## Editorial.

THE Cricket Season of 1899 has proved a very active and enjoyable one, and in the former respect has certainly surpassed any previous year. A glance at the fixture card shows that nearly 100 matches were arranged at the commencement of the season, of which about half were "foreign" and half form matches. Of these we have now published the results of 92, so that it is evident that the weather has throughout been very favourable to the game. For evidence of increase in keenness and enthusiasm we can point to the marked improvement in the numbers of boys playing cricket on half-holidays, which

has gone up from an average of 107 last year to 135. This is a most satisfactory advance, but we may yet look for further progress, and the interesting comparison between the different forms which appears in our cricket notes will show in what quarters there is still room for improvement.

The performances of our representative elevens give good cause for satisfaction, and will compare very favourably with those of the past few years, both as regards the success of the teams and in individual excellence. Of the 44 foreign matches played up to the present 26 have been won, 7 drawn, and 11 lost. The First have won 10, drawn 4, and lost 4; the Second have



won 10, drawn 1, and lost 4; and the Junior Elevens (Third and "Under 14") have won 6, drawn 2, and lost 3.

We are glad to see that the visits of parents and friends to the School field are becoming more frequent and general. They are welcome signs of interest, and do much to encourage and support our games.

## School Notes and News.

H. M. Sheaves has taken the degree of Bachelor of Music of the Victoria University, and J. O. Nichol the ordinary degree of B.Sc. in the same University.

R. A. H. Atkinson, F. C. Hudson, and R. T. Slinger have passed Part I. (Chemistry and Physics) of the Victoria First M.B., and C. R. Green has passed the Victoria Preliminary in the second division.

F. Barrett has passed the Law Preliminary; A. Payne the Final Examination for Solicitors of the Incorporated Law Society.

C. H. Saxelby has obtained the Dalton Entrance Scholarship (Mathematics) of £40 per annum for two years at Owens College.

N. H. Hey has obtained the Theodores Entrance Exhibition of £15 (Modern Languages) at Owens College.

master in this School, in classics, modern languages, and English; Mr. C. L. Barnes, M.A., F.C.S., formerly assistant science master in this School, in science and mathematics; and Mr. H. Foster Newey, Head Master of the Technical School, Tunstall, in drawing and writing.

First Eleven cricket caps have been awarded to W. J. Dearden, J. Norquoy, and W. Kemp, and Second Eleven caps to E. T. Wihl and G. E. Mason.

A large number of rewards have been given by the Games Club this term for performances with the bat or ball. In the First Eleven, G. F. Buckland has received a pair of batting pads for the score of 64 made against Warrington Grammar School; E. C. Allen a bat for his score of 90 against Lymm Grammar School; H. C. Swindells a ball for performing the "hat trick" against Bowdon College, and another for the same feat against Macclesfield Grammar School. In the Second Eleven, G. N. E. Gilliat has been presented with a pair of batting pads for his score of 51 against Mottram Grammar School; and J. Froggatt with a ball for performing the "hat trick" against the same school.

G. F. Buckland has received a pair of batting gloves from the Masters for his score of 50 made against them in the Masters match.

The prizes on Speech Day will be distributed by His Honour Judge Parry, and the Sports Prizes by Mrs. Hicks.

## The Sports.

The Athletic Sports will be, as usual, held on the afternoon of Speech Day, at the conclusion of the annual ceremony in the Central Hall. Last year, it will be remembered, there was a record entry of 242, every boy in the School, except about 20, being in for something. This year the number of competitors is 244.



Two additional 100 yards races have this year been added to the programme, or rather the 100 under 12 has been converted into two races, 100 under 12 and 100 under 13, and the 100 under 15 into two races, 100 under 14 and 100 under 15.

On the afternoon of the Sports boys must keep off the course except when actually competing for an event. Boys should be careful to get in the heat for which are down on the programme, otherwise they will be disqualified.

The Old Hulmeians Race, which this year is a half-mile, is placed as late as possible in the programme, for the convenience of competitors coming out from town, and will be started about 5-30.

## Swimming.

Two instructors have been engaged in teaching swimming this season, and there are now only a few boys who cannot swim at least a few yards; special efforts will be made to enable these few to swim before the end of the season (September). The total number of boys who have received instruction this season amounts to 86, and the average attendance since April 1904 has been about 60.

The School Races and Life-Saving Competitions will take place at the end of September. Until this year the cost of the medals for the School Races has been defrayed by the Games Club; the expenses of the latter have increased to such an extent this year that it will be necessary for those taking part in the races to pay a small entrance fee.

With regard to the Life-Saving Competition, the Humane Society of Salford have again offered three medals for competition in September, and we ought to have a large entry. We hope that all boys who can swim will practise with the dummy in September, in order to acquire knowledge of rescuing life from drowning. A very interesting article on that subject appears in the Summer Number of *Pearson's Monthly Magazine*. We recommend all boys to read this during the holidays.

It has frequently been suggested that there should be an Old Boys' Swimming Club. If the idea is well supported during the next few months, efforts will be made to form the club next season.

## Volunteer Notes.

### OLD HULMEIANS IN CAMP.

The interest in Volunteering still continues to increase, and we have now enrolled our 21st member. The following are in the new squad of recruits: R. A. Bateman, T. D. Hallett, C. S. Douglas, and C. E. Charnley. P. E. Ombler has been transferred to "I" Company, and we shall be glad to welcome others, as we hope to have the section in full working order next year. All members who have joined have shown great keenness in their drills, and in shooting both Sutton and Pepper are taking a prominent part. H. P. Brown distinguished himself in shooting for the Recruits Cup, in which he made the second highest score. We look forward with interest to his future scores, and hope that he may be some day found in the list of winners at Bisley. We print below a few experiences of Old Boys in camp at Scarborough, and our thanks are due to H. P. Brown for his interesting description of camp life.

DEAR MR. EDITOR,

In your last issue it was suggested that an Old Boy should write you an account of our life in camp at Scarborough. If you think it will be of interest to



your readers I shall be very pleased if you will publish the following.

We paraded in full uniform on Saturday, May 20th, at Victoria Station at two o'clock, and proceeded by train to Scarborough. We were glad to avail ourselves of what room there was in the carriage to get rid of our superfluous luggage in the way of belts and valises, but we took care of our water bottles. After a few hours it pleased the L. & Y. to deposit us at our destination, and we soon made our way to the Camp on the breezy heights outside Scarborough. The natives seemed pleased to see us, and turned out in crowds to welcome England's brave defenders. The tents had been pitched a few days before, and by special arrangement the Old Hulmeians were located in the same tent. We were soon provided with provisions and our sleeping apparatus, and turned in about nine o'clock; the excitement of our novel situation prevented us from sleeping till somewhat later, while frolicsome members of our party derived considerable amusement from throwing boots and portions of German sausage in various directions. We got to sleep at last, and awoke about five o'clock. After a wash and brush up, orderlies were appointed to fetch breakfast, which consisted of bread, butter and bacon, and needless to say we did full justice to our fare. We then cleaned up generally, and donned our uniform for Church Parade. The morning was cold, and after a short service we were marched through Scarborough. The next event was dinner (roast beef and potatoes), after which we were free for the rest of the day. The afternoon was hot, and we dragged our feather (!) beds into the sun and baked. Five o'clock tea, with jam and shrimps for those who could pay for them, was next served, after which the Camp was practically deserted, most of the men turning out to explore the neighbourhood, making excursions to Flamborough Head, and so forth. All had to turn in by eleven o'clock, when "lights out" was sounded.

"Reveille" was sounded at 5-30 on Monday morning, and a serious day's work was commenced. "Dirty parade" at 6-30 and drill till 8-30 gave us an appetite for breakfast, after which we had to clean up and prepare for Colonel's ("clean") parade, the great event of the day. In the afternoon we were again free for the rest of the day. The weather was unfavourable, but this did not prevent us from donning great coats and doing the Spa, where a grand pyrotechnic display was given in the evening. The succeeding days were

similar in respect of routine, but Wednesday being Queen's birthday the "I" Company was chosen as special guard for the day. Two more Old Hulmeians joined us on this day, making our number ten, but Hardy and Dewhirst left the following night. On Friday a Review took the place of Colonel's Parade. This was followed by sports, in which Wood won the 100 yards Open.

On the whole we thoroughly enjoyed our first experience of camp life, and fully intend to repeat our trip in succeeding years. We all returned to our homes in first-rate health, and next year we hope that two tents will be filled with representatives of the Old Hulmeians.

## School Concert and Dramatic Performance.

A School Concert and Play were given in the Central Hall, on May 17th, at 7-30. There was an excellent attendance. The seats for the first time were numbered and reserved, and every seat was taken. The stage arrangements necessary for the second part of the programme somewhat interfered with the acoustic effect of the concert, but apart from this the combination of the two was a success, and certainly the orchestra and chorus profited by the additional space provided by the stage. The concert was made up of part songs, pieces for string orchestra, and solos for voice and instrument. The orchestra has certainly improved since its last appearance two years ago, and though the effect was somewhat muffled by the scenery the four pieces given were very well received. Of the part-songs all went well with the exception of the first two, in which the trebles were painfully sharp, a fault which was corrected in the later pieces. For the first time a 'cello solo appeared on the programme, and Dehn acquitted himself very creditably in it, as also did Wihl in his violin solo. Hough has a voice of a pleasing quality, but his words were inaudible. Mr. E. A. Brown delivered "The song of the bow" very finely; his voice has gained greatly in richness and power. Mr. A. W. Dennis, of the Manchester Grammar School, gave a charming rendering of a song by Stange, and to both these gentlemen and to Mr. A. L. Hewlett we

The play was a great success, and Morton's entertaining old farce kept the audience in a perpetual state of merriment. The one general criticism we have to offer upon the performance of it is that most of the actors were not distinctly audible at the back of the hall; Mason's enunciation was far the best. Of the

individual performers, Davies deserves first mention; he really possesses a distinct genius for low comedy; his entrance in a fit of laughter, which he seemed unable to control for two or three minutes, would have amused a far more critical audience. A word of praise should be given to him, too, for the excellence of his brogue and the way he managed to keep it up. Mason was excellent as Fitzsmythe; he was content to be largely himself upon the stage, and the effect was natural and pleasing. Dehn made a charming Penelope; his costume deserves special praise; to the male eye it appeared perfect in every detail. Allen acted well as Mrs. Fitzsmythe, and his get-up was most elegant, though his face was too young for his grey hair. The part of Frank Timperley, the every-day young man, is perhaps a trying one. Norquoy improved very much during rehearsal, and gave a creditable performance of the part. Corfield gave a clever rendering of his small part. During the minute he was on the stage he was certainly the central figure. Good crying bids fair to become a tradition at the Hulme Grammar School. The two cricketers seemed to bring in a refreshing whiff of fresh air from the play-ground.

The best thanks of the School are due to G. R. O. Chorlton (O. H.) for designing the effective proscenium; to Mrs. Kelsey for her kindness in making the curtains; to E. A. Brown (O. H.) for valuable help in making-up; and to other kind friends for the loan of lamps and furniture.

The success of the entertainment was largely due to the energetic stage-management of Mr. Hewlett, in which he was ably seconded by Mr. Crombie. Mr. Dorrans and Mr. Brice also rendered invaluable services in the preparation of the stage and the scenery. The expenses were naturally somewhat heavy, as it was the first public performance, but a balance of about £1. 10s. has been handed over to the Field Fund. The only matter for regret was that after so much trouble had been taken it was found impossible to give a second performance.

### CRICKET NOTES.

We began the season with good prospects of a strong First Eleven, since, to fill the six vacancies, there were nine of last year's Second Eleven to choose from. Five of those who were selected at the first have retained their places throughout the season, so that we have had the advantage of playing practically the same Eleven in all our matches. Of the matches arranged for the First and Second Elevens, only three have had to be cancelled, and those by reason of the weather which, this summer, has been exceptionally favourable to cricketers.

The First Eleven have, so far, won 10 matches, drawn 4, and lost 4—a record which compares very favourably with that of last year. Of the four matches lost, two were played against strong teams got together by F. C. Hudson. In one of these engagements we were helped by their good bowling and our own inferior batting to establish the record lowest score for the First Eleven. The two other defeats were sustained at the hands of St. Bede's College and Bowdon College—both away. The former are decidedly strong this year, both in batting and in fielding, and it would take a very good team to beat them. Our return matches with these two schools both resulted in drawn games—in one case fortunately, and in the other unfortunately, for us. The Masters Match this year was once again productive of a draw. We had a fine day for it, and the game, as usual, was thoroughly enjoyed, although the Masters had most of

the fielding. The other drawn game (in our favour) was with Warrington Grammar School, on our ground. The matches with the Manchester Technical School and Victoria College, Congleton, are new fixtures this year. Owing to the distance of Congleton from Manchester, we shall play only one match a season with Victoria College, and as this year the match is on our ground, next summer it will be on theirs. The return match with Lymm Grammar School afforded us our highest aggregate score (204 for 7 wickets—innings closed), as well as the highest individual score for the season of 90 by Allen. It will be remembered that it was in one of the matches with Lymm last year that Hawkins established the record score for the School of 103. Allen's score of 90 is the third highest ever made for the School, and has brought him well up in the batting averages; at present he holds first place with an average of 14.2 for 17 completed innings—a great advance on his 4.6 of last season. If he should maintain his place at the top, this will be the third occasion on which he has headed lists of averages, as we find him first in the Second Eleven batting averages in '96 and also in '97. It is possible, however, that the last few matches will make a change in the order, for Derbyshire, who is second, is only two runs behind, and Swindells, Buckland, and Dearden are all within one run of Derbyshire. The bowling honours have been shared by Kemp and Swindells, who have both bowled consistently well throughout the season. There were hopes entertained by many of us that McChlery, who bowled so well for the Second Eleven last year, would have strengthened the bowling of the First team this year; but, although he has again rendered excellent service to the Second Eleven, taking over 70 wickets at the cost of 3.5 runs apiece, his bowling was not quite up to First Eleven standard. Of the fielding we may remark that it was weak at first owing to a want of smartness about some of the team, who had a way of standing as though there was only the remotest chance that the ball would come their way. There was also a lamentable tendency to drop catches, and an inability to gather the ball well and return it instantaneously. But after the first match with St. Bede's, in which our severe defeat was, in a large measure, due to indifferent fielding, more serious attention was devoted to this branch of the game. The result is that a continued improvement has been shown in our fielding, and in some of the later matches it has been a pleasure to watch it. Swindells, with his previous experience in the same



capacity, has proved an excellent captain, and has performed his duties to the satisfaction of everyone. The Second Team have a very similar record to the First, for they, too, have won 10 matches and lost 4, whilst one game has been drawn. Gilliat, with an average of over 20, has rendered the best service with the bat, and he has been well assisted by Wihl, Blaikie, and Mason. The fielding of the team has been consistently good. Bradbury has ably captained the Eleven throughout the season, but we should liked to have seen him a little oftener at the practice games.

The Form Matches have afforded a large amount of pleasure to the players, and an interest both to them and to the spectators, which has been maintained to the end. There was a very close finish for the Form championship. Modern V. and IV. were beaten by Science V. by only one run, being bracketed with them at the head of the list.

The "hat trick" has been performed no less than seven times this season—by Mr. Kelsey and Swindells (twice) for the First Eleven, by Froggatt for the Second Eleven, and by Barrett, F., and Derbyshire (twice) in Form matches. The following comparative table of the results of our more important matches for the last few years may be of some interest:—

The Junior Elevens (Third Eleven and "Under 14" team) have won 6 matches, drawn 2, and lost 3. The Third Eleven have been unfortunate in having to cancel several of their matches owing to bad

weather, otherwise they would certainly have a better record. Radford and Southam have shared the duties of captain. Southam has batted well, and has lately been playing for the Second Eleven, while Radford and Chalmers have rendered valuable service in the bowling. The fielding has been rather slack, and some of the team are too fond of talking when in the field. The "Under 14" team is one of the best we remember. True, they have lost two matches against Oaklands School, but, then, the team of the latter was not an "Under 14." In the field they are keen and quick; their opponents seldom feel safe in making runs, for they run to meet the ball without waiting for it to reach them. In this respect they are much smarter than the Third Eleven. Wihl, Buckland, Hough, and Ford have bowled well, and the most promising bats are Young and Hough.

The School Games on half-holidays have been well attended. The entries in the register average 135 for each half-holiday, and probably the average number of boys in the School who have actually played cricket on holidays is more than this; but, compared with last year, when the average was only 107, this improvement is highly satisfactory.
