Entry Requirements: Sociology is at the cutting edge of understanding the world we live in. It is the study of human social life, groups and societies. Sociology attempts to describe and explain people's social behaviour. In so doing, it asks questions such as why is it that people join gangs? What causes crime? Why are some people rich and others poor? Why do girls get better exam results than boys? Why do 50,000 people in the world die of poverty every day? Sociology can help you to understand the social structures that shape us and prepare us for our place in the world, such as the family and education. It can also shed light on hidden aspects of society such as criminal gangs and youth subcultures. Sociology will allow you to develop critical insight, questioning the status quo. Realise how varied the human experience can be and how powerfully identity shapes a person's future.
