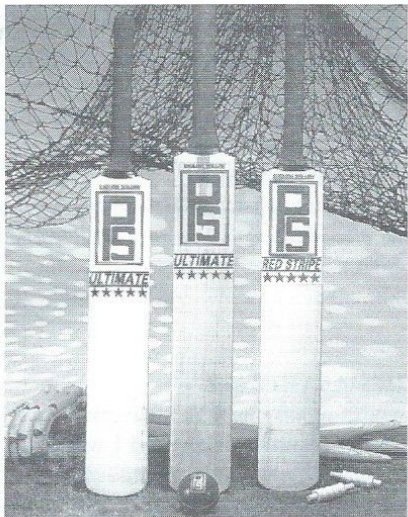

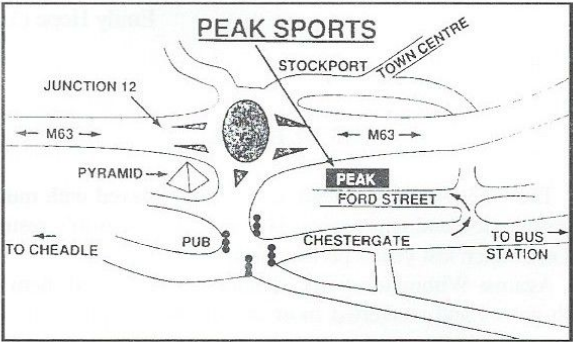

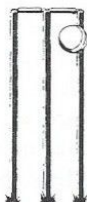

This was a very good season for the 1st XI, although, once again, the results appear to be very moderate when considered without a knowledge of the season as a whole. The team won only two games, but came very close to winning a handful of others. Only very rarely were we overwhelmed by a superior outfit, and, on such occasions, much fight and character was usually apparent.

At the beginning of the season, I feared that we would struggle to score enough runs, since there was nobody likely to fill the holes left by the departure of Nathan Wood and Perry Warren. However, I was absolutely delighted to be proved wrong by Iain Warburton who was without doubt the most improved player in the team this year. He scored 628 runs at an average of almost 45 runs per innings, and often held our innings together when it may have otherwise disintegrated.

Our failure to win as many games as we deserved to was once again due to lack of penetrative bowling. Mark Warnes was the pick of our bowlers, taking 29 wickets in the season and after bowling very long spells. He still has much to learn, but I expect him to be a very useful cricketer in the future.

We had the best of most of our early games, just failing to bowl out King's, Macclesfield and King Edward's, Lytham. However, a very disappointing bowling performance led to our defeat against QEGS, Wakefield, and our batting self-destructed against a weak St Bede's team.

Ironically, two of the worst performances of the year were in games which we won, against King's, Chester and Rydal. Against Chester in particular, we batted very poorly and, after having them 45-8, nearly lost the game though some very poor bowling and fielding. We eventually won the game by three runs in an exciting finish.

The now traditional festival was held this year in magnificent surroundings at Magdalen College School, Oxford. It was possibly our most impressive performance at a festival so far, and apart from a poor batting performance against Chigwell we played some very entertaining and attractive cricket.



This was, I feel, the most enjoyable season of school cricket I have experienced. The team were pleasant to spend time with and worked very hard. In particular, John Hall, the Captain was astute in his leadership of the team and very easy for me to work with. He deserves much credit for the way he coped with a difficult job.

All that remains is for me to thank those “friends” of school cricket, who make it possible for games to be played; ground staff, caterers and members of staff and parents for their support.

At the start of the season expectations were that the team might be put at a disadvantage occasionally through promotions to the school 1st XI. Asif Majid in particular was a candidate for this honour, but Nick Bell and perhaps others could have been removed from the side. As things turned out, Majid suffered from an injury for most of the season which stopped him from bowling but did not prevent him from batting. Although only James Jobling and newcomer Chaudhri played in all nine matches none of the regulars missed more than one match.

One might therefore have expected better results than five wins and three defeats. The batting was stronger than last year: Miles Newton achieved a century against Manchester Grammar School and there were seven other scores above fifty. The most noticeable progress was achieved by Newton but Nick Bell managed to bat much more consistently than last year, while Jobling again showed excellent form, especially at the beginning of the season. Majid again scored heavily and fully justified, especially when taking into account his bowling after half term, his selection for the HMC trials at Rugby.

It is in the field where one needs to look for reasons for the three defeats, by which is meant attitude and team spirit, rather than bowling performances. A sound defeat by King's School, Macclesfield at the start of the season gave an indication of just how important are a good team spirit and a disciplined approach. A similar set of circumstances occurred in Bradford in the very last match, thus nicely confirming this truth about the game.

Majid, in fact fully justified his appointment as captain. After initial doubts and hesitations he learnt to lead the side not only by example but also by good decisions and by something approaching a commanding manner. He deserved criticism occasionally for keeping certain bowlers on too long and for under-bowling Andrew Xydeas, but he showed as much willingness to learn the art of captaincy as he has always shown in learning anything else to do with cricket.

James Calderbank had a disappointing season, and not just with the bat: a key member of any side is always the wicket-keeper and, although he played well, it was when he passed the gloves to another (sometimes for reasons which were elusive) that we too often missed important catches behind the wicket which led to our not winning, or even losing. It is important that he plays consistently behind the stumps - that is where he is needed and that is the skill which he has the great fortune to be equipped with.

The bowling attack was much improved by the addition of Fazal Chaudhri, who joined the school at the beginning of the year. Not only was his style of bowling one that we lacked but he was also generally very accurate, despite putting a great deal of spin into his action. As a result, he helped to win us three matches (Lytham, Crosby and Rydal) and nearly brought about a surprise win against Wakefield.

As regards faster bowlers, Bell maintained his progress and had another successful season, including making an

impressive debut for the first team, although he will again be disappointed by the relatively few wickets he managed to take. Majid's memorable feat against Birkenhead, coming on to bowl when injured in order to destroy the opposition just when they looked like breaking away to an undeserved win, was probably the highlight of the season to an unbiased observer. On this occasion, he had to sacrifice speed for accuracy and swing and, as a result, bowled much better than against Bradford when his excessive speed led to runs and byes aplenty for a side which deserved to beat us. Of the other bowlers Kellett and Humphries had only moderate success: neither showed the discipline necessary to sustain for enough of the time the accuracy that is needed. Humphries more than Kellett showed an improvement over last year's bowling performances, but he let himself and the team down too often in other respects.

The most impressive team we played against was certainly Bradford Grammar School. Our potential weakness throughout the season was, an implied earlier in this report, lack of individual self-control and the ability to work together as a team.

Self-discipline and sheer determination was demonstrated to perfection by the Bradford middle-order when we had appeared to be coasting to victory. One hopes that this lesson has been soundly learnt.

Apart from the above mentioned players, Paul Edmundson played one game. My thanks go to Mr Timm, who shared the umpiring against Rydal and to Mr Taylor who again produced excellent cricket wickets for us.

The season started against King's School, Macclesfield, who had the advantage of several games behind them. Good batting performances from H Anwar and R Bell set up a good score of 152 runs, but we were unable to bowl King's out in the allotted time, so drawing the match.

Our second match was in the Harold Bailey Cup against Barlow High School, limited to 25 overs. A lack of experience of scoring quick runs gave us a total of 79, with solid batting from W Stoddart. Generally poor bowling to the good opening batsmen allowed Barlow to make the score in just 14 overs.

Due to a school trip, a much weakened team was put out against King Edward, Lytham. A new opening partnership of R Bell and P Murphy made a solid start of 51, followed by a rapid batting collapse for just 17 more runs. This low total was rapidly overhauled by King Edward's but good bowling from R. Mensah kept hopes alive for a short while.

Back to full strength the team next visited St. Bede's, where on a cold and windy day we fielded first. A much improved bowling attack kept St. Bede's to a total of 114, especially from M Prasad and R Mensah. Having batted after tea, St. Bede's left us short of time to make the runs. An average batting performance and tight bowling by St. Bede's left us 14 runs short at the end of a good, close draw.

The Birkenhead match was expected to be the hardest match of the season. Poor to average bowling allowed their openers to make a partnership of 135, declaring at tea with a total of 206. Thoughts of fighting for a draw soon became dreams as one wicket after another was given away poorly, or won by the opposition's best bowler (7 wickets for 18 runs off 13 overs). Eventually we were all out for a total of just 82 runs.

Another poor batting performance followed against Merchant Taylor's School, all out again for 82. Two quick wickets gave a glimmer of hope, but Merchant Taylor's made the runs with ease. A good bowling debut by P Murphy was the highlight of the game.

Rydal School, an unknown quantity, was the next match. Rydal batted first and declared at 114, good bowling from N Haider and R Mensah keeping the score down. W Stoddart and N Haider opened the batting strongly, followed by M Naylor who played extremely well to secure a pleasing win from a good all-round performance.

Two days later we were away to Manchester Grammar School, where strong batting by just one of their players, 109 runs, gave them a score of 171 declared. # PARENTS' ASSOCIATION

## Chairman's Report

Last year, the Committee decided to change the date of the AGM from the end of the School Year to the start of the (next) year. This change was made to give new parents an opportunity to become involved early in the activities of the Association. This proved to be a successful move, with a number of first year parents elected to the committee, bringing with them new ideas and enthusiasm, which should be translated into a revitalised programme of events for the coming year.

The Christmas Fair, Grand Draw, and 300 Club continue to be the main fund raising events, whilst the Head Master's Talk was again interesting and entertaining. Quiz Night and the Dinner Dance provided two very different and enjoyable social functions, supported by a number of sporting activities, including tennis, badminton, keep-fit and cricket. It was disappointing that we failed to promote a Disco this year after the success of last year's event and the attempt to produce a very ambitious International Festival at short notice also resulted in postponement until next year. Perhaps these failings were not surprising as some time was taken up by "older" committee members handing over key roles to new members.

Christine Fleming took over as Secretary, leaving the major task of organising the Christmas Fair to Janet Rodgers, a new Committee member. Sue Wilson handed over the 300 Club to Tony Freeman, also new to the Committee, and Nuzraj Choudry, a third new member, not only introduced the concept of an International Festival, but almost pulled it off in a very tight timescale. With this level of enthusiasm from new members, next year should be both interesting and successful.

With the AGM scheduled for September, this year's accounts have not yet been finalised, but will show a reduction in funds raised, partly resulting from the cancellation of activities as the Committee moved through a transitional phase, and partly due to a general fall-off in attendance at events. Last year I suggested that events were suffering from the effects of recession, and I see no signs of change in this year's programme. Despite this, we managed to meet a number of requests for gifts, the main item being £10,000 donated towards the purchase of a new mini-bus. A donation of this size, following so quickly after a £6,500 purchase of a Grand Piano (plus a number of smaller gifts), leaves funds at a low ebb, and 1994/5 will almost certainly be geared towards rebuilding cash balances to meet a growing list of requests for help from various departments in School.

The Parents cannot operate without co-operation from School Staff and once again special thanks are due to Mike Peters and his team, and the three teachers (Rani Tandon, Alan Simkin and Malcolm Wood) who both attend the Committee meetings and act as advisers and liaison between School and the Committee. We also marked the retirement of Betty and Brian Gregson with the presentation of a gift on behalf of parents past and present. They have been good friends of the Association, helping on numerous occasions over a long period of time. We appreciated their help, and wish them a long and happy retirement.

I have already mentioned that we managed to encourage the election of some new Committee members last year, and we shall need to repeat that this year, as a number of "older" members are ineligible to stand for re-election, and some have decided not to seek election (due to pressure of work) after serving for a number of years. Caroline McNally and Sally Whittle have organised and helped at numerous events over a long period, but are unlikely to seek re-election. Don't be surprised, however, if they continue to help out at events, it's in their nature!

Mel Sherwin, Martin Shelmerdine and myself all stand down as our sons leave School.
