

Editorial.

The Cricket Season just at an end will on many accounts be looked upon with satisfaction. Considering the strength of the teams they have met, we have every reason to be proud of the form shown by our representative eleven. After rather a bad beginning they acquired a happy knack of making runs, and for the latter part of the season they carried all before them. Out of fifteen matches we have won nine, lost four, and drawn two, both greatly in our favour. The Second Eleven have had a stronger card than usual, and have acquitted themselves with great credit. They have won ten matches, lost two, and drawn one. The game has also been fairly flourishing in the school generally; the form matches have been contested as keenly as ever, and if the lower games are far from being what they should be, at any rate they show an improvement on last season. Lastly, the vast change this year in the condition of the upper ground, which is noticed by every

visitor to the field, marks off the present season as the first in which decent pitches with good out-fielding have been available for our matches and games. That this has had much to do with the progress of the game amongst us, there can be no doubt.

Special facilities have this term been obtained for boys to visit the Corporation baths, and a great impetus has thus been given to the pursuit of swimming. This has proved a most popular movement, and many boys have availed themselves of this opportunity for learning to swim.

We are glad to hear of the continued success of the School Library, although no further donations of books have to be chronicled. We hope, however, that it will yet meet with the encouragement it deserves from those interested in the school.

Another requirement which we have still to hope for is a Gymnasium of our own. Such an institution is much needed; it would be a vast boon to all boys, and would form an invaluable complement to out-door games.

School Motes and Mews.

The following gentlemen have been appointed by the Governors to conduct the Midsummer Examination:—
The Rev. Henry Ellershaw, M.A., Classical Lecturer, Durham University, in Languages and English; Mr. A. D. Hall, M.A., formerly Science Master in the School, now Principal of the South-Western Agricultural College, in Science and Mathematics; and Mr. H. Foster Newey, of the Municipal School of Art, Birmingham, in Drawing.

In the Manchester Geographical Society's Examination on the Geography of Yorkshire, open to Schools in Lancashire and Yorkshire, the following distinctions have been gained:—First Prize and Duke of York's Prize, H. H. Vlies; Second Prizes, S. R. Oddy and A. White; Certificates, H Buckingham, A. A. Clarke, P. Knoop, and C. C. Railton. The prizes and certificates were distributed on July 13th by the Lord Mayor, and each boy also received a volume of beautifully executed Italian maps, recently published.

First Eleven cricket caps have been presented to J. H. Wright, C. J. Green, C. C. Railton, and R. G. Clarke; and Second Eleven caps to H. Buckingham, E. Classen, H. Miller, W. J. Young, R. E. van der Veen, G. Classen, S. Atcheson, and J. B. Robertson.

A cricket bat has been awarded to H. B. L. Muth for his score of 86 not out against Parkhurst School, Buxton, and a pair of batting pads to V. S. Booth for his innings of 50 not out against St. Bede's College.

The work of relaying the First cricket ground is progressing rapidly. Nearly 3,000 square yards have been put down this season. Three new rollers have visited the field this season. Of these the first was found to be cracked, and the second met with a serious accident in getting off the lurry. The third is with us still. It weighs about two tons when filled with water, and has already worked wonders on the ground.

We congratulate A. G. Baker on the fine form he has shown this summer for the Manchester Club. His best innings have been 82 not out against Whalley Range, and 51 not out against Cheetham Hill. He has also bowled with effect now and then.

The entry for the athletic sports is again a "record," no less than 202 boys having given in their names. This speaks well for the popularity of the fixture. The

prizes for the sports will be distributed by the Lady Mayoress of Manchester.

The School prizes will be distributed by Mr. Arthur Birley, one of the Governors of the School.

Michaelmas term will begin on Tuesday, September 11th, at nine o'clock. The Entrance and Scholarship Examination will be held on September 10th, at nine o'clock.

The Library.

Since our last number the Library has much increased, but the increase has been more in books than in members. While nearly a hundred books have been added, only about twenty new members have joined. This, although a very fair average, is lower than was expected, owing probably to the fine weather and the enthusiasm for cricket now prevailing. The books which have been recently added are of all classes, fiction, science, travel, history being represented, but not poetry. The foundation of a reference library, for the use of the upper forms, has also been laid. At present this consists only of a few works on science, history, and geography, and there is much room for improvement in this department, as there are many books which, without being absolutely indispensable, would yet be of great use to boys during their school career, and perhaps not much afterwards. During the last term a special committee for book buying was appointed, and the result of their work is seen in the increase of the number of books above mentioned. The only assistance the Library has received this term in the way of donations is the extremely acceptable gift from the School of a large bookcase, made in the workshop by A. Ll. Allen, E. A. Brown, and R. H. Pearson, to whom we owe our heartiest thanks for the time and trouble they have spent on it. The officers for the present term remain the same as before, except that Swinn has become treasurer. The Chess and Draughts

Club, having broken up, has presented the balance of their funds to the Library. The Library is only in its second term, and if it goes on increasing at the present rate, it will in 1897 embrace the whole School, and contain over 2,000 volumes.

CRICKET NOTES.

Although the weather has not been so favourable for cricket as last season, yet we have played matches on every half holiday with only one or two exceptions. The card has included three new fixtures—namely, Sandbach School, Hyde Grammar School, and Stand Grammar School. We found little difficulty in defeating the two latter, but with the former matters were far different.

In fact from our first match with Sandbach, which was played on their ground, we returned home crestfallen. for we were sadly beaten. But this defeat, coming as it did immediately after an even more serious reverse at the hands of the Old Hulmeians, incited our First Team to more assiduous practice. Since then they have steadily improved, and as a proof of this they had the gratification of winning the return match with Sandbach. We lost both of our matches against Bowdon College, but it is only fair to mention that in the first of these we were without the assistance of four of our best players. The return match with them was lost owing to our bad fielding, but with this exception the fielding throughout the season has been generally good, and has steadily improved from the beginning, which improvement we consider to be due in a large measure to our new form of practice games. The batting averages show that our team are strong in this branch of the game-in fact, every boy in it is capable of making a score. Wright, who has been the chief bowler this year, has been most successful with the ball. He has taken 54 wickets for 204 runs, thus having an average of 3.7 runs per wicket. Youatt has proved an excellent change bowler, for he has obtained the best average so far, having taken 17 wickets at a cost of 3.5 runs each. H. van der Veen, although he has greatly improved in batting, has not been so successful with the ball this year as last, chiefly on account of the unfortunate habit he has acquired of bowling to leg. Muth was elected captain of the team at the commencement of the season, and has justified his selection by the able manner in which he has performed his duties. The Second Eleven contains several promising cricketers, some of whom, we hope, will do as well for the First Eleven next year as they have done for the Second during this season.

In the lower games there is much room for improvement. There are many boys who have the making of really good cricketers who hardly ever touch a bat. Why they show this lack of keenness about the school games we are at a loss to understand. Some say that they do not like cricket, but the majority of these have either never played at all or have not played enough to give the game a fair chance. The hope of representing his school at some future time on the first or second team should in itself be sufficient stimulus to every boy to do his best to excel in the game. It should be remembered that in order to make real progress in cricket regular practice is necessary.

We were unfortunately only able to retain the services of Wall for the month of April. He left us to go to Rugby where we are sure that his services will be as much appreciated as they were by us. As a mark of the interest he continues to take in our cricket he has very kindly presented the bat for this season's best average.

In the early part of the season we were again favoured with a visit from Alec Watson, who treated the first team to some real county bowling for a couple of hours. The large muster of boys at the nets was sufficient to show how grateful we were to him for his visit.

This year most of our First Team will leave us. We sincerely hope that they will keep up their cricket, and we confidently expect to hear of many of them doing good service for the Old Hulmeians Cricket Club next season.

Muth's innings of 86 not out against Parkhurst is the highest score made for the School since A. R. Lowe made 102 against the Deaf and Dumb Schools in 1889.

Among the noticeable features of the season we may mention that four matches were played and won by the School on June 27th, in one of which our opponents were dismissed in their second innings for one run.

MUTH, H. B. L., captain, has made a very good captain, bats well, fields extremely well, and makes a good change bowler.

BOOTH, V. S., vice-captain.—Invaluable to the team; when once set is very difficult to remove, bowls with his head, and is very quick at coverpoint.

CLARKE, L. C.—The steadiest bat in the team, and a safe fielder.

YOUATT, E.—Hits freely, but not in style, has bowled remarkably well towards the end of the season, and is very sharp at point.

VAN DER VEEN, H.—Has batted well this season, but has not been quite as successful with the ball as last season; a fair fielder.

ROWBOTHAM, A. E.—Bats fairly well, but has not come off much this season; invaluable in the long field.

SWINN, C.—A very strong hitter, and has kept wicket well.

GREEN, C. J.—A capital longstop, can bat, and has lately come out as a bowler.

WRIGHT, J. H.—The best bowler in the team, bats well at times, but with a style of his own.

RAILTON, C. C.—A very careful batter, with a good forward play, and a sharp fielder.

CLARKE, R. G.—Plays a steady game, and is a good fielder in the slips.

BUCKINGHAM, H. (captain.)—A good bowler, and has captained the team with success.

Young, W. J. (vice-captain.)—A fair bat, with good hitting powers, but very little defence. Fields well in the long field.

CLASSEN, G.—A fair stumper, and has made some good scores during the latter part of the season.

ROBERTSON, J. B.—A good bowler and a fair bat, but is rather inclined to hit at every ball.

VAN DER VEEN, R. E.—Bats very well for his size, and fields well at cover point, when awake.

Atcheson, S.—Makes the ball go when he hits it, but does not always know where it is. A useful fast bowler.

ODDY, S. R.—A careful and steady bat, and has done some good service in the field.

MILLER, H.—Has frequently played for the First Eleven. A good steady bat.

MASON, R. L.—A poor bat, but bowls very well at times.

HOBDEY, C. W. G.—A very strong bat, but would do better if he kept the ball nearer the ground. A smart field.
