# Two Studies at Criccieth, Carnarvon=shire.

I.

#### A PLOVER'S EGG.

It was dull and cold for June. Behind me a blue-grey canopy of cloud leant heavily on the Snowdon hills, reached in a monotonous sheet overhead, and hung down in front to meet and mingle confusedly with a horizon of sea. tide was half out, exposing a foreshore of blue shingle trimmed at its lower edge with a clean fringe of sand. Above the extreme limit of the waves at ordinary times more shingle was heaped up in a bank some yards in width that sloped steeply on its seaward and more gently on its landward side, and over this rampart, built by spring tides and storms against themselves, lay a carpet of dead seaweed flung up for a last hasty tribute in the wild days of March. Wandering here with a crunch, crunch of rounded, flattened stones, and much wearing of boot leather, I came upon my first plover's egg. I was looking for something else, which is no doubt why I found it. I am not sure how I chanced to stop just at that place, and happened to look down; but there it was, right at my feet, a little eight-inch clearing in the seaweed, a slight depression pitted in the shingle, that was all, and one chocolate, blackblotched egg in it, point inwards.

I had seen them often before in pictures and collections, or snugly arranged in a moss-lined basket, but this was no common-place museum specimen blown dry as Easter eggs, and made as impersonal with a Latin label, nor some epicure's commodity reckoned by the dozen and counting so many spoonfuls of jelly-like albumen and orange yolk. This was a real live egg, laid by a real live plover, and with the promise of a chick in it. And yet, spite of all this, what did I go and do with it? I coldly calculated that since the full clutch numbers four, this was probably new-laid and

waiting for the other three. So while my conscience smote me for a robber, I took it home ruthlessly, heedless of the return of the real live plover, and only anxious about that promise of a chick in it. So it was cooked, just like a barn-door fowl's egg, and eaten, just like ordinary eggs, only with a little apprehension and a trifle more of ceremony. It was my first plover's egg, contained ten tiny spoonfuls, and was in excellent flavour.

#### II.

#### ON THE CASTLE ROCK.

Morning in the long grass on the top of the Castle Rock; a blue sky overhead, made bluer by contrast with the few fleecy cloudlets slowly shepherded across it, and underneath it the dancing sea laughing back the same azure light and tossing up many a streak of playful foam into the fresh salt breeze. I think I hardly know a finer seascape than this one, framed in an amphitheatre of purple hills, and ringed with eighty miles of tumbled rock, flat sands, and imminent cliff. Only in front for less than a third of the circumference does a chord of sealine interrupt the circuit broken by a single point of sail. Sitting out here on the verge of a promontory so far advanced into the sea and looking outwards and upwards an almost giddy sensation seizes me, as though I were poised aloft on a slender pinnacle with nothing but water around me and below me and limitless With a half-shiver I turn my space above. head to reassure myself.

Crowning the rock behind me is the castle itself, ruined, yet seeming solid and secure enough in spite of all its more than thirteen centuries of storm and battle. Now in these latter days its old age has peace; a thick mantle of ivy hides the upper half of the massive walls that still enclose its central courtyard, and three spleenworts—Black Maidenhair, Wall-Rue, and Common Spleenwort—find hospitable lodging in the crevices of the very ramparts that

frowned seaward in the red, black days of

Edward Longshanks.

Lower down, behind the rock, but within the precincts of the castle, nestles a lovely little terraced garden, like a garland on a warrior's head. If you want to know how the desert came to blossom like the rose you must ask Sergeant Wilkinson, who keeps the gate and made the garden. Haply among the paths and flower beds you may glean from him sundry mature reflections on Taffy, horticulture, cricket in general, and Yorkshire in particular.

#### CRICKET NOTES.

It is, we often think, much to be regretted that the cricket season is of such short duration. Four months out of twelve is a proportion scarcely commensurate with the prestige which the game rightly enjoys, and, save for the question of daylight, one sees no reason why the cricket season generally should not be extended to the end of September. Such a change would not, however, extend the School cricket season, as the only effect it would have would be to increase the time lost during holidays from six weeks to ten. It remains to us, therefore, to make the most of the many opportunities which, compared with a large number of schools, we undoubtedly possess. Perhaps, however, we do not all sufficiently appreciate the advantage of having a cricket ground adjoining the School, instead of at a distance of two or three miles. This year, until within a week or ten days of the time of writing, the weather has been most kind to us, as only three half-holidays have been rendered unavailable for cricket by the bad state of the weather.

At a meeting of the Games Committee, Powell, A. L., was elected captain of the First Eleven, and Watson, R. S., vice-captain. These were the only members left to us from last year's First Team, who had First Eleven colours. There remained also two other boys, Bradbury, A., and Roberts, who had Second Eleven colours. Up to the time of writing, the First Eleven have played 12 matches, 7 of which have been won, 4 drawn, and 1 lost. Three had to be abandoned. The match which we lost was that against Bowdon College. It was rather remarkable, and not a little exciting, owing to the fact that until the last ball was bowled either a win or a loss, but not a draw, was possible. In the first innings we scored 56 in reply to our opponents' score of 43, so that, had the second innings not been completed, we should have counted a win. Bowdon, however, turned the tables by scoring 68, against which we were unable to score more than 49, Bowdon thus winning the match by six runs. It was unfortunate that neither of our matches against St. Bede's College could be fought to a definite issue. One had to be abandoned altogether, and in the other play was stopped by rain after St. Bede's had lost six wickets for 42 runs, the School Faving scored In this match Bradbury played a fine innings of 51, and Powell took six wickets for 17 runs.

In the matches played, we have compiled a total of 959 runs at the expense of 96 wickets. This gives an approximate average of 10 runs per wicket. Our opponents' average, on the other hand, is 5'8 runs per wicket, as 549 runs have been scored against us for the loss of 95 wickets. These figures speak well, both for the batting and bowling averages of the team as a whole.

With regard to individual batting averages, that of Watson, who has been a consistent scorer, is perhaps the most noteworthy. In ten matches he has scored 267 runs, and, having been twice "not out," his average stands at over 33. Dickinson, who has only played on the First Eleven during the latter half of the season, has an average of 21'5. He has, however, played only two complete innings, though he has batted on three other occasions. The averages of Clarke, J. H., Bradbury, A., and Shawcross, J., all exceed 10, being 16'3, 18'5, and 10'5 respectively.

Throughout the season a high standard of bowling has been maintained. Bradbury heads the list of averages, having taken 12 wickets, at an approximate cost of 3.75 runs per wicket. Watson's performance, however, ought perhaps to be considered the better, as he has taken 45 wickets, the average cost per wicket being 4.2. Powell's average, 40 wickets at a cost of 6.3 runs per wicket, is distinctly creditable. The fielding of the team has been good. Keenness in the field is almost more to be desired than good batting, and nothing is more disheartening to the bowlers than the lack of it.

The Second Eleven have played 13 matches. Six have been won, one drawn, and six lost. The team has been somewhat handicapped, owing to the changes in the captaincy, made necessary by the promotion of Dickinson to the First Eleven. They still have time to alter the balance to the right side, so we hope that they will. This year much interest has been added to the Form matches by the Livesley Challenge Shield competition. At the time of writing it has not been decided whether the shield is to adorn the room of Science V. or that of Lower Modern IV. The former have defeated Modern V. and IV., and the latter Science IV., Latin III. and II., and Classical V. and IV.

The Third Eleven have played 12 matches, winning 7 and losing 5. Duffy, A., Holmes, V., and Powell-Jones have acted as captains. In batting, Holmes, Sutton, V., Goodwin, and Duffy, A., have done well. The bowling has been equally shared by Powell-Jones, Sutton, and Duffy, K. Hudson and Cruse have also bowled with success in one or two matches.

The Fourth have been captained by E. H. Livesley, and have won 4 and lost 4 of their 8 matches. Oldham, Hawkins, Williamson, Budge, Hudson, and Thornley have batted well, and Budge has also done well in bowling. In the later matches Crawford has been useful with bat and ball, and Palmer, H., has been a good addition to the team. The fielding as a whole has been good, but there is room for improvement in the team's batting.

The Under 14 Eleven have won 6 and lost 3 of their 9 matches played. The team has been selected from the following: Travis, A. E. (captain), Murphy, Palmer, C. W., Proctor, Pool, Linfoot, Thornley, Stewart, Eccles, Bruce, Simpson, C., and Simcock, E. Stewart, Linfoot, and Eccles have bowled well throughout the season. Bruce and Murphy have also bowled at times. Travis did the hat-trick against North Manchester. Travis, Palmer, Simpson, Burce, and Murphy have batted well.

The Under 14 2nd have won 3 and lost 3 matches. They have had to play some much bigger teams, and have had good practice in fielding now and then. Captain, P. Dorrington. Simcock, E., Lowther, and Neill have made some runs, and Johnson, Dorrington, Humphries, C., and Need have bowled.
