Editorial.

ORE than three years have passed since the School time has now arrived, which comes soon in the history of all schools, and all too soon in ours, when boys begin to leave us for their work in life, carrying school memories with them, and leaving behind the stamp of their influence. This is the first turning point in the School's history, the beginning of that stream of influence, which the School as long as it exists, will continue to send out into the surrounding world; it is also the foundation of school traditions, for every boy leaves behind him for his successors some contribution to that public spirit which makes the life of a school continuous.

It is very important for both that boys when they leave should not lose sight of their old school, nor their school of them; and though old Hulmeians need not be asked to remember us, yet with the best intentions they may be prevented by various causes from keeping themselves

informed of our doings—though they are not likely to forget their own school days, they will be glad of a record to refer to.

It is equally if not more important that present members of the School should remember that standards of success in work and games have been set up by their predecessors, which it should be their aim to raise, but below which they must never fall.

Hence, a School Magazine is not merely a desirable luxury, but has a double purpose to perform, to interest the old in the doings of the new, the new in the doings of the old, to keep within the sphere of its influence all who have at any time been connected with the School.

This our first number, a simple record of our history and our doings, we issue in the confidence that it will be welcomed by all members of the School Past and Present, and that both will combine to make *The Hulmeian* a success.

School Rews and Motes.

THE Examiners appointed for this year by the Governors are H. W. Just, B.A., formerly Scholar of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, (for Classics, Modern Languages and English), Mr. W. W. Haldane Gee, Lecturer at the Owens College, (for Mathematics and Physical Science), and Mr. F. G. Jackson, Second Master of the Birmingham School of Art, (for Drawing and Writing).

We record with great regret the departure of three members of the staff. Mr. Urwick and Mr. Oldham have rendered valuable services to the Games' Committee ever since its beginning, as Treasurer and Secretary; and to the untiring interest taken by them and Mr. Meade in the Athletics of the School their present flourishing condition is largely due. Mr. Oldham is going to a Modern Mastership at Harrow, Mr. Urwick and Mr. Meade for a lengthened stay on the Continent. Our best wishes go with them.

Mr. E. J. Urwick, Classical Scholar of Wadham College, Oxford, Mr. E. G. Hewlett, B.A., formerly Foundation Scholar in Classics, Trinity College, Cambridge, and Berkeley, Fellow of the Owens College, Manchester, and Mr. K. J. Fison, B.A., of Clare College, Cambridge, have been appointed to Masterships at the School.

F! M. Saxelby, who was elected to the Dalton Mathematical Entrance Exhibition at the Owens College, in September last, has been placed in the First Class at the Preliminary Examination of the Victoria University.

"Ex Africa semper aliquid novi." In a recent general knowledge paper a young Hulmeian ingeniously completed a scrap of quotation thus:—

On! Stanley, on! Were the last words of Livingstone.

At the supper which followed the Past v. Present cricket match the idea of founding a cricket and football club for old Hulmeians was warmly received. The old boys are, as yet, few in number, but there are materials for a good eleven at both

games. The expense attending the provision of a suitable field is the main difficulty. Perhaps some of our older readers may help us, and render the very great service of keeping the old boys together and in touch with the School.

Thirty boys and three masters from the school spent their extended Easter Holidays at Port Erin, Isle of Man, this spring. All the party will long remember with pleasure the succession of excursions over the cliffs, the football and cricket matches on the shore, the paper-chase and the boat races, even though they forget the few hours of lessons which varied the monotony of holiday.

Next term will begin on Tuesday, September 16th. The Examination for Entrance and for Entrance Scholarships will be held on the day before.

The Prize Day and the Athletic Sports take place on Thursday, July 31st. There are 53 entries for the 600 yards handicap, 90 for the 300 yards, and 37 for the open half-mile. 12 have entered for the old boys' race. Altogether 115 competitors have put down their names for the various events.

The Games' Club.

THE Games' Club dates its existence from the Spring of 1889. Since our School opened in 1887, Cricket, Football, and Lacrosse had been played with steadily increasing success, under the care of Mr. A. D. Hall, and afterwards of Mr. R. Holmes. Indeed, towards the end of the Winter of 1888-89, our reputation had become somewhat embarassing. The climax was reached when we found, one day, that one of our opponents thought it necessary-"to make an even game"-to put a team in the field composed of five Masters, four "old boys,"-and two actual members of their School! At the close of this season, it was decided to establish the Games on a definite basis, and to vest the management in a Committee of Control.

The first meeting of the Games' Committee was held on April 1st, 1889, when the School was represented by A. R. Lowe, H. J. Amos, A. G. Baker, H. Haynes, J. R. P. Sclater, G. L. Hansford, J. White, P. Williams, T. Hart, and F. V. Hansford. The three lowest Forms did not elect Members of Committee. A. G. Baker was elected Captain, H. J. Amos, Vice-Captain of Cricket. and A. R. Lowe, Secretary of the Games' Committee. Mr. Urwick and Mr. Sykes were appointed Treasurers.

At the next meeting the report of a Sub-Committee on the duties of these officials, and of the professional cricketer, was presented and adopted. T. Whatmough, the well-known ex-Cheshire County player, and Stockport professional, had been engaged for the season. his steady and excellent coaching, there is little doubt our striking success in cricket is largely due, and we are glad to be able to place his services on record here.

After the Summer Lowe was appointed Captain of Football, with E. Shorrocks as Vice-Captain. The duties of the Secretary having proved rather exacting for a member of the School, Mr. Oldham, who had undertaken them for some time during Lowe's absence, was asked to resume them. The Treasurers were re-appointed, and the result of fresh elections in the different Forms was the selection of the following representatives: -Amos, H. J., Shorrocks, E., Classen, H. L., Hardie, J. H., Thrustle, G. H., Lowe, F. H., Silkstone, W. F., Spencer, R. B., Booth, V., Farquharson, G. At a later date Clarke, H. F. was chosen in place of Silkstone who found himself unable to serve on the Committee. The next appointments made were Amos, H. J. as Captain of Lacrosse, Bennett, P. M. Vice-Captain, and Hague, O. Captain of 2nd Football Team.

After Christmas it was necessary to select a successor to Lowe as Captain of Football. Accordingly Shorrocks, E. was appointed, with White, J. as Vice-Captain. On the Cricket Season coming round again, Baker and Amos were re-appointed to the positions they held last year.

The effect of the Committee in stimulating

public spirit, and rousing strong interest in the games has been marked, and the honour of representing one's form on it, will, we feel sure, be more and more coveted.

Cricket. 1889.

UR first systematic season opened successfully, and closed with a brilliant record. To begin by beating a strong team from the Manchester Grammar School was good, but better still was to end with following record :-

Matches played 16. Won 10; lost 4; drawn 2.

The matches lost, as will be seen below, were against the Masters, Shrewsbury C.C., Manchester Grange C. C. "A" team, and a team from Farnworth Grammar School, of which, it was ascertained. no less than five members had no connection whatever with the School. The principal features of the season were the successful batting of Lowe, and the brilliant bowling of Amos. On May 8th, against the Deaf and Dumb Schools, Lowe made 102; and on May 4th, against Norman Road School, Amos took nine wickets for one run in the first innings, and did the hat trick in the second. The rule about closing the innings was successfully put in force more than once, the first time being almost immediately after it came into operation.

Football 1889=90.

IN arranging fixtures it was decided to have I two classes of matches,—1st, against schools, a purely school team-2nd, against clubs,-team to includesome masters. The system worked excellently and enabled us to measure our strength occasionally against strong teams. were unfortunate in losing our first match, and during the first half of the season lost four other games, the principal defeats being at the hands of the Catholic Collegiate Institute, a heavy and clever team. As the season advanced, however, our style of play steadily improved; a vicious style of individual dribbling and selfish play, which had prevailed at the beginning, gave place to good passing and combination, and as a result, after the New Year began we never lost a match, and ended the season with a string of ten successive victories.

The Masters' match, which was arranged for March 29th, had to be abandoned on account of the unfortunate simultaneous illness of several members of the staff, and a game with St. Mary's A.F.C. "A" team was substituted; a game with them which should have been played on December 14th having been cancelled owing to fog. An "Old Hulmeian" match was hastily arranged, owing to a team being unable to fulfil an engagement, and played on February 8th. The "Old Hulmeians" had a fair,

though scarcely representative team, but found that training and combination mean a great deal in football, and so came off only second best. The game was notable as forming the first of what it is to be hoped will be a long series of similar struggles between Past and Present.

Characters of Football Team.

Lowe, A. R., forward. The best all round player we have had. An excellent back or half-back, played centre forward with great skill and irresistible dash. A good Captain.

Shorrocks, E., forward. A good wing; neat dribbler, quick, but inclined to keep the ball too long and work into the centre with it. Very painstaking and promising. Succeeded Lowe as Captain.

Baker, A. G., back. Invaluable to the team, sure, steady, and always reliable.

HAYNES, H., half-back. Played up with dogged persistency, but rather slow.

THRUSTLE, G. H., forward. Played with great dash at times. Shoots well with either leg, but easily disheartened and then fails to keep his place.

WHITE, J., back, Developed into an excellent back. Never shirks. Great dash and strength.

HART, T., half-back. Strong and fast. Improved greatly during the season. Is also an excellent goal keeper.

CLASSEN, H. R., half-back. Played for half the season very pluckily. Rather too light as yet for the team.

Amos, H. J., forward. Played well as right wing. Fast and centres excellently, though sometimes too late.

Bennett, P. M., goal. On the whole good. Quick, lively, and can kick well. Practised hard, and improved considerably.

EDGE, J. G., forward. Fast and neat, at times the best forward on the field, but uncertain.

L ACROSSE was played in the winter of 1888-89 in a desultory manner, with natural results. Nearly all our energies were concentrated on football, and, that having become an assured success, it was possible last season to take up Lacrosse with greater vigour. A good list of fixtures was arranged, but several were interfered with by bad weather and other circumstances, especially the Owens College Challenge Shield Ties, which entailed considerable alterations in our list. In this competition the season before last we were knocked out in the second round—last season, however, we reached the semi-finals; and next, we hope to get even further.
