Editorial.

This year's cricket season, though rather short and not so enjoyable as usual, has been very satisfactory in its results. The weather has been more suggestive of football than of cricket, and frequently the summer game has been pursued under very wintry conditions. Matches, however, have not been to any extent interfered with by rain, and a long programme has been successfully carried out. The First Eleven have played 15 matches, winning eight and losing two (neither of which was against another school); the Second have won successful than ever. The subscriptions

six matches, lost four, and drawn three. The Under 14 Elevens have gone through the season without defeat, and have the excellent record of nine victories and one drawn game.

The half-holiday games have been well patronised, and the practice of enrolling names for the season (subject, of course, to parents' consent) has much simplified the arrangement of sides' games. An attendance of over 150 has been usual, and on one afternoon over 190 boys took part in school games and matches.

The School Prizes will be distributed on Speech Day by H. F. Hibbert, Esq., County Councillor, Chairman of the Technical Instruction Committee of the Lancashire County Council, and the Sports Prizes by Mrs. J. Armitage Bennett.

Mr. Sykes has been connected with the School since its opening, and has served as joint honorary treasurer to the Games Club during that time. Mr. Barber, who will give his whole time to the work of the office, is well known in the lacrosse world, being a prominent member of the Cheetham and Lancashire teams.
- J. R. P. Sclater, M.A., with whose distinguished Cambridge career our readers will be familiar, has been licensed to the Presbyterian ministry, and has accepted a unanimous call to the Presbyterian Church at Derby. He will be ordained and inducted on September 16th.
- E. Macfadyen has been elected President of the Oxford Union Debating Society.

First Eleven caps have been presented to J. S. Ardern, D. McNicol, W. E. G. Thomas, and F. E. Swindells, and Second Eleven caps to A. M. Thompson and E. Matthews.

- To A. M. Thompson has been awarded a pair of batting pads for his score of 54 not out, for the Second Eleven against St. Bede's Second on June 25th, and to F. W. Thompson a ball for performing the "hat trick" against Bowdon College Second on July 7th.
- O. J. Wilkinson, who won the Gaskell Challenge Cup at the School Sports in 1898, has made his mark as an athlete at Owens College, winning the Freshmen's Race (220 yards) and coming

in second for the 220 yards open, and third in the quarter-mile.

The Head Master has presented the School with a very handsome new School flag and a new flagstaff and Union Jack. The School flag, which floated for the first time in celebration of the conclusion of peace in South Africa, is based on the coat-of-arms of William Hulme, with its alternate bars of yellow and blue, together with the cross of St. George for England, in which the School wreath is included.

Swimming.

In spite of the cold spring and summer there has been a very fair attendance at the Leaf Street Baths this season, and a considerable number of boys have taken swimming instruction. Of these, nearly all are now able to swim. The School Races will, we hope, be held next term, and all boys who are qualified swimmers should make a point of practising during the holidays, and give their full support to the Swimming Sports in September.

The Athletic Sports will be held on the afternoon of Speech Day, July 31st, beginning at 3-30. This year three new events have been added to the programme—a quarter-mile race for boys under 14, and two football dribbling competitions—one open, the other under 14. The 600 yards handicap has been changed to a 200 yards handicap for boys under 13. This year a uniform subscription of one shilling for all competitors has been introduced, and the entry is 251, the highest on record. A gratifying feature is that the Upper Forms of the School have entered en bloc, and the subscription is the highest on record.

On the afternoon of the Sports boys must keep off the course except when actually competing for an event. Boys should be careful to get in the heat for which they are down on the programme, otherwise they will be disqualified.

No Cameras will be allowed within the ropes, except by special permission of the Clerk of the Course.

The Old Hulmeians race, which this year is a Half-mile, is placed as late as possible in the programme, for the convenience of competitors coming out from town, and will be started about 5-30.

The Extension of the Playing Field.

The work of enclosing and preparing the eastward extension of the playing field is now in progress, and will be rapidly carried on until the whole ground is levelled and properly laid, whether for football, lacrosse, or cricket. The new plot has been enclosed on the east with a strong 5ft. 6in. iron fence, and by the removal of the old fence on the east of the present playground the School field now forms a continuous area of over 111 acres, exclusive of the ground occupied by the buildings. As the level of the new piece is much lower than the upper ground of the present field, the height of the latter will be considerably reduced. It is hoped that football grounds on the new piece for First and Second teams will be ready by next September. The handsome bequest of £2,000 which was left to the School by the late Mr. William Roberts has been invested as the nucleus of a Fund for the maintenance of the Field. It is to be hoped that this Fund will be largely augmented by other friends of the School.

CRICKET NOTES.

The Cricket Season, always a brief though busy one, extending practically from the end of April to the end of the summer term, has seemed shorter than ever this year. No sooner have we settled down to serious cricket than one interruption after another occurs in the form of such incidents as the Whitsuntide holidays, Coronation Week, and last, but not least, the weather. Never has the summer seemed so long in coming, never has pleasurable cricket been so long postponed. Frosty nights have been followed by bitterly cold days, and there has been an abundance of rain, which has made the wicket soft and treacherous. To play cricket with safety a "sweater" was needed, and topcoats and macintoshes have stood spectators in good stead. Only towards the end of the term can the wicket be said to have been at all favourable to the batsmen, and it is not surprising that on only two occasions have the First Eleven totalled more than a century in a single innings.

We had prospects of an unusually strong First Team this year, as there were five of last year's eleven left, and to fill the remaining six vacancies there were seven candidates from last season's Second Eleven. Four of these-McNicol, Swindells, Thomas, and Ardern-found their way at once into the First Eleven, have played regularly during the season, and have all achieved the distinction of winning their colours. Ford, C. M., was promoted from the Second to fill the vacancy caused by Bryceson's departure, and by good cricket has made his position secure. Buckland, R., whose talent was brought to light in one of the trial matches, was played for the team, and in spite of his lack of years and experience has batted and fielded so well that he has been awarded his colours. The last place in the Eleven is still doubtful, the choice resting between Jago and Lister.

Of the matches originally arranged, seven have been won, one lost (the return against Owens College Second), and four drawn, whilst the return match with the Manchester Technical

School produced the unusual result of a tie. Our wins were against St. Bede's College, Manchester Technical School, Warrington Grammar School, Bowdon College, Hulme Lads Club, and Salford Technical School (both matches). The drawn games were with Owens College (Second), St. Bede's College, Bowdon College, and Macclesfield Grammar School. Two additional matches were played, viz., with a Team of Parents and with Whalley Range B Team, the former of which was won and the latter lost.

Speaking of the team generally, we feel compelled to say that in batting and fielding they are superior to the teams of some years past, although the bowling is weaker than usual. The batting is of good quality throughout, and there is hardly a member of the Eleven who cannot be relied upon to make runs. We have had instances of this, two of which stand out conspicuously. In the return match with St. Bede's on our ground, when with eight wickets down and half an hour to play we were in a hopeless position and it seemed impossible to avert defeat, onlookers were preparing to take their departure, thinking all was over. But in that last half-hour was seen some of the best cricket of the season, for Swindells and the younger Buckland not only played a sound defensive game, defying numerous changes of bowling, but very materially increased the score from 47 to 77. Then there was the Owens College return match, where everything seemed to go wrong at first with our batting. Six wickets had fallen for three runs, and we were in a fair way towards establishing a record to be heartily ashamed of. It was then that the "tail" came to the rescue, and chiefly through the plucky batting of Thomas and Ardern, brought the total up to 45.

Buckland, H., heads the batting averages with 16.3 runs per innings. He bats with an attractive style, possesses a sound defence, and can punish loose bowling, although he is not sufficiently severe on leg balls, a fault common to other members of the team. His average of 16.3 is three runs above what it was last year, though it

is more than eight below Allen's record of 24'5 made last season.

The fielding, too, shows a marked improvement on that of previous years. With the exception of one match (the first against Owens College), there has been a gratifying absence of dropped catches, and the throwing-in and ground fielding is particularly smart. There is a general keenness throughout the team, and not often can it be said as this year that the fielding is really a pleasure to watch. There is only one fault that we notice, that is, that the bowler is not always ready to receive a ball which is returned to his wicket.

Our bowling strength was considerably weakened by the loss of Bryceson at Whitsuntide. Since he left the bowling has been shared chiefly by Buckland, Swindells, and Southam, whilst Ford, Bradbury, and Ardern have proved useful changes. Southam's bowling has met with more appreciation from the batsmen than that of either Buckland or Swindells, whose averages work out at 4'7 and 5'35 respectivly, the former having taken 55 wickets and the latter 40.

Undoubtedly, the most popular match of the year was that between the First Eleven and a team of Parents. We had delightful weather for it, and there was a large assemblage of spectators, who seemed to enjoy the game nearly as much as the players themselves. The match was arranged as an experiment, but its success seems to justify its inclusion as an annual event in our list of fixtures. It has been even suggested that two of these matches should be arranged in future years. Rumour has it that there are some parents who are desirous of crossing swords, metaphorically speaking, with the Masters. If such a fixture were arranged, it would probably attract so vast a concourse of spectators that a considerable admission fee would have to be charged, the proceeds to be given to the School Field Fund.

The Second Team have a fairly satisfactory record of six wins against four losses, three other matches being drawn. Thompson, A., is first in the batting averages with 12.8, followed at a respectful distance by Barrett and Thompson, F. The elder of the Thompsons has made some good scores, his innings of 54 (not out) against St. Bede's being a very creditable display of batting. The attack has been undertaken chiefly by Harrison and Lindley, E., but the younger Thompson, who has not bowled so frequently, has a better average than either. On the whole, there is no need to be despondent about the material from which we shall have to furnish a First Eleven next year.

The First and Second Elevens have been captained respectively by Bradbury and Foster, T., who have both performed their duties with zeal and success. McNicol, D., has captained the First Eleven in one or two matches whilst Bradbury was away, and has fully justified his selection as Vice-captain.

The Form Match Championship has been won by Science V. again this year. For many seasons past the contest for the honour has lain principally between them and Modern V. and IV., but this season the latter went down in their first match before Science IV. Last year we noticed the marked improvement in the form shown by Science IV. This year we have pleasure in recording a further improvement, and whilst congratulating Science V. on securing the Championship, Science IV. deserve praise for fighting their way into the Final by their successive victories over Lower Modern Fourth, Latin III. and II., and Modern V. and IV.

The Junior Elevens ("Under 14" First and Second, and "Under 13") have an unbroken record throughout the season. They have played ten matches, of which nine have been won and one drawn. The batting has been consistent, somebody always coming up to the scratch, and the bowling and fielding have been sure and keen. In batting and bowling Buckland, R.

(who was soon promoted to the First Eleven), Sykes (who has often played for the Second), Cooper, A. F., and Bradbury have done very good service, while Jones, S. W., has done well with the ball on more than one occasion.

Old Boys have, as in previous seasons, been well to the fore in local cricket. Whalley Range First Eleven has usually contained six or seven Old Hulmeians, and the scores printed below will show what good service they have done for the club. F. C. Hudson has been very prominent in the Owens College Eleven, and P. J. Jefferis has done well at times for Rusholme.

CHARACTERS OF THE FIRST ELEVEN.

BRADBURY, L. A., Captain.—A very good allround cricketer. Plays a sound defensive game, is a fine cover-point, and a useful change bowler. Has made a first-rate captain.

McNicol, D., Vice-captain.—A brilliant field at point, but has had little success with the bat. Has ably captained the team on two or three occasions.

SOUTHAM, L. M.—Has done good work both with bat and ball, but has hardly fulfilled expectations. Is not quite keen enough.

Buckland, H.—By far the best bat on the team. Has a very pretty style, and his scoring has been most consistent all through the season. A sharp field at slip, and has rendered excellent service as a bowler during the latter half of the season.

Wihl, H. S.—A good, reliable bat. Has filled his new place behind the stumps very successfully.

BRYCESON, W. G.—A very good bowler and a stylish bat. His leaving at Whitsuntide was a great loss to the team.

Swindells, F.E.—Has bowled well throughout the season, and has played some good innings.

THOMAS, W. E. G.—A vigorous and plucky batsman. Has often made runs when badly needed. With more practice would become a really good cricketer. A splendid long-field, his catching and throwing in being particularly fine.

Ardern, J. S.—By his consistent practice has improved wonderfully both in batting and fielding. A fair change bowler.

FORD, C. M.—Has justified his selection to fill Bryceson's place. Bats and bowls well, but rather slow in the field. Ought to practise sprinting.

BUCKLAND, R.—The youngest member of the First team for some years. Has profited by the example of his elders, and promises well. His fielding is smart, and on one occasion at least his plucky batting saved the game.

JAGO, E. O.—A fair bat, and has been useful on occasions as a change bowler. His ground fielding is good, but he is not a safe catch.

LISTER, C.—Bats in good style, but has not met with much success.

CHARACTERS OF THE SECOND ELEVEN.

FOSTER, T. T., Captain. — A fair bat, and has much improved in fielding. Has proved a capable and energetic captain.

MATTHEWS, E.—Has been frequently away on service with the First Eleven. A smart fielder, and has batted well on the few occasions he has played.

McNicol, M.—Batted well at the beginning of the season, but has finished with a rather low average. A very good field.

THOMPSON, A. M.—A keen cricketer, and very promising bat. Has played some excellent

innings this season.

LINDLEY, J.-A good wicket-keeper and a

useful bat.

LINDLEY, E.—Has improved wonderfully in batting, and is now able to play a steady, careful game. A tricky bowler on some wickets.

Mudie, R. A.—Has made some creditable and useful scores, but has unfortunately developed a knack of getting run out. Might practise more with advantage.

HARRISON, S. D.—Has been very successful in bowling and keeps a good length. Plenty of room for improvement in batting.

BARRETT, G .- A good field, and has batted well on occasions. Ought to practise more.

THOMPSON, F. W.—Has played one or two plucky innings, and has met with considerable success as a bowler.

Sykes, R.—Has practised regularly, and come on nicely since the beginning of the season.

BRISTER, J. F.—Showed signs of good batting at first, but has fallen off considerably. Might do better if he practised with the First and Second Elevens.
