent advent of Brown into the line at centre has made a little difference in this respect. They are faulty when they get near goal, but otherwise there is not much to complain about. They are decidedly smart, and have some good ideas of combination. The half-back line is perhaps the strongest division of the team, but if R. Bradshaw happens to be out of the team they are conspicuously weak. Up to the present the backs have given the most trouble and anxiety to the committee and supporters. They are not heavy enough, and the kicking is rarely clean, but there is no doubt that if S. W. Saxelby will again play regularly—as it is hoped he will—there will be a great improvement here. Thompson in goal is all that can be desired. In the Second Eleven it is again the back divi-

## Old Bulmeians Lacrosse, 1903=4.

Never since the origin of the club can the lacrosse members point to such an auspicious opening as they have made this season. At the beginning of the season it was reported that the clubs in the Second League were much more on a level than ever before, and therefore that the fight for top place would be much keener. It was therefore expected that no club would go far in the competition without suffering defeat. Perhaps the greatest improvement, however, has been on the defence, as here a better system of play has been shown than ever before. Clegg at 3rd man has been a great success, backing up the attack splendidly, while at the same time neutralising the efforts of 3rd home. P. J. Jefferis and J. Buckland have played at the top of their form, and no greater praise could be given them than this. Shorrocks in a new position at right defence, has played a splendid game, and his weight and dash have helped him repeatedly to break up the rushes of the opponents' attacks. W. Merchant in goal has not had quite such a sinecure as the goals against would seem to denote, as in some games, notably Ashton, he had a very busy time, and came through splendidly, being coolness itself. Again the team were honoured by having men selected for Lancashire County, as Hobbins at 3rd home and J. Buckland at cover-point represented their county against Middlesex, while P. J. Jefferis was reserve for the defence wing.

What makes the prospects of the club better is the fact that it is represented by such a splendid "A" team. Last season saw the break-up of the fine School Eleven, which took three years to build up and three years to disappear. These were years of prosperity for School football. We have now to set to work and build up another team to do battle, a team of young blood, which has it in its power to make or mar the football of the next two seasons at least. We have had our "fat" years; let us make the "lean" years as few as possible. At the beginning of the term, therefore, the captain found very little of last year's material left, and the task of reconstruction was not at all a simple matter. We have found it difficult to meet some of our old opponents, and the First Team programme has had to be lightened to meet the altered circumstances.

The Eleven made light of their first three matches, winning comfortably on each occasion, but nevertheless showing many sources of weakness that augured ill for the heavier fixtures to follow. A period of failure succeeded, and November was a bad month for us, five matches being lost in succession. Warrington, Bowdon, and Macclesfield Schools defeated us after even games, any one of which we might conceivably have won. And this brings us to our criticism of the team. In the Warrington and Bowdon matches our opponents were actually on the defensive for most of the game; in the Macclesfield match we were leading at half-time. These facts show that

there was always a weak point somewhere. failures are easily summed up-lack of dash, lack of unity.

To criticise in detail, the following points will explain our weakness this term:-

- (i.) The running is poor: no sprinting. Hesitation is fatal. In the two or three seconds' hesitation a fast sprinter would make 15 yards advance.
- (ii.) Kicking-out exceedingly poor. This should certainly be practised more.
- (iii.) Lack of mutual understanding, e.g., between backs, or a back and a half. This weakness cost us the Macclesfield match.
- (iv.) Weak half-back line for purposes of attack; too much on the defence, and do not pass accurately to the forwards, but kick ahead haphazard.
- (v.) Lack of judgment, e.g., allowance for screw, bounce and wind. Boys should learn to anticipate the probable flight of a ball. A good team brings brain as well as muscle into play.
- (vi.) Weak combination in the forward line, due largely to want of a first-rate centre forward.
- (vii.) Long passing (so suitable to our ground) from centre forward or centre half to the outside forwards has apparently gone out of fashion.
- (viii.) Time wasted when throwing in from touch, and no smartness in marking men when opponents throw in.
- (ix.) Too much clamouring for the ball. A good team plays quietly. To call for a pass assists the opponents, who should be kept in the dark as much as possible.
- (x.) Good sporting teams cheer heartily for their opponents. It is humiliating to hear our First Eleven feebly attempting the ghost of a cheer after

Our readers will think there is little left to criticise, and yet individually the Eleven has many elements of strength. Thomas is probably as good a full-back as we have ever had; Lister a most capable centre-half, and greatly improved upon his form of last season, while Harrison, Bradbury, Lindley, and Cruse are all clever forwards, Jones, Stocks, and Turner hardworking. The material, therefore, is here, but the one thing needful is lacking. a dashing combination. The best form was undoubtedly shown in the match with our best friends and strongest opponents, St. Bede's. There is something about this fixture that always brings out the best fighting qualities in our play, and to run St. Bede's to a goal would seem to show that our eleven is really capable of great things, if only they could get together and put more life and determination into their games. Not that St. Bede's are the fine team they were last year. The difference between their present team and that of last year is considerably greater than it is in our own case, and only serves to show that that wayward and fickle jade, Fortune, coquets with other schools as well as ourselves. Our severest defeat was at the hands of Salford Technical, upon whom the aforesaid young lady has been smiling her sweetest for the past two seasons.

With the exception of this one match, a very little luck in all our lost games would have turned defeat into victory, and the return matches with Warrington and Bowdon, which have to be played on our own ground, may be anticipated with confidence. We were pleased to see a Third Eleven of Old Hulmeians on our ground this term, but the match was quite spoilt by a blizzard, which raged throughout the game.

This seems to us to be a suitable occasion on which to review the football of the First Eleven for the past six years. To this end we have tabulated the results of matches with the 10 schools in the neighbourhood with whom we engage in friendly rivalry.
