A Right in the African Jungle.

Alone, every one of us lost his assurance and made all haste to rejoin his companions.

It was, then, with feelings none too comfortable, that I learnt one night that I was to sleep alone on a car that had stuck in a pool My rifle was not a trustworthy in the road. weapon, but that, as it turned out was of no consequence, for it was quite dark when I lay down about eleven o'clock. Shortly afterwards there was a tremendous, earth-shaking roar. I was very considerably perturbed by its proximity, but we had had a most fatiguing day, and as the noise was not repeated I was soon fast asleep. How long I slept I do not know. I remember becoming slowly conscious of the sound of something moving rapidly through the bush close by. At once I connected this with the roar I had heard before. All the blood-curdling lion stories we had been told now passed through my mind. I became numb with fear. For a few moments the sound of snapping twigs ceased, and I was beginning to breathe again when to my horror I heard the beast break through the undergrowth into the road not many yards away. He came straight towards me, padding along and drawing quick breath like some monstrous hound. He stopped close by the car. put out my hand I could have touched him. Conscious of impotence and paralysed with terror I lay still, waiting for his spring. A moment later I heard him greedily lapping up

Half an hour afterwards I climbed cautiously out of the car and hurried up the hill to join my companions.

CRICKET NOTES.

The season so far (up to the end of June) has been most successful; 10 matches have been won, 4 lost and 1 drawn; the record in school matches is 6 wins to 1 loss. Of the four losses, those against Manchester C.C. and Whalley Range - an unbeaten side in Manchester Club Cricket - were of course foregone conclusions; against a strong Old Hulmeians' side and Manchester Grammar School we made a good fight. We have beaten King Edward's School, Lytham, Willaston School (twice), Macclesfield G.S., Bowdon College and St. Bede's. The record is all the better in that we are playing against stronger teams than in former years. One result of this is that we have naturally had better wicketsin fact, we have had only one really bad one. At the same time, though rain has interfered with only one match, most of the wickets have been slow, and that is against a school team.

The batting has given much less cause for anxiety than in former years; Furmston has improved tremendously and has the best strokes on a fast wicket; A. G. Campbell and Williamson are difficult to get out, especially on a slow ground, and have often put up a good score for the first wicket, while C. D. Campbell is improving in defence and has a powerful drive. All these have scored fifties. A long way behind, but with useful scores to their credit come Jarvis, Ferry, Fowler and Smith, and the tail is doing very well. fielding has usually been good and sometimes brilliant, while in bowling Williamson always keeps a length, even when he has to bowl for two hours at a stretch, and is far the best. Ferry is also settling down to a length and Smith though erratic, bowls some very dangerous swinging balls. Furmston and A. G. Campbell have also done some good work. C. D. Campbell has been a very good captain, knowing a good deal about placing the field and showing initiative.

Whatever happens in the remaining six matches this year's team is clearly a very good, one.

The Second Eleven have played thirteen matches, but have only won six, mainly owing to the many changes that have had to be made. The most satisfactory results have been the two wins against St. Bede's and the match against the University Staff team. Dickson, D. W. and Elderton have been our most dependable batsmen, and Horner, C. E. and Oddy the most successful bowlers. There are two or three promising cricketers for next year in Lowther (who unfortunately met with an accident which has put him out of the team since June) Rains and Lymer, but the bowling will be distinctly weak. G. V. Oddy has made most of the material at his disposal and captained the team well.

The Third Eleven has been captained by R. L. Eastwood, and has won four matches out of five played.

The Under 14 XI. have played 13 matches, of which 10 have been won and 3 lost. batting is promising, and if only they will keep the right foot steady most of them will do well. Shevloff, S., who has captained the team since Lymer went on to the 2nd XI., has scored freely in good style. Woodward and Proctor have done most of the bowling. The fielding has been disappointing, and many runs have been thrown away by fumbling and poor Most of the team need to learn throwing in. to anticipate the movement of the ball, but Widdows has done consistently good work in the field.
