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Editorial.

DURING the past Football season the School has played considerably more matches than in any previous year, and it may be honestly said that the standard of play has been well maintained. No less than 63 matches have been played by all Elevens, of which 38 have been won, seven drawn, and 18 lost. This increase is not due to better weather than usual, for we find that the half-holiday sides games have suffered severely from the climate. The First Team shows an advance

upon last year in the proportion of wins and losses, while the goal average, curiously enough, remains almost the same. They have won 10, drawn three, and lost four, and their play has throughout been marked by strength and determination.

Several Lacrosse matches have been played since Christmas, and the policy adopted last year of arranging fixtures against "A" and "B" teams of clubs in the absence of schools has been developed, and on the whole has proved a success.

The Old Boys' Football Club has suffered

from a lack of enthusiasm towards the end among a section of its members. We hope this will be mended next winter, and that all players leaving the School will join the Club and loyally support it throughout the season.

The Old Hulmeians' Lacrosse Club has had a good deal of bad luck in not being able to play the best team regularly. They have, however, finished third in the Second Division of the League, and have played good games with all the strongest teams in the district.

The Swimming season began on April 15th. There are now 105 names on the register for attendance, the majority of whom are displaying great keenness, and we hope that all of these will be able to swim before the end of the season. The swimming fees this year will not permit of our having three instructors, as we had last year; but the two professionals, Stearne and Turley, have now had much experience in teaching swimming, and a considerable improvement is already noticeable in those who are receiving lessons from them.

Cricket is now in full swing, and never before has the season opened better. An hour was given off by the Head Master on April 23rd, and nine games were arranged, in which 190 boys took part. It was a satisfactory sign that with one exception all the games were played out to a finish, and did not go to pieces when the four o'clock bell rang. Over 150 boys were playing on Wednesday, May 8th, and more than sixty per cent. of boys in the school are now playing cricket regularly on half-holidays.

Cricket flannels, as well as the School blazer, can now be ordered at the Office, and a number of boys have availed themselves of this convenience. To those who have not yet provided themselves with flannels we would point out that they not only improve the look of the field, but also one's personal appearance and skill in the noble game itself.

The Death of Queen Victoria.

MEMORIAL SERVICE AT THE CATHEDRAL.

The death of Her Majesty Queen Victoria was observed in a most fitting manner by the School in a memorial service, which was held at the Manchester Cathedral, on Friday, February 1st. Besides ourselves, there were present the Manchester Grammar School, the Chetham's Hospital, and the Manchester, North Manchester, and Pendleton High Schools for Girls; in all, 1,900 scholars of the secondary endowed schools of Manchester. The service was arranged for 12 noon, and before eleven we marched down to Alexandra Road, where tramcars were in waiting to convey us to the Cathedral. To the School was allotted an excellent place in the centre of the nave on the left-hand side. The service opened with a procession of choir and clergy singing the three sentences from the Service for the Burial of the Dead. The 23rd Psalm was then sung, and as lesson, the 31st chapter of Proverbs was read by Canon Davenport Kelly. The anthem was "Remember now thy Creator" (Stern-dale Bennett), the solos being taken by Miss Stuart Cummins and Miss Bertha Guthrie. The hymns chosen were "O God our help in ages past," and "Ye servants of the Lord." The sermon was preached by the Dean of Manchester, from the text "I love those that love me." He dwelt especially upon the lessons to the young to be drawn from the noble example set by Her late Majesty, her unselfishness and self-sacrifice. At the close of the service the congregation stood while the Dead March was played by Dr. J. Kendrick Pyne. The impressive service was well suited to the solemn occasion, and will always be remembered by those privileged to take part in it.

Proclamation of King Edward VII.

The School was enabled to be present at this historical ceremony by the Head Master kindly giving the necessary time "off" on the morning of Friday, January 25th. The Proclamation was made by the Lord Mayor at the Town Hall, at New Cross, the Infirmary, and All Saints'. Most boys made their way to one of the two last-named places. Those who went to the Infirmary had the best of things, as a violent storm of wind and rain came on just before the ceremony at All Saints'. The Lord Mayor, in robes and civic chain, was preceded by a gorgeously-attired mace-bearer. After salutes by trumpeters, he read the Proclamation, and called for cheers for His Majesty, which were heartily given. Another salute from the trumpeters was followed by the playing of the National Anthem, in the singing of which every one joined.

The Hulme Lads' Club Collection.

Last term's collection on behalf of the Procter Gymnasium and Hulme Lads' Club resulted in the addition of the handsome sum of £45. 4s. 6d. to the finances of the Club. This is the largest sum the School has yet collected, being some thirty shillings more than the previous record collection of 1898.

It is a peculiar pleasure to me, as Chairman of the Committee for the present year, to express our sincere thanks to the Masters and boys of the School for the valuable help they are giving us. From comparatively small beginnings in 1893 the contribution of the Hulme Grammar School has risen to be one of the most important items in our subscription list. The scope and usefulness of the Club have been increased in many ways of late years, and we find it difficult with the strictest economy to keep our expenditure within our income. Any diminution in the School contribution would be severely felt.

The feature of last year's collection—and it could present no more pleasing feature—was the general interest and enthusiasm it showed throughout the

School. Latin III. and II. again made the largest individual collection—£8. 11s. French II. and I. both contributed well over £5. The contribution of Modern V.—£3. 9s. 6d.—gave the highest average per head.

Old Hulmeians Football, 1900-1901.

The latter half of the season has been one of varying success. About Christmas time and the beginning of the year the first team was better than it has been for years, and five good matches were won in succession. But after this, alas! the team failed every week up to the end of the season, and in most cases by a bare goal. It is very annoying to have to confess again that the old fault is at the bottom of it, viz., lack of enthusiasm of the majority of the members towards the end of the season. If full teams could have been raised regularly, a good share of the matches, if not all, could easily have been won, but on wet days the reliable few who turn out regularly have always been disappointed and discouraged to find themselves three or four short on their opponents' ground. It is sincerely to be hoped that a more sportsmanlike feeling will soon become prevalent amongst the boys leaving the School, and that they will not, like a large number of their predecessors, leave the old regular players, the mainstay of the club, in the lurch when the weather happens to be a little unpleasant.

Volunteering has also done its share in inconveniencing the club, but then there should be quite enough members to fall back upon to counteract this. For the next season hopes are being entertained that a few well-known players, who have not been able to play for some time, will again be at the disposal of the Club, and if certain players at the School will only give their help a good season may confidently be looked forward to. The talent is there, but if not coupled with a sporting enthusiasm it is worse than useless. The second team have had very little to do. Large drafts have had to be made to fill up the gaps in the first team, and this has, unfortunately, led to the cancelling of one or two matches; and with matches which could not be played on account of the death of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, and a large number cancelled by our opponents, the result is that only two matches have been played since the beginning of the year, both of which were won. The second team has been more or less of a scratch affair all through the season, for reasons already mentioned above.

Old Hulmeians Lacrosse, 1900=1901.

Never since the Old Boys' Lacrosse Club was formed have we been so bothered with men crying off the teams. This has not been so much the fault of the members in question as the result of real bad luck. Several of our fellows have been called away from Manchester on business, and a good deal of sickness has kept away others, while volunteering and other suchlike engagements have had their share in the general upsetting of the teams. Taking this into consideration, we have not done so badly. All our friendly matches have been against First League clubs, and we have lost them all. Still on several occasions we have not been very far behind at the call of time. In League matches we have done fairly well, finishing up third in the League. Total results: 8 won, 14 lost, goals scored for, 131; against, 147. These results (8 won, 14 lost) look worse than they really are, as three or four of our losses were by the odd goal; and indeed, our goal average shows there was not so much difference in most of the matches, as we have scored nearly as often as our opponents. A review of the past Football season discloses the fact that, while on the one hand more matches have been played than in any previous year, the School side games have suffered most severely from the inclemency of the weather. The register shows a lamentable number of half-holidays in February and March, spoilt by the seemingly puerile vagaries of the Manchester climate. We can claim to have made the most of such fair weather as has been granted to us, and our fixture list, appended to these notes, show that we have not allowed bad weather to interfere with our matches. Severe frost, of course, makes football impossible. Rain can do little harm if the players take reasonable care of themselves after the game. Our record of nearly forty matches won shows that our players have lost little of their cunning, but have worthily upheld the past traditions of the School.

The play on the whole has again been of a very high standard. The first eleven, perhaps, have not exhibited the fine points of the game—the extreme accuracy and subtle combination of the eleven of two years ago—but are rather to be characterised as a strong, hard-working team, who have won their

matches largely by their strength, determination, and persistency. It is in the forward line that most weakness has been remarked. Our forwards should read the remarks on "passing" in the little Association Football manual by that celebrated international, G. O. Smith. The style of passing, he says, should largely depend on the nature of the ground. On the heavy and rain-sodden grounds which are, unfortunately, too plentiful in our Lancashire towns, the forwards should adopt short passing as much as possible; but on dry grounds, such as are to be found mostly in the South of England, the long passing to the wings and a rapid break-away along the touch line by fast "outsides" should be the prevailing tactics. Now, our ground, though situated in what Mr. G. O. Smith would probably call "the muddy North," is essentially a dry ground, and therefore excellently adapted for a long-passing game. And, in fact, this style of play was brought as near perfection as possible in a school team two years ago by H. C. Swindells and E. Derbyshire. Of course, a good centre forward is indispensable. McNicol has proved a hard worker, and clever on the ball, but is rather given to experimenting—*e.g.*, with long shooting or tricky dribbling—and is often weak in front of goal; while there is no one on the wings who is really fast, and who can break away at once to receive or anticipate a pass. This waste of time, though apparently slight, nevertheless gives just sufficient time to the opposing backs or halves to collect themselves and prepare to check. The remedy would appear to be in "sprinting" practice with the ball once or twice a week. Unfortunately, all our sprinting is at present done on a single hot afternoon in July; and goal-to-goal running with the ball would, we think, be often a very useful practice, and a more profitable occupation than aimless shooting round the goal posts.

The defence has proved quite sound, and the halves especially have done some fine work. They recognise the fact that the very name "half-back" implies also "half-forward," and the "half-forward" tactics, to our mind, are the most important part of their duties. As in war, a hot attack vigorously pressed home often demoralises the defence, and the main duty of the halves is to keep the forwards well supplied with shot and shell for the enemy's goal. Accuracy of passing to the forwards should, therefore, be their chief aim. Wild kicking only results in giving a number of goal kicks and waste of valuable time.

We were fortunate in having but two places in the First Eleven to fill in January. A match was arranged with an eleven of public school boys got together by Mr. O. S. Flinn, an Old Hulmeian at present at Shrewsbury School. There were also O.H.'s at Rossall, King William's, Sedbergh, and the Manchester Grammar School in the scratch team. A pleasant game resulted in a win for the School by a bare goal. The eleven played up finely against their powerful rivals of S. Bede's College, and turned their defeat of last term into a very creditable draw. Indeed, seeing that our own backs scored two of their goals, we may be said to have been the "moral" victors. The team next journeyed to Swinton Park, to be beaten by a strong eleven of the Salford Royal Technical School. Bury, who in the first match of the season defeated us by a single goal, were outplayed when they returned our visit; but it is only fair to add that they came over with a team much weaker than that of last October. Oldham are generally strong on their own ground, and they gave us a good fight. We congratulate them on the great improvement effected on their playing field. Warrington are much stronger this year, and we did well to draw with them on their own ground. It will thus be observed that we have won or drawn a match with every other school played, a satisfactory result as compared with last year, when both S. Bede's and Bowdon College beat us at every meeting.
