Swimming.

This season should be a record one so far as attendance at the Baths is concerned. The register contains 85 names, and although detention and other causes keep a few away, yet the average attendance so far has been over 60.

Last year there were 90 boys in the School able to swim; this year the number should exceed 100. There are, unfortunately, still some boys who hold aloof from this side of school life, but the number of these is less each year, and some day no doubt every boy in the School who is physically fit to learn will acquire this useful art before leaving.

An additional instructor has been engaged this season, and a marked improvement in the efficiency of the teaching is already noticeable. We hope that the number of efficients will be largely increased this year, and that every boy who is now having lessons will be able to swim by the end of the season.

The shower bath continues popular, and the beneficial effect on bathers is to be seen in the warm glow and healthy appearance of the boys after indulging in it.

Some boys seem loath to part with their long, flowing locks of hair. These latter may be becoming, but they are certainly cumbersome, and form the only risk there is of catching cold after bathing. We understand that learning swimming is rather hungry work, and a certain refreshment establishment not a hundred miles from the Baths is enjoying a considerable inflation of business.

Mr. Franklin again occupied the chair, and the attendance easily beat the record, being over 100, and including ten Vice-Presidents, a result chiefly due to the energetic efforts of Mr. Fison, for which we here gladly take the opportunity of thanking him. key-note of the proceedings was, of course, the celebration of the successes gained by the Lacrosse Team in winning the Championship Shield of the Third Division of the League and the Lancashire Junior Cup. The promoters had taken advantage of this event to introduce opportunities for several congratulatory speeches, which were a new and distinctly successful feature of the evening. Further, the presence of J. R. P. Sclater, with the laurels of his recent success among the coming orators of the nation fresh upon him, gave a distinction to the gathering of which the chairman was quick to take full advantage to the great enjoyment of those present.

After a few songs had been given, the chairman rose to make his customary remarks. He commenced with interesting reminiscences of the early history of the Club, the small beginnings, and the hard struggles, which must have had an almost pathetic interest for the few "old originals" present. The picturesque though somewhat eerie description of the first "smoker"-held on a foggy January night, when the gas was frozen up, and halfpenny dips had to be brought into requisition, lighting up the gathering with a somewhat ghostly glamour, and throwing the rest of the room into deep shadow, revived further memories. After contrasting the present flourishing condition of the Club, and referring to the special occasion for rejoicing that evening, Mr. Franklin concluded with congratulations to Sclater on his unanimous election to the Presidency of the Cambridge Union Debating Society. He emphasized the fact that this distinction was one of the three most coveted by any 'Varsity man-the Senior Wrangler and the Captain of the Boats being the only other persons who could consider themselves his equals. Sir William Harcourt, Sir Charles Dilke, Mr. Speaker Gully, &c., had at one time held this position, and Mr. Balfour, even, was not considered good enough; a remark (in parenthesis) which some present evidently thought showed the want of discrimination of the electorate -in that instance only, of course. The confident expectation that some position equally famous was reserved in the future for our distinguished member was warmly echoed by the meeting, which had now commenced to enthuse. Sclater had no alterna-

tive but to reply. There was a slight interruption here, however, while the strains of "For he's a jolly good fellow" floated on the silent night for some miles around probably, and the meeting, in that state of comfortable exhaustion succeeding any violent effort, reposed itself to listen to an item not on the programme, but which had been looked forward to with considerable interest. There was no reporter present, unfortunately, but it is needless to say Sclater's remarks were eloquent, witty, and to the point. After relieving his personal feelings on the kind words and the reception he had met with, he touched on the relations between Masters and Old Boys in general and Masters and Old Hulmeians in particular, and gave the best expression to the feelings of those present. The special advantages of the Hulme Grammar School, from all points of view, followed, as a matter of course. He also paid a tribute to the success of the Lacrosse Team. While disclaiming any special distinction for himself, he looked forward to the time when Manchester should possess among its chief citizens the sustaining influence of the presence of many Old Hulmeians; certainly a Lord Mayor or two, numerous Aldermen, and Town Councillors by the dozen. He made reference also to the band of Old Hulmeians gradually spreading over the globe, with especial mention of our Klondike representative. In conclusion, in solemn tones befitting the subject, he referred to those courageous Old Hulmeians who had entered the "holy bonds of matrimony," a state which, apparently, he (at present, at any rate) views as the reverse of blissful. When order was again restored, S. W. Saxelby was called upon to offer the congratulations of the Football members to the Lacrosse Team. He said that although they could not congratulate them as equals this season, yet they were none the less sincere. While remarking on the splendid trophies they had gained in the Cup and the Shield, he took the opportunity of expressing the thanks of those present for the further generous evidence of the interest of the Masters in the Club. He also pointed out that the footballers had a more sordid interest in the success of the Lacrosse Team in that it brought honour to the name of Old Hulmeians which they also bore. J. H. Buckland replied.

Further songs carried the evening towards its close, followed by more speaking. Mr. Kelsey made a few encouraging remarks for the benefit of the football members, gleaning causes for congratulation despite the bad season. He pointed out that the footballers

started the Club, and were in a measure, therefore, responsible for the success of the Lacrosse Team, in which they could take a fatherly interest. He gave out great hopes for the future in the success of the School Eleven this season. J. R. Corbett replied, laying stress on the need of new blood from the School.

L. C. Clarke then rose to offer the congratulations of the meeting to Mr. Hall on the successful state of athletics at the School and in the Club, a fitting result to the keen interest and kindly help he had given to this important branch of school life. Great cheers followed, ending in a repetition of the popular refrain mentioned above. Mr. Hobbins ably seconded, emphasizing the deep practical interest Mr. Hall took in the athletic side of the School, and the source of congratulation in such a meeting as the present, particularly in the direction of its oratory.

Mention was made by the chairman of two impending departures of prominent Old Boys to different scenes, L. C. Clarke to London, and J. Van der Veen to Australia, and he wished them every success. These gentlemen suitably responded, after each being in turn told, emphatically, that he was "a jolly good fellow."

A few further songs brought the programme to a close. The efforts of the artists were all much appreciated, R. H. Beales and J. E. Tyson being in particularly fine voice, and Mr. Corbett doing yeoman service on the keys. After a vote of thanks to the chairman and to the vice-presidents had been proposed and carried amid applause, "Auld Lang Syne" concluded a memorable Old Boys' Smoker.

Old Bulmeians Association Football, 1898=99.

The latter half of the season has, unfortunately, been marked by the same want of success which characterised the earlier portion; but, as this was a contingency not altogether unexpected, we must make the best of the results as they stand.

The First Team have played seven matches since the last report, losing five and drawing two; whilst the Second Team have also played seven, three resulting in wins and four in losses.

Our ranks were strengthened by the presence of our old captain, E. Shorrocks, during the Christmas weeks,

services on two occasions, viz., in two matches against Chorlton-cum-Hardy, in which he did yeoman service.

The other two fixtures were cancelled by our opponents, much to our chagrin, as they would probably have resulted in victories which would have been very precious.

Six matches were cancelled, frost accounting for two, and the prevailing epidemic for the others. Only one, however, was cancelled by us.

Turning to the Second Team matches, we can glean some satisfaction from the results, as three out of the seven resulted in victories. It is only fair to state, however, that on these three occasions, owing to the First Team matches being cancelled, our team was, perhaps, stronger than it otherwise would have been, more particularly in the case of the matches with Chorlton Congregational. However, the results show a marked improvement on last year's, when seven out of the last eight fixtures had to be cancelled.

Looking at the season as a whole, the chief cause of our lack of success has been the fact that, whilst the fixtures have been almost as strong as ever, the team has suffered exceptionally heavy losses among its old members. No doubt, also, the record would have been much more creditable had a keener spirit been manifested among the members themselves, and a regular First Team turned out every Saturday. The same team never turned out twice consecutively, and there is no doubt that had all the members shown the same keenness, and made an effort to be ready every Saturday, the continual practice together would have, before long, made the team a much more formidable one than it was. Of course, it was only in about half the team that this spirit of unrest was so manifest, but it had the effect of quite spoiling the efforts of the rest.

Turning to a more pleasant retrospect, there undoubtedly are one or two features which may be considered as encouraging. Despite the bad results the membership shows an increase on previous seasons, being probably larger than ever before. Second Team results show a marked improvement on last season, when only one victory was recorded. This is an improvement in the right quarter, as there is plenty of room for it to spread in an upward direction, and we hope we are right in taking it to mean that the coming generation of members mean business. The second half of the Old Boys' season has been even better than the first, for whereas one match was lost in the earlier half, the second was finished without having a single defeat to mar it. The record for the whole season reads—24 played, 22 won, 1 lost, and I drawn. Goals for 223, against 68. We have had many

disappointments of this kind of late, and it was trying to have our return fixtures with Lymm, Oldham, and Stockport Grammar Schools cancelled within the space of a few days. The First Team have, notwithstanding, accomplished some fine performances, notably at Sandbach, where they won by six goals to one, and against Bowdon College. The latter was undoubtedly the match of the season. At half-time the visitors were leading by two goals to none, our efforts to score being fruitless up to this point.
