<p><u>Week 3: Words with silent letters</u></p> <p>Spelling tip!</p> <p>Some examples of silent letter rules are:</p> <p>B is silent before 't' and after 'm'.</p> <p>C is silent after 's' and before 'i,' 'e,' or 'y.' C is also silent in the combination 'ck.'</p> <p>E is silent at the end of a word and makes the internal vowel a long vowel.</p> <p>GH is silent at the middle or end of a word, and when preceded by an 'i' the 'i' is long.</p> <p>K is silent in the combination 'kn' at a word's beginning.</p> <p>N is silent in the digraph 'mn.'</p> <p>P is silent in the combination 'ps' at the beginning of a word.</p> <p>W is silent in words beginning with 'wr' as well as in some other</p>	<p>Doubt</p> <p>Lamb</p> <p>Solemn</p> <p>Thistle</p> <p>Knife</p> <p>Thumb</p> <p>Salmon</p> <p>Crumb</p> <p>Gnome</p> <p>Wreath</p>
<p><u>Week 4: 'fer' words</u></p> <p>Spelling tip!</p> <p>The r is doubled if the –fer is still stressed when the ending is added. 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Week 5: -ant/ance/ancy and -ent/ence/ency

Spelling tip!

Use -ant and -ance/-ancy if there is a related word with a /æ/ or /eɪ/ sound in the right position; -ation endings are often a clue.

Use -ent and -ence/-ency after soft c (/s/ sound), soft g (/dʒ/ sound) and qu, or if there is a related word with a clear /ɛ/ sound in the right position.
