### Editorial.

"What so good when Time is sunny And the air is sweet as honey, As the game of crease and wicket, England's proper pastime, cricket?"

This year, grumblers may say that sunny days and balmy air have been rather the exception, and that, instead, we have had more than our share of cold and biting winds. Readers of this number will, however, admit that we have not allowed the unpleasant weather to interfere with our activity in cricket, though it does need some effort to look cheerful when umpires are wearing overcoats.

An enormous number of matches have been played—nearly 60, without counting Form

Matches. The First Eleven have come out with six wins, five defeats, and four drawn games (two in our favour); the Second have won ten, lost six, and drawn one; the Third have won six and lost five, while the best record is held by the "Under 14," who have won nine and lost two.

Throughout the School the popularity of the game has certainly increased this season. In the number of boys playing cricket on half-holidays the Games Register shows an improvement, even on the excellent figures of last season. Practically the whole of the junior forms turn out regularly, and there is a large number of boys in the School who have not missed playing cricket on any

occasion this term. The actual number of boys taking part in cricket on half-holidays has averaged 125.

The increasing success of Old Boys in local cricket is a pleasant feature of the season. For evidence of this we refer our readers to the long list of good scores made by Old Hulmeians, which we print in this number. In bowling, also, excellent work has been done.

### Swimming.

Three instructors have been engaged this season in teaching swimming, and over 90 boys are either under instruction or practising the art. About 60 boys, on the average, have attended the baths each Monday and Thursday, and we hope to have considerably over 100 swimmers in the School by the end of the season. We are afraid that it will be found necessary to raise the fee for instruction next year, as not less than three instructors are required for the success of the class, and the expense is hardly covered at present.

The School Races and Life-saving Competitions will be held in September next, and we hope to have a strong entry and keen rivalry. Three medals have again been offered by the Humane Society of Salford.

# In Camp at Aldershot.

We paraded at 10 o'clock on Saturday night at the Stretford Road Drill Shed, and marched as far as London Road Station, where, after some delay, we entrained at about 11-45 p.m. Notwithstanding the late hour, there were many hundreds of people to see us off. The journey was very tedious, as it was dark most of the way, and, being Sunday morning, we had to restrain our overflowing spirits somewhat. After numerous delays we finally detrained at the military siding, Aldershot, at 8-15 a.m. It was a beautiful morning, the sun blazing down with unusual force.

We had a march of three good miles to our camping ground, "Cove Hill," near North Camp. The tents were pitched on a slight rise, from which we had a good view of the Long Valley and Laffan's Plain. We were jolly thankful to get our equipment off at last, I can tell you. There being an unusual number of men in camp (nearly 1,000), we had to put up with 10 in a tent. There were five Old Boys in ours. We were served with breakfast at 10-30—bread and fried bacon. Then, as there was no parade, we employed the morning in straightening up generally. The dinner call was blown at two o'clock, and you may be sure were ready for it. The "menu" was roast beef, potatoes, and beans.

We found it rather crushed sleeping 10 in a tent, but, as it was fine, we managed fairly well. Of course, it meant one of us sleeping with his feet half-way up the tent pole, but small inconveniences like this have to be put up with when camping out.

We were hauled out at 5-30, and paraded at 6 o'clock. The drill consisted of manual, firing, and bayonet exercises. We were dismissed to breakfast at 8, and then had to clean up for dress parade at 10 o'clock.

The drill this year differed very widely from that of former years, being entirely the attack in extended order, the most essential part of which, we were told, was to seek as much shelter as we possibly could, even if it was only a blade of grass.

We came off parade about 2-30, and then had dinner. This finished the work of the day; but we did not feel like doing much beyond lying about on the grass, as the heat was terrible. Even by this time many of the fellows' faces were swelled beyond recognition. We heard there was a canal not far off, so some of us went for a bathe. When we got there we were told that if we went in we should get taken prisoners, and get seven days in "quad"; but we managed to elude the guards, and had a lovely swim. Military law is very strict at Aldershot; men are hauled up before the authorities for very slight offences. It was practically the same routine all week, except Wednesday, when we ("I" Company) had to go to Ashrange for a special musketry course. We had breakfast at 7 o'clock, and paraded at 9 in heavy marching order. It was the hottest day we had in camp by a long way, and it fairly burnt the skin off our faces, necks, and hands. We had a five-mile march to the range, then we started straight off firing at 300, 400, 500, 600 yards respectively. We had to fire 60 rounds in magazine volleys and rapid magazine independent. Considering this was the first time the magazines had been used, the work was got through very well. The firing at 300 yards was done with fixed bayonets. We marched back, and arrived at Cove Hill at 3-30. There is one very good thing about Aldershot, and that is that the natives make their living by selling lemonade, cake, pine-apple, sherbet, &c. I don't think there was anybody in "I" Company that day who did not drink over a quart of the various mixtures, besides eating numerous oranges, &c. A detachment of us (about 250) came home on Saturday, June 9th We had

breakfast at 7-30 a.m., and that was the last we saw of food or drink till 9 p.m., when we got home.

The second week was similar to the first, except on Monday, when there was a big field day, employing over 30,000 regulars and volunteers.

The remaining part of the battalion came home on June 16th. The men of this lot profited by our fast on the Saturday before, each man being served with a loaf of bread, piece of cheese, polony, two hard-boiled eggs, and some salt. Everybody enjoyed the camp, and said it was one of the best they had had at Aldershot.

The Annual Inspection took place the following week at Heaton Park; there were between 1,400 and 1,500 men of all ranks on parade.

### CRICKET NOTES.

Whatever may be said of the quality of this season's cricket, the quantity has been abundant. With cricket reporters reiterating dreary complaints against the weather, with dismal tales of matches cancelled, abandoned, interrupted, drawn, or postponed through rain, it surprises us, on looking back upon our record rain, it surprises us, on looking back upon our record for the season, to find that on only two half-holidays

has rain prevented play on the School Field. Consequently more matches, both home and foreign, have been played than in any previous summer.

We depended upon three of last year's First Eleven and five of the Second to form the nucleus of our First Eleven for this season. Of these, seven have played regularly for the First, whilst experiments have been made from time to time to find a "tail" worthy of so august a "body." On the whole, there has been no cause for regret in our choice of a tail. Frequently, owing to the monopoly of the batting by the body, it has had little opportunity of distinguishing itself in this department of the game; but on occasions when the body has seemed possessed of little or no life, the tail has shown signs of intense vitality. On one very memorable occasion it managed to make a respectable total out of what, by the ordinary rules of proportion, should have been our lowest aggregate score for the season. If only they had shown themselves equally alive in the field!

Our Fixture Card continues to undergo the process of change. Three schools, which we beat in all our encounters with them last year-Sandbach G.S., Lymm GS., and Park Hurst School, Buxton-for various reasons, have disappeared from this year's card. To fill the vacancies thus made in our list of fixtures, matches were arranged with Owens College (Second), Stockport G.S., and Chorlton Congregational, teams which our First Eleven had not met before. The Owens match was cancelled owing to rain. Stockport for many seasons have played our Second Eleven. Generally they have been beaten by us, but last season each team won one of the two matches. This year they desired to meet our First Eleven, and lost to them in both engagements. Chorlton Congregational, having been beaten by our Third Eleven last season, at the beginning of this played our Second Eleven, and met with the same fate. Nothing daunted, they attacked our First Eleven later on only to be beaten once again. Bury G.S. are old friends of ours, but for the last few years we have not seen anything of each other; now that Bury has become a sister school in connection with the Hulme Trust, it seems natural that we should exchange visits at least once ayear. We met Victoria College, Congleton, for the first time, on their ground. It will be remembered that our match with them last year was cancelled, owing to a common desire to see the Test Match at Old Trafford. They are not a strong team, and we found little difficulty in winning by more than an innings.

Of the 15 matches played by the First Eleven so far, six have been won and five lost, whilst four have been drawn—two of these decidedly in our favour. St. Bede's College and Bowdon College again claim victories—one and two respectively—at our expense. These schools have for a long time past been our strongest opponents, and it is gratifying to us that in the match against the latter at Bowdon we made a better show than ever before on their ground, losing the game by only four runs. The Masters Match once again resulted in a draw in favour of the School.

Two members of the First Eleven, Allen and McChlery, stand prominently above the rest, both in batting and in bowling. Allen, who was top of the batting averages last year, is again first, with the excellent average of 24.7, which is the next best on record for the School. He is followed by McChlery, whose average is 21.5.

Allen also heads the bowling averages, having secured 54 wickets at a cost of 5.03 runs each, whilst McChlery has brought about the downfall of 52 at the rate of 5.5. Both have in them the making Their batting is clean and of first-class cricketers. vigorous, and they bowl with accuracy and skill. Not only has Allen played capital cricket, but, what is of even greater importance, he has proved an able and resourceful captain, who should find his experience of great value to him in the same capacity next season. H. W. Green has rendered able assistance in bowling, having taken 22 wickets at an average cost of 5.9 runs, and Dearden has also been useful in one or two games. The latter has, however, been a distinct disappointment as a bat. He is a powerful hitter, and we had looked forward to great scores from his bat; but his prowess has been confined to practice games, and in matches, where it is most needed, it has been latent. A strange fatality seemed to pursue some of the First Team in the earlier matches. Only one score-the smallest of all possible scores-was registered by them in match after match with wearying monotony.

Coming to the second team, we find a record of ten matches won, against six lost, only one being drawn. The draw was with Salford Technical School, who won their return match with us. They are a much older and stronger team than our Second, and will, in all probability, meet our First next year. Our other losses were all due to indifferent fielding. Never have we heard of so many easy catches being missed in the course of a season, and the average per match must be a very high one. It is most disheartening to the bowlers, as it is demoralising to an eleven, for catch after catch to be dropped, some of them, too, of the easiest sort. The new fixtures this year were with Bury G.S. (Second), who lost both matches to us, and Sale Grammar School, who won the match at Sale, but were easily beaten on our ground.

Knoop has made a first-rate captain for the Second; in fact, quite as good as his brother, who so ably captained the team in 1895. He heads the batting averages with 17.1 runs per innings, and is followed by Wright and Frankish, who were only recently recruited for the team. Swindells is next with an average of 10 for three completed innings; and, after him, there comes a considerable fall. Humfrey has been invaluable as a bowler, having taken 47 wickets at a cost of 4.3 each. Phibbs, Bryceson, and Hough have also done good service with the ball. Several members of the team show excellent promise both in batting and bowling, and, with more experience and diligent practice, should become serviceable members of next season's First Eleven. But fielding must not be neglected, for, strange as it may seem, practice is needed as much in this branch of the game as in the others; and, whilst good batting and bowling may go a long way towards winning a match, bad fielding will go just as far towards losing it.

One cause of the indifferent fielding is, doubtless, the few opportunities the teams have had of practising together this season. The long list of Form Matches has crowded out almost everything else. These are 21 in number, and as each of them, as a rule, requires two nights to finish, Tuesdays and Fridays have practically to be given up to them. On Mondays and Thursdays there are, of course, previous engagements, which often prevent attendance at practice. It is plain that this state of affairs must be altered next year. Two ways suggest themselves: (1) to play off some of the matches on half-holidays, (2) to alter the nature of the Form Match arrangements, and, instead of the present League

system, to substitute the "knock-out" system, after the manner of the English Association Football Cup Competition. There will be plenty of time to think over these matters before next season.

We congratulate Modern V. and IV. on their securing the Form Match Championship. They thoroughly deserve the distinction, for they have played up well, and have shown great keenness. At the beginning of the season few thought that they showed any promise of being Champion Form, but they made the most of what material they had, whilst the a priori excellent chances of one or two other forms were spoilt by the slackness and lamentable lack of esprit de corps of a few of their members.

The Third Eleven have been captained by Norbury, R., and have played II "foreign" matches, of which six have been won and five lost. They have also been defeated in two very keen encounters with the "Under I4" Eleven. In batting, good service has been rendered by Wright, Young, Norbury, Frankish, C. W. Schroller, and P. M. Cooper, and the most successful bowlers have been Thomas, Norbury, and C. W. Schroller.

For the first time this season a Fourth Eleven has represented the School in cricket. This has, at any rate, served to raise the status of the Third Eleven, and we hope next season that more matches may be arranged for them. F. Mason has acted as captain on most occasions in which they have taken the field. Kennaugh made a good all-round performance for the Fourth, and was then promoted to the Third. The Fourth Eleven have won three and lost two matches, including a game with the "Under 14," in which the Fourth had a somewhat scratch team.

In the "Under 14" team we have been represented by as smart and keen an eleven for their age as one could wish to see. They have played 11 matches, winning 9 and losing two. Ford, C. M., has shown himself a steady and competent captain, keeping his men together well, and doing excellent service both in batting and in bowling. The success of the team is largely due to keen interest taken not only in matches, but in practice games. The fielding has been good, and the wicket-keeping, in the hands of Morrison, all that could be desired. Young, Swindells, and Ford have

done well in bowling; and, while most of the team have done good service with the bat, mention may be made of Swindells, Brister, J. F., Ford, Morrison, and Matthews.

Two "Under 12" Matches have been played, and aroused much interest among the keen cricketers of the junior forms. Sykes, R., who has done creditably on the "Under 14," acted as captain, and batted very well, as also did Champness. In bowling, Bradbury and Champness did wonders.

The Cricket "blazer" has proved a great success. Nearly a hundred have been sold, and during the warm weather it has been a favourite garb in the classroom. An air of smartness now pervades the cricket field, where a nondescript attire will soon be the exception. Whilst on the subject of costume, we may point out the room for improvement in one respect. There are many boys who possess flannels and will not take the trouble to put them on for half-holiday cricket. Now, apart from the slovenliness and discomfort of it, the game can only be properly played when one is properly clad.

Among the Old Hulmeians who have been batting well this season for local clubs, the names of A. G. and C. S. Baker have been most prominent for consistent good scoring. Both have been playing for Manchester, as well as Whalley Range, and the latter club numbers amongst its best batters and bowlers several other Old Hulmeians. Subjoined will be found a list of some of

#### CHARACTERS OF THE FIRST ELEVEN.

ALLEN, E. C., Captain.—Has been the mainstay of the team both in batting and bowling. As captain, has shown excellent judgment in the field.

Dearden, W. J., Vice-captain.—Has made a good change bowler, but has been a great disappointment as a bat.

GREEN, H. W.—A very steady bat, and has done good work with the ball; rather slow in the field.

McChlery, W. R.—An excellent bat, hitting freely all round the wicket, and has bowled with great success.

WIHL, E. T.—Bats in a style of his own, but has made some very useful scores.

Bradbury, L. A.—A careful bat, but should learn to hit. Fields well at cover-point.

Southam, L. M.—A good bat and a first-rate field. MUDIE, W. H.—Did not begin to score till rather late in the season. Has a very good style, but wants more confidence. Fields well at long-on.

DICKINSON, R.—A hard hitter. His fielding at longstop leaves much to be desired.

THOMPSON, W. S.—Has done good service as a wicket-keeper, and greatly improved as a bat.

JOHNSON, S. J.—A very fair all-round man, but has only played in a few matches.

KNOOP, D.-A capable and energetic captain. Has rendered valuable service with the bat.

HUMFREY, P.-Has bowled very well during the latter part of the season, and has made one or two good scores.

WIHL, H. S .- Fields well in the long-field, and lately has done excellent work with the bat.

BRYCESON, W. G -Has bowled well throughout the season, and is a steady batter.

Hough, H -The safest bat in the team. Fields and

bowls well. WEBSTER, J. S.—Takes the ball well behind the

wicket, but fails to stump anyone out. Needs practice in batting.

SWINDELLS, F. E.—A promising batter and bowler, but could only play a few times for the Second, owing to pressing engagements on the " Under 14."

JEFFERIS, F.-Has not had much opportunity of displaying his batting, and is slow in the field. Should practice more.

McNICOL, D.-A keen and safe fielder. Promises

well both as batter and bowler.

Phiebs, R. A.—Our best change bowler. Fields well at long-stop, but is by no means a safe catch.

WRIGHT, S —A hard hitter. Has shown good form on

the few occasions on which he has played.

GREEN, L. S.—Has hardly come up to expectations.

Plays well at times.

FRANKISH, A. (reserve).—Although he has only lately come on the team, has played very well.
