## Old Hulmeians' War Memorial.

The bronze memorial tablet bearing the roll of honour of Old Hulmeians who fell in the war was unveiled by the Lord Mayor of Manchester (Alderman W. Kay) on Monday, June 13th. There was a large gathering of visitors, including many relatives and friends of the fallen.

The chairman of the Governors, Archdeacon N. L. Aspinall, presided and there were also present the Lady Mayoress, Dr. Joseph Hall, Mr. S. W. Saxelby, Chairman of the War Memorial Committee, Mr. H. Cardwell, Hon. Secretary, Mr. J. H. Wright, Hon. Treasurer, Mr. H. H. Vlies, Mr. E. Kington Brice, Mr. J. Dorrans, the Rev. J. F. Tristram, and the Head Master.

ARCHDEACON ASPINALL, said the memorial was to the brave lads educated in the school who went out to service in France or to the East. Of 670 old boys who answered the call they knew that 111 laid down their lives. They had learned to play the game in the fields around that school, and they played the game to the last. Most of the boys who fell were in the Army, five in the Air Force, and two or three in the Navy. Six had won the Military Cross. Some who died had entered the school in the year 1887, when the school had its

birth; some had entered from the school cadet corps, and went straight from the playing fields to the field of battle. The memorial had been designed by Mr. E. K. Brice, for many years the art master in the school.

A procession was then formed to the Memorial in the Vestibule of the New Hall and the Lord Mayor unveiled the Tablet to the memory of the Old Hulmeians who fell in the service of their King and Country in the Great War. The bugle then sounded The Last Post.

THE LORD MAYOR said that several of the names there recorded were those of his own friends, and urged the importance of good citizenship of which they had given such a noble example, and which was never more needed as a steadying influence than to-day.

DR. JOSEPH HALL, the first head-master of the school, said that every old boy whose name stood on the tablet had been a pupil of his at that school. Many of them had already attained high position in business or other walks of life, while others had shown great promise, and all had left an inspiring example of which that memorial was the record. He offered his deep sympathy with the parents and relatives of the fallen.

Mr. S. W. Saxelby on behalf of the subscribers asked the Head Master to accept the Memorial Tablet on behalf of the school and Mr. Dennis in accepting it said that every morning as they passed out to their day's work the Tablet would meet their eyes with its reminder of the call to duty.

The ceremony closed in an impressive manner by the boys of the school filing past the Memorial Tablet, followed by the audience, while the School Orchestra played Beethoven's Funeral March.

## Natural History Notes.

A most curious freak of nature in plant life has been noticed in the playing field near to the pit. At one end there are buttercups and daisies growing in profusion. Probably by cross pollination several of the buttercup plants bore forth two kinds of flowers, the buttercup and daisy, both on the same stalk of the same plant, each flower head possessing its own characteristic species form.

This same phenomenon I have also come across quite recently in relation to the violet and deadnettle where the cross plant thus produced had the form of the deadnettle flower with the characteristic violet markings.

## Gardening.

Great enthusiasm has been shown in this work and there are signs of good crops being secured in spite of the continued drought.

Potatoes look well at present, especially the late varieties, and if we get the needful rain, there will be quite heavy yields.

By constant hoeing the turnips are still doing well.

Respecting beans, both broad and runner, a word of warning is very necessary. All beans, particularly the former, should be sown very early, their tops nipped off and well washed with a mixture of soap, paraffin and water in their early stages to keep down the black fly. A few cabbages have gone back but by pulling up, killing the root maggot, and washing the roots they may still do well.

During this dry spell of weather all spare time can be profitably spent by liberal use of the Dutch hoe, which serves a double purpose, rapidly killing off all weeds and at the same time enabling the soil to retain the maximum amount of moisture so essential at the present time.

## Levelling the Field.

## CRICKET NOTES.

Afternoon cricket is a precarious business, especially when, as has sometimes happened, our opponents have been unable to play later



than 6 or even 5-45, and the results and averages of ten such matches are not much of a guide to the value of a team. What at any rate is certain is that the side has been really keen and as the result of a regular practice five days a week since the snows and fogs of March, has improved considerably. At the beginning of the season our prospects were none too bright; all of last year's caps had left and all but two of last year's team, and of these one did not come back till June. But a season which included the first victory for 28 years over Manchester Grammar School and in which we have lost only one School match and that on an impossible wicket is certainly a success. Also there is no tail to the batting, the last two or three men having more than once doubled the score. We have not been dismissed for less than 100 on our own ground: the dry season has of course flattered run-getting on a good ground but a bad wicket is impossibly difficult after so long a drought. Two bowlers have usually been enough on a short afternoon with the result that the change bowlers have lacked experience on the few occasions on which they have been needed. On the whole the team has shown up particularly well in comparison with their opponents in running between the wickets and in the placing of the field and in the orthodoxy of their batting, but they are promising rather than reliable. The strain will be relieved when one or two begin to make fifties, as a matter of course, and next year when we shall have practically the same team again we should be a strong side. Our record to date out of 10 school matches is 5 won, 4 drawn and one lost.

The Second Eleven have up to date played nine matches, of which five have been won, three lost and one drawn. On the whole they have done well. Crompton started the season with some good batting and bowling and has captained the team efficiently during the absence of Hawkins. Mawdsley has steadily improved his batting and is now quite the best bat on the team. Clason and Alston have also improved considerably and the latter ought to make a lot of runs next year. Clason's defence is his strong point, but he ought to cultivate his off-side play. Glover as a hitter has been a success and his bowling is quite good. Jackson, who came off the First when Upton returned, has not yet shown him-

self a success as a batsman. Barber has improved considerably behind the wickets and now takes the ball cleanly. Hackett has a nice easy left-hand delivery but ought to try and keep off the leg: his batting shows promise. Smith is keen and should cultivate his bowling. Flanagan has tried hard but has never bowled as well in a match as he does at practice. Jones, W. N., and Cherry have given the team useful assistance. Generally speaking the team has shown commendable keenness and the practices have always been well attended. The batting is now quite good but the fielding and the running between the wickets still leave much to be desired. The bowling has only once proved weak.

COE, N. R.—Does not yet swing his bat straight but can punish loose bowling at the end of an innings. Runs well between the wickets and shows a good deal of dash in the field.

FOWLER, G.—Is keen and always does his best; valuable at a crisis, but often mis-judges the flight of the ball.

WILLIAMSON, W.—Can hit a half volley but has no other stroke; an improved field and a promising bowler who has not yet had much of a chance.
