School Notes and News.

Mr. F. Adams, B.A., late Scholar of St. John's College, Cambridge, and assistant master in Bethesda County School, has been appointed to an assistant mastership in the School.

Mr. Owen has succeeded Mr. Kelsey as honorary secretary for Football. Mr. Kelsey has held the office for 19 years, and has seen the coming and going of several generations of footballers. It would not be possible in a few lines to do justice to the services he has rendered to the School Football during his tenure of the secretary's post. They stand recorded, imperfectly and indirectly, in the past numbers of this Magazine, but only those who can read between the lines know how much our past successes are due to his energy and keenness. Fortunately his services are not lost to the School; they have been secured

by Gaskell House, and, we hope, are duly appreciated in that quarter.

Mr. Fison also retires from the secretaryship for Junior Elevens, which has come to an end with the adoption of the House system and the reduction in the number of School Elevens. He has held the post for 12 years, and the School games owe a great debt to him. He reorganised the sides games, and brought the Junior teams to a much higher level of efficiency. In his case, also, the fruits of his labours as secretary are to be looked for, by those who can find them, in the records of the School games.

Mr. C. A. Wicks, M.A., formerly assistant master in the School, has been appointed Professor of Physics in the State Medical College, Colombo.

An Old Hulmeian, E. C. Allen, was captain of the Leicester Lacrosse Team which won the Southern Tournament at Lords on October 1st, out of 25 entrants. Allen's team had to meet four of the strongest Southern clubs before reaching the semi-final, in which they defeated Hampstead 4-3, Allen himself shooting the winning goal.

On September 9th and 10th C. H. Turnor, O.H., was successful in breaking the North of England 24-hours' unpaced tricycle record. The distance covered was 319½ miles, which is 5¼ miles better than the previous record. This is the second time this year that Turnor has ridden round the clock. In July he rode 342 miles on a bicycle.

The School Library.

Owing to the recent changes in the School buildings the Library was obliged to close during the summer months, but room has now been found for it in the Head Master's waiting-room.

It was re-opened this autumn, and we are glad to say that the membership is distinctly in advance of what it has been recently. We still think, however, that more advantage might be taken of it, especially by members of the Lower School.

We are intending to add 20 or 30 new books at the commencement of next term, and therefore hope for a good membership, because the increase of the Library depends almost entirely upon the subscriptions. The subscription is 5d. a term, or one shilling a year, and the Library is open every day after morning school.

Swimming.

The Annual Sports took place on Monday, July 25th, at the Leaf Street Baths. The improvement in the entries, which has been a noticeable feature since the transference of the races to the end of the summer term, was well maintained, a record total of 66 being reached.

Unfortunately it was found impossible to include any form of House competition without unduly prolonging the time occupied.

As usual the racing was very keen, and produced some fine contests. A notable advance was made in the Junior events, and we think that had it not been for the stop-watch provokingly getting out of order, there would have been some very fast times to record. The plunge dive was also better than last year in that the number of poor or moderate dives was remarkably small.

The skill of the Handicapping Committee was again shown in two very fine finishes for the Four Lengths Handicap. In this event we ought to condole with Whitcombe for coming second in both heats, each time by inches only.

Prize Day.

At the annual Speech Day, July 28th, the school prizes and certificates were distributed by the Rev. Noel L. Aspinall, M.A., Rector of St. Edmund's, Whalley Range, and one of the Governors of the School. There were also present Mr. Henry Worrall, Mr. Councillor

Stephen Edwards, M.A., and the Rev. F. W. Cooper, M.A., Rector of Prestwich. The Head Master who presided made his annual statement as follows:—

"A year ago we were fairly confident that we should be able to use the new assembly hall for our next annual gathering, but we reckoned without the builder and the makers of the special material which enters so largely into its construction. We must look forward to next year, when, with better accommodation, we shall not, as now, be obliged to compress our proceedings within the narrowest limits. The prize distribution and the sports will then be held on separate days. The building is now approaching completion, but our gratification at the prospect will be qualified by the existence of a debt of £800, and by the consideration that for lack of an additional £3,000 only a portion of the scheme has been possible. It may be useful to say that we cannot look to the Hulme Trust for any part of this sum, because, under a recent scheme, all its funds are allotted for many years to come. We stand, therefore, greatly in need of help from the private benefactor.

"During the past year we have had to regret the loss of Alderman Joseph Thompson, who represented the Corporation of Manchester on the Governing Body from the opening of the School in 1887.

"The honours which have fallen to the School during the year reach a fair average. At the Victoria University, E. Williamson has won the William Simpson Exhibition, and he was also *proxime accessit* for the Gaskill Scholarship. G. A. Evans has been awarded the Shuttleworth Scholarship and the Gladstone Memorial Prize. Mr. Evans has also obtained the degree of B.A., with first class honours in Economics and Political Science; he took the degree of B.Sc. in 1908, with first class honours in Mathematics, and is thus the first Old Hulmeian to win the distinction of a "double first." H. Browning has graduated B.Sc., with first class honours in Chemistry and the Leblanc Medal. H. Dearnaley and H. Cardwell have obtained second class honours with the degree of B.A. Eight Old Hulmeians in the Medical School have advanced another step towards their degree. Five boys have

passed the Joint Matriculation Examination in the first division, and two in the second. P. Dorrington has been awarded a Senior Secondary School Scholarship of the Manchester Education Committee. Old Hulmeians have taken their full share in the social and athletic life of the Manchester University; they furnish secretaries and treasurers of the College Societies out of all proportion to their numbers. Among appointments of former boys may be mentioned that of Mr. Ernest Classen to an assistant lectureship in German in the Manchester University; of Mr. Douglas Knoop as Lecturer in Economics in the University of Sheffield; and of Messrs. W. T. Hurst, D. C. Foster, and T. T. Foster to assistant master-ships in Grammar Schools.

"The Old Hulmeians Lacrosse Club have brought back to the School the North of England Flags and the Iroquois Cup (the Championship of England), which they have thus won three times in the last four years. Percy Courtman is still the breast-stroke champion of England, and he and H. C. Duffy have won the Lifeboat Saturday Shield for swimming. The latter is captain of the Manchester University Swimming Club and holder of the Mather Challenge Cup. F. B. Turner is captain-elect of the University Lacrosse Team. The London Association of Old Hulmeians held their first annual dinner in January last. They have more than 40 members.

"The internal history of the School during the year affords much cause for congratulation. There has been a considerable increase in our numbers, especially in the Preparatory Department, and the Governors have added a very welcome occasional grant to the regular endowment. The new scheme of the Board of Education, to which I referred last year, has greatly improved the status of the School, making it first grade by leaving age and curriculum. Since September last we have had Sixth Forms both in name and reality. Prefects, nine in number, were appointed for the first time last January, and they have done good service in the government of the school. But perhaps the change the boys will think the most important is the arrangement of the School in Houses, which was instituted in April last, the idea being borrowed from the

boarding houses of the great public schools. There are four of these Houses, called by names whose bearers have won honour for Manchester—the names of Byrom, Dalton, Gaskell, and Heywood. To each House are assigned two house masters and two prefects. Boys of all ages are distributed as equally as possible over the four Houses, the division cutting across that into forms. The object of the arrangement is to foster a healthy rivalry in all things which can bring credit to a House, and especially to rouse a keener interest in the games confined to our own boys as distinguished from matches with other schools. It has already produced excellent results in the competitions for the shields, the struggle for which is now fought out by Houses and not forms as heretofore. These competitions are now so arranged that every boy in a House can take a direct interest in them. The results of other athletic competitions, such as the sports of to-day, are referred to the successes of the Houses at least as much as to the credit of the individual winners. So far, the new departure has been an unqualified success. Last year I had to speak of some falling off in the enthusiasm of those boys who were outside the match teams, but under the new arrangement the lost ground has been retrieved, and the cricket season of 1910 will rank as one of the best in our history. Nor have our foreign matches suffered, for our representative teams have fully upheld the reputation of the School. But the emulation of the Houses is not confined to athletics; every distinction won by a boy is recorded in the chronicles of the house to which he belongs, and is so much more to its credit.

"It is my pleasant duty once more to acknowledge the hearty co-operation of my colleagues in all matters concerning the welfare of the School. This year has made larger demands on their time and energy than usual, and they have met them loyally and well."

The Rev. N. L. ASPINALL gave a most interesting address to the boys, and heartily congratulated the Head Master and staff on the progress made. He was thanked on the proposal of the Rev. F. W. Cooper, seconded by Councillor Edwards.

Old Hulmeians' Lacrosse, 1910=11.

The Old Hulmeians began the season with very favourable prospects. Last year's First and "A" Teams were practically complete, and although the "B" and "C" were not strengthened by any fresh blood from the School, a number of new members added considerably to the strength of these two teams.

The First have played 9 matches, winning 7, losing 1, and drawing 1, scoring 106 goals to 39. They have beaten South Manchester with comparative ease and drawn with Stockport, and it is hoped that with Harrison back in the team after Christmas they will be able to beat Stockport too. Their one defeat was at the hands of Monton, who beat them by 6 goals to 5. This was a big blow, but doubtless it will be a lesson to us to take things seriously. The team have had their good and bad days, as all teams have, but on the whole have played very well, and show promise of winning the Flags again.

It is some time since the "A" Team found themselves, as they do this year, in the 3rd round of the Lancashire Junior Cup. They have beaten Heaton Mersey Guild First and Monton "A" in the 1st and 2nd rounds respectively, and we hope they will be victorious in the final. The attack, although greatly handicapped by the absence of Blamey, have shown very good form, and when they like can play an excellent game. L. S. George is perhaps the best attack, and Dickinson shows great promise. In Ellam and Cardwell the weight lacking in the other members of the attack is found, and is used to great advantage. On the defence, there is plenty of weight, and a good understanding exists

between the players, but the weight is not used to advantage on many occasions, and consequently goals have been scored which might easily have been frustrated. Apart from the two Cup matches won, 7 League games have been played, 5 won and 2 lost, and 84 goals have been scored to 32. On the whole, the prospects of the "A" Team are excellent, and one looks forward to them not only winning the Cup, but reversing their defeats later in the season.

Perhaps the "B" Team have never been stronger than they are this season. Eight matches have been played, 5 won and 3 lost, 71 goals to 37. The team has, of course, suffered by its best members being called up on to the "A" Team. Their great strength lies in Levy, who has kept an excellent goal throughout, and on more than one occasion has practically won the match. Hobbins and Ashworth are the strength of the defence, receiving great help from Cartwright and Kalisch. O. Needham, F. W. Thompson, and E. E. Paul are the pick of a very good attack. On the whole, the team is very well balanced, and should be capable of holding their present high position, if not improving it.

On the other hand, one cannot but regret the poor results that have attended the efforts made to run a "C" Team. Greatly handicapped by the best players being called up to the "B" Team, the faithful few have done well to turn up under such gloomy conditions. After Christmas, it is hoped their luck will change, and that several of the team who have so far not turned out regularly will make an effort to do so, and thus keep the team together. Sargent, the captain, has played on the "B" nearly every week, and is well worth a permanent position on the team. Only 5 matches have been played, 1 won and 4 lost, and 20 goals have been scored to 65.

FOOTBALL NOTES.

In the present football season we have struck out new paths. It is the first in which the house system has been applied to our winter games, and several changes in old ways have followed. Fixtures with other schools have been reduced in number to allow of House matches in football and lacrosse being played on half-holidays. The number of our representative teams has also been reduced to two, the first and the second, so as to provide the grounds required on half-holidays for a larger number of players than before. Besides these changes, the dividing line has been removed between football and lacrosse, which has hitherto prevented boys from seriously pursuing both games together. Separate days have been allotted to football and lacrosse fixtures, and the full strength of the School can now be put into both games. To a certain extent then this season is one of experiment, and when it is over we shall have

to take stock and make whatever improvements or modifications may seem called for.

* * *

In one or two ways we have not been favoured by luck. It was unfortunate that we should lose just at this time so many of last year's School teams. It was also unfortunate that most of those who remained should happen to be gathered together in the same house. The results have been that our foreign matches have been played with lighter teams than usual, and some of the shield matches have been too one-sided to be of much use, as football, to either side. But both of these drawbacks have been accidental, and will right themselves in course of time. Previous years have shown that every now and then comes a falling off in weight at the top of the school; this year it was foreseen, and we have done better than was expected. On the other hand, the new system, although the unevenness of the houses has put rather a severe strain upon it, has been justified by success. It has brought more boys into the football field than ever played before. Never before this season have we needed seven football grounds, or had as many as 14 teams playing at the same time, as was the case on more than one half-holiday. Numbers, of course, are not everything, but the house system promises, we think, to make the most of the material available, and to raise the standard of play in the representative teams.

* * *

To return to this year's football teams. Naturally, as the great bulk of last year's first team has left, together with several members of last year's second, we have had to call upon members of last year's third and under 14 teams in order to complete our first team. The unavoidable consequence has been a lack of years and of robustness. Our light forwards have more often than not been overwhelmed by a far bigger defence, and excessive strain has been thrown upon our back division. The halves, splendidly led by Travis, have worked very hard, although the wing men are rather unpolished. This line, however, makes more conscientious efforts than last year's halves to give ground passes to the forwards. The forwards, with the exception of Bevan, are very slow. The inside left must learn to play

more closely with his outside man. The full backs seem to have no understanding with one another, and their tackling and kicking are alike feeble. They ought both to practise more shoulder charging. The goalkeeper has had a great quantity of work thrown upon him, and has done splendidly.

The second team has, we think, done somewhat better than last year, though it had a terrible experience against St. Bede's. What is wanted is more courage and energy among the forwards, who, with the notable exception of Hough, seem to lack skill. Ravald is an energetic captain.

Lacrosse.

NOTES.

As was predicted in our April number, lacrosse has made a great advance this term owing to the House system.
