

Editorial.

S in our last number we commented on the deserted appearance of the School field during most of the Cricket season, it is satisfactory to be able to acknowledge this term that, to whatever cause it may be due, there has been a much better patronage of the games. Football and Lacrosse together have been certainly more successful than Cricket in tempting boys out to play. It would be rash to draw from this any general conclusion as to the relative popularity of the winter and summer games. Our Literary Society did indeed decide the other day that Football was better than Cricket, but we doubt whether they would not reverse their decision if the question were put six months hence. It is more probable that the improved turn-out is due to the conversion of loafers, to new blood, or simply

the necessity for keeping warm. However that may be, we hope this improvement will be maintained next term.

Of our last year's First Football Team only five have been available this season, and our present eleven have not so far met with any measure of success. There is however yet time for them to put a better appearance on the season's record. The Second Eleven are nearly all new to representative matches, and if they continue to improve as they have this term, they should do well before the end of the season.

Lacrosse continues to increase in popularity. The First Team has only lost one match, and have scored seventy goals against their opponents' six. The style of play generally has very much improved, and we hope to see it shown forth next term in the Flag Competition, for which we have entered two teams.

School Motes and Mews.

F. M. Saxelby, B.A., who last year won a prize of £25 in the Victoria University Honours School of Mathematics, and the Dalton Senior Mathematical Scholarship of £40, has just obtained the Shuttleworth Scholarship of £50 in Political Economy at Owens College.

F. H. Lowe has obtained a Manchester Corporation Science Scholarship of £60 for three years, tenable at Owens College, and G. L. Whitworth a Corporation Scholarship of £30 for three years, tenable at the Municipal School of Art.

In the October Preliminary Examination of the Victoria University, E. Shorrocks was placed in the first class, and F. H. Lowe in the second. E. C. Dutton also obtained a first class in the entrance examination in Arts of the Medical Faculty.

The first collection in the school for the funds of the Hulme Lads' Club has just been made, the result of which appears in another column.

Cricket caps were obtained at the end of last term by E. Youatt, W. N. Caw, A. E. Rowbotham, and C. G. Swinn.

First Eleven Football caps have been won this term by P. E. Green, S. A. Smith, A. White, L. H. Guest, H. B. L. Muth; and Second Eleven Football caps by E. Youatt, S. A. Guest, J. H. Wright, W. J. Young, S. Atcheson, C. O. G. Muth, and A. A. Clarke.

First Team Lacrosse caps have been given to S. A. Smith, E. L. Hunn, and A. E. Rowbotham.

Mr. Kelsey has succeeded Mr. Franklin as Secretary of Football Mr. Franklin remaining Lacrosse Secretary.

The first ground, which has been partially levelled and re-laid during the summer, will be closed till the cricket season.

The Speech Day.

A T the annual Prize Distribution, on July 27th, the prizes were distributed by Mr. C. J. Heywood, Governor of the School. Mr. T. W. Freston and Mr. A. Birley, Governors of the School, were also on the platform.

THE HEAD MASTER made his annual statement. The school year had been distinguished in the best way by good work and steady progress. To the great benefit of the school the staff had remained unchanged during the year, and the continuance of the grant of £200 made by the Withington Local Board out of their Technical Institution Fund had secured for a second year the services of an additional science and mathematical master. This had resulted in so marked an improvement of all our work in these two departments as to cause regret that the example was not followed by other governing bodies for whose districts the school supplied the advantages of higher education. He felt sure that these public funds in some part could not be better employed than in strengthening the staffs and improving the appliances of the secondary schools. The efforts made to place the higher technical and commercial instruction upon a sound basis involved much experiment, and it was to be feared much waste of public money and effort for want of combined action. It was, however, quite certain that without a sound and fairly extensive general training no adequate result could be gained from more special studies. Early specialization and consequent neglect of literary training were to be avoided. Examinations for technical scholarships should be, far more than at present, tests of general knowledge, and it should be more clearly understood that few boys were fit to take up special work before the age of 16 or 17. He regretted the early age at which many boys intended for business left the school. Boys leaving between 14 and 15 were at a most unfortunate age for the continuance of their studies. In medern languages such boys would usually have passed the elementary difficulties of grammar, but had not attained the mastery over their vocabulary and structure which would lead them to further study after leaving school. They had of course

gained greatly by the discipline of mind which grammatical drill alone affords, but it was to be feared that everything else was too often lost for want of another year at school. As for the special training in commercial knowledge, the results of which in other countries were so often held up to us as an example, we must be content to employ the means if we wished the end. For us such knowledge implied the continuance of school work by a university course at the Owens College, followed by at least two years study abroad. He enumerated the honours and successes which had been gained by the school during the year, all of which have been reported elsewhere in this magazine. Letters from the examiners appointed by the governors were read, showing the satisfactory results of the year's work. In games the school had maintained a good place. The limit of age to 17 caused us often to be handicapped in weight and age. The first lacrosse team had not lost a match till it reached the final of the Schools' Challenge Shield Competition. In the Junior Flags Competition open to schools in the North of England, our team had made the school the first holders of the trophy. In cricket our results were not so good as in former years, but we had met much stronger teams than ever before. He regretted that the number of boys taking active and regular part in the school games did not increase, and could not help thinking that if parents were aware of what their boys lost by abstention they would second more effectively the efforts of himself and his staff. The encouragement and time devoted to the games by the masters should find a heartier response both from parents and boys. He referred with pleasure to the success of the Old Hulmeians Club, and regretted the fact that so many old boys held aloof from it. As the only tie between past and present, it should be supported by every boy who left the School. He concluded by thanking his colleagues for their support and by acknowledging the general good conduct of the boys.

Mr. Heywood, before distributing the prizes, made a short but most impressive speech upon the duties of kindliness and regard for others.

At the conclusion of the meeting the Athletic Sports were held in the School field.

The Athletic Sports.

O NCE again the sun shone brightly upon us during the eventful afternoon of the Athletic Sports, and this year the weather seemed to have singled us out for especial favour, to judge, at least, from the conditions under which other people's sports were held. There was a gay throng of spectators and a record entry of 153 competitors-considerably over half the boys in the school. Two new fixtures had been added to the list, an open and a junior lacrosse ball throwing. The 100 yards race under 14 was abolished, and the age of the 100 yards under 12 was raised to 13. The programme was got through in good time with the following results. The Gaskell Challenge Cup, held last year by S. W. Saxelby, passed to L. H. Guest, winner of the broad and high jumps, second in the halfmile, and third in the 100 yards. Mr. J. G. Batty kindly lent us again the stop-watch from which the times were taken. Our best thanks are due to Miss Hall, Mrs. C. N. Adams, Mrs. Green, Mrs. Tristram, and the Head Master, for kindly presenting the prizes offered respectively for the half-mile, 100 yards open, 300 yards, 100 yards under 15, and the consolation races. At the close of the afternoon the prizes were distributed by Mrs.

ur First Football Team, we are sorry to say, is not up to the standard of those of previous years, and, so far, has met with little success. Six matches have been played, only two of which against Bury Grammar School and Old Hulmeians Second, have been won. The great fault of the team is its lack of combination, and until boys recognize the fact that they must play and work together, instead of trying to outdo each other in dribbling on the ball and keeping it as long as possible, we fear there will be little chance of improvement. LACROSSE NOTES.

Swimming Competition.

S we mentioned in our last number, the A Humane Society for the Hundred of Salford again offered a medal for competition among boys of the School in the art of saving persons from drowning. It was arranged to hold the competition on Monday, October 2nd, at the Salford Baths, and Mr. R. M. Whitehead again kindly consented to judge. School swimming races also formed part of the programme, the Games Club having offered medals to the winners in an open race, a handicap, and a junior race. We are sorry that the Society's offer and the School races did not attract a larger entry, only 13 boys taking part as competitors-E. W. Adshead, A. Black, V. S. Booth, L. H. Guest, S. A. Guest, H. B. L. Muth, C. O. G. Muth, J. H. Nichol, J. O. Nichol, E. H. Owtram, H. R. Pilcher, C. C. Railton, and V. M. Wardrop The contest for the Society's medal was first held. All the competitors except one succeeded in the preliminary swim of 100 yards, which was a necessary qualification. Among the swimmers Black was conspicuous for his good side-stroke. The first test, which consisted in bringing to the platform a floating dummy, was accomplished by nearly all the competitors. In the second test the same dummy was weighted and sunk in shallow water. This was evidently a difficult task for the younger boys, and those who had not previously taken part in the competition. In the final the dummy was sunk in deep water, and candidates were required to swim the length of the bath and dive for the dummy, bringing it back to the platform from which they started.
