## SECOND XI. MATCHES.

Hilton has batted well on occasion, but frequently misjudges leg balls. In this he is not unique, as the team wastes 80 per cent. of possible hits to leg. Ballinger plays steadily, but wastes his height and reach, and is apt to put up the ball on the off by not getting his foot far enough across. Lonnen and Romer have not had much chance yet, but both are promising. Davies was batting well, but was promoted to the first.

The bowling suffers from lack of variety. Lonnen has been the most successful, as he keeps a steady length and bowls fairly straight. C. T. Howard had one deadly spell against Baines's, but his action is laboured and his length therefore unreliable. The slow bowlers, Parkinson, Aspinall and Romer have suffered because the fielding has frequently been thoroughly bad. Intelligent anticipation is seldom seen, slowness off the mark is a common fault, and both ground fielding and catching are most unsafe. Exception must be made of Parkinson, Aspinall and Lonnen.
