# Mr. W. A. Brierley.

At the end of this term we have to say good-bye to Mr. W. A. Brierley, who has been in charge of the Art teaching in the School since September, 1919. He came to us after a distinguished career at the Edinburgh School of Art and five years of military service in the last war. Developing the excellent tradition established by Mr. E. K. Brice, Mr. Brierley

has raised the Art work of the School to a very high

But Mr. Brierley's work has never been limited to the Art room. During his army career he had a good deal of experience of Concert Party work with professional artists, and as soon as he came here he professional artists, and as soon as he came here he founded "The Hulmerists," whose performances will be remembered by Old Boys of that period. When the present Head Master came in 1920 dramatic work was undertaken on a larger scale, and Mr. Brierley not only found greater scope for his talents as an actor, but was in constant demand for producing, making up, and designing scenery and costumes. Among so many scenes and performances it is difficult to pick out some for particular mention, but many people will remember Mr. Brierley as "Sir Joseph Porter" in "H.M.S. Pinafore," and the beautiful ship scene in that opera. Others will remember the amazing "transformation scenes" in "The Brass Bottle" and "Ambrose Applejohn's while Mr. Brierley's performance as

Ambrose—"Aces! All Aces!" was outstanding.

The Old Hulmeians Dramatic Society also owes Mr. Brierley a great debt of gratitude. Not only did he produce plays and design scenery for them, but he patiently guided them into doing this work for them-

In spite of the hours that this work demanded, Mr. Brierley has found time to make a considerable reputation as a painter, and has exhibited at Manchester and at the Scottish Academy in Edinburgh, where his distinctive style in landscape has attracted much attention.

Mr. Brierley is going to the Lawrence Sheriff School, Rugby, and we wish him every happiness and success there. We understand that the school has no stage, and feel that Mr. Brierley will soon remedy

that omission.

# Speech Day.

The Annual Speech Day ceremony was held in the School Hall on Monday, July 17th, at 5 p.m. Canon Woolnough, Chairman of the Governors, presided, and the prizes were presented by Lord Merriman, President of the Probate, Admiralty and Divorce

Division of the High Court of Justice.

The Head Master, Mr. Trevor Dennis, gave his report on the School's work during the preceding year. He stated that as a result of the examinations held in July, 1943, fifty-one School Certificates had been gained, and twenty-three Higher School Certificates. Some 400 boys had attended games on The Junior Training Corps had a half-holidays. record membership, and a very favourable report had been received from the War Office after the annual inspection. During the year twenty-five boys had

gained their Certificate "A." The two annual harvest camps had been held at Grange and in Worcestershire in 1943, and were to be held again in 1944.

The Head Master mentioned the unprecedented number of new boys who were to be admitted after the midsummer holiday. Pressure on the lower forms and on the Preparatory School was very great, and a large number of applications had been received.

Over 500 Old Boys had been recorded as serving with H.M. Forces, and thirty-seven were known to

have given their lives.

Lord Merriman, in his address, spoke of the value of justice. No nation, he said, could exist without a system of justice, carefully administered, and the mark of a good citizen was not in his brain power but in his sense of fairness.

The prize distribution followed, and the proceedings ended with a rendering of Handel's "Faithful Shepherd" suite by the School orchestra.

# Flookburgh Harvest Camp.

At the invitation of the Lancashire War Agricultural Committee the School provided a Harvest Camp in the Cark, Cartmel and Holker districts of North Lancashire. The camp opened on July 26th and closed down on September 6th, and we were again fortunate in being able to have the use of the Keighley Education Committee's excellent Camp School on Humphrey Head.

As this was our fifth harvest camp in this district very little canvassing for labour was necessary, and as the weather was the best we had had since 1940, it was not surprising that we worked a record number of hours. Our total of 7,400 hours was 500 more

than our previous best.

Every kind of farm work was splendidly done by an excellent crowd of boys and, whether asked to "scrat" potatoes for three hours after a full day on forestry or drag a ton of coal up a cliff side to our camp school, all the work was cheerfully done.

The first corn was cut on August 4th, and from that date until the day before we left everybody was hard at work, and we had the satisfaction of coming away with the feeling that our efforts had been worth while. Every farmer we worked for thanked the boys for their labour, and all stated that their help had materially assisted the district in saving an excellent corn harvest.

We also provided the Holker estate with the usual squad of boys, and we hope that those foresters will have the satisfaction in later years of seeing some excellent spruce, ash, oak, larch and beech trees in the plantations where they worked. Lord Richard Cavendish, who took a great interest in the work and welfare of the boys, expressed his very best thanks to the Camp Commandant for the help the boys gave to a very depleted estate staff.

A lot of the work was heavy but was cheerfully tackled; driving tractors and working corn binders, dipping sheep, hedging and ditching were just a

change from forking corn on to a "moo."

Again we have to thank an excellent Camp Staff most of whom stayed for the full period. Our quartermaster, Mr. Gatley, worked untiringly and seemed to thrive on very little sleep, as his was the first voice one heard very early in the morning, and

the last at night. The work done in the kitchen by Mrs. Barber, Miss Gill, Miss Bevan and her friend Mrs. Hope, Mr. Ginever, Mr. Williams and Mr. Wardle was excellent, and the health of the camp was a tribute to the culinary arts of the kitchen staff.

A special word of thanks is also due to the orderlies who, owing to the demand for outside labour, were mostly 50 per cent. below strength. They were R. W. Douglas (3 weeks), P. Quarmby (3 weeks), K. Rowe (3 weeks), J. W. Handford (3 weeks), and K. Robertson (3 weeks).

In conclusion, we have again to thank the Keighley Education Committee and its Director of Education for the privilege of using their Camp School and equipment.

Every boy has received, in addition to free board and lodging, rail and cycle fares, 12/- a week for his

efforts.

# Worcester Harvest Camp.

For the fifth year in succession the Worcester Agricultural Committee asked us to provide a contingent of harvest workers, and, in response, some ninety boys attended the camp at Eastham, many of them for the full period, from August 1st to September 7th.

For the first part of the camp the weather was ideal, but, towards the end, we were not quite so fortunate, as rain interfered with things, making it difficult for us to achieve our aim of beating last year's record of hours worked. All were keen to accomplish this, and, by making the most of our opportunities, we succeeded in reaching the figure of 11,437 hours, almost a hundred over last year's total. While it is satisfactory to have made such a record, the actual number of hours is not everything. The quality of the labour is even more important, and it was pleasing to hear from all the farmers the spontaneous expressions of their great satisfaction with the work of the boys. Their whole attitude is, perhaps, best summed up in the letter of one farmer who wrote, "I specially wish to convey my thanks to the boys who helped us with our harvest. Believe me, it would have been badly damaged by the rain if we had not had the great help of your boys. Good show! Hope to see you next year." Another farmer, Mr. Froggatt, of Hill Wood, who employed many of our boys, sought to express his appreciation in yet another way, and, on the last night of our

stay, he and his family did the whole camp proud by killing (in this case) the fatted lamb and providing a feast for the whole camp. It must be a great satisfaction to those who attended the camp to If further know their work is so much valued. proof of the value of our work were needed it can be found in the much greater demand on our resources. Altogether we provided labour for twentyone different larms, a number which could have been increased if we could have supplied the boys. During the camp we had a visit from Mr. D.

Scott, M.P., representing the Ministry of Agriculture, the Chairman of the Agricultural Committee, and two other officials. Mr. Scott, who had heard of our work, asked that the thanks of the Ministry of Agriculture should be conveyed to the boys for

their great record.

The work was, as in the past, varied, but, whatever the job, it was tackled with cheerfulness and determination. A word of commendation is due to the leaders of working parties, experienced campers, who set a good example to those under their charge, and the good work of the orderlies, R. P. Handford, D. Watkins, L. T. P. Wood and G. J. Derbyshire should be noted.

We were all very sorry that Mr, and Mrs, Dennis, who have been with us at all our camps, could not attend this year. The camp organizer, Mr. Anderson, would like to express his sincere thanks to all those who helped so willingly and cheerfully with the work of running the camp: Miss Green, Miss Denton, Mrs. Ruddlesden, Miss Slater, Miss Harris, Mr. Jeeny and Mr. Lowther,
