

# Editorial.

The progress of the work of levelling and relaying the field has been more than once referred to in this MAGAZINE, and from time to time a statement of the expenditure upon it has been published. So far about two fifths of the surface have been thus improved, and the cost has been defrayed by grants from the Governors and by liberal donations from a few friends of the School. But it is evident that a broader measure of support must be secured if the present somewhat slow rate of progress is to be quickened and the work done in a reasonable time. An appeal has therefore been issued to the parents of present boys and other friends for assistance in the completion of this work. About £500 will, it is expected, be required to level and relay the rest of the field, and nearly half that amount has already been subscribed. The circular has not yet been sent to Old Boys or their parents; this will be done next term, and we are confident that all will combine heartily in this effort to put the School field in proper condition. Readers of the Hulmeian need not be told of the importance of the games to our school life, and their future prosperity depends largely upon the success of the effort which is now being made.

The Cricket season, as the following pages show, has been of a very satisfactory character. The weather has been all that could be desired, and both the First and Second Elevens have gone through a long list of fixtures and with equal success.

This number ends the first volume of the Hulmeian, and those who wish to possess a complete record of the School games from the commencement should avail themselves of the arrangements made for purchasing the whole volume.

It is with deep regret that we refer to the sad death of Mr. Joseph Travis, J.P., one of the Governors of the School, who was drowned last January. Though associated more actively with the Hulme School at Oldham, where he lived, he took a great interest in our welfare, which he showed by his presence on several of our Speech Days.

We regret to record the departure from the School of Mr. C. L. Barnes, who has been with us since January 1892, and is now leaving through the curtailment of the annual grant made by the Withington District Council. His loss will be very seriously felt, and our best wishes go with him.

- G. P. Varley, B.Sc., has obtained an honorary research fellowship (tenable for two years) and a research student-ship in Chemistry at the Owens College.
- H. M. Sheaves has obtained the Performer's Diploma of the Royal Manchester College of Music, for the organ.

In all, 26 exhibitions (a considerable proportion of the whole number recommended by the Committee) and three scholarships are for this School.

G. Youatt has passed the Intermediate examination of the Institute of Chartered Accountants.

The Midsummer Examination in the School has been conducted by the following gentlemen, appointed by the Governors:—The Rev. H. Ellershaw, M.A., Classical Lecturer in the University of Durham, in Classics, Modern Languages and English; Mr. W. W. H. Gee, B.Sc., Lecturer at the Municipal Technical School, in Science and Mathematics; and in Drawing and Writing, Mr. F. G. Jackson, Second Master of the Birmingham School of Art, and author of Lessons on Decorative Design and Theory and Practice of Design.

The "hat-trick" has been performed twice in First Eleven matches this term, by C. W. G. Hobdey against Warrington Grammar School, and by J. Wihl against St. Bede's, and once in a Second Eleven match, by H. Crawford against Stockport Grammar School. To each of these bowlers a cricket ball has been presented by the Games Club.

Pairs of leg-guards have also been presented to C. S. Baker and G. Brewer, for their scores of 53 (not out) and 51 (not out) respectively in the St. Bede's match.

The School prizes will be given away on Speech Day by Professor Wilkins.

The prizes for the Athletic Sports will be distributed by Mrs. W. T. Arnold, who has kindly presented the first prizes (crosse and gloves) for the two lacrosse-ball throwing competitions.

A valuable desk has been presented by Mr. and Mrs. J. Southam as the prize for the 300 yards handicap, in memory of their son, John Southam, who won this race three years ago. Prizes have also been kindly given by Miss Hall for the half-mile race, Mrs. Tristram (bronze inkstand) for the 100 yards under 15, Mrs. Kelsey (barometer) for the 100 yards open, Mrs. F. E. Brown for the 80 yards, the Misses Barnes for the 100 yards under 13, Mr. O. C.

Ormerod for the sack race, Mrs. Green for the three-legged race, the Head Master for the consolation race, and by the Old Hulmeians Club for the 600 yards handicap.

There is a splendid entry for the Sports this year, already exceeding the record entry of last year. Up to the time of going to press 221 names had been given in. The Old Boys Race this year will be a half-mile.

# Swimming.

The Swimming Class has met twice a week at the Leaf Street Baths, and there has been an average attendance of 32 boys since April 23rd, when our season commenced.

Nearly all boys who have attended regularly can swim, and it has been decided to publish in the School Magazine a list of those who are efficient in swimming and diving.

There are occasions when some evidence of a boy's knowledge of swimming is required, and we hope, in such cases, that the lists which appear in the *Hulmeian* from time to time will be of service.

All boys who wish their names to appear in these lists must be able to swim 100 yards and dive satisfactorily.

The attractions of detention have been too strong for certain boys belonging to the Swimming Class, but slackness or a slight chill in the air have frequently kept boys from the Baths; when boys have paid their fee for instruction in swimming, it is their duty to turn up regularly.

We hope that all boys will practice swimming during the holidays, so that there may be a large entry and good racing in the September competition.

Last year several boys who were unable to visit the baths during the term arranged to receive lessons during

the holidays; we have no doubt that similar arrangements could be made this year.

# School Concert.

#### CRICKET NOTES.

We have had excellent cricket weather this season, so that all the matches arranged for both teams, with one exception, have been played. The exception is the Masters' Match, one of the most interesting of our fixtures, for which we hope that an afternoon towards the end of the term may be set aside. The Old Hulmeians have once more defeated us, but we showed better form against them than last year, when we were all dismissed for 12 runs. This defeat and that by Bowdon College on their ground seem to be annual events now. They are becoming almost monotonous and we should gladly welcome a change – if it were only a draw.

Of the 16 school matches played so far by the First Eleven we have won 8, lost 2, and 6 have been drawn. We have won both of our matches against Sandbach School and against Warrington Grammar School, and we have beaten St. Bede's College, Park Hurst School,

and Bury Grammar School each in one engagement. The two matches lost were against Manchester Grammar School and Bowdon College—both away, so that we have not been beaten this year on our own ground.

Three of the six drawn matches—those against Park Hurst School, Bury Grammar School, and Macclesfield Grammar School, all on our ground—were left decidedly in our favour, and had time allowed we should have scored three more victories, whilst not one of the three other matches was drawn against us. One or two changes have taken place in the original team, for we unfortunately lost the services of Birch about the middle of the season, and soon after Wihl, our vice-captain, was prevented from playing.

Perhaps the team is strongest in batting, for in spite of some individual inconsistency in the matter of scoring we have made 100 runs or more on seven occasions, and the average for each wicket throughout the season is over 10 runs. We have dismissed our opponents at the cost of 7.5 runs a wicket, and although this does not appear brilliant we must remember that the wicket this season has been on the whole in favour of the batsman. The 'hat-trick' has been performed on two occasions—by Hobdey against Warrington Grammar School and by Wihl against St. Bede's College. We have greatly missed the bowling of the latter in our later matches.

Our fielding in one or two of the earlier matches left much to be desired, but we have noticed a steady and satisfactory improvement in this branch of the game, and the match against Sandbach, when we dismissed our opponents for 28 and won the match by 6 runs, shewed that our team can field when they think it necessary. It is a pity that they have not always thought so, for a run saved is just as good as a run made from the bat, and a wicket thrown down is just as good as one bowled. To those who will be left for next year's team we would recommend the study of the Badminton book on cricket with special reference to the chapter on fielding. The book can be borrowed from the School Library or purchased from any respectable bookseller.

The Second Team have quite as good a record as the First Team. Of the 14 matches played not one has been drawn, and 11 have been won, and three lost. We have beaten every team we have played at least once. One of the matches lost was by one run only. The eleven contains some very promising players, who will doubtless render a good account of themselves in the First Team matches next year.

The First and Second Teams have been captained respectively by Clarke and Knoop, and both have performed their duties with zeal and success.

The eight Junior matches against Woodlands 2nd XI., Grafton House School, Chetham's Hospital, and Nicholls Hospital have resulted in six wins and two losses.

In the lower games there is not the amount of enthusiasm we should like to see. The Second Game soon disbanded, some going to the nets, others to the Third Game, and the larger number becoming spectators and not players. Consequently their ground was given to the Fourth Game, who have shown their appreciation of it by turning out in very satisfactory numbers. The Third Game, too, have generally had sides at twelve and at four. We have to deplore the fact that there are some who will not avail themselves of their opportunities of playing cricket—opportunities such as few schools like ours possess.

The Form Matches have been contested with considerable keenness. Modern V. and IV. are at the top of the First Division, having won all their matches. French III. are at the bottom, having lost all theirs. The latter could have done better had they taken more trouble to practice, but some of their eleven are never seen on the field except on the occasion when they "represent" their form by assisting it to the extent of a cipher. French II. head the Second Division, having beaten Latin I. and French I. twice each.

# CHARACTERS OF THE FIRST ELEVEN.

CLARKE, R. G., captain.—Has captained his team well; is the most consistent scorer on the team, and fields well at cover-point.

WIHL, J., vice-captain.—Has bowled very well, and can make runs at critical times.

VLIES, H. H.—By far the steadiest batter in the team, keeping up his wicket when others fail, and has been successful behind the wickets.

HOBDEY, C. W. G.—A hard hitter with a style of his own; bowls well occasionally, but would bat and bowl better if he practised more.

BIRCH, A.—Bats carefully, and can punish loose bowling effectively, but has not come up to expectations of late. A very good fielder at point.

Brewer, G.—A useful bat, but lacking in defence. Invaluable in the long field.

SEARLE, A. E. A.—Bats steadily, and cuts well. Has made a good change bowler.

BAKER, C. S.—A promising and pretty bat, who has not done himself justice lately. His fielding is not always first-class.

VAN DER VEEN, R. E.—Has proved a useful bat. Bowls well but is variable in the field.

MUTH, C. O. G.—Bats in a poor style but hits very hard. Has made a good long-stop.

ADSHEAD, J. D. M.—A free batter who cuts well. A very tricky and effective bowler.

BARTON, J. S.—Has only played in the First for half the season; has a good style of batting, and is a useful man at long-off.

## CHARACTERS OF THE SECOND ELEVEN.

Knoop, P., captain.—Has made an excellent captain, and is one of the best bowlers on the team. Bats with great vigour, and is a good field.

Leigh, E. H., vice-captain.—Has batted consistently well; fields best at third man. Has captained more than once lately.

JEFFERIS, P. J.—The best bat in the team, owing to his careful play; has made some good scores and bowled once or twice.

CRAWFORD, H. G.—The best bowler, having an excellent average; has also batted well in one or two matches.

Brown, H. P.—Fields well at point, and can hit hard when once set.

HOBBINS, W. A.—Has kept wicket well, especially of late. Hits very vigorously, usually being caught from a lofty hit.

GREEN, F. E.—A good change bowler, but cannot bat. Fields well at cover-point.

BRADSHAW, W. P.—A very good slow bowler, having been effective in more than one match. Has also batted very well lately.

WILKINS, A. K.—An excellent long-stop, and has helped to raise the score on several occasions. Can also bowl.

TYRER, P.—A very fast bowler, and will improve in batting. Can field well in the "country."

ALLEN, E. C.—A promising bat, but fields indifferently. With regular practice and more vigour will make a good cricketer.

# FIRST ELEVEN MATCHES.

Saturday, May 9th, v. Bury Grammar School. Played on our ground. Drawn. Winning the toss, the visitors put us in to bat. Runs came slowly at first, and Vlies could get no one to stay long with him until Birch joined him when three wickets were down for 25. The two put on 20 runs, of which Birch contributed 14, but he was caught with the score at 45. Seven men were out for 56 when Baker partnered Vlies, who all along had played a very steady game. The two left-handers by good cricket brought up the century, and were not out when the innings was declared closed at 104 for seven wickets. At first our opponents fared badly, four wickets falling for 10, but afterwards their batting improved, and we were unable to dismiss them all before time, when six wickets were down for 46. The play of our whole team was satisfactory, Baker signalising his first appearance in the team by first-class batting. The fielding all round was good. Brewer being prominent in the long field.
