The Hewlett Cup took place this year in perfect conditions but our teams on the whole did not impress favourably. Only our fourth year first team and second team from the third years managed to reach the finals, while four of our teams lost all their matches. Just two years ago we won this competition in dreadful weather, displaying truly admirable spirit and attitude; this year, however, there were disturbing examples of failure to play the game in an acceptable manner.

Our six third year girls took part in Inter-House hockey and netball competitions. At netball we just managed to avoid the wooden spoon but when playing hockey we were far more successful, reaching the final but losing by just one goal. All our girls were awarded their House Colours for this success: Caron Abramson, Sarah Bancroft, Shakila Chaudhry, Maria Jobling, Gabrielle Miller and (not least!) Amanda Wheeler.

A full report on this year's Whitworth House Play production, the court scene from Arthur Miller's "The Crucible", appears elsewhere in this magazine. Catherine Lewis soon made her presence felt in the House when she arrived at the School in September and it became clear that she would make important contributions to both sporting and cultural aspects of the House calendar. With Nick Cherry closely involved with the School Play production, Cathy was an obvious choice for the job of producing our play. Once a play and the cast had been chosen, rehearsals began and things looked well under control. Unfortunately, the two major roles fell upon individuals who took no great care over the first duty of any actor: to learn the lines. In most other aspects of the production we had what looked likely to be a winning entry in the competition, but, as the judges fairly pointed out, the play foundered on what is the most elementary of faults. It was clearly a great pity because so many of the large cast had worked very hard and indeed there were many highly promising performances, not least from Alok Jha, Zoë Wallis and Daniel Riste. Daniel Marsh showed increasing skill as an actor, making the most of a genuine stage presence.

Daniel Moss took charge of our entry in the Music Competition, which consisted of eight sterling performances from Ha Vu (piano), Cathy Lewis (an ambitious piece for the viola by Bach), Robert Gee (ragtime piano), Tim Wright (a sensitively performed song by Roy Harper on the twelve-string guitar), Chris Heys (Mendelssohn's "Christmas Piece" played immaculately on the piano), Steven Bookbinder (Weber's Allegretto for clarinet), Martin Shields (remarkable skill in coping with a difficult cello piece) and Daniel Moss (his own arrangement on the synthesiser). In all it was a varied and entertaining presentation performed by serious and enthusiastic members of the House, who in several cases were taking advantage of (for them) a rare opportunity to make a much-appreciated extra-curricular contribution to the School. I did feel disappointment that an attempt made earlier in the term to set up a rock band was not brought to a successful conclusion.



In terms of results, the 1st XV have had a poor season, winning only four out of seventeen matches. This has not been due to a poor attitude as commitment, effort and determination have been excellent in every single game. Unfortunately what has let the team down is a lack of quality players at 1st XV level.

As the pack was fairly experienced, being made up of mainly upper sixth formers, it was hoped that enough ball could be won at the set piece. This would allow the half backs to use the three-quarters or at least to kick for a position in which the backs could then be launched. This basic game plan regularly broke down at source however throughout the season as the forwards struggled to overcome their lack of technique against much stronger, well drilled packs.

The first game of the season was lost to a big Widnes side who played hard, basic rugby. Having not played for nine months, the inevitable weaknesses in technique and fitness were exposed, especially in the scrummaging of the front five forwards. On the positive side, the tackling and finishing were good as we scored three tries in going down fourteen points to twenty four.

The next game against Birkenhead School, where the previous year we had been thrashed by over sixty points, saw the 1st XV play possibly their best game of the season. Winning 7-4 at half-time, a memorable result seemed possible until the final ten minutes when their fitness and experience finally opened up our defence.

Poynton High School was a game that should have been

won. Winning 8-6 with only minutes remaining, Tilston refused to make the game safe by failing to ground the ball after our pack had driven them back over their own try line. Their long 22 metre drop kick put the ball back into our half, they were awarded a penalty and the goal was kicked. A hard lesson to learn but chances mut be taken if games are to be won.

In the next three games, the team were outplayed by very good Lymm and Cheadle Hulme School teams but narrowly lost to St. Bede's College, the score not really reflecting the true balance of play. On the last Saturday before half-term, the journey was made (for possibly the final time) to one of Yorkshire's best rugby playing schools, Woodhouse Grove. Although the level of commitment was outstanding from every player, the oppositions individual skills and team work were vastly superior to those of ours and the result was never really in doubt.

In the half-term holidays, a ten day tour of America was undertaken, with games scheduled for Boston and New York. It was expected that the opposition would be very big and fit, but lacking in the basic techniques. Consequently we went into every game with the intention of trying to ruck everything in the forwards to give the backs time and space to use the ball. The game plan worked well against Brookline High School and Boston College where two wins were recorded, but broke down against Vasser College from New York where a week of socialising in Boston, a six hour coach trip and a twenty three stone prop ended any hopes of an unbeaten tour. A 23-4 win against Seaton Hall College the following day brought an end to a very enjoyable and successful tour.

In the first two games after half-term, we were comprehensively beaten by King Edwards VII School and Manchester Grammar School, drew with Bolton School courtesy of two Baama penalties and beat Bury Grammar School with Matt Rogers scoring two very good tries. In the penultimate game of the season, the Stockport Grammar School pack proved to be one of the most formidable we had come across all season and they won by a convincing twenty seven points to three. The final game of the season against Sale Grammar School was an interesting game played in atrocious weather conditions. Despite the driving wind and rain, the team played some attractive attacking rugby and were unlucky to be on the losing side again.

Even though the season has been poor in terms of results, a tremendous team spirit has existed throughout the term. Much credit must go to the captain, Noble, whose efforts on the field have been excellent. Malik, Johnson and Tilston have all made significant contributions in the pack whilst the tackling of Hollingworth and Bradley remained hard and uncompromising. Regrettably a settled side has been impossible and the stability of the team been disrupted through the long term injuries to Frost (dislocated knee), Moss (shoulder), Veitch (shoulder) and Cooper (ruptured spleen).

Overall, it has been a disappointing season for the 1st XV. Unlike a few years ago, the School at present does not possess players at senior level who are capable of competing against the better rugby schools such as Birkenhead and Woodhouse Grove. It is a travesty to see a fixture list weakened and teams replaced, but if players are to enjoy their sport, they have to experience some sort of success and in the present system, with the present fixture list, they are not!

Within the School, there are some very good junior sides. Many of these boys play rugby at a club as well as at School and this must be encouraged as much as possible if these teams are to remain successful as they move up through the School. In order to become better players, it is essential that they can spend time on their game. Only then can we hope to see a revival in the fortunes of the 1st XV.

Due to a reorganisation of coaching staff I found myself looking after the U15 side this year, by reputation a side with many talented players but one which lacked discipline, with a number of reluctant trainers. We started our campaign away at Birkenhead School, always one of our most difficult opponents.

The team played like fifteen individuals - too many were willing to let others do their jobs for them, particularly when tackling was required. There were flashes of promise notably from Richard Gandy who was playing full-back for the first time since his U12 days.

The mid-week fixture at Poynton was a scrappy affair, both sides were rather unorganised but our strong runners in the back row and quicker half-backs proved to be our winning edge. By the time we played host to Lymm we had had a number of training sessions. We knew however that Lymm would be a solid, well drilled and powerful team via inside information through some club links. As expected the game proved to be a very tough close contest.

Both sides played good rugby moving the ball to the wings as often as possible with scrum half Taylor also making some good moves up the blind side from the set scrum. However, Lymm pressed strongly at the end of each half and as a result of this pressure we made two very costly kicking errors that lost us the game. Clearly we needed some kicking practice and some guidance on keeping a cool head when under pressure.

The following game against Cheadle Hulme School was one of our most convincing victories, our improved organisation, discipline and strong running proving too much for Cheadle. This good form was maintained against St. Bede's College who were much stronger than Cheadle. We put together a very good performance, our back row again causing numerous problems and acting as the basis for a good win. Our next game, the last before half-term, is traditionally the hardest. The whole team, and in particular the forwards, raised their level of effort and commitment and we did exceptionally well to run a very strong Woodhouse Grove team so close.

We returned from a rest over half-term and seemed to have forgotten much of what we had worked on before the break. The game against King Edward VII was one that we could and should have won, and in some style. However, we went back to playing as individuals, tackling poorly and showing an indisciplined attitude, and as a result we failed to do ourselves justice. Luckily this was the only time that we lapsed and the remainder of the season was most successful. We went to M.G.S. knowing that they had a strong pack and that we would have to play well up front. In the event we played very well and the final score does not reflect the true nature of the game. The forwards rose to the challenge, disrupting much of M.G.S.' possession, but we failed to win clean ball either and to give our backs, who always looked dangerous, a chance to run at M.G.S. Had they got more ball we would have scored tries. In the end the size of the challenge proved too much for the forwards and M.G.S. ran in scores as we tired.

The Bolton School game was as usual a very keen and closely contested affair. Bolton are improving every year and we had to work very hard to win by a narrow margin, in the end out scoring them by three tries to two.

The final games of the season proved that we were now a well-disciplined, talented side. Against Bury School we showed strength and pace in all areas and ran in fifty two points with tries from backs and forwards. What I was particularly pleased with was that most of the tries came about by winning clean ball, moving it quickly and supporting team mates, with many players involved and all doing a good job to aid the end result. This was a complete change from the first game where we expected individual strength or brillance to get us tries. Having learnt the lesson that fifteen players all working together makes it very difficult for the opposition, we went to Stockport.

We knew Stockport had some good players as we had encountered them at the East Cheshire U15 trials. The game was nip and tuck for most of the first half with neither side having the upper hand. However, in the second half we started to take control. Mark Shelmerdine was playing particularly well at the lineout to win us good possession. We passed the ball out to the wings where Ben Wood showed his strength and speed which led to good tries. By the end of the game we were totally in command and ran out worthy winners.

The Sale game proved to be the last of the season as bad weather caused the cancellation of the Bramhall High fixture. We had now won three games in a row and confidence was high. We again showed how much we had improved and that we were now a very positive rugby team. The forwards drove the ball at Sale with powerful runs and close support, then when we had Sale's defence going backwards the backs moved the attack wide and exposed weaknesses on the wings and in the centres. The tries followed as we proved once again to be too strong and quick for the opposition to hold.

Overall it has been a good season for the fifteen-a-side team. The squad by the end of the season were working hard in training sessions. However, this took time to develop. Many players do not appreciate the need for practice and treat it as a time for fooling. To get things right on match days requires practice in training and if one player is missing or is not trying then it makes it very difficult. Also several players need to realise that you have to moderate 'social activities' on Friday nights if you are going to be able to perform to your best on Saturday mornings.

During the season several players went to the East Cheshire trials. There were many players from the Stockport and South Manchester area at the trials held at Marple Hall School. The players that we took all did well, Daniel Riste, Mark Sellers and Matthew Musgrove were very close to being selected but just missed out. However, seven did get selected to join the squad. They were Tim Allen who went on to become captain of the team and had a very good season both for School and Division; he was our top try scorer and should develop into an excellent player. Chris Armstrong was consistently East Cheshire's outstanding forward and his powerful running and destructive tackles were an inspiration to all around him. Damian Taylor played himself into being the Division's first choice scrum half and with a little more commitment could be an excellent player as he has the qualities required. Matthew Butterworth, Shahid Hussain and Ketan Misra all played their part for East Cheshire and were key members of the School attack. Mark Shelmerdine played in the games before Christmas but due to Lacrosse commitments and an eye operation, did not play in the second half of the season. My congratulations go to these boys for gaining representative honours.

Elsewhere in the School team there were many good performers and developing players. In the forwards, there was keen competition between Alex Rodgers and Jon Hall for the position of hooker, neither player quite managing to make the place his own. Matthew McLean and Stuart Murray proved to be very solid props and Raffi Haroutunian was always pushing for a permanent place in the pack. There was also a battle for

places in the backs. On the wings between an improving Ian Sherwin and the very quick Ben Wood. Late in the season Joe Sayyid, Paul Harrison and Nick Owen came through from the house league and played in the Centres. All could develop into good players.

At the end of the season we were involved in three sevena-side competitions at Ripon Grammar School in North Yorkshire, Sale Grammar School and Wilmslow R.U.F.C. We played strong opposition in each of the tournaments but managed to win games in every one. We usually finish mid-table in our group mainly due to our lack of experience at this particular brand of the game. However, we learnt much as we went along and in our final competition we were joint second. It has been a season which I have enjoyed a great deal. I feel this squad could go on to be a very successful senior team and I would strongly encourage them to join clubs if they have not already done so.

The squad contains considerable potential for the future and gradually developed into a very efficient and determined team. After a hesitant beginning they worked very hard on individual and team skills and as the season progressed they played some excellent rugby.

The first game was against Birkenhead and although we played some good rugby, weak tackling against two strong running Birkenhead forwards made the difference. The ball was moved quickly along the threequarters and only some excellent cover tackling kept out the wings, Wan and Clemetson. This was encouraging but greater team work was required, plus work on the tackling.

The next game against Poynton was a dreadful performance due to a combination of circumstances. Firstly, the pack was in disarray because of problems at prop which resulted in a lack of clear possession. Secondly, a try was disallowed and then too many individuals tried to do it all by themselves. Poynton became more determined, the players lost concentration and started arguing and the game was lost 4 pts to 8. This was the one game I would have liked to play again later in the season in order to show what we really could do.

The match against Lymm High School put the team back on course. The forwards and backs combined well and they quickly took control of the game and never faltered. Chris Gleave was in excellent form and strong determined running brought two fine tries. David Grove was a danger every time he received the ball, as was Neville Clemetson, and both also scored two tries.

At Cheadle Hulme the team got off to an excellent start and scored two very good tries through excellent team work. The backs ran the ball and quick support by the forwards resulted in a scrum about fifteen metres out. A quick heel allowed Damian Brown to dart around the blind side and put Martin Wan over in the corner. Then after another surge and quick scrum heel, David Grove picked up from the back of the scrum and ran through from forty metres. Things changed quickly when Cheadle gained some decent possession and the outside centre revealed devastating pace to run in two tries in quick succession, and suddenly we were behind 10 pts to 12. The second half was similar in that once again the team were in control, and two fine tries from Neville Clemetson put them in front again. However, Cheadle rallied strongly and eventually forced an 18-all draw. On balance a fair result, but the boys were beginning to play as a team and the commitment and effort were one hundred percent.

After a comfortable win against a weak St. Bede's team, came the best performance of the season at Woodhouse Grove. Against Bolton Grammar School we were well in control and ran the ball well in the first half, but then lost our way and let Bolton come back. Chris Gleave was a continual problem with his strong running but otherwise movements seemed to break down just before the line. The team were in fine form against a weakened Bury Grammar School, but the opposition never gave up and made them work for every score.

This was followed by another tough match against Stockport Grammar School. The teams were well matched and strong tackling on both sides closed down a lot of the play. A quickly taken penalty enabled David Grove to charge over from fifteen metres, but it was never going to be enough. Stockport pressed continually at the beginning of the second-half, but two missed penalty kicks were to prove very costly. Eventually, the pressure told and Stockport scored an equalising try which meant an exciting last few minutes. A surge down the right side lead to a five-metre scrum, and a quick heel by Mark Knowles allowed Grove to pick up from the back and force his way over the line, but he could not ground the ball. Another scrum followed and this time Grove managed to run wider and squeeze over near the posts for the winning try. An excellent performance all round and a richly deserved victory.

The final game against Sale Grammar School was played in atrocious conditions and was notable only for the fact that David Grove ran in a total of six tries - a rare feat.

The squad contains some very promising individuals but the real strength was in its all round ability. As pack leader, David Grove led by example and was a very consistent performer. He is a strong runner and tackler and also enabled us to use the tactical ploy of dropping him out into the centre when the need arose. James White, James Crawshaw and Ben Myddelton were hardworking flankers and all improved throughout the season. Ian Graham and Nick Byrom were an impressive combination in the second row and provided both height and weight. Ian improved considerably and made a telling contribution in the Woodhouse Grove match.

Mark Knowles was one of the stalwarts in the pack, not only for his quick hooking but also his ability to be first to the ball and get his hands on it. It is not often you have a hooker who can play centre as well, and it will be interesting to see which position he fills as a senior. David Slack was a very efficient prop and Rizwan Ahmed shows considerable promise in that position. This leaves Tyrone Berkeley, a great character who is equally at home as prop, flanker, or winger. An exciting runner and forager, again it will be interesting to see where he plays at senior level.

James Brocklehurst gained in confidence during the season and made the fly-half position his own. He handled well and showed that he can make tackles. Chris Gleave was an admirably consistent performer at centre who was a great asset to the team. A strong runner and tackler, he always showed great determination and never gave less than one hundred percent effort. He was well supported by Nick Reading who was probably the best tackler of them all. An elusive runner and good link-man he just needs to have a little more confidence in his ability.

Martin Wan was very quick on the wing and always threatened whenever he had the ball. Neville Clemetson was a most dangerous player, quick and powerful, he could run through or break tackles and quickly threaten the line. The opposition could never relax when he had the ball. Avinash Rao also improved considerably and provided good cover at wing and centre. Matthew Whiteley took over at full-back and proved a dependable last line of defence. He will however need to improve his tackling in future. Jose Witter is still searching for his best position and with greater application could easily find a permanent slot.

Finally, this leaves the Captain and scrum-half, Damian Brown. A lively character, always full of energy and continually trying to improve his own game. He never gives up and continually urges on the team from the front. His commitment was never shown better than when he made the tackle on the huge number eight forward at Woodhouse Grove.

I greatly enjoyed coaching the squad and was proved to be part of the team. They worked hard in training but also showed that it was possible to enjoy it as well.

Finally, thanks to an outstanding group of parents whose support and encouragement were greatly appreciated.

Following on from last year s undefeated season, the U13 XV began in great style, convincingly beating Birkenhead School. The foundation for success was, as last year, a well drilled pack capable of producing good first phase ball but, more importantly, good quick second phase possession. Behind the pack the team had strength and pace but suffered from an inability to move the ball quickly enough through the hands at speed to break down the better defences. A lot of our running went across the field rather than penetrating through the middle. At the junior ages this is understandable and will improve as players become more experienced in their differing positions.

Following on from the Birkenhead game a run of convincing wins followed, culminating in a magnificent victory over Woodhouse Grove. The whole team played exceptionally well - but particular praise must be given to the forwards who completely dominated the game, denying the opposition any decent ball.

Two defeats followed. Against King Edward VII School, slack tackling and an inability to convert pressure into points saw the fortunes of the game swing away from us. Initially we controlled the game but failed to score. With their first touch of the ball after 10 minutes, the King Edward No. 8 picked up from a scrum on half-way and ran through three tackles to score. Gradually we lost control of the game and King Edward emerged deserved victors.

Similarly at Manchester Grammar School we dominated for the early periods of the game, but again could not score. Once again we lost control of the game through weak tackling and our own inability to gain ground when in possession. Our third defeat at the hands of Stockport Grammar School followed a similar pattern. Again we allowed players (their No. 8 in particular) to make large inroads into our defence. It was only in the later stages of the game that we "woke up" as a team but by this time the result was not in doubt.

These three fixtures apart the team played very good rugby and showed a willingness to run, pass and support. Quality ball, particularly second phase, is vital if the opposing defence is to be breached and our pack worked very well to supply enough ball for our speedy backs to dominate against most of the teams encountered.

Although rugby is a team game and we accept success or failure as a team, several individuals deserve special mention. In the forwards, Richard England was the cornerstone of a solid pack. He is very strong and has pace, and on more than one occasion contributed significantly to the overall team performance. My one criticism would be that although he works very hard to secure the ball in the maul he often then runs off with it instead of giving the ball to the scrum half. This effectively isolates him (and next year the better teams will tackle him early) and also denies the ball to the talented backs.

Adnan Malik proved himself a very useful No. 8. Quick and tall, he showed he has talent. He must, however, work on his handling ability and his tackling. Gavin Elly was probably our most improved forward. His tackling was superb. Gavin must also work on his handling ability.

Behind the pack Ben Smith is an offensive scrum half whose strength is his aggressive running. He will need to work very hard on his passing and kicking and also his vision ie, when to run, pass or kick. The fly half spot went to Peter Day who improved with every game. Peter captained the side extremely well following on from Joshua Robinson (who was not available for every game). Both these players showed great maturity Joshua in particular impressed me with his play at full back.

The season as a whole was very enjoyable. In both victory and defeat the team was a credit to the School. The team spirit and competitiveness, as well as a healthy respect for the opposition was always present and these factors made for very entertaining rugby.

Finally my thanks go to all players for their work in training and on the field of play and to all those Parents who supported the team.

After last year's highly successful unbeaten season with the U12's my first impressions of this year's rugby squad was that we would do very well indeed to lose only half of our fixtures. It is to the players immense credit that we only lost one game this season - indicative of the tremendous collective spirit and attitude in the team. Add to this the fact that in only three games were we ahead at half-time and this demonstrates the uncompromising commitment to the cause that the U12's displayed throughout the season.

Uncompromising and possibly even dour, could be used to describe some of our play this year and I attribute this wholly to myself. Most coaches feel instinctively that they are playing players in their right positions but this year in hindsight I feel that the side became too unbalanced and that major surgery will have to be undertaken next year (despite the fact that we averaged over three tries a game!). We always gave a good account of ourselves upfront but never really exploited the hard won possession - and this is probably why a successful season was not an exceptional one.

The U12's traditional first game of the season is against Cheadle Hulme and, again following 'tradition' a very close game took place, and in which we triumphed by the odd score in five. What was immediately obvious was that we were going to produce abundant possession from the tight and that our back row would compete fiercely in the loose. It was to be hoped that our inability to move the ball wide would come with time and so we were off to a promising start.

The game versus St. Bede's College saw five of our eight tries being scored by the backs with wings and full back involved. A few carefully chosen words at half-time with the lead at 12-0 saw our forwards up a gear in the second half and monopolise possession which we utilised quite effectively.

So far so good. The backs had started to move the ball, the forwards could win it - all augured well for what invariably is the toughest game of the season - away at Woodhouse Grove. For the first five minutes of this game we were entirely magnificent - we kicked off, buried the catcher, shoved them five metres back at the subsequent scrum, ran straight, rucked them off the ball and almost sneaked in. In terms of our level of superiority, that was about it. Three horrendously missed tackles in the first half let them in, denting our confidence and with our scrum creaking and a drought in the line out we were up against it. They created three good scores in the second half and won comfortably by 24-0. Our disappointment was there for all to see (some of us were a little over-disappointed and the shouting at the goal kicker as he ran up following the final try did us no favours and was more reminiscent of the behaviour of soccer fans rather than a rugby team). A few positive things did emerge from the game. We were hugely committed and never stopped against an extremely 'streetwise' U12 team and a few 'non tacklers' earned their spurs in the second half when we refused to lay down. Probably our most gutsy performance resulted in our only defeat of the season and we remembered never to buy dummies from side-stepping players (shouting 'joy'?) ever again.

The visit of the King Edward VII side from Lytham always guarantees a tough game and we were deservedly a try to nil down after the first half in which our forwards were ridiculously lethargic. Fortunately, subtle promptings at the break achieved the desired effect and we scored a couple of very hard worked tries to take the lead only for the opposition to score again to tie the game - somewhat fortuitously for us it must be added. Our performance did not really merit any success in this one, which boded ill for the next game versus The Manchester Grammar School. I thought back to the 'mini-classic' of the previous year, a wonderful nil-nil draw and found it hard to imagine a similar scoreline based on our previous performances of the year. However the game was a collective triumph of our will to win in the end. We found ourselves in the familiar position of being 4-0 down after a first half in which we had posed quite a few problems but had largely been outmanouevred and outthought by more flexible and quick witted players (and coaches!!). (Have Hulme U12 teams become so predictable?) We had made all the mistakes and had to impose our game plan if we were to achieve anything at all. A surge straight from the restart saw us to within one metre of their try line, equalising with a catch and fall from the line out. We then severely tested the oppositions defences with a fifteen minute encampment in their twenty two which yielded a preciously converted try but a great break out and score between the posts brought the scored to 10-8, with the kick to put M.G.S. level being narrowly missed. We just about deserved to win this one and it was a real credit to our efforts in training that we did so. The game couldn't have been much closer.

Bolton School were our next visitors who more than matched us in every department except for defending in their twenty two and whereas we conceded soft tries early on in the season, they let us in for four straightfoward scores to none.

The Stockport Grammar game saw us come up against what I considered to be the strongest backline we faced all season. They scored a couple of very simple but very effective

tries with their first two bits of possession and could have ran us ragged if not for the Herculean efforts of our pack in depriving them of the ball for virtually the whole game.

The final game of the season finally saw the bullet bitten and a few fundamental changes were made. The game, played in icy conditions was something of a lottery but we ran out comfortable winners (20-14) inspite of the apparent closeness of the scoreline. The actual nature of the game provided few bits of evidence as to whether the changes were for the better or not.

So, who were the players? James Jobling, as pack leader and tight-head prop is a blunderbuss of a player. He is strong, surprisingly quick and was top try scorer with eight tries. Perhaps his biggest strength however is his mobility and he would have played in the back row against Sale (and Bramhall) if circumstances in both cases had allowed it where, perhaps his influence could have been even greater. Michael Dodds was the team's every present tenacious hooker. Once more though he might have been played out of position. His double-figured 'against the head take' recorded in one game followed by the "strike on striking on his own ball" in the next might be explained by the fact that he's left footed - not ideal for winning your normal put in. He has good hands and 'Doddy' may develop into an 'athletic' scrum half in the mould of his father in years to come. James Silver on the loose-head was another ever present and was 100% reliable in every sense. He worked very hard in training and learnt very quickly indeed. Much of the disruption of the opposition's ball was down to his very sound technique.

The most regular second row pairing was Graham Thornton and Guy Malach. Graham provided a constant supply of line out ball for us all season and as he gained in confidence and assurity developed into a very useful performer. Guy is a different sort of player, considerably more robust in his approach. When he uses his strength more productively, he will be a very powerful customer. Daniel Bishopp was another regular 'engine roomer' who never let the team down and with greater vigour could be a real force.

The regular 'back rowers' were Matthew Robinson, Richard Kiff and Richard Woolley. Matthew was probably the most improved player in the squad. He took knocks without moaning and had a happy knack of doing the right thing at the right time (well, in most cases). His handling skills and tackling improved beyond recognition over the season. Richard Kiff is a player of huge potential - his strength is his strength and when he learns to read the game a little better I feel sure will develop into a very high quality player. Last but not least in the forwards is Richard Woolley. He was probably our most influential, our key forward in the scheme of things. His ball winning and claiming ability coupled to his capacity for retaining it meant that most of our loose-play and subsequent driving play revolved around him. In some games he was quite outstanding in this role though it might have gone totally un-noticed.

Whilst I have expressed 'doubts' concerning 'positionability' amongst the forwards, it was the selection of the backs which caused me the most problems. To some extent my hands were tied faster than in previous years in that this year's squad were largely lacking in pace, physical stature and experience, so in many cases a compromise had to be made. Robert Seddon captained the side from scrumhalf. He has an experienced rugby head on his shoulders already, an eye for the half-break as well and his tackling improved beyond recognition as the season progressed. He also possesses a very good delivery 'both sides' but his love for running with the ball in his hands often meant that he restricted his choice of option and this resulted in the remainder of the back line playing 'bit-parts' on too many occasions. In the final game of the season versus Sale, he led the side from centre, where he scored a try from outside of the twenty two, to add to his five scored sniping round the base of the 'juggernaut' in front of him!

Greg Humphries was the regular outside half and looks to be a talented sportsman. He is a very strong runner scoring a 'gem' of a try against Bolton. Following the Woodhouse Grove game his defence became absolutely watertight and he became a devastating 'crash tackling flyhalf', much in evidence during more stressful moments in the King Edward and M.G.S. games. His distribution however needs improving and will inhibit his game and that of those outside him, until sorted out.

The three-quarters 'evolved and revolved' from game to game. Chris Reading played seven times at inside centre and was full back for the final game. His tackling in both positions were typically "Readingesque' and drew favourable comment from many of the opposition coaches. If he can improve his speed, a fine all round player will emerge. Miles Newton, Matthew Healey, Guy Brocklehurst, Stephen Kellett, Jordon Partington and Nick Bell all partnered Chris in the centre or occupied other positions in the three-quarters. Miles is a very elusive runner and looks a fine natural athlete. Matthew is probably the quickest of the group and he should look to hold a regular position in the team next year with a little more determination and consistency. Guy is a good dodger and weaver who tackles bravely and as he develops physically should turn into a fine player. Stephen looks to be very comfortable with the ball in his hands and is a nicely balanced runner but his defence needs a little bit of tightening up. Jordan is very sharp over the first few metres and surprised many opponents with his pace and changes in direction only to suffer at the hands of bigger and stronger foes. Nick really came on during the season. He emerged as a very fine defensive player capable of try saving tackles. His attitude was first class throughout whether playing a full game or half as a replacement.

Richard Dawson was the regular full back and last line of defence, a role he played admirably throughout. Though small in stature 'the bigger they came, the harder they fell' was his motto throughout.

Other players who represented the School were Richard Beenstock, Jolian Guy, Simon Longsden, James Lambert and Asif Maiid.

Many thanks to Messrs. Mallinder and Seddon for the colossal amounts of their time they have given up in helping me with the U12's (this, in addition to running their own teams), to parents for their whole-hearted support and coping with various meteorological hazards on Saturdays (blazing sun at Woodhouse Grove, snow at Sale) and to the players for representing the School with so much pride and training with so much commitment. We scored 66% of our points in the second halves of games, when other teams were wilting and our fitness resulted largely from doing ballwork and handling skills during training whilst running all the time!

This year's group, I feel could go from strength to strength. It delighted me to learn that nine of the regular fifteen all play on Sundays for local clubs which can only help their development as players.

Maybe the clubs can sort out their proper positions!


I must congratulate all those pupils who time and time again came out to practices and supported us, even when not playing in matches themselves.


Stockport Grammar School and Knutsford County High School proved to be a formidable opponents and we lacked pace and the will to win on both of these occasions.


The changing pattern of junior lacrosse fixtures in recent seasons has worked greatly to the advantage of the School first team, and it appears that forthcoming seasons, assuming no further changes occur, will bring the most satisfactory balance of games for many years. Playing the bulk of Under 19 League (Conference A) fixtures bring an almost guaranteed competitive game each Saturday afternoon, with Lancashire Cup rounds interspersed. The excellent Timperley floodlit competition adds several more top quality fixtures on Sunday evenings, and the half-term tour and the traditional Hulmeians fixture complete a near ideal mix. It is to be hoped that we can continue to expect this combination.

Our playing strength this season was well-balanced, both in talent and experience, and we were fortunate in being able to keep the back four together for almost every game, for it was here that the team's success had its foundation. Bone's goalkeeping was outstanding, often brillant, and fully worthy of the representative honours it has attracted. It was a difficult decision to select him above Sherratt, who also performed excellently when called upon. The three defence players came from three different years, but gelled from the outset. Walker's man-on-man play was splendid, always fair, yet very tough indeed, and he was rarely bettered by an opposition attack. Stansfield worked very hard at his all-round game, especially in restraining his more vigorous instincts and soon looked the complete defence player, and Foster was simply the best Fifth Year player for a very long time with immense skill and a remarkable temperament for a young player. With a change of structure in the junior game next year Fifth Year boys will be kept as a group in their own "Under 16" squad, but we will have to think long and hard before deciding to keep players of Foster's quality out of 1st team lacrosse for another junior season. There are many great players around who will testify to the boost their game got from three years' first team play, rather than just two.

A similar blend of year groups was found in the attack and midfield areas: dealing with the two together is especially appropriate this year, as Dan Berkerey, in his role as coach, brought great flexibility to the game in this area, and was always prepared to make attack men run and midfields handle, without being governed by stereotypes. The senior players here were S. Veitch, who captained the side with total reliability and poise, James, Johnston and Rogers, all players who had been characterised as individual 'stars' who were not 'suited to team situations'. Stereotypes were shown to be totally unreliable yet again: lack of these players made a huge contribution in his different way, and whilst we often saw their 'star' individual attractions in their play, it was hardly ever at the expense of team play. So we saw Veitch winning faces with awesome power and carrying the ball just the right distance; Rogers driving in fearlessly and excitingly at the left post, but so often with the intention of drawing defenders and laying off; Jameson's incomparable pace just outside the restraining line and his often aerobatic shots, but maturely rationed this season; and Johnston, who at first doubted if he would be selected, blossoming in confidence and sliding both himself and his underarm left-handed shot into the smallest spaces at just the right time. Great support for these senior players came from N.D. Williams, promoted after spectacular scoring feats on a lower team whose game developed splendidly from the simple addition of enforced midfield running. Early injury meant that R.W. Buckley, a great servant of School lacrosse, had sadly limited opportunities.

The 'continuity factor' at the attack end was provided by the naturally ambidextrous N.J. Williams, who shows particular promise in that he never gives or receives the ball when standing still and with a touch more confidence will make great contributions in his final year; by Ladd, whose progress from the Fifth Year had been so remarkable as to make him unrecognisable even to recent leavers "Who's that great big, really quick middie?" - and who provided massive power at the faces and when running the ball out of defence as well as many touches of real class near goal; and by the amazing Bratt, the 'players' player' in original discussions about team selection, whose pace and energy were phenomenal, especially when combined with his control, both of the ball in his stick and of his checking and pressurising opposition players: to see him collapse onto the bench was not unusual, but in moments he would be right back in the fray, and with his level of commitment our game is in very safe hands. We will see the same sort of game next year from T. Veitch and Sum who looked perfectly at home in the first team midfield and both have great pace and fluent handling skills, as well as a natural flair. Baama had a very full season indeed, playing mostly under great pressure at the left post, but with the determination to keep the ball close and not be pushed away, and he also will look back on this season as one of gaining experience for the coming ones.

As to the fixtures, it was disappointing to lose a great semifinal in the Lancashire Cup when a spell of old-fashioned 'storming' might have changed the result if we had brought it out earlier: the first cup game was expected (by some) to be a close one, but the opposition, almost all WHGS Old Boys, wilted in the pace of the struggle. The league games were excellent: Cheadle were unfortunate in having their main defenders out of action on the day, the School games were decided by a single-irresistible scoring burst in each, and the magnificent Timperley match consisted of protecting a 5-0 lead for the 80% of the game which remained after we had established it! Unfortunately though, for our match practice, Stockport's 'senior' sides made excessive demands on their Under 19 squad on a Friday evening - a sad sense of priorities - and, even worse, Ashton did not respond to our request to rearrange a postponed fixture, forcing us to share the championship with Timperley. The tour games were not well supported by the Upper Sixth team members (except for the captain): what a good thing we have such supporters as Wilson who travelled at 24 hours notice. The first round defeat in the excellent Timperley competition was far closer than the score suggests! Yes, it can be closer than 6-7! - and the final of the plate, against a strengthened Stockport Grammar School side, brought a fine performance in a really exciting game and a second trophy for the team.

Iain Shaw, but it is here, in the School magazine, in a report on the School lacrosse team, that the main one belongs. No-one will run the first team with his blend of skill, knowledge and understanding, and he has created a very special atmosphere: I am proud to be able to follow him.

The season ended on a high point with 11 players being selected for a successful Lancashire team. Following weeks of training the South were defeated 11-2 and then 10 players took part in a superb 9-8 victory over Cheshire. A certain Bradley Jones being named Man of the Match. The squad are therefore some of the best players for their age group in the country as Dan said if they work hard and are prepared to learn there is no reason why they cannot travel around the world as future England players.

Dan Berkerey was a tremendous positive influence giving vast amounts of time and enthusiasm to all the school players and coaches. Many thanks to him and we wish him all the best in the future. Thanks also to a tremendous off field team of parents who constantly encouraged their sons, were great support and even supplied half-time refreshments. I think the cup final loss was a greater blow to them than their sons! Last but by no means least thanks to Simon Marsden and Andy Booth for their constant assistance and guidance.

An Ul5's 'B' team played throughout the term with enthusiastic 3rd and 4th years. They all enjoyed themselves and improved rapidly through the season. Frequently players come from the group to play on the first team or even later at University or clubs level.

The season started with a disappointment: the first match was against Timperley in the Centurion Trophy. Although the School beat Timperley later in the season, the disadvantage of playing our first match against a good team half-way through their season was too much and Timperley went through to the next round 6-4. The rest of the season was also to bring some more narrow defeats (all four defeats were by two goals), some narrow wins and some more comfortable successes. This is an interesting age group for lacrosse. There are no outstanding teams, but there are several teams of a similar standard and hence there were some good competitive matches.

Throughout the season the defence performed consistently well, keeping the opposition down to a meagre five goals per match which should normally bring success. The defence normally consisted of Gerezdi, Birtwistle and England. Gerezdi is a naturally aggressive player but often commits himself too easily. Birtwistle is a solid, tenacious player who must improve his mobility and his handling skills. England was the find of the season. He made an inauspicious start in goals for the 'A' team but improved rapidly when promoted to the first team. I can see him developing into a midfield player next season so it is important that players like Keller and Royds are ready to press for places. Behind the defence, Pearson, in goal, was a model of consistency. It is vital that the defence have confidence in the goalkeeper to save most shots that come from outside the danger zone and this is exactly what Pearson did.

The defence was assisted by a midfield that won the majority of possession and worked hard to retrieve the ball once it was lost. The focal point of the midfield was Day, a very strong player with great determination. Alongside Day was Flatman who, although lacking the physical size of Day, showed similar determination. I would like to see a more positive approach from Flatman when attacking. The rest of the midfield was normally chosen from Ghazi, Johnson, Lamb, Robinson and Taylor. None of these players really had the same command and authority shown by Day and Flatman. If the team is to develop from a promising one into a really good one then it is these players who must work hard to improve.

The regular attack was Elly, Hope and Khan. Elly progressed well during the season, his willingness to use both hands giving him more options than other one-handed players. Hope was leading goalscorer but I would like to see a greater commitment to create goals as well as score them. Khan must improve his mobility if he is to retain his place next season because Ghazi, with seven goals in the final match, demonstrated quite clearly that he is an attack player rather than a midfield player.

Overall, the season was slightly disappointing. I must take some of the blame for this in that I played Ghazi in midfield for most of the season. When selecting the team I could write down about seven players straight away but the remaining six players could have been chosen from about twelve other players of similar ability. For the team to fulfil its potential it is important that these players, who are not automatic choices, develop so that they do establish themselves in the team.

Finally, some thanks are due in a number of directions. Firstly. I would like to thank all the players for making the season an enjoyable one, with particular thanks to Peter Day and Jonathan Flatman for their captaincy.

Thanks also go to the various parents who not only supported the team, but also helped with transport so that not one min-bus was needed during the season. Last, but not least, my thanks go to Dan Berkerey, the American coach. It was quite extraordinary how one man could make such a favourable impact in such a short space of time. It was no coincidence that the best performance from the team came in the final match when Dan was coaching. He returns to the States with our thanks and best wishes for the future.

As in previous years, coaching and practice sessions were held over the Christmas holiday period, and it was very encouraging to have a large attendance at each session. It was soon apparent that there was a group of six boys who would advance quickly. Three of these had lacrosseplaying brothers in the School, with whom they had practised, and others were natural athletes who could quickly adapt to the skills of lacrosse.

Once the term started, we were very fortunate to have the services of the School's first permanent lacrosse coach, Dan Berkerey, and he helped to coach groups of boys daily. Further lunch-time and Saturday morning practices helped more boys gain the basic skills of picking up the ball, catching and throwing, before the technicalities of match play were introduced.

A practice game against a group of Under 13 players was very valuable in helping mould a group of individuals into a team, and in showing them the essentials of match play. The following week, the first match was against Mellor, who, despite being a young side, had several who had been playing two or three seasons. We had the strength of athletes in

midfield, and Robert Seddon in particular played well in a comfortable 8-0 victory.

Very bad weather - snow and torrential rain - prevented the lunch practices proceeding for most of the next two weeks, and vital time was lost when all needed to improve handling and to practice game skills. The next two matches were cancelled because of flooded pitches, and only one match had been played before half-term.

Our next opposition was Heaton Mersey, a team who were small and skilful but lacking in strength. James Lambert, in goals, had an excellent first half, confidently catching the ball whenever the opposition pressed forward. In the second half, we won most of the faces, thanks to the strength of James Jobling, and pushed forward steadily because of the skilful midfield play of Guy Brocklehurst and Andrew Xydeas. After a half-time score of 1-1, we scored six without reply in each of the final two quarters, mainly because of the positive shooting of James Calderbank.

Ten boys took part in the Under 13 six-a-side tournament at Timperley, and all enjoyed the experience, winning one of their four matches.

We were then due to play the Waconians team on each of the final three Saturdays, and attempts to change some fixtures were unsuccessful. The first match was on a very uneven and heavy pitch, and against a team who were mostly 13 year olds. We seldom managed to pick up the ball easily, and ran with the ball too often, instead of passing. Inexperience, and lack of training in match play, were now becoming evident. This inexperience was even more clearly visible in the return match the following week. The School pitch was again uneven, and the previous week's training was forgotten when the match was dominated by a much stronger team. One player left ill before the match started, and several others were injured during the match - we needed to employ three goalkeepers! The scoreline of 2-7 could have been much worse.

For the final week, seven of our regular players were away on a School trip, and intensive training was given to new recruits. This match was played on an excellent dry, flat and even surface, and the newcomers all fared well. Miles Newton, in his first full game in goals, played confidently. Chris Reading had his best game in defence, and was always ready for the clear, and the attack were willing to pass the ball round.

Our defence looked more solid than in any previous game, and, after several near misses at each end, the final score of 3-3 was about right.

There is a nucleus of a good side here, with three good goalkeepers - confident James Lambert, the enthusiastic James Jobling, and the potential of Miles Newton. The defence needs to be rather more tougher, and must work at marking in a zone instead of chasing players and going out of position. Here, Michael Dodd could be partnered by any two from James Jobling, Chris Reading, Matthew Healey and Chris Longsden (one of our last match heroes). #### DAN BERKEREY: AMERICAN LACROSSE COACH

The 1991 lacrosse season saw a major venture by the School, designed to give breadth and strength to its lacrosse coaching programme. While we have over recent years welcomed the various American coaches employed by the English Lacrosse Union to join us in your games periods, we

have never before had a coach of our own, full time, to help out at all levels of the game. With the co-operation of the ELU we were able to engage such a coach from a wide choice of young Americans eager to gain qualifications in their chosen game, and, of course, to spend an extended spell in Europe as well. There must evidently be a question of risk where it is not possible to meet personally and interview each prospective candidate for the job, but everyone concerned with this year's experiment agreed that we could not possibly have made a better choice: not only did we get a great and totally committed lacrosse player in Dan Berkerey; we also got a splendid new friend and colleague and our own personal U.S. Ambassador.

A Harvard graduate, Dan arrived in England from Boston in January, a few days before the start of term and within hours he was on the School field both leading and helping out with practices - that there were three arranged for that day must have given him some encouragement that he had come to a place where they took it seriously! It was soon obvious that he was just as comfortable with accomplished 18 year olds as he was with 11 year old beginners, and by his easy manner with the boys at all levels, along with his willingness to pick up names very quickly, it was clear from the outset that he was going to do a great deal for us. In the following weeks he spent hours on the field in games lessons, lunchtimes, and after School, as well as taking two games on a Saturday with a practice before them. He did not restrict himself to School teams either: anyone with a lacrosse stick was fair game for help and advice, and more players than ever were attracted to the excitement of this games individual stick handling skills.

Dan coached every area of the game with skill and enthusiasm, but his own position was defence and to see him work with individual defence players with the ball was excellent, and it is surely significant that the first team, with whom he worked so regularly, hardly gave away a penalty between them in the season, yet at the same time forced opposing attack players to play and handle at a pace which was often simply too great and inevitably made them lose the ball. As a coach on the bench too he brought a fluidity to the overall play of the side by a constant replacing of players, not looking always for the 'star' player to use, but simply going on whose turn it was to go on, and this brought extra handling out of the runners and extra running out of the handlers at the same time. He was always totally involved in the game from the bench, which of course led to many a 'discussion' with referees, who still in England find it largely intolerable to be questioned and assume that being referred to as 'Sir' is an impertinence! Many English referees, and organisers in the game too, seem to be simply afraid of an American accent, but to penalise a side because they do not understand the points being (politely!) made to them is indefensible. The next generation, with regular contact with our American friends, will be more enlightened!

The involvement with coaching lacrosse was in fact only half of Dan's contribution to the School. He was an enthusiastic referee at all levels ("Hey guys! Anyone ragging my accent and it's a two minute personal, O.K.?"), he played whenever available for Hulmeians, where he made many friends, and also most Sundays for the U.S. Coaches team, often in London - he needed his Mondays off! - and he was a welcome and prized house guest with the several families of boys from the School, who accommodated him for a few weeks at a time. All in all, he set a superb example of enthusiasm, commitment and general life style to all our lacrosse players, and it came as no surprise when they wished to mark his excellent contribution to School life and lacrosse with a special party in the Sixth Form Common Room which Stephen Veitch, the first team captain, organised at the end of term. This informal gathering was just the right way of marking a most significant point in the history of School lacrosse and of saying thank you to Dan, who returned to the States with many souvenirs of English sporting and social life. It had been a great pleasure to be involved with a remarkable young man.

Cricket is a team game and so is everything that goes into the staging of it. May it continue to be so and may cricketers continue to develop their talents and find enjoyment in playing to the best of their ability.



The 1991 season started with high hopes: a strong senior squad containing about fifteen players of 1st XI potential promised a stronger than average 2nd XI. The first two matches reinforced this optimism with good draws against Bolton and Arnold. In both matches the School controlled this by batting first, setting challening targets, but not being able to bowl out the opposition on good wickets. The highlight in these two matches was a powerful innings of 93 not out by Mehta who would undoubtedly have scored a century had the interests of the team rather than the individual not necessitated the declaration.

The third match brought the team down to earth, when, having bowled Bury out for 89, the Schoool were dismissed for just 44 runs. A damp wicket was not easy to score on but there was a lack of application which was to feature in later matches. A draw against Macclesfield was followed by a defeat at Wakefield, where again the batting was fragile. A draw against Lytham was then followed by a remarkable defeat the hands of St. Bede's. A captain's innings of 129 by Bone, in which he attacked the bowling mercilessly and was rewarded by more than one stroke of good fortune, enabled a declaration of 208 for 5. From such a seemingly impregnable position the School managed to lose off the last ball of the match. Our bowling was indifferent and our fielding a disgrace.

After half-term, examination pressures drastically weakened the team. 109 runs was never going to be enough to test Stockport and they were comfortable winners despite a triple wicket maiden by Hira. This match was completed in steady rainfall and a very set June caused the cancellation of other

matches and, probably, saved the School from further losses. One match that did escape the weather, unfortunately, was the embarrassing 10 wicket defeat before tea at Manchester Grammar School. The M.G.S. bowling was quite good but so was the wicket and it was very disappointing to see such a spineless effort against the old enemy.

Examinations over the team was almost back to full strength for the Merchant Taylors game. Good bowling, including 5 wickets for Williams, combined with good fielding restricted Crosby to 93 and, despite a few alarms, the winning runs came quite quickly.

It was unfortunate that the final match was played on an atrocious wicket at Bradford Grammar School. The home side, knowing the wicket well, played in cavalier fashion amassing 159 runs. When the School batted, a good start by Baama and Bone was followed by the regular fall of wickets and it was left to Burton, with perhaps the best innings of the season, to steer the side to safety.

Overall, a season that started and finished well deteriorated in the middle. This was due to many players being unavailable during the examination period. In fact, twenty nine players were used during the season and the team that lost at Stockport Grammar School contained no players from the opening match of the season! I would like to thank all the players for their efforts during the season. Thanks also go to John Taylor, the groundsman, who managed to produce excellent wickets in a difficult season and Mr. Gregson and his ladies for the teas.

The season began with an optimism perhaps greater than usual because of the careful preparation that had taken place during the winter with the help of the professional coach, Roy Collins. It had been felt that our bowling looked stronger than the batting, due to the presence of a fast bowler (Dipak Bhakta), a left-arm opener (James Brocklehurst), off-spin (Phillip Sidebottom), leg-spin (Iain Cooke) and left-arm orthodox spin (Mark Warnes). We had others in reserve who could bowl medium pace with some movement and accuracy, such as Nick Gresty, Avinash Rao and Adam Aslam. All these bowlers had performed well indoors and were prepared to learn and work at their weaknesses. We felt that our batting was weaker, as we had no single player who was likely to dominate an opposition's bowling attack.

By the end of the season, however, the fact was that we had bowled out only three sides: Arnold (for 150), North Manchester and Bradford (on a poor wicket). Our attack was classic in that we had almost every style of bowling in our armoury, but injuries and the unavailability of key players for certain early matches weakened us. More importantly, our bowlers did not produce the form on grass that had been promised indoors. Bhakta's bowling began disappointingly as he struggled to keep the ball on the off-stump consistently; he was greatly disadvantaged, however, by poor fielding at fine-leg/third-man positions and one could sense the whole side becoming demoralised as opponents' opening batsmen often put on

twenty or thirty quickly. He showed improvement in the second half of the season and demonstrated how a good fast bowler can run through a side by his efforts at Bradford. Sidebottom often bowled splendidly, but on occasions seemed to be indifferent to his task; Cooke and Warnes were both under-bowled, particularly the latter, although all too often this was because our batsmen had not given our bowlers much time in which to perform.

The support that these bowlers received from the fielders was inadequate. Mark Knowles was outstanding in the deep and others performed well enough, but in every match we had easy catches dropped and fours let through when they could have been stopped by applying the most basic of rules. It took half a season before key fielding positions had been decided upon and filled by competent players, thus demonstrating just how difficult a job it is to be captain of a cricket team. Sidebottom filled this role until the half-term holiday while Warnes and Cooke each captained for a few matches in the second half of the season. When they captained there was a greater sense of urgency and Warnes in particular must have felt pleased by the relative success in the match against Manchester Grammar School. There were two unfortunate incidents during the season which reflected an immature approach to the game and which a strong captain should have prevented: against Lymm, when Cooke and Graham struggling to increase the tempo in order to set up a winning total, not one player on our side was watching and showing encouragement; similarly, in the final match all our dismissed batsmen were ignoring the play while our tail-enders were trying to find sufficient concentration to defy the Bradford bowlers on an almost unplayable wicket.

Our batting was better than anticipated for the first three matches: we were able to declare against Bolton, won easily against North Manchester and came very close to overtaking Arnold's score after we had bowled them out. Indeed, by the half-way stage all our first six batsmen had made decent scores on at least one occasion; the problem was that none of them were able to score consistently well and that only Gresty (64) and Sidebottom (52) managed to keep going for a long innings. It is interesting to note that of our batsmen only Graham could be described as strongly-built; perhaps as a consequence of this it seemed that our runs mainly came from nudges and deflections, with just the occasional drive to long-off (Warnes and Cooke being particularly adept at this shot) or pull to leg (eg Cooke). When our batsmen did hit the ball hard it went all too often directly to a waiting fieldsman. Our batsmen are certainly not without talent however, and all are capable of technically correct defensive and offensive shots. I am sure that as they become more experienced and larger these batsmen will overcome all these weaknesses.

I should like to express my thanks to all those parents who came to watch matches or help make the teas and, especially, to John Taylor for preparing such excellent pitches.

To defeat Parrswood (who had previously beaten us quite convincingly) to win the Manchester Schools' Trophy was a wonderful end to a disappointing season.

He gave thought to the variety of situations and, with experience, should be more able to dictate the course of play. Peter Day, Stephen Hadfield, Nicholas Ghazi and Jonathan Flatman were our best batsmen. All have faults, mostly to do with maintaining concentration for long enough to build an innings. All are more than capable of maturing into fine cricketers further up the School. Simon Johnson and Sujoy Jaiswal opened the bowling attack. Both are quite different in their tactics. Simon has the pace but, as yet, not the consistent accuracy to worry the better batsmen. This, again, will develop as he gets older. Sujoy is not as quick but is able to move the ball off the pitch. His figures of 9 wickets for just 12 runs against Birkenhead School was quite remarkable. Stephen Hadfield was our first change, spin bowler. Stephen turns the ball quite a lot, but must really concentrate on pitching the ball outside the off stump otherwise he gives the batsman a free hit. Against Q.E.G.S. Wakefield he returned 8 wickets for 32 runs, again superb figures at any level.

All the other players who represented the School did so with credit. My advice to them would be to work hard at one aspect of the game, batting, bowling or fielding and endeavour to make a positive contribution to the overall team performance.

Finally my thanks go to all the Parents for their support throughout the term, to the boys for their appearance and attitude, and to Mr. Mallinder for umpiring half the games.

The great success of this Under 12 season had its roots in the very early stages of the School year when each first form was invited to show its skills and potential at informal knockabouts with a tennis ball in the Sports Hall. The range of ability was total, beginners at beach cricket rubbing shoulders with those who already had battle scars from big brothers (or fathers?) and with some few who had a little experience of the real game. A squad of about half a dozen players then continued to practise in the indoor nets every week until the start of the season, latterly with the extra help of Roy Collins, and all made a great deal of progress in batting and bowling, some attending as many as twenty evening sessions over the winter. The week at the beginning of the Summer Term then brought daily sessions as the squad was made ready for match action. (Incidentally, in a spare few moments on the first day of term I jotted down a list of things still to be covered, apart that is from basics of batting and bowling, from fielding and throwing, through field placing and running between the wickets, to scoring and kit management: the list came to thirty one items, enough for a GCSE in the subject at least: it's a complicated game!).

With all this effort put in over the winter, the team certainly deserved to do well, and I was delighted for them when, on the first Saturday of the season, we had perfect weather conditions and superb pitches and outfields. As the big day approached, nerves had definitely been in evidence; I remember well the apparently casual but deeply felt question, "What sort of total are we expected to get, sir?". That nightmare of every team to have practised and tried your best and still get rolled over for next to nothing, was immediately dispelled as the opening pair, James Jobling and James Calderbank, put together a glorious century partnership, thus laying in the team's minds the foundation of how to play confident cricket: win the toss, bat first, score a lot, declare, have tea, bowl'em out!

Opening partnerships between these two were a regular feature, almost always giving us our first thirty runs, with well-run byes a major contributor. Jobling, though at times an awkward looking player, actually has a very good eye and improved greatly in his orthodox defence over the season: by the Bradford game he was looking quite sound and he faced

hostile bowling with great determination at Stockport. Calderbank was the team's wicket-keeper throughout the season and always outdid his opposite number; by the end of the season he had started to accept his stumping chances coolly, and one catch, low, diving, two-handed, in front of second slip was worthy of the "100 wickets" video! His batting was remarkably consistent and watchful, and he was the side's top scorer, both in an individual innings and in aggregate total.

The Captain, Nick Bell, and his vice-captain, Miles Newton, usually batted at three and four, and we saw some fine innings and also fine partnerships from them. Bell's determination came out in his fifty at Stockport, where many lesser batsmen would have been frightened out, and he played several useful smaller innings and also played himself bravely out of a grim sequence of low scores. Newton also had to do this, and we never actually saw him in full flow for long; he was most often undone by his own nervousness in the first few overs or by the typical left-hander's eagerness to whip the leg-stump ball to square leg, but short and delightful innings left us in no doubt that his first big score will be a treat: he proved his determination to succeed by opening against Crosby after several fruitless innings. Both captain and vice-captain made major contributions to the bowling: Bell's medium pace was always reliable, and especially fine against Manchester Boys and Stockport, and Newton's off-breaks with the occasional leg-break soon transformed themselves into leg-breaks with variations, bowled with excellent control. The attitude of these two players to captainacy was splendid and they worked very well together on the field.

After this sound start the middle order provided an embarrassment of batting riches, and almost always someone was left without a chance to shine. So, for instance, the last two excellent wins were achieved without the batting contribution of Asif Majid, who was in fact the side's leading all-rounder. He hits the ball very cleanly, especially when driving, and surely has some great innings to come. Not only did he top the batting averages, he was also the leading catcher and the main strike bowler; his performances at Stockport and at Wakefield were match winners, the latter an amazing spell of naked aggression for such an unassuming personality. Stephen Kellett also had a superb all-rounder's season and it is his batting which is developing fastest. His elbow and bat are becoming straighter with every game and he confirmed his progress with a beautiful innings at Bradford, but before this he had already had the main say in winning the Macclesfield match. His useful seam bowling and superb fielding make him another tremendous

Other players appear from the statistics to have made a small contribution to the side. but they have all done much more than that because of their sound fielding and accurate throwing, and they all have special and worthwhile skills of their own. Charles Ellis will make many runs in the seasons to come, and Zaki Elmasri, without scoring many runs, has already made significant contributions to victories by simply staying in. Nobody in recent years has chased with the pace and vigour of Jorden Partington and his bowling will also develop an imporant supporting role. Guy Brocklehurst can also bat now he has overcome his doubts about facing fast bowling, and he has waited loyally for the chance to lob out his lethal leg-spin; in fact his six wickets in the season cost only 7 runs each. Andrew Matson amazed us from the earliest practices by even getting the ball to the other end from his diminitive height, but his leftarm slows are a regular feature of the bowling and show great promise; he also fields as bravely as any. At the end of the season we were joined by Mark Olden who has had little chance to learn the complicated parts yet, but will be remembered especially for his two wonderful catches at Bradford. Greg Humphries' season was sadly curtailed through injury; he has promise as an accurate medium pacer.

I have admired this team, individually and collectively. They have listened, learned and worked at their game and they have excelled all opposition in cricketing maturity, especially

in the way they support each other when batting. Much is expected of them in the coming seasons and I hope that the unit so carefully built up will not be broken unduly early. I have been grateful to them for dozens of bright spots in a busy term, as I have also to my colleagues for their support, especially Mr. Blight and Mr. Timm, to the many supporting and supportive parents, and to our remarkable ground staff for providing consistently the best junior playing surface of any we play on. School Cricket is in very good heart with our present first year side.



The final session at the end of term produced an exciting handicap singles tournament, won by Jonathan Flatman of 2D. There were also trophies for the most promising young players, awarded by an ex-parent Mr. Aubrey Lee, who saw three of his sons educated at William Hulme's; the youngest, B.G. Lee was

Captain of Tennis in 1989. The trophies, named The Lee Brothers Cups, will be awarded annually to the girl and boy who, in the opinions of the Staff who coach them, have shown the most significant improvement in their playing standard and who have a sufficiently dedicated attitude to the game. We would like to thank Mr. Lee for the sentiment behind his awards. The winners this year were Geraldine Brook (lA) and David Gilbert (2A).

Another parent's cup was won this year by P.J. Davies and his father who took the Burden Trophy from the holders M & M Shelmerdine. This year's Parents-Pupils Competition was the biggest ever and a large crowd of competitors watched the final being played under the floodlights until nearly 10.30 p.m. The match was decided when the lights went out automatically, leaving the Davies a mere one game ahead. The Head Master presented the Trophy to the winners in the Sixth Form Common Room, where the traditional buffet was enjoyed by all. My thanks as always to all the parents and pupils, who helped to make this event such a resounding success. The results of the competition can be seen on the next page.

The Direct Line Manchester Tennis Open Tournament was held again this year at the Northern Lawn Tennis Club in Didsbury. In the past, William Hulme's had supplied ball-boys to the likes of John McEnroe and Stefan Edberg. This year's winner, Goran Ivanisevic of Yugoslavia was served in a different capacity by eight of our fifth formers, who were employed as stewards by the club. During the week, they coped with thunderous downpours and broke the existing club records for clearing and covering-up the courts several times, and some even appeared on the BBC s regional news programme.

Finally, the first Tennis Tour to the Continent took place in May. Sixteen boys and girls from the first four years went with Miss Barlow and I to Seefeld in Austria, where they enjoyed four days of coaching and competition, in excellent weather and beautiful surroundings. The trip was organised by Aspects of Leisure Limited and involved 18 schools from Great Britain in what was called a Festival of Tennis. The facilities were excellent and everyone enjoyed the experience, but you can read all about the trip in more detail on page 27. It is hoped that a similar trip can be held next year so if you want to improve your tennis, this is an excellent way to do it. Until next year, keep practising.

## **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**

Last year I reported that the Association had enjoyed a record year in terms of fund raising, but emphasised the need to improve on this to fund a growing number of projects. I am pleased to report that the 1990/1991 year achieved even higher income. In the last two years, the Committee has more than doubled net income, from just over £4,000 in 1988/1989 to just under £9,000 in 1900/1991 and this must be considered a creditable achievement.

The Christmas Fair and Grand Draw were once again the main fund raising events, and both improved their income yet again this year. It was, however, disappointing to see a fall in the income earned from the 300 Club, which has been

a steady earner for a number of years. The Committee intends to relaunch the Club in the current year.

Other events organised included the Head Master's Talk, Cheese and Wine, Dinner Dance (jointly with the Old Hulmeians), Quiz Night and Race Night. Support for these events was mixed, but on the whole a little disappointing. For the first time in three years, however, a summer event was successfully promoted. The Barbeque and Disco was well attended and appeared to be enjoyed by all - despite the weather!

Whilst the Association's finances are relatively healthy, as we look forward the requests for funding are beginning to build. We have recently funded some lacrosse kit, and have just bought equipment to establish a full video studio for the School. We have requests for both library and stage equipment to consider, and in the longer term a mini-bus might become a major project, so we cannot become complacent. We have outlined an ambitious programme for the new year, in which

we hope to break the £10,000 barrier.

The Committee elected Elizabeth Bull as its President for the coming year. Elizabeth has served on the Committee for seven years, being involved in most events, and organising some functions in her role as Tickets and Social Secretary. Her election to President is a fitting tribute to her work for the Association. Sue Wilson resigned as Secretary after six years but remains on the Committee and will lead the re-launch of the 300 Club. Sue is replaced as Secretary by Shirley Cope who, together with Janet Priestner, joined the Committee at the May A.G.M.

New blood on the Committee is always welcome, and I am sure both Shirley and Janet will help to produce another record in the coming year. I cannot, however, end this report without thanking the Committee for its work and support over the last twelve months. In addition, thanks are also due to the many parents and pupils who helped at the various events throughout the year. Special thanks also need to be extended to members of Staff particularly Mr. Simkin, Mr. Wood, Mr.

G.H. Jones and Mr. Gregson.

Next year's targets will not be easy, and cannot be achieved without the support of parents, pupils and staff. I therefore look forward to an increased level of support so that the Association can continue to provide essential funds for a variety of important projects.






