## Editorial.

The past term has been marked by one of those breaks in tradition to which our School Football is liable from time to time, and which can be foretold, though they cannot be avoided. We have been fortunate year after year of late in beginning with a good nucleus from the team of the preceding season, from which it was easy with a few recruits to evolve a strong and skilful First Eleven. This season only three members remained of the old team, and the vacant positions have of necessity been filled with young and light players. It is

pleasant to report, as we can, that all have done their best, and that the success of the team has been far beyond what was anticipated at the first. Though we have never had the advantage in weight over our opponents, we have, at the time of going to press, the record of 6 wins to 6 defeats, with one drawn game.

In Lacrosse also the First Team has been very light, but there is an unmistakable revival of interest in the game, which will bear fruit, we are confident, before long.

Turning to the Old Boys' Clubs, we recommend to anyone who wants cheering up, the accounts of their Football and Lacrosse season, which appear in the present number. Never before have the Old Hulmeians had such a splendid series of successes in both such a splendid series of successes in both games as they can point to this season. Their First Football Team has played 10 matches, of which 9 have been won and only one lost, with a total of 37 goals for them and 9 against. The First Lacrosse has played 9, of which 6 have been won, 2 drawn, and one lost. The Second Lacrosse Team has played 10, all of which have been won, and scored 134 goals as against 23.

## Speech Day.

Prize Day was July 31st, and the Central Hall was, as usual, full to overflowing with parents and friends. The Head Master presided, and was supported by Mr. H. F. Hibbert, chairman of the Technical Instruction Committee of the Lancashire County Council, and Mr. Thomas Price, LL.B., chairman of the Technical Instruction Committee of the Withington District Council. The HEAD MASTER made his annual statement, as follows:—

"During the past year the monotonous sameness of our School life has been agreeably broken by events which make it memorable in the history of the School. At last we have entered into possession of the long-desired extension of the School field. By this addition of more than four acres, the space available for games has been increased to eleven acres, and the needs of the School in this direction satisfied for the present. Henceforth, so long as there is no considerable addition to our numbers, there will be ample room for the proper organisation and arrangement of our School

games. But it would be a mistake to regard the present provision as sufficient for the expansion of numbers which may be expected in the future with the growth of this district. Our new acquisition brings with it considerable financial anxiety. In the first place, a sum of at least £600, in addition to what is already available, will be needed for the levelling and preparation of the ground. And then there will be an appreciable increase in the already heavy annual charge for maintenance. Towards this the interest from the handsome bequest of £2,000 left to the School by the late William Roberts has been allocated, but the capital sum requires to be at least doubled to meet the inevitable expense of keeping the ground in good order.

"We have further reason for congratulation in a notable increase of the endowment of the School made by the Governors out of the funds of the charity. This sorely-needed addition to our resources will serve to strengthen the staff and execute repairs and renewals, the necessity for which increases as the fabric and fittings of the School grow older. It will bring us nearer to the ideal in these matters, but will by no means do all that is desirable. On previous occasions I have spoken of the defects in the equipment of the School, and it may be well, even at the risk of being wearisome, to repeat myself. I fear that, for the present at least, we shall sigh in vain for a suitable assembly hall, a new and much larger workshop, a swimming bath, and a gymnasium. But the provision of a sufficient library of reference books bearing on the studies of the higher forms would be a most valuable addition, and need not be very costly. And, furthermore, the excellent competition for the History Prize (presented this year by Mr. T. H. Davies-Colley) only shows how much we lose by the absence of a similar stimulus in other subjects lying somewhat outside the ordinary curriculum, such as the study of the Earlier English Literature and of Modern Literature generally. The School does not possess a single foundation of this kind. The erroneous idea that it is well off has, I feel sure, prevented the flow of benefactions in our

"We have further ground for satisfaction in the direct subsidy given to the school during the past year by the Lancashire County Council. Their grant of £120 has been entirely expended on apparatus for the lecture theatre, laboratories, workshop, and drawing school, and has increased the efficiency of these

departments in a marked degree. But here, as else where, there is plenty of room for further improvement."

The Head Master then read letters giving in brief the opinion on the work of the School of the Examiners appointed by the Governors, Professor W. W. Haldane Gee in mathematics and science, Mr. E. R. Taylor in art and writing, and Mr. A. G. Lathamin classics, modern languages, and English subjects. He then proceeded as follows: "Mr. Latham's remarks on our system of teaching Modern Languages deserve a Dissatisfied with the slow progress passing notice. made in French and German by the old methods of translation and retranslation, we have adopted a system which begins with direct and exclusive use of the foreign tongue orally in the lowest forms and advances in the higher stages to the discipline of formal grammar and translation into English. In another year this system will prevail throughout the School, and it is to be hoped that the Examiner's opinion will then be as favourable as it is now. I should like also to draw the attention of visitors to the exhibitions of work shown in the Drawing School and Workshop. He then referred to the distinctions gained by pupils of the School during the past year, which were fully up to the average of former years.

"In the Lancashire County award of scholarships and exhibitions, the first places in the Science and Commercial Exhibitions, and the first and second places in the Junior Commercial Exhibitions, have all fallen to the School this year. Altogether during the last seven years we have obtained 14 scholarships and 118 exhibitions, of a total value of £4,000, in the County Competition. In the Victoria University E. B. Le Mare, B.Sc. has been elected to a Fellowship in Science, H. P. Pearson and W. J. Young have taken the degrees of M.Sc., C. H. Saxelby the degree of B.Sc. in the Honours School of Mathematics, G. W. A. Foster in that of Chemistry, and C. S. Chalmers the ordinary degree of B.Sc. C. G. Dehn has passed the Final Examination for the degree of LL.B. in the First Division, and F. R. Sawdon has taken the degrees of M.B. and Ch.B. E.T. Wihl has passed the Preliminary Examination of the University in the First Class, and J. G. Bearn and J.S. Webster in the Second Class. At the Owens College E. B. Le Mare has been awarded a Gartside Commercial Scholarship, of the value of £80 for the first year and of £150 to £250 for the second. C. G. Dehn has

been elected to a Dauntesey Legal Scholarship. Among miscellaneous successes P. M. Bennett has obtained a Whitworth Exhibition, and F. Barrett has passed the Intermediate Examination of the Incorporated Law Society in the First Class. Mr. Eric Macfadyen, who received his early training here, has been elected President of the Oxford Union Debating Society. Three years ago Mr. J. R. P. Sclater, another Old Hulmeian, was President of the Cambridge Union. It is not a little remarkable that the double honour should have fallen to a school within the first sixteen years of its existence.

"Time fails me to speak at any adequate length about another and no less valuable side of our School life, namely, the School games. Their organisation, mainly owing to the untiring efforts of my colleagues, has witnessed a notable advance during the year. We have had at times nearly two hundred boys playing in the School field. All our teams were much above the average, and our First Cricket Team has not lost a single school match this season. The Junior Teams show very great promise, and the games have so generally come to be regarded as a regular part of the School life that very few boys now stand aloof.

"In conclusion, I beg publicly to thank my colleagues for their ready support at all times, and the great sacrifice which they have made of their leisure, especially in connection with the games. I rejoice to be able to say that the conduct of the boys generally has reached a high standard."

Mr. H. F. HIBBERT, chairman of the Technical Instruction Committee of the Lancashire County Council, distributed the prizes. He congratulated the people of the neighbourhood on the possession of so excellent a school, and proceeded to refer to the condition of secondary education in the country. It was, he said, particularly difficult just now to say anything about education, as one section of the community was, metaphorically speaking, flying at the throat of the other. The system of secondary education throughout the land was certainly not abreast with the times. It dated, to a large extent, with the stage coach, and not with the locomotive and electric traction. There was too much Latin and Greek, and too little modern languages. It had been said there was no better training for the youthful mind than Latin and Greek, but he thought that, if a student was going to be a commercial man, those languages would not assist him very much. It seemed to him that a student ought to be given the kind of education

which would assist him to earn his living. He drew a contrast in this respect between the course pursued in our own country and in Germany. According to a report recently issued by the German Government, the study of modern languages was taken up enthusiastically by the teachers, not because the knowledge of French and English were necessary in business, but because they might be made instruments of a much-needed type of education. Colonel Hozier, of Lloyd's, has said that his firm was driven to employ foreigners because English boys did not give enough time to the study of foreign languages. A facetious German, writing home from England, said "You will be surprised to hear there are still some Englishmen employed in this office." (Laughter). Those instances well exemplified his contention. With regard to the difference between the teaching of the Chinese language in England and Germany, Mr. Hibbert said that half the exports from this country to China went through Manchester, yet until the County Council found money for the teaching of Chinese at the Owens College there was no provision for it at all. He believed that with one single exception there was only one chair of Chinese in the whole of the United Kingdom, and it was certainly not attended by more than twenty students. Yet in Germany, which did not do one tithe of the trade with China Lancashire did, they found that between 1887 and 1892 no less than 202 students at Berlin had been instructed in Chinese. In addition to that, there were facilities for learning other Asiatic languages, of which, in the same period, 833 students had taken advantage. The only conclusion was that England was a long way behind in this branch of education. At that school English, modern languages, mathematics, and physical science were taught, and he commended this curriculum to a great many of the secondary schools in the country.

In conclusion, Mr. Hibbert spoke of the aid given by the Lancashire Council to education in the way of grants. The School, he said, had that year received a sum of £120. Had the School been paid according to the amount of good work it was doing it would certainly have received three times that amount. He hoped that by the end of the year the County Council would be able to take over the School's financial responsibilities.

Mr. Thomas Price, in proposing a vote of thanks to Mr. Alderman Hibbert, said that technical instruction classes had been established in the Whalley struction classes had urged that every advantage should be taken of them.

## The Athletic Sports.

VERY favourable conditions attended this, the most popular event of our School year, which took place on Thursday, July 31st. The weather was all that could be wished, and many were the congratulations on the contrast with the day appointed for our 1901 sports. There was a large gathering of parents and friends, and the number of competitors showed the keenness with which athletics are pursued throughout the school.

The introduction of a uniform subscription of one shilling was a decided success, the number of entries (250) and the receipts both surpassing all previous records. A most satisfactory feature was the fact that every boy in the six top forms had subscribed and handed in an entry form. The subscriptions reached a total of £12.17s., including two of half-a-crown and one of five shillings. Valuable assistance was rendered by the Form Representatives in collecting the entry forms and moneys. Again we have to acknowledge the kindness of friends of the School in making liberal donations

and presenting valuable prizes, which were this year more numerous than ever. This is a very gratifying feature, showing, as it does, the kindly interest taken in the School and its sports. The programme of events was rather longer than before, three new events having been added to it: football dribbling competitions (senior and junior) and a quarter-mile race for boys under 14. The latter race, of course, is included in the marks for the China Cup, to correspond with the half-mile in the Gaskell Cup Competition. The dribbling races were rather an experiment, and afforded more amusement in the preliminary heats on the previous day than on the sports day itself, when the races seemed to be over before anyone realised that they had begun.

The preliminary events had been held on Wednesday, July 30th, and of these the most noticeable were the cricket and lacrosse ball throws (open), both of which were won by H. S. Wihl, with magnificent throws of 95 yards I foot and 124 yards 2 feet respectively, both of them records which will not easily be beaten. The day was very favourable for the throws, and another record was established by R. Buckland in the junior lacrosse ball throw; his distance, over 79 yards, being remarkably good for his age. The Old Boys' Race was won by H. C. Swindells, after a splendid spurt. The Gaskell Challenge Cup was won by H. S. Wihl, winner of the 100 yards open, throwing the cricket and lacrosse ball, and the broad jump. The China Cup was won by R. Sykes, after a keen competition. The winner was first in the quarter-mile and high jump junior, and second in the junior cricket ball throwing and junior broad jump. The programme was carried through with the traditional despatch, and in spite of the late start (due to circumstances not under our control) the concluding ceremony was not delayed. The distribution of prizes was made by Mrs. J. Armitage Bennett, whose kindness was fittingly acknowledged by a bouquet of flowers from the stewards, and a hearty meed of applause.

The programme was of the kind peculiar to these Meetings, and was enjoyed by everyone present, the evening terminating in the usual way by the singing of "Auld Lang Syne."

## Old Hulmeians' Football, 1902=3.

Played 10, won 9, lost 1, 37 goals against 9. Such is the record that the First Team have to be rather proud of up to the moment of making this brief report. It is rather curious that, with one exception, the team consists of exactly the same members who have played regularly for at least two seasons, some of them for many more, and yet the improvement has been so great that interested followers of the team's doings set themselves to determine how the improvement has come about. To beat by 8 goals to nothing the identical team of Buxton College which last year they could only just manage to hold their own against is a striking proof of the improvement in question. The above-mentioned exception is McNicol. We should not care to say that the improvement is due to his advent alone, but it certainly has a great deal to do with it. One of the

difficulties last season was to get the forwards at disposal into positions where they would work well together, and especially to find a suitable player for inside left to work with Swindells (one of the best forwards the Old Boys have ever had), and to feed him well on the left wing. R. Bradshaw was repeatedly tried, Corbett was often brought across from his right wing, and the other forwards changed about continually, but never once did they get going as they have done this season. McNicol, fresh from the School, has been found almost ideal for the place, and if the whole forward line keep together and work together as they are doing at present, the Old Hulmeians will have a fine record to show at the end of the season. The shooting as well as the combination is considerably better; evidently McNicol has set a good example in this branch. Considering individuals, the two most striking improvements are Blaikie at inside right and R. Bradshaw at centre half. Blaikie is really brilliant at times, taking the ball right down the field and finishing up with a good shot; but there is a decided tendency in his play to keep the ball just a little too long, and when a pass at an earlier moment would put Wilkins at centre (who is generally to be found in the right place at the right moment) in a good position for scoring, Blaikie finds himself too far down the field to make his own shot very effective. He can and does, however, feed Corbett at right outside very well, and this player is still very good at getting quickly down the field. Bradshaw at centre half has done wonders with his steady and dogged play. This position has been rather a weak spot in the team for some time, but he fills it with really splendid results, although previous to this season he has been considered a forward. The other two halves, Barrett and Norquoy, have made their positions pretty safe on the team, while the two full backs, Saxelby and Brown (who has turned out a better back than a forward), with Thompson behind in goal, are all very steady and reliable.

The match which was lost was against a strong team of Owens College on the College ground. This is generally considered the hardest fixture of the season, and as they have generally managed to win by 8 or 9 clear goals in the past few seasons, the result of 3—0 against the Old Boys this season may be taken as another example of the improvement. After the first ten minutes in this match, in which Owens scored two goals, the play was very even indeed, the College

being lucky in rolling the ball into the net from a scrimmage in front of goal once during the second half. Before this appears in print the return match on the Old Boys' ground will have been played, which we think will not be an easy win for Owens College. The results of the other matches fairly indicate the state of the play.

Unfortunately again this season the second team are still struggling against the old evil of having to play a man or two short. Out of seven matches, they have only won two and lost the remainder; but it may be encouraging to say that the two games won are the only occasions on which the team has played with a full complement throughout. However, there are plenty of members now, most of whom are very keen, and a different and better report will no doubt be given of them by the end of the season.

Our Football Season opened this year under circumstances which have not prevailed for a considerable period. The history of the last four or five years is largely the history of a single team which, from promising beginnings, has handed on a nucleus of exceptionally good material from year to year, a team which imparted to its recruits a style of play productive of the very best exhibition of school football, a confidence in itself which could only lead to the successful results which it has been our pleasure to record in successive numbers of The Hulmeian, and traditions which we trust will never disappear from our School Elevens. H. C. Swindells, E. Derbyshire, and L. A. Bradbury have handled a succession of powerful combinations which have responded to almost every call made upon them, and which have borne visible fruit we consider in the splendid series of successes achieved this season by our Old Boys' Eleven.

This year the conditions were changed. Three only of last year's Eleven were left to carry on the work of their predecessors. The result is that a young, light, and not very experienced eleven has been formed, an eleven which has had to spend a considerable portion of the term in "experiments," and which, while containing elements of conspicuous individual brilliancy, has on the whole failed to exhibit that skilful and harmonious combination which has been such a feature

of their predecessors. Not that we have anything to be ashamed of, even thus, in the records of the team. The team has been engaged in a series of uphill struggles, out of which they have come, if not with flying colours, yet with no small credit to themselves. A dozen matches have been played so far, and on no occasion can we be said to have had the advantage in weight over our opponents. In other words, all our victories have been won by distinctly superior play and skill. The highest total of goals scored against us was made by the Old Hulmeians—that is, by a team every member of which was older than the oldest member of the School Eleven.

\* \* \*

The work of the term has been full of varied and often exciting interest. No match gave us more pleasure than the renewal of friendly rivalry with the Oldham Hulmeians, while the return encounter in November with our doughty opponents of Bowdon, when we reversed the verdict of October, was productive of one of the sternest and most exciting struggles we remember. Narrow victories were also secured at the expense of Bury and Warrington Grammar Schools, but the matches with Salford Technical School and Macclesfield Grammar School brought us a brace of defeats. Out of twelve matches played six have been won, one drawn, and five lost, the goal average being slightly in our favour—35 goals for the School to 28 by our opponents.

\* \* \*

The main characteristics of the team have already been touched upon. Every member has done his best, there has been no slackness visible, and on many occasions individual brilliancy has been shown, sometimes where it was least anticipated. Two features, however, stand out conspicuously, the superb efforts of Swindells on several occasions to secure victory for his side, and the untiring perseverance of Thomas for the defence. It is no reflection on the rest of the team to mark these points for special commendation. The halves have also put in an immense amount of work, Barrett, in particular, improving vastly during the term. Of the recruits in the forward line Buck has amply justified his inclusion by many praiseworthy efforts, while a McNicol, praclari nominis alter, still worthily maintains the "family place" of centre forward. We reserve for our next issue further detailed accounts of the play, and the "characters" of the players.
