### Arthur Baker.

A well-known Old Hulmeian has passed away in Arthur George Baker, who died after a long illness on March 28th last. He entered the School in April, 1887, soon after it was opened, and left in December, 1890. He was a member of a noted cricketing and musical family and was the first cricket captain of the School in 1889 and 1890. On leaving he joined the newly-formed Old Hulmeians Football Club, and was captain in 1891. For many years he played cricket for Whalley Range. He was a violin player and organist and in business in Manchester. His younger brother played for Warwickshire in county cricket.

### CRICKET NOTES.

Up to July 1st, seven School matches have been played, 3 won, 3 lost and 1 drawn; but these figures do not do justice to our record as in each win we have more than doubled our opponents' score, whereas in two losses we were beaten by only 21 runs and 1 wicket respectively and the draw was distinctly in our favour. Including Club matches we have played 13, won 5, lost 6 and drawn 2, so that the success of the season is still in the balance and will be decided by the remaining six matches. The fixture card is much stronger than last year and for the first time the School has had to face really strong sides in Mr. Classen's XI and the Manchester C.C.; in the latter our getting 7 of their wickets for 104 after scoring 84 ourselves, was particularly cheering.

Only five of last year's team have remained and the older members of the side have not come on as they ought to have done. The average age of the team is only 16, yet the bulk of the work has been done by those below this age. In batting, A. G. Campbell and Williamson are doing well and C. D. Campbell seems at last to have got going. The rest are promising and would probably have made runs during June if the wickets had remained fast. But one or two show a tendency to put their legs in front and this can lead to nothing but disaster. We have had to play on only three bad wickets. The bowling has improved in steadiness and has only once been really collared; we have five who can bowl something like a length, but none is very deadly. The fielding has been good and sometimes brilliant, though it has not always stood the test of country catches and sharp running between the wickets. The team has been very keen and C. D. Campbell has captained it with excellent judgment.

Mr. H. R. Classen has very kindly offered a bat for the best field during the season. Marks are awarded for the fielding in each match and the present scores of the leaders are:—N. A. Barber 150, G. Classen 149, C. D. Campbell 148, W. Williamson 147, A. G. Campbell 143.

The Second Eleven have played eleven matches, of which six have been won, three lost and two drawn. The team has been changed rather often, but on the whole the results are quite good. Smith, M. W., the first captain of the team was soon taken on to the First Eleven, where Alston, his successor has followed him. The present captain, Avery, has made the most progress of any player tried this year and is now an excellent opening batsman. Willis and Dickson are both promising bats and should do well next year. The rest of the team can all make runs but are not dependable. The bowling is perhaps the strongest part of the team with Flanagan and Jones, W. N. the best of a good average lot. The fielding has not been too good but Allman at point has been a great success.

The Under 14 team has played ten matches, of which seven were won, two lost and one drawn. The greatest weakness has been the nervousness shown by most members on critical occasions and experience will probably overcome this. There is quite a good style in the batting, and Lowther in particular shows much promise. With a little more confidence most of the others should also do well, but all need to remember to hit hard when a loose ball presents itself. Milligan and Hilton have done most of the bowling with Rains as a very useful change bowler. The fielding has been quite good, but catching and throwing in leave something to be desired.
