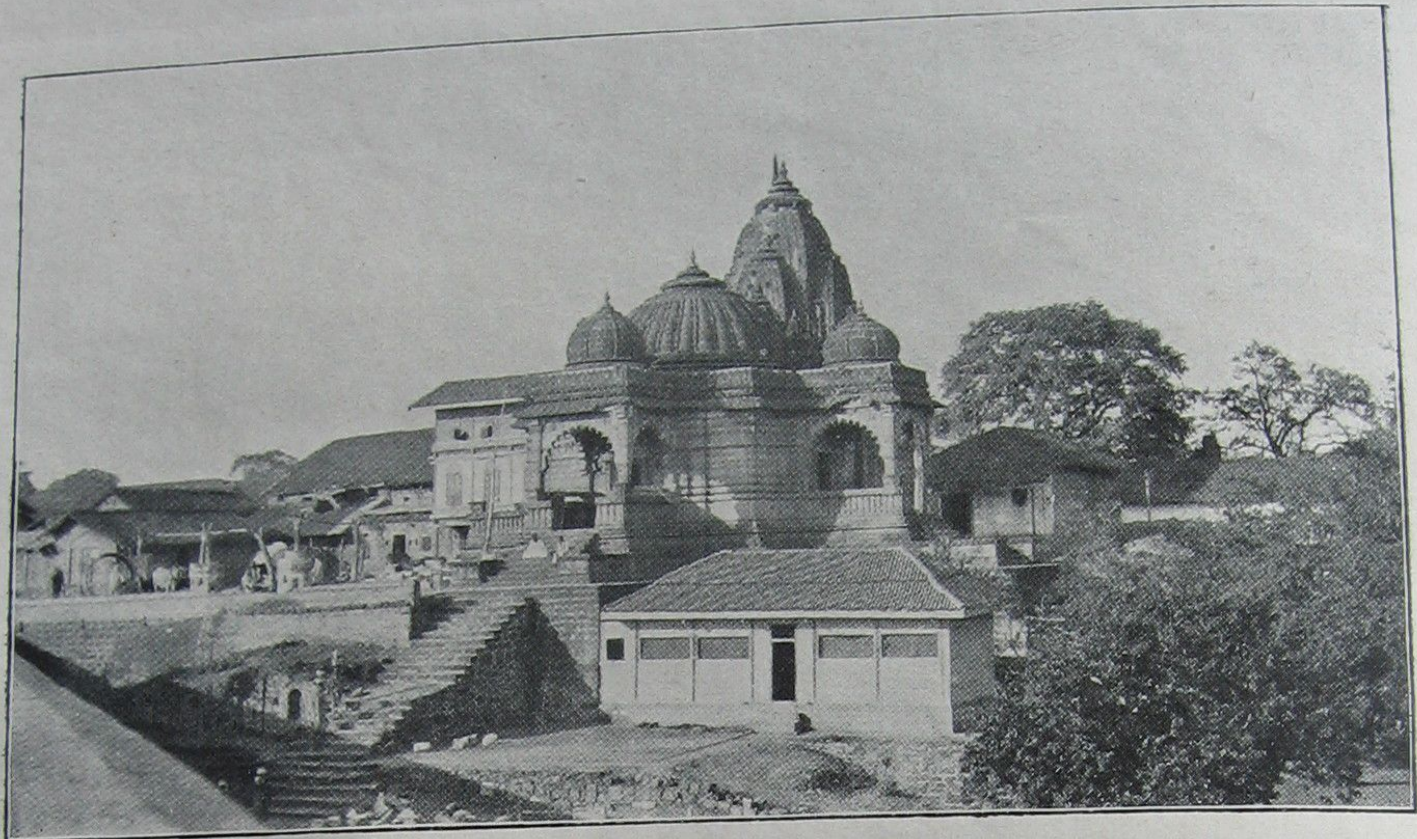

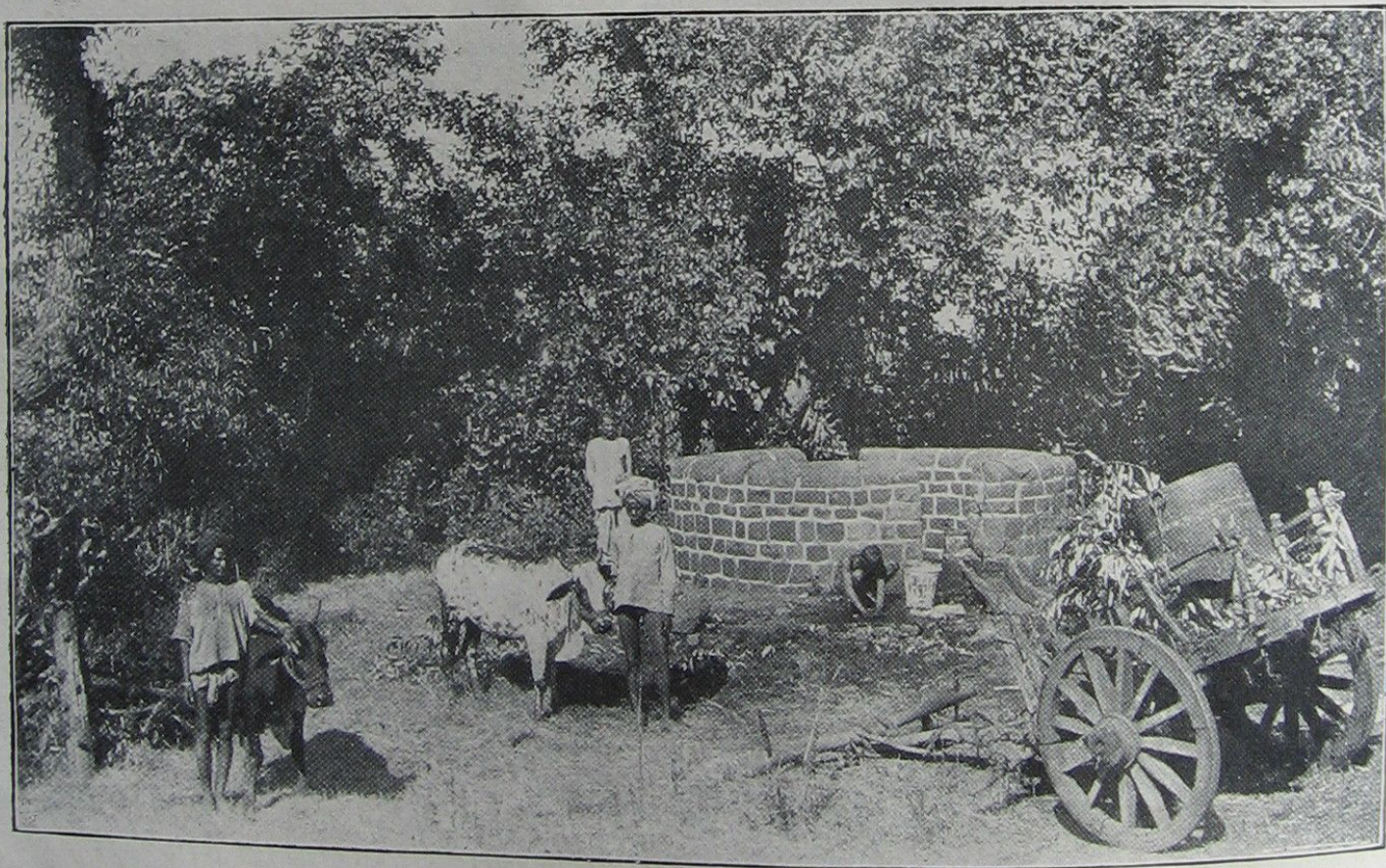

AN INDIAN WELL.

Our Illustrations.

The views we reproduce have kindly been sent by an Old Hulmeian, Mr. H. Sidney Needham, who writes as follows to Mr. Kelsey from the Central Police School, Nasik, Bombay:—

"Here are a couple of Indian scenes of my own taking. As I am not yet very expert with a camera, kindly excuse defects. It is very difficult to get decent results, as we cannot get sufficient water for washing, and that is generally too warm. The first is a temple of the Hindu god Narayan, in Nasik City, situated on the bank of the sacred river Godaveri. Worshippers descend to bathe in the river by the steps you see in the photo. The other view was taken at Christmas, some miles from Nasik. I spent a few days out in a shooting camp. It is a typical Indian scene—the well, and the Chisties or water carriers. There you see them with their "bails" or Indian oxen. These cattle do absolutely everything that the horse does at home. Very rarely do you see a horse doing any kind of draught work.

"At the school here I am working principally at Law and Kanarese, a language spoken in the South of the Presidency. I am really at a serious disadvantage, for Nasik is in the heart of a Marathi speaking district. Further north Gujeratti is spoken, and, of course, Sindhi in Sind. Hindustani, too, is pretty widely spoken, though it appears to be little but a camp language. We get plenty of riding; in fact, our course in this respect is practically that of a cavalry officer. In addition we have foot drill and a certain amount of practical work. Later on we are to attend the Courts. We get plenty of exercise, golf, tennis, badminton, and hockey, though the latter is too strenuous at 98° in the shade."

A Week-end Camp.

Our original plan had been to cycle on to the tent at Combs (Chapel-en-le-Frith) after the footer match at Cheadle Royal, but the fates willed otherwise. The afternoon was a par-

ticularly wet one, and the roads particularly greasy. Suddenly the writer was surprised to find himself lying in the middle of the road looking up at a tramdriver. A glance at the offending bicycle revealed the fact that one of the pedals had snapped off, and valiant attempts to ride with the left foot alone proved unavailing.

After a gruelling game I parted from X., who was to cycle on, while I went by train from Cheadle Heath, taking X.'s rucksack as well as my own tennis bag, each containing muddy footer things, a blanket, and sundry necessities for the inner and the outer man.

I reached Chapel-en-le-Frith just after eight, when darkness had fallen, and after buying bread, butter, cakes, and tinned fruit at a neighbouring shop, the journey up the hillside was begun. The night was pitch black, the road rough, and through various scrubs and woods, and the tent two miles from the station. The whole of the distance I groped along blindly, stumbling at every step, and colliding with innumerable walls, trees, and bushes, but still hugging my bags and the bread, now practically stripped of paper, and pretty wet.

At last I staggered into the field and looked round to see if X. had arrived at the tent, but alas! no light was visible. After groping about for a while I discovered that the gale of the preceding days had uprooted the pole, hurled part of the tent floor some distance away, and deposited the canvas on the other side of the tent pegs, with the result that both tent and flooring were saturated. Borrowing a lantern from the farm, I succeeded in collecting the bits, and discovered in the process that the canvas had a great rent in it. I had just arrived at the decision that sleeping there was out of the question when the belated X. arrived. Our plan of action was quickly decided on. We transferred our blankets and palliasses, &c. (which luckily were stored at the farm), to a cart shed, which, though not of the choicest order, was at least dry. There we had a vigorous rub down, followed by hot tea and biscuits, after which we settled down to rest. Though we were not the only inhabitants of that shed, we passed a delightful, if at times a somewhat exciting night.

Next morning brought the beautiful blue sky and brilliant sunshine so dear to all campers.

Below in the valley, still hazy, only Nature seemed alive, save when the faint music of the farm lad calling in the cows floated up the hill side.

I cannot do justice—in writing—to the feasts we had that day. Potatoes, steak, and onions do not sound very romantic, but as they frizzled on the camp fire, even the most fastidious could not have breathed their savoury odour and remained unmoved. Apricots, cakes, biscuits, and scones sound commonplace, but eaten on the green sward at an altitude of several hundred feet, with a glorious view below and beyond, they become transfigured.

All that day we seemed to be the only sharers of the beautiful landscape, and for the time, at any rate, to possess all that heart could desire. As the darkness fell, we prepared to leave, and conveyed the palliasses and camp utensils to their storehouse at the farm, in readiness for the next visit. Having fastened up the tent and slackened the ropes, we bade farewell to the camp and its rugged surroundings and descended once more into the valley,

"To-morrow to fresh woods and pastures new."

CRICKET NOTES.

The First Eleven have played 13 matches so far, six of which have been won, six lost, and one drawn. Several of the matches have had very exciting finishes, both in our favour and against us. Our wins have all been obtained with a fair number of runs to spare, while in three of our defeats we were only two or three runs short of our opponents' scores. The drawn game would, if time had allowed, have added to the list of exciting finishes, and probably one more to our victories, for the same last batters were in who had saved the game on two previous occasions, viz., Caswell, F., and Beck.

As regards the individual batting of the team, the averages are not as high as usual. As a whole, the team has improved greatly during the last month. Murphy once again heads the batting averages, and deserves his position, having batted most consistently. Irwin also has reached three figures, while five or six other members of the team hope to do the same before the season closes.

The bowling has been rather more successful. While some of our batsmen seem to lose heart when wickets are tumbling rather fast, in bowling a little knocking about seems to make us more determined not to let our opponents do as they like with us. The averages show the amount of hard work done by the regular pair of bowlers. Neill comes first with 46 wickets for 6.45 runs each, while Simcock follows close with 49 for a fraction higher. These figures are not so good as last year's best average at the corresponding date, but they represent more work, as three more matches have been played and over 30 more wickets captured.

The fielding of the team as a whole has been fairly good, although it would be much improved if more interest were taken in the field practices held on the eve of every match. No match has been actually thrown away by bad fielding, but our margin of victory might

have been considerably larger on several occasions.

Up to the present the team has scored 1,115 runs for 147 wickets, giving an average of 7.58 per wicket, a figure not so good as last year's (8.46). The opposing teams have scored 986 runs for 135 wickets. This works out at 7.30 runs per wicket, .20 greater than last year.

The season has thus been fairly successful, and if we do as well as we have of late, we ought to increase the wins by the number of matches still unplayed.

The Second Eleven have played 13 matches. Seven have been won and six lost, which is a very fair record, considering that no boy was left from last year's successful team. The team have failed chiefly in batting, and two lost games would have been won if "lives" had not been given to opposing batsmen. The bowling has been uniformly good. Brocklebank and Allison, J. K., have generally kept so good a length that only on 5 occasions have our opponents exceeded 50 runs. Dyson, Powell, and Sutton have also met with some success with the ball. Palmer, W. H., Dyson, and Royce have been our most dependable batsmen, and Parkes has given one or two hitting displays, but in nearly all the matches the bowling has been allowed to look too deadly, and the batsmen have scraped for runs instead of hitting it as it deserved. Dorrington has made a very good captain, and has always made the most out of the team. The practices have been well attended.

The Livesley Shield has again been won by Byrom House with a total of 27 points, only one point in front of Gaskell who came second with 26.

In the House League for half-holiday matches, as most of our readers know, members of the School Elevens take no part, except on the few days when there is no match for the Second. This year Byrom contribute 9 members to the representative teams, Heywood 7, Dalton and Gaskell 3 each. The House League is thus the training ground for the School Elevens of the future, and it is very necessary that interest in it should not be allowed to flag. This year there has been plenty of keenness amongst those who have taken part in it, but the number has been smaller than last year. At an early stage the C

matches had to be abandoned, through failure to raise teams. There is no doubt that a considerable number of boys who ought to have been playing regularly have spent their half-holidays in loafing. Fifteen matches have been played, and Heywood stand first with a total of 104 points out of a possible 150. Gaskell come second with 93, Byrom have 54, Dalton 45.

For Heywood A. Walshaw, N., has kept wicket, and has generally led his team to victory. Clift and Holden have scored on several occasions, and Goodwin, Campbell, Ashworth, and Cox have batted well. Powell and Allison, J. L., made some good scores before they were captured by the Second Eleven. In bowling Goodwin, Holden, and Campbell have done most work, while Clift has come off more than once.

Gaskell A have been captained by Reed and Elliott, but were often without the former, who has played several times for the second. Elliott has batted very well, reaching double figures on seven occasions. Reed, Briggs, R. W., Briggs, J. E., Elly, and Brookes have made good scores. In bowling, Reed, when available, Briggs, J. and T., Brookes, and Elliott have done good work.

For Byrom A Walker, G. S. (captain) has been a very consistent batsman, and good scores have been also made by Humphries, C. and N., Barr, and Weldron-Willing. Walker, Fox, and Humphries, N., have done most with the ball.

Dalton A were without the services of H. O. Jones till rather late in the season, but since then he has been a keen captain, and has batted and bowled well. Woollam made some very good scores, and has been taken by the Second Eleven. Holmes, F. and J., Norris, and Sutton have also scored, while Aspinwall, Neill, D. A., Orr, A. W., have done most of the bowling.

In the B teams Cartwright, T. A. Roberts, John Roberts, and Mallison have made some good scores, and have done the bowling. Mee, McGeogh, and Gates have been prominent for Gaskell (who have the best record in B team matches), Needham, Tratt, and Clark for Byrom, Nesfield, S., Marson, and Watkinson, T. and J., for Dalton.
