We much regret to record the death of Mr. Henry Webb, representative of the Bury Corporation on the Board of Governors from the opening of the School in 1887. He always took a warm interest in the School. He was frequently present on Speech Days, and once delighted Old Hulmeians by coming to their annual dinner. In him the School has lost a good friend.

We are very sorry to record the resignation, at Whitsuntide, of Mr. F. S. Salisbury, who had been a master in the School since January, 1904. His activity and energy in founding and developing School societies and in fostering varied out-of-school interests will be gratefully remembered, and we hope leave a lasting influence in the School. The Hulmeian in particular owes both directly and indirectly many interesting pages to him. Our best wishes go with him in the sphere of work he has chosen. The new Board of Education scheme for the School was sealed on April 29th. It affects the government of the School in various ways, among which we may note the raising of the leaving age practically to 19, and the abolition of the fee for Greek, which becomes an ordinary class subject. The status of the School is thus made first grade by age and curriculum.

A generous gift of £500 has been made by a donor, who wishes to remain anonymous, towards the cost of the new hall.

Mr. Councillor Wallwork has very kindly presented silver medals to the Under 14 Cricket Eleven and reserves.

Mr. Ernest Shorrocks, M.Sc., formerly captain of cricket in the School, now assistant master at Queen's College, Taunton, has very kindly given a prize for cricket, which is to be awarded for fielding in first eleven matches.

CRICKET NOTES.

The School cricket season is now nearing its close, and we again experience the customary regret that it is of such short duration. To prolong it, however, without encroaching upon

the holidays, is not within our power. All that remains to us, therefore, is that we should make the most of it while it is with us. Are we sure, though, that we do this? That there should be cause for serious doubt concerning this matter is the one thing which mars an otherwise successful season. Our teams have acquitted themselves creditably; their fielding has been on the whole good; they have batted well; they have bowled well; they have won matches. Yet matches are not won in a day. The winning hit, or the fall of our opponents' last wicket which secures a like result, is but the climax to a long sequence of events which extends back into previous seasons. Let us not, then, claim for the present season that share of our success which belongs to the past. Also, we must remember that the season's work should be estimated not merely by the number of such climactic events, but also by those less exciting but no less important matters which are the necessary preparation for the achievement of like successes in the seasons to come. teams have discharged their duties to the past: can the side-games claim to have done the same with regard to the future? It is here that our weakness lies, and it is incumbent upon all to see that it is remedied.

At the commencement of the season we were in the fortunate position of possessing six members of last year's first eleven. Of these, Bradbury, A., and Chorlton, J. S., were elected captain and vice-captain respectively. S. Whitcombe was appointed captain of the second team.

The weather, upon which so much depends, has sadly interfered of late with practice games and form matches. Of our "foreign" matches three have been spoiled by rain, though one of them might have been played had not our opponents failed to turn up. Considering our weather experiences of the last two months, it is, however, somewhat surprising to find that during this time rain has stopped play on only one occasion. This was in our away match against Bury Grammar School, when we had

made 24 for 1 wicket in reply to our opponents'

Up to the time of writing the first team has played 16 matches. Of these we have won 10, lost 2, and drawn 4. An aggregate of 1,731 runs has been scored for the loss of 136 wickets, which works out at an average of 12.7 runs per wicket. Against this our bowlers have obtained 149 wickets at a cost of 7.4 runs per wicket, our opponents having scored against us 1,102 runs. This result is very gratifying. It speaks well for the all-round play of the team. Bradbury's share in it deserves special mention. He has scored 351 runs in 15 completed innings, and has an average of 25.07. His bowling average stands at 6.5, the result of taking 38 wickets for 247 runs. He has made an excellent captain, and has set a good example to the rest of the team by his keen fielding and rapid scoring.

Three other members of the team, Chorlton, Banks, and Stone, have batting averages above 10, the figures being 17.6, 16.6, and 16 respectively. Sutton, V., heads the bowling averages, having taken 14 wickets at a cost of 3.5 runs per wicket. Stone and Bradbury, however, have constituted our main attack. The former has taken 39 wickets, at a cost of 6 runs per wicket. Banks, who has taken 9 wickets, has a slightly better average, viz., 5.7. Baines and Chorlton have also done some useful bowling.

The fielding has been good, though we failed badly in the match against Stockport Grammar School.

The team as a whole have played bright, attractive cricket. On several occasions the hundred has been reached in little more than an hour. This, together with good fielding, has won matches which would otherwise have been drawn. Two questions are still undecided at the time of writing: Who will win the Livesley Challenge Shield? Will Bradbury create a new record?

The Second Eleven has been ably captained by Whitcombe, and has supplied the First Eleven with some capable reserves, notably van der Veen, whose 21 against St. Bede's, coming at the time it did, served to put the School in a strong position. Bruce and Holmes have also played for the First in several matches, and ought next year to find a regular place. Dunham, who was discovered by the Second Eleven, quickly found a place behind the First Eleven wickets. Eccles is a distinctly promising bowler, and with Crawford and van der Veen also bowling well opposing teams have found runs hard to get. The team has turned out regularly for practice, and the fielding on the whole has been good.

The record of the season's work would have been better if the team had not been disappointed by having matches cancelled. They have won 6, lost 3, and drawn 1.

The Third Eleven have been captained by Palmer, H. They have won six and lost four matches. In batting, Irwin, Crawford, Palmer, and Need have done well. Molyneux, Nash, and Need have bowled.

The Fourth Eleven have won all the four matches played. Walshaw, F., has been captain, Blaikie has bowled well, and Hitchen, Walshaw, and Blackhurst have done best with the bat.

The Under 14 Eleven have been led to victory by C. W. Murphy in every match since the first, which was lost. In token of their success Mr. Councillor Wallwork has very kindly given them silver medals. Neill, G. W., has bowled very well, and Murphy has also been successful with the ball. Good scores have been made by Proctor, Lowther, Clarke, Cattrall, and Simcock, E.

The Under 14 Second Eleven have won all their four matches. Holmes, F. E., has been captain.

In recording batting performances of Old Hulmeians, we may draw attention to the success of N. Fletcher, who left the School in 1907, and has made some very good scores this season
