In answer to this, Bradbury said that if people were sharp they could get on anywhere. There also spoke Rhead, Browning, Goodger, van der Veen, and others.

Nov. 9th.—A most interesting lecture was given to the society by E. Oppenheimer on "Switzerland." The lecturer illustrated his lecture with views of most of the high mountains round Ferpècle and Zermatt to the regions round which he confined himself. The chair was taken by C. J. Stone, and a vote of thanks proposed by Mr. Morley was seconded by A. Goodger.

## Prize Day.

### EXTENSION OF BUILDINGS.

The annual Speech Day was held in the Central Hall of the School on July 30th last. The prizes were distributed by Sir T. Thornhill Shann, chairman of the Manchester Education Committee. The HEAD MASTER, in his annual statement, said:—

"To-day we hold our annual meeting for the twenty-second time in this room, the unsuitability of which has compelled us to compress our proceedings on these occasions within the narrowest possible limits of time. It is, therefore, with no common pleasure and a strong sense of relief that I announce to-day the prospect of a better provision. Under a recent scheme for the distribution of the funds of Hulme's charity, a sum of £4,700 has been allotted to the School for extension buildings, and the Governors, having decided that the most pressing need of the School is a suitable assembly hall, are now considering designs made by Mr. W. Cecil Hardisty, of which some idea may be gained from the drawing exhibited on our walls. It shows an extension of the facade of the present building, measuring about 130ft., and providing, in the basement, cloak and store rooms; on the ground floor, offices, vestibule, and a great hall, measuring 90ft. by 42ft., the whole being arranged as a first item in a scheme of reconstruction, with a view to further additions of gymnasium, laboratories, and class-rooms.



"But the money at the disposal of the Governors for the execution of this first instalment of the new buildings is strictly limited by the terms of the scheme, and is quite insufficient to complete it, even in the plainest way. If they have to proceed with their present means, only a section of the assembly hall can be built, and that at a cost proportionally greater than the cost of the complete building. And even that section would necessarily have to be restricted in point of ornament. Now, when it is borne in mind that the hall will be used not merely for our annual gathering, but for the daily assembling of the School, and for many School occasions, such as concerts, plays, and lectures, the great desirability of a dignified and effective interior will be felt. This can be secured, and the hall can be completed in a handsome style, for an addition of £3,000 or £4,000 to the funds in hand. The School, which has done the community some service during the 21 years of its existence, ought not to find itself without friends at this conjuncture. With the necessary help, if all goes well, we shall be in possession of the new hall for the midsummer meeting of 1910.

"But we have further reason for pleasant anticipation. Last year reference was made to changes in contemplation which would improve the status of the School. These changes cannot be much longer delayed, and probably by the end of this year the School will be first grade by leaving age and curriculum. Meanwhile the Governors have decided on another extension. The preparatory department for boys hitherto maintained at the Whalley Range High School will be discontinued when the Manchester Education Committee takes over that school. It has, therefore, been arranged to open a preparatory department here for boys up to the age of eight years, under the experienced management of the former kindergarten mistress of the Whalley Range School.

"The financial position of the School has been greatly improved by the addition of an annual sum of £400 to the endowment out of

the funds of the Hulme Trust, making our annual income from that source up to nearly £2,000. The Manchester Education Committee has also increased its annual grant of £250 to £300 for this year, a kind attention for which we are duly grateful. The Davies-Colley history prize no longer stands alone, for an old Hulmeian, Mr. H. H. Vlies, has offered an annual prize of the value of £3 to be awarded to the best boy in Modern Languages. Mr. Vlies was, in his school days, one of the first here to obtain a Lancashire County Council scholarship, which enabled him to improve his knowledge of French, German, and Spanish by a stay of three years abroad. He has found the knowledge thus gained of great value in business, and wishes to encourage others to the same end. It is to be hoped that his example may lead to other benefactions of the same kind. There is yet another gift to record, in the handsome challenge shield for cricket form matches, presented to the School by Mr. W. H. Livesley. The first competition for the shield has just been completed, and in recognition of the historic occasion it will be presented to-day to the captain of the winning form. After an interval of a year the School has again been inspected by examiners appointed by the Governors, before whom detailed reports will be laid.

"The honours which have fallen to the School during the year are quite up to the average." After mentioning the chief of them, he went on to say: "The Old Hulmeians' Lacrosse Club have established themselves for the second year in succession champions of the North of England and champions of England, enabling us to retain the North of England Flags and the Iroquois Cup as decorations of the walls of this School. The School games during the past season show no falling off in general. The Football Team of last winter was not as good as its predecessor, but the Lacrosse and Cricket teams rank with our best. The former played 28 games, and won 24 of them, and the Cricket Team has lost only one school match this season. The Swimming classes are now recog-



nised as part of our regular work, and tuition in the art is included in the school fee; but the distance of the baths limits our visits to two a week during the season, and it is to be hoped that the School will some day have its own bath.

"I have again to tender in public my hearty thanks to my colleagues for the important share they have taken in all the activities of the School."

Before giving the prizes, Sir THOMAS SHANN said:—

"I gladly accept the invitation of the Head Master to be present this afternoon on the occasion of your annual speech day and prize giving, and to hand to the successful scholars the prizes which I have no doubt they have most deservedly earned.

"This is a School which we owe largely to one of the pious founders of past days, who, with a wisdom which we would desire should be more often followed, left of their abundance whereby future generations of men might profit by better means of education.

"It is pleasant to know that the feeling is growing—not too rapidly, it is true—in this busy district in favour of giving to boys, and to girls also, a longer period of school training.

"It should not be forgotten that the most effective period of a scholar's life—that in which the powers of mind and body can be most lastingly influenced—is not before, but after 14 years of age, and that the two or three years then given to the further education of the boy are invaluable. Only a comparative few can avail themselves of this extended education, and you boys are therefore fortunate in the opportunity you enjoy. I earnestly hope that you appreciate your advantage.

"In a school such as this, with its excellent staff, you can prepare yourselves for an education such as will carry you to the University as students of the arts or science in preparation for one of the professions, or to the Municipal School of Technology as students of science as

applied to industry and to business pursuits. The advantages of a sound training preparatory to the active pursuits of industry or commerce are too obvious to need much comment. In any event nations such as Germany spare no effort to give to their youth—and it is to their credit that it is eagerly sought—the advantages of a most excellent training in the applications of science, the result of which is plain to be seen in the great industries which have grown up in Germany of late years.

"The advantages offered in Manchester by means of the University and the Municipal School of Technology are not excelled, even if they are approached, anywhere in the kingdom, but it should be firmly grasped that you cannot hope to enjoy them fully unless in such schools as this you are fully prepared.

"Before long in the Platt Fields near by you will have an exhibition of high achievements in electrical science, and you will be able thereby to see how much of skill, training, and sound scientific knowledge is needed to produce the remarkable results therein displayed. This School is an institution of which you may well be proud. Though young in years, it has achieved its share of distinction, for it has turned out many men who have made their mark. Standing formerly somewhat isolated, it now finds the city reaching closer to its doors. It will find itself called upon more and more to do the great work for which it is specially designed, namely, to bring the advantages of an excellent secondary education right home to those who need and can obtain it. The poor but clever boy is not denied his chance, and the child of the well-to-do finds here also an education exactly suited to his needs. Our ideas of the dignity of the School are growing. We feel more and more that the School should be ample in its accommodation, ministering to all the needs and aspirations of the best ideals of school life; not the class-rooms only should be adequate, but the common room, the library, the assembly hall, where the corporate life and a spirit of fellowship can grow in strength and



power for good. You need a hall, ample in proportions, dignified in character, where there may be in time to come memorials of men who, having been taught in this School, have gone out into the world and done the State some service.

"You are especially blessed in the splendid playing fields which adjoin the School. There you can learn the invaluable lessons of self-restraint, of fairness to others, of the need of co-operation, and of due subordination if the game is to be honourably won. Here in this School, therefore, you have the opportunity of serving the needs of mind and heart and body, and of fitting yourselves to take your place as men worthy of a great city, which, if it has done much in the past, has still greater tasks to perform in the future, remembering always that some of the finest work that has been accomplished has most often been done by men poor in material wealth, but rich in spirit and knowledge, and in their desire to benefit their fellow-men."

A hearty vote of thanks was accorded to Sir Thomas Shann, on the motion of Mr. Councillor Stephen Edwards, member of the Manchester Education Committee, and Governor of the School.

In acknowledging this, Sir Thomas announced his intention of offering a prize for competition amongst the senior boys, an offer which was welcomed with grateful applause.

## The Athletic Sports.

The twenty-second annual Sports were held on July 29th and 30th, in fine weather. On the latter day rain was falling till a short time before the start, but the weather then cleared and the sun came out. There was a good attendance of spectators, and a full programme was successfully carried out. A new feature, which provided some excitement while it lasted, was the Lacrosse Passing competition. This was arranged in heats, in which

the two competing teams were spread out on opposite sides of the course. The final was between Science V. and IV. and The Rest, the former winning. Of individual performances, the cricket ball throw by Banks was the most noticeable. His throw of 102½ yards is a record for the School. The Gaskell Cup was again taken by H. S. Needham, who won the Broad Jump, 100 Yards, High Jump open events, and was second in the Open Hurdle race. W. H. Cox won the Cardwell Cup, and was first in the High Jump, 100 Yards, and Quarter Mile under 16 events, and in the Open Hurdles. G. Baines, winner of the Donner Cup, was first in the Hurdles and Cricket Ball and second in the 100 Yards under 15 events. The China Cup was won by B. Johnson, who was first in the 100 Yards and Hurdle race under 14.

After some discussion the motion was put to the meeting and lost.

The following gentlemen were elected vice-presidents of the club, viz.: G. Caradoc Thomas, Esq., and the Rev. Noel Lake Aspinall.

A brief discussion followed as to the advisability of making a charge for viewing the Lacrosse matches, and the committee were empowered to charge for entrance to the ground if they thought fit.

With a vote of thanks to the chairman the meeting adjourned.

## Old Hulmeians' Lacrosse.

The defeat of St. Bede's on their own ground is in itself sufficient to make the present season a remarkable one. Our gallant opponents will be the last to grudge us our victory. We always give them of our best, and several times in late years we have pushed them severely, on two occasions even making a draw. Our victory this year was the result of real hard work and painstaking efforts on the football field, and is all the more meritorious as the School team is a newly-made one, and contains few old hands. It is however a team of triers. Everyone has worked hard, and done his best, without attempt at shirking. The football, if not of the highest order, is very sound. The combination is good, and there is a complete lack of selfishness. The team possesses great pace, and the kicking is nearly always reliable. The bulk of our strength was put in the forward or fighting line, for a weak attack gathers no goals,

and the policy has been amply justified by its success. The halves, on whom the success of a team so often depends, have improved in every match, and it is doubtful if we have ever had a better trio. Halliwell is the mainstay of the defence, playing centre half. Never once has he been below form, never once met an opponent he could not hold. The full backs, too, have come up to expectations. Although still at times uncertain in their kicking, they have done very well, for they have met some good forwards. Banks especially has immensely improved since last year. Our goalkeeper (Sutton, L. J.) has also done very well. He has brought off some splendid performances, particularly against St. Bede's, for which he was awarded his cap at the next meeting of the committee.

It was rather disappointing to be defeated at Bolton after having gained a lead in the first half. However, we have improved since then, and hope to reverse matters in the return match on our ground. At Macclesfield our combination was not at its best, but we managed to pull the game out of the fire in the last few minutes. With a little more dash and heart, we might have done differently against Salford Technical School. Perhaps the match in which the whole team played best was against St. Bede's. Everybody exerted themselves to the utmost, and we were well rewarded. But the hardest game up to now, as well as the most enjoyable, was that versus Bury Grammar School. Our opponents were considerably the heavier, it is true, but that did not daunt us. The game throughout was fast and clean; we had quite as much of the play as Bury, and with a little more luck might have won.

Altogether we may congratulate ourselves on a very successful season, and if everybody is keen and makes up his mind to do his best, we may do even better during the second half. We must at all events try to reverse the results of three matches we have lost.

## Lacrosse.

### NOTES.

After opening the season with three wins and one drawn game, the team, or rather that portion of it which defends, has fallen away remarkably. In several of the later matches the defence has been woefully weak, particularly in the Brooklands and Disley matches, when a little more steadiness and determination to get at the ball would have given us a winning position. Defence men must learn that they have one man to watch, and the chief object of their play must necessarily be to prevent their man from scoring. To do this, it is necessary to stick close and prevent, if possible, an attack from getting the ball. When a defence man has been beaten it is not necessary for two men to endeavour to cut the attack off. One is sufficient, and the defence man who has succumbed in the first instance ought to try and reach his colleague's man as quickly as possible. In the cutting off, care should be taken not to go out too far from goal, as the closer you can make the attack the better chance have other defences of intercepting passes. Another very weak feature with the defence is the calling for passes when the caller is in no better position than the holder of the ball. Frequently short passes are called for and given when the best policy would be to clear to a much safer distance. It is also courting disaster to pass the ball from the back of goal to a defence man standing in front. The ball ought to be carried as far as possible wide of the back of goal and a pass given either to a wing defence, who has drawn away from his man, when he has seen that the ball was safe, or to a wing attack, who ought always to be on the look-out for a pass up the side of the field. Attack men can also assist in saving goals by following their men down the field, for nothing disconcerts a defence more than to have to play against a loose man. The team is very young, and with so able a captain as Dickinson, ought to train on into a very useful twelve.
