Editorial.

It is pleasant to record in this number the opening for school games of the new "Roberts Piece," and, as in fitting celebration of it, one of the best cricket seasons in the School's history. By the extension of the playground, which the generous bequest of the late WILLIAM ROBERTS enabled the Governors to carry out, we have now the enjoyment of the finest school field to be seen within many miles of Manchester. But such a possession should be no subject for idle boasting, for it carries with it a heavy moral responsibility; the School has to live up to its playground. And that it has done so this

cricket season with some degree of success, we hope the following pages will show. Of course King Willow is never laid to rest in his "green baize tree" without the true cricketer feeling some qualms of remorse, but this year they should be fewer than usual. The weather has throughout dealt very kindly with our fixture-card, and no less than 58 school matches have been played; of these 38 have been won and 12 lost—a record which shows the very satisfactory proportion of three wins to one defeat. There have been some very good individual doings—the record batting average for the School is held by LINDLEY, E., and 11 scores of over 50 have been made by batsmen

in school matches. Plenty of talent and zeal has been shown in the junior games, and we have no cause for despondence in looking ahead to next year's season.

The Head Master received the honorary degree of Doctor of Literature at the University of Durham on June 21st last. The day was observed as a whole holiday by the School.

D. Knoop has obtained the Commercial Certificate at Manchester University with distinction in all subjects.

Swimming.

Swimming is more popular than ever this year. Seventy-six boys are receiving lessons from two instructors, and rapid progress has been made. CRICKET NOTES.

Matches played, 58; won, 38; lost, 12; drawn, 8.

The Cricket Season of 1904 has been one of hard wickets and big scoring. The condition of the wicket has its effect even on school cricket, and it is not surprising to find that more runs have been made and more bats broken than in any other season within the recollection of any of us. Cricket captains have been spared the anguish of having to decide what plan to adopt in the event of winning the toss. Only one course has been reasonable—that of taking first innings for their own side, so that nearly all those cricket reports (and in their original form they are not a few) which lead off with the words “we won the toss,” almost inevitably proceed to relate further that “we decided to bat.” For winning the toss has been of no small advantage to an eleven. It has usually meant that they have had the privilege of making their opponents field for an hour or two under a very hot sun, and to the tune of a considerable number of runs, and when they were thoroughly tired out, the wicket getting worn, and the day becoming cooler, putting him in to try to knock off the required number of runs. There have been one or two exceptional occasions when captains, after winning the toss, have declined to take first innings, but their decisions have been due perhaps to a kindly indulgence of their opponents’ weakness or to strategy too subtle to be generally understood or appreciated.

On a wicket so favourable to the batsman, some very good scoring has been seen. An excellent record for the first wicket was made in the return match against St. Bede’s College, on our ground, by Lindley and Buckland, who opened our innings and were not separated until they had between them compiled 131 runs, Lindley scoring 80 (not

out) and Buckland 54. The best of our other totals were 113 for three wickets against Bury Grammar School, of which Jones scored 55; 126 for two wickets in the first match with Bowdon College, Buckland making 64 (not out); and 166 for two wickets against West Didsbury. In four other matches the century was exceeded.

Another interesting record has been established. Lindley, who began none too brilliantly, has lately played some fine innings, and has finished the season with the capital average of 28.9, which is three runs above the previous record held by F. E. Swindells. Buckland, who follows him, is three runs behind Swindells. Jones, Cooper, and Howard have secured very creditable averages; in fact, the averages as a whole compare very favourably with those of past years. It is in batting that the First Eleven are strongest, a fact due to the regular practice of most of the team, and, in no small degree, to Bennett’s careful coaching.

Of the 19 matches played, the First Team have won nine, lost five, and drawn five, a rather poor record compared with those of previous years. It is unfortunate that this should be so, particularly as the team is a stronger one than the School has had for a good many seasons; and it is only fair to state that of the five unfinished matches four were drawn considerably in our favour. The five defeats were all sustained during the first half of the season. Somehow it generally takes a little time for the team to settle down and play their best game, but it has been pleasing to remark a steady all-round improvement as the season advanced. The improvement has been specially noticeable in fielding. It was to bad fielding that the ill-success of the earlier part of the season was in a large measure due, but lately there has been a decided change for the better, and the ground fielding, catching, and throwing in are much smarter and more accurate.

But the chief weakness has been in bowling. What we have sadly needed has been a really good bowler—an Amos, a Wright, or a Swindells. Not that there has been an insufficiency of bowlers; there is not a member of the team who cannot bowl a very fair ball, and there have been a few exceptionally good performances, *e.g.*, Buckland’s six wickets for 7 runs, and three wickets for 5, and Howard’s four wickets for 7 in the

Warrington Grammar School matches. But there has not been much sting in the bowling. Howard heads the bowling averages, having taken 15 wickets for 7 runs each. He is closely followed by Buckland, who has borne the brunt of the attack, and has secured 42 wickets at an average cost of 73. Lister's average, and his performance of five wickets for 8 runs and six wickets for 11 in the Bury Grammar School matches, show that during his absence his services were missed as a bowler as well as a captain.

Our victories were gained at the expense of Bury and Warrington Grammar School in both matches. We also won our matches against the Parents' Team, Macclesfield Grammar School, and West Didsbury. We were defeated by Manchester and Salford Technical Schools, St. Bede's College, Heaton Mersey (B), and the Hulme Grammar School, Oldham. The last defeat was the most bitter of all, for it is most undignified for the elder sister to be beaten by the younger. The drawn matches were with Bowdon College (twice), St. Bede's College, Hulme Grammar School, Oldham, and Chorlton-cum-Hardy (2nd).

This season four fixtures were arranged with clubs other than schools—Heaton Mersey (B), Chorlton-cum-Hardy (2nd), Whalley Range (2nd), and West Didsbury—the reason for this being the difficulty of finding enough schools within reach to make a complete fixture card. The experiment has proved a success from more than one point of view. There is, of course, no intention of deviating from the time-honoured rule of playing boys only in all our matches with other schools, but there is every probability that a few matches, in which masters will play for the School, will be included in the fixtures of future seasons.

The annual match against the Parents' Team proved as interesting and enjoyable an event as ever. There was a large gathering of spectators, and 19 parents assembled to give battle to the younger generation. They were assisted by Bennett, but, on this one occasion, the boys were proof against all his wiles, and played with ease and confidence his most tricky and enticing balls.

The Second Eleven, after starting the season badly, have finished with a good record of ten matches won, three lost, and one drawn. As in the case of the First Eleven, steady progress has

been made throughout the season, and considerable keenness has been displayed. Dearnaley, with the excellent average of 22.5, Greenup, Bird-sall, and Cruse have been the most successful batsmen, whilst Longrigg, Williamson, Dearnaley, and Jackson have all done good work as bowlers. Decided improvement has been made by the team in fielding. There was certainly room for it, for in one single match no less than nine catches were dropped. Foster has ably captained the team during the greater part of the season.

The side games this term deserve some record. French I. has latterly turned out in great strength, Kilgour's bowling at times proving deadly. In Latin I. the placid content of Henderson when comfortably set is only equalled by the sorrowful resignation of the field; while Chapman, J. T., has shown promise with both bat and ball. But quite the keenest and best of the lower forms is Modern III., which has provided several members of junior teams. Their fame is written elsewhere. Unfortunately, games have been sometimes spoilt by boys failing to turn up after giving their names in to play. They overlook the fact that their side is depending on them, and that when they consult their own convenience and stay away, they spoil the cricket both for their own side and their opponents. We feel sure that if boys realised this there would be fewer absentees than is sometimes the case. The remark will apply equally to football. But there have been many keen and regular players, and the names mentioned above by no means exhaust the number of boys who have developed promise as bowlers and batsmen. As much cannot be said for the fielding, though there are notable exceptions, and boys should pay more attention to this, remembering that a smart field may be quite as showy and often more useful than a good bat.

The Third Eleven have won eight matches and lost only one. Orford has made a very good captain, and has shared with Norbury the honours both in batting and bowling. Good scores were also made by Allison, O. R., Greenup, H., Macpherson, and Lindley, F.

The Under 14 had an unbroken career of success until their seventh match, which was against South Manchester School, on a ground which required knowing. They have won six and

lost two. Greenup, G., has been captain, and has done his duties well. In batting Henderson made the top score of 47 (not out), while Greenup, Lea, E., and Cox have all done very well. In bowling Cartwright and Cox have been very deadly, and Greenup has also had his days. They are a smart team, and inspire confidence in the future of School cricket. The Under 14 2nd has been well captained by Livesley, R., and has won three out of four matches played.

In local cricket the School has been represented in Whalley Range and Chorlton-cum-Hardy by several Old Hulmeians, and in the former club also by Mr. C. A. Wicks, who has made 77 (not out) and other good scores, and has bowled very effectively, taking on one occasion six wickets for 8 runs against Knutsford. CHARACTERS OF THE FIRST ELEVEN.

LISTER, C., Captain.—Has not distinguished himself as a bat, but is a smart field at slip, and perhaps the best bowler on the team. Was unfortunately unable to play in several important matches, but has done good work as captain during the rest of the season.

BUCKLAND, R., Vice-captain.—Has played well throughout the season. A capital all-round cricketer, and has ably performed his duties on several occasions in the absence of the captain.

LINDLEY, E.—Has improved greatly during the season, and is the best bat on the team; has bowled effectively at times.

JONES, S. W.—Bats well, and has made several good scores, though rather unlucky of late. Fields well at long-stop.

WALKER, J. H.—Has had little success with the bat, but is a splendid field, and has proved a useful change bowler.

BRADBURY, R. J.—A fair bat, capable of making a score on occasion; a good long-field, and has had some success as a bowler.

COOPER, A. F.—Bats steadily, with a good style but should put a little more vigour into his strokes. A fair field.

TURNER, F. B.—Has improved greatly with the advance of the season; a good field.

HOWARD, G. G.—Has made some scores when most needed in a plucky but unfinished style. A very good field, and has bowled successfully on several occasions.

TURNER, S. B.—A poor bat, but gradually improving; a very indifferent field, and needs to practice catching and throwing in.

STOCKS, T. S.—Not much of a bat, but improving slowly. Stumps well as a rule, but has his "off" days.

FOSTER, D. C., Captain.—Has made a good captain. Bats well, and works very hard in the field.

DEARNALEY, H., Vice-captain.—Has made some excellent scores, and on more than one occasion his batting has won the match for his side. Fields well in the slips, and has bowled with moderate success.

BIRDSALL, F. A.—Bats with a nice easy style, and has bowled with success in one or two matches.

JACKSON, J. A.—Has bowled well at times, but needs to cultivate a better style in batting. Might be smarter in the field.

BREWIS, J.—Has played several good innings, and fields well in any position.

GREENUP, W.—Began the season rather badly, but has lately had considerable success with the bat, and is a safe long field.

LONGRIGG, S.—A fair bat and moderate field. Has improved greatly in bowling.

CRUSE, A.—Bats steadily, and has been useful at times as a bowler.

MCADAM, W. M.—Has kept wicket fairly well, and has made some good scores in a somewhat unorthodox style.

HOUGH, C.—Has been absent most of the term, but has made some good scores. A good change bowler.

WILLIAMSON, F. H.—Bowled well at the beginning of the season, but has fallen off of late. Ought to practice batting.

SIMPSON, G. F.—A steady bat, and makes runs at times. Should practice fielding.

BAUERKELLER, E.—Has fielded well at mid-on, but takes things too easily. Should practice batting.
