

# Editorial.

T would be a mistake to regard the I present number, with its columns of cricket reports and scores, as evidence of our exuberant activity in the cricket field. It is of course only a chosen few who have the honour of representing the School in cricket matches, and, it may be added, it is only a few who do them the honour of looking at their performances. This number of the HULMEIAN therefore contains much that will come as news to many of our readers—a state of things which in our editorial capacity we should be the last to lament. Nor should we on other grounds regret the small attendance of sight-seers at our matches, if we saw them better employed in playing cricket themselves. This, however, is what we have not seen. Strange as it may appear, the remarkable spell of dry weather-of cricket weather,

as it is called—which has made the present summer memorable, seems to have been thrown away on most boys in the Hulme Grammar School. Never before this summer have we seen the field so empty after school and on half-holidays; never have the signs of life in the lower games been so few. It seems indeed that the weather has been rather too good, and that our northern constitutions take less kindly to the dog-days than to the rains and fogs of the football season.

The First Eleven have, up to the present, won six matches and lost five. Of the four matches which have been drawn, two were left with the chances decidedly in our favour. If this result, at first sight, compares unfavourably with last year's, it should be remembered that they have had to meet a considerably stronger array of opponents, while some of their former adversaries have this year tried conclusions with our Second Eleven. The latter have the creditable record of seven wins and four losses, two games having been drawn.

# School Notes and News.

THE Midsummer Examination has been conducted by the following gentlemen, appointed by the Governors: Mr. J. G. Tuckey., M.A., in Languages and English; Mr. A. D. Hall, M.A., formerly Science master in the School, in Science and Mathematics; and Mr. H. Foster Newey, of the Municipal School of Art, Birmingham, in Drawing and Writing.

In the Preliminary Examination of the Victoria University, held in June last, S. W. Saxelby and W. B Smith have been placed in the first class, and J. R. P. Sclater in the second class.

First Eleven cricket caps have been awarded to G. L. Whitworth, H. van der Veen, V. S. Booth and L. C. Clarke. Second Eleven caps have been awarded to A. Payne, C. H. Bennett, H. Maguire, R. G. Clarke and H. H. Price.

A pair of batting pads has been presented to J. R. P. Sclater for his score of 73 not out against Eccles Grammar School, and a similar award has been made to W. N. Caw for his score of 51 against Woodlands Second.

H. van der Veen has received two cricket balls in recognition of the "hat-trick" performed by him twice this season, against Eccles Grammar School and against Macclesfield. C. H. Bennett and S. Atcheson have also been presented with cricket balls for the "hat-tricks" done in both cases against Albert Park School.

The final of the Form Matches was played on July 20th, and resulted in a win for Science V. (39 for 4 wickets) over Latin V. and IV. (38).

We are glad to see that A. G. Baker has been playing regularly for Manchester this season, and has justified his selection by making some useful scores for the premier club.

Under the title "Lancashire Amateur League" we hear that a league has been formed for strictly amateur association clubs in the district, which has been joined by the Old Hulmeians A. F. C.

The Royal Humane Society has again offered the School a badge for competition in swimming and in practices for saving persons from drowning. Our readers may refer to the December number for an account of last year's competition, and doubtless many will avail themselves of the opportunities for practising which the summer holidays afford. We hope for a much larger entry of competitors next time.

The entry for the Athletic Sports is larger this year than ever before, and has now reached the high total of 150. Mr. Hewlett has resigned the post of Secretary and Treasurer, and has been succeeded by Mr. Kelsey. The prizes will be distributed by Mrs. Wilkins.

We congratulate Mr. Brice upon having a picture well hung on the walls of the Royal Academy.

The prizes on Speech Day will be presented by Mr. Charles J. Heywood, one of the Governors of the School.

Next term will begin on Tuesday, September 12th, at 9 o'clock. The Entrance Examination will be held the day before at 9 o'clock.

# CRICKET NOTES.

Our list of first team fixtures included for the first time one match against the Second Eleven of Rossall School, two against the Manchester Grammar School, and one against Macclesfield Grammar School. These new features have rendered the task of carrying out a perfectly successful programme much heavier than before, and in fact three of our defeats are to be attributed to them. We have also lost against the Old Hulmeians and against Parkhurst School, but in the latter match we were without some of our best men. The weather seems particularly averse to our fixtures with St. Bede's; of the four matches which have been arranged with them during the last two seasons, not one has been played out.

The Club is indebted to the Head Master for the present of a pair of long wing nets, of which we were very much in need, as with the short ones formerly in use bowling at the side wickets was attended with considerable risk.

Most of the First and Second Elevens have been pretty regular in their attendance at the nets, but we doubt whether they have all made the best use of their time there. Batting at the nets is a very pleasing form of amusement, but among cricketers it is not regarded as an end in itself, but as a means of becoming acquainted with all sorts and conditions of bowling, so that they may play the good with due care, while meting out to the bad the punishment it deserves. Now most boys get into the habit of playing two games. At the nets every ball, good bad or indifferent, is to be scored off, if possible, but it is so obvious that these tactics will not do in matches that often a totally opposite policy is there adopted. The ball is not welcomed as something that may be hit, but looked on as something to be dreaded, irrespective of its pitch or direction. Other boys continue in matches their game of "swiping" blindly at every ball that comes with equally fatal results. But slogging is not

hitting, and sure defence is only to be got by careful practice at the nets. Bowling, too, should be practised with equal care; overs should be taken, and each ball should be thought about.

The lower games have been noticeably slack. One would suppose from the appearance of the field that the Second Game consisted of some half-dozen players instead of fifty. The Third have generally had sides games at twelve and four, but both they and the Fourth have been poorly attended on half-holidays.

# CHARACTERS OF THE FIRST ELEVEN.

SMITH, W. B. (Captain).—A batsman of considerable strength, which he uses to advantage in certain strokes. Had his defence been better, he would have been a really good bat. Has done good service as wicket-keeper and in the field, and has made an excellent captain.

SCLATER. J. R. P. (Vice-captain).— A fair bat with some hitting power. In bowling he has rather sacrificed accuracy to pace. A very good fielder at short slip or cover-point.

MUTH, H. B. L.—A strong but rather wild hitter, with small power of defence. A very fair longstop and useful change bowler. Has captained the team on several occasions.

WHITWORTH, G. L.—A batsman with a promising style, who has suffered from want of regular practice. Has latterly proved himself a good change bowler. A very good fielder at slip.

BOOTH, V. S.—A good all-round player, with a style of batting peculiarly his own. He has rendered the team invaluable service by his conspicuous pluck on several occasions. A skilful slow bowler and an excellent field at cover-point, his throwing-in being especially praisewortby.

VAN DER VEEN, H.—The best bowler in the team. His success has been due to steadiness both is direction and length. Has twice performed the

"hat-trick" this season. His style renders him very liable to hot returns, of which he must learn to take advantage. A very fair fielder, and has on some occasions distinguished himself with the bat.

CLARKE, L. C.—A careful and steady bat. Keeps up his wicket well. A very fair fielder.

YOUATT, E.—An excellent fielder at point. Bats fairly well, and makes a fair change bowler.

ROWBOTHAM, A. E.—Has considerable hitting powers, especially on the leg side. A good fielder in the long field.

SWINN, C. G.—Bats very fairly, and has made a good wicket-keeper, considering how far the season had advanced when he took up that position.

CAW, W. N.—Can hit, but has very little defence. His fielding is fair, but he should practise throwing.

# CHARACTERS OF THE SECOND ELEVEN.

PAYNE, A. (Captain).—A very fair bat, and a persevering but not brilliant field. Has made a good captain.

WRIGHT, J. H.—A very promising bowler, and has worked hard to make himself a good bat. A smart field, and has captained the team on several occasions.

MAGUIRE, H.—A very fair bat, who has gained the highest average in the team. His fielding leaves much to be desired.

Bennett, C. H.—Has bowled regularly throughout the season, and with considerable success. He requires more steadiness, especially in adversity. A fair field, but not quite keen enough.

CLARKE, R. G.—A bat with considerable idea of style, and should do well next season. A very good fielder in the slips.

COLLIER, F. S.—Has kept wicket fairly well. His bowling is fast, but rather wild.

BUCKINGHAM, H.—A useful bowler, but a poor bat. He would have done much better had he been more regular at the nets.

ROBERTSON, J. B.—His batting has been spoilt by wild attempts to hit at balls of every variety of pitch and direction. As a change bowler he has done good service at times.

CLASSEN, G.—Has generally managed to secure a few runs, although not in a very finished style. A very fair fielder.

CLASSEN, E.—Has a very taking style, which ought to develop into something really good. His fielding suffers from want of dash. He should look to this if he wants to play cricket.
