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Editorial.

The past term has been on the whole a very successful one for school football. We have seen one of those revivals of enthusiasm and keenness which appear periodically like the ebb and flow of the tide. This keenness has been chiefly noticeable in the Junior elevens of the school, who have had a larger programme than usual provided for them. We have on several occasions had five elevens in the field on a single afternoon, and the result has been the steady supply of young recruits for our older elevens. The first team has done well, but might have done better. There is

quite a sufficient amount of skill in the team to have enabled them to win most of their matches, but the necessary proportionate element of dash has frequently been painfully wanting. The eleven have played best in their losing games. Against Macclesfield and St. Bede's the team played resolutely and with considerable energy; but the Warrington, Bury, and Bowdon (return) matches were drawn or barely won after having most of the game.

A School Union Society has been formed this term for the purpose of holding debates and lectures, and encouraging original scientific and literary work among its members. Over forty boys have now joined, and the majority of these have already either spoken at debates or in other ways taken an active part in the work of the Society. Several of those who have joined most regularly in the discussions have shown a marked improvement both in style and matter, and should develop into capable speakers. We can hardly overrate the importance of learning to speak in public, to boys who may later be called on to take their share in the government of a great city. There may be Lord Mayors among us. We are not all brilliant orators yet, but we are on the way, and we should get there sooner if members made a point of getting up on their feet at every opportunity. A chance should never be missed.

Hardly less important is the other side of the Society's work. Boys have a definite object in leisure work of any kind. They can sum it up from time to time in a lecture or paper; or, if their hobby is of a practical sort, the exhibition of their results at the conversazione which closes the term will interest others and stimulate their own keenness.

* * *

The success of the Society must depend on the energetic support of the boys themselves. Every meeting means much solid work behind the scenes, and the work is for the boys to do. The reports of the meetings, which appear elsewhere, show that that support has been fully given, but they only partly show what the Society owes to the work of the boys' Committee, and to the keenness and ability with

which they successfully met the many difficulties that were new problems to nearly all of us.

The Hulme Grammar School Union.

At a meeting of representatives of the three highest forms, held at the beginning of the term, it was resolved that the formation of a society for

debates and lectures was desirable, and officers were elected to carry out the idea. The School Library Committee decided later to affiliate that useful institution with the Union, of which it now forms a branch organisation. Appointments were also made by the Society with the object of arranging and extending the School Museum. An attractive syllabus of meetings has been drawn up by the Committee, of which we give a brief report below, so far as the programme has already been carried out. Preparations for a mock trial and a social gathering are being made as we go to press.

The first meeting was held on Tuesday, September 27th; the Rev. J. F. Tristram in the chair. There was an impromptu debate, and volunteers were called for to draw for the duty of proposing and opposing six resolutions, the subjects of which were unknown to the House.

S. B. Turner proposed "That in the opinion of this House people should not wear hats," and was opposed by F. M Gilliat.

H. E. Walker proposed "That a scientific education is of more advantage than a classical one," and was opposed by G. G. Howard. G. A. Evans supported the motion, and Mr. Salisbury spoke against.

Mr. Morley next discussed the question "If a man catches hold of a tiger's tail, should he hold on or let go?" and proposed that he should. He was opposed by R. J. Bradbury,

G. A. Evans proposed "That the evacuation of Lhassa was a grave mistake," and was opposed by Mr Hewlett.

Monday, October 17th.—At this meeting a lantern lecture was given by Mr. Salisbury on "The Sun, Moon, and Stars." S. R. Best worked the lantern. Many interesting slides were shown, including the comparative apparent sizes of the sun to various planets of the solar system; also the comparative sizes of the planets themselves, accompanied by actual dimensions. There were also slides of solar eclipses of sun spots, and of the moon in its various phases,

Monday, October 24th.—On this day a general business meeting was held, the Rev. J. F. Tristram in the chair. It was settled, after some discussion, "That new members elected after October 24th, 1904, shall pay an entrance fee of sixpence before attending any meeting of the Society," and "That members pay a terminal fee of threepence, except for the term in which they are elected."

Tuesday, October 25th.—At this meeting (the Rev. J. F. Tristram in the chair) a lantern lecture was given by Mr. J. Dorrans, on "Timber Trees and Their Structure," S. R. Best working the Mr. Dorrans illustrated his lecture by many interesting slides, the first being one of a giant tree in America. Others illustrated the functions of the cells in wood, and there were others of tree sections. A series of very interesting slides showed the way in which a tree heals over a place where a branch has been properly sawn off. There were also slides of seeds and seedlings. G. A. Evans proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Dorrans.

Thursday, November 3rd.—The third debate of the Society was held on the above date, the Rev. J. F. Tristram in the chair. G. A. Evans proposed "That the present Government is undeserving of the support of the nation,"

and was opposed by F. M. Rowbotham. There also spoke: for the motion, C. Mason and Mr. Tristram; against the motion, A. Andrews and Mr. Salisbury. The Government had a narrow escape, the voting being: for the motion, 9; against, 10; majority against, 1.

Monday, November 7th.—At this meeting (Mr. Franklin in the chair) S. R. Best gave a lecture on "The History and Chemistry of Photography."

After referring to the various uses of photography, Best lectured on the history of photography, illustrating it by many excellent drawings showing the growth of the modern camera from a dark room with a white wall and a small hole in the wall opposite.

The second part of the lecture was on the chemistry of photography. Best gave a sketch of the ancient methods of developing, and then illustrated the modern methods by experiments, mentioning the different substances used. S. G. Birks proposed a vote of thanks.

Monday, November 14th.—On this date the fourth debate was held, Mr. Hewlett in the chair. H. E. Walker proposed "That home work should be abolished," and was opposed by S. R. Best. S. W. Jones spoke for the motion, and Mr. Salisbury against. G. A. Evans proposed, as an amendment, "That home work in moderation is a good thing," and was supported by F. B. Turner. There also spoke: for the amendment, Mr. Wicks and Mr. Hewlett; against, A. Andrews and Mr. Franklin. The amendment was carried. A vote of thanks was proposed to Mr. Hewlett by R. J. McNicol.

Monday, November 21st.—At this meeting (Mr. Franklin in the chair) a lecture was given by G. A. Evans on "The Ashantee War," which was illustrated by a map and black-board diagrams. Evans described the expedition of 1873-74, under Sir Garnet Wolseley, against the Ashantees, the decisive battle of Amoaful, and the Ashantees, the decisive battle of Amoaful, and the burning of Coomassie. The motion was carried, the voting being; for the motion, 15; against, 10.

Prize Day.

The Annual Distribution of Prizes took place on the afternoon of July 28th, and there was a large attendance of parents and friends. The Head Master took the chair, and there were also present Mr. Henry Webb, Mr. E. Donner (Governors of the School), Miss Ashton, and Mr. Thomas Price.

The HEAD MASTER, who appeared for the first time in his D.Litt. robes, made the following statement:—

" For the eighteenth time it is my duty to submit to you some account of the internal history of the School during the year. It will probably be found, by those who have often been present at these annual gatherings, that the statement of this year bears a strong family resemblance to its predecessors. That is in the nature of our work inevitable, and, however irksome the absence of variety may be, altogether desirable. The internal history of a school is generally most satisfactory when it is least diversified by change and incident, and we ought to rejoice at the absence of any special marks to distinguish this year from those which have gone before. Yet it has not been altogether without change for the better. Thanks to a substantial increase in the endowment assigned by the Governors, the staff has been strengthened by the addition of a master, and a considerable alteration in the organisation of the School has been made possible, whereby the work of the upper forms in particular has been better arranged and more adequately provided for. The total working time of the week has been slightly increased and the

duration of the lessons has been considerably shortened, with a corresponding increase in their number, which is a decided improvement, more particularly in connection with the oral teaching of modern languages. The services of the second science master, provided out of the educational funds of the Withington District Council, have been enjoyed for yet another year, and it is to be hoped that whatever changes may take place in our local government, there will be a continuity of policy in this matter so important to the welfare of the School. The staff might with advantage be even larger than it is at present. That the work of the School during the year has been marked by steady industry and considerable achievement will, I think, appear from the judgments expressed by the examiners appointed by the Governors. Their formal and detailed reports are submitted to the Board of Governors at their autumn meeting; but by their courtesy I am able to give you their general impressions of our school work. In the case of two of them these have been acquired by detailed inspection of the forms as well as by written examinations, and this is the third year of office for all three examiners. Professor Gee, of the Manchester School of Technology, has examined the school in mathematics and science; Mr. E. R. Taylor, formerly head-master of the Birmingham School of Art, in art and writing; and Mr. A. G. Latham, lecturer in modern languages at the Newcastle College of Science, in languages and literary subjects.

Turning to another popular indication of the merits of a school, namely, its success in external examinations, it should be pointed out by way of preface that the main purpose of this School is to prepare boys for business life, and that therefore the great majority of the boys have no opportunity of distinguishing themselves in examinations. For it has not been our practice to encourage boys to enter for any competition in which success was not directly valuable to the boy himself. The greatest success of the year is undoubtedly the first place in the examination for admission to the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich, won by G. B. F. Smyth. He obtained very high marks in this important competition, for which special classes are held at many of the large public schools. In the recent competition of the Lancashire County Council the first place among the winners of Scholarships fell to L. Clarkson, the head of our Scholarships fell to L. Clarkson, the head of our modern side. At the Owens College, G. W. A. Foster has obtained the 1851 Exhibition Scholarship of the value of £150 for two years, and D. C. Foster has obtained the Hulme Entrance Scholarship of £40 for two years. E. Classen has been awarded a the force in the competition for the Shuttleworth scholarship.

"At the Preliminary Examination of the Victoria University, D. C. Foster and C. Lister have been placed in the First Class; C. G. Brentnall, A. Jones, and E. O. Jago in the Second; E. H. Cox and R. T. Slinger have passed Part II. of the Victoria University Final in Medicine; and Slinger was awarded honours; R. A. H. Atkinson and P. G. Pell-Ilderton have taken the degree of M.B. in the Manchester University; J. H. Webster has passed Parts A and B of the Second Examination in Medicine; D. Knoop has obtained the Commercial Certificate of the Manchester University with distinction in all subjects; L. A. Bradbury has obtained the Greek Testament prize for second year men at Emmanuel College, Cambridge. In the Lancashire County Competition, S. W. Jones was awarded a Senior Exhibition, E. Wood and H. N. Johnson Junior Exhibitions. The mention of this last competition leads me to speak of impending changes which are likely to seriously affect the prosperity and success of the School. During the last nine years our position in the area of the administrative county has opened to our boys a competition in which they have won 16 Scholarships and 136 Exhibitions, of a total value of nearly £5,000. The Scholarships have served a very useful purpose in carrying boys to places of higher education. But the direct importance of the Exhibitions to the School cannot be over-rated. They were mostly held in the School itself. They came just at the right time in the life of a clever boy to induce him to remain another year or two at school, and have often proved the stepping stone to higher distinctions. During the past year no fewer than twelve boys who occupy the highest places in our top forms, have been holders of these Exhibitions. Now, it is most unfortunate that in the scheme of the Manchester Education Committee, there is no corre-

sponding provision for the encouragement of higher work in the secondary schools, and unless the gap is filled up here by the munificence of the private benefactor the work of the whole school is bound to suffer.

"Only a passing notice can be given to the games of the School. Our lacrosse team last winter was probably the best we have ever had, and the moderate cricket team of 1903 was succeeded by one which went on improving all the season of 1904, and in the latter half it was of very high merit. The fine weather of this summer term and the improved playing field have had a gratifying effect on the enthusiasm of the rank and file. In this connection I must not omit to mention the remarkable success of the Old Hulmeians' Lacrosse Club. They have won the shield of the Second Division of the North Lacrosse League with a remarkable record, as well as the North of England Junior Flags, and have made their way into the First Division of the League for next year, where their performance will be watched with the utmost interest by all Hulmeians, past and present. The School is fortunate in the strong attachment of a large and growing number of old boys, as was testified by the marked success of their second annual dinner in April last. I take once more the welcome opportunity of thanking in public my colleagues for their unstinted support and the enthusiasm they have brought to bear on the manysided activities of our school life. And I rejoice to be able to say that the conduct of the boys generally has maintained a high standard."

Mr. Henry Webb (Governor of the School) distributed the prizes. After congratulating the Head Master in the name of the Governors, parents, and boys on the honour recently conferred on him by the University of Durham, he addressed himself to the boys, and dwelt upon the value of sincerity and genuineness. He referred also to the prospect of a change in the constitution of the governing body, which would secure a closer local interest in the School.

Mr. E. Donner (Vice-chairman of the Board of Governors), in moving a vote of thanks to Mr. Webb, referred to the inconvenience of the room in which the prize distribution ceremony was always held, Many people had to be kept

standing outside the doors, and he wondered whether it would be possible to have a larger room provided. He would do anything he could to further such a desirable object.

Mr. Thomas Foster seconded, and spoke as the father of three boys, all of whom had gained scholarships from the School at the Victoria

University.

The most important business was the proposal to alter the rule relating to subscriptions. The Committee recommended an increase in the subscription for playing members, as, judging by the last year's accounts, the present subscription was not enough. They also recommended that the subscription for honorary members be reduced to 2s. 6d., as it was thought a more nominal rate for honorary members would induce many more Old Boys to become connected with the Club.

After discussing the question, Rule 8, in the following amended form, was finally adopted:—

"Rule 8.—That the annual subscription for playing members be 10s., due on the first day of October in each year; provided that, if the subscription be paid on or before the 31st day of January next succeeding that date, the amount thereof shall be reduced to 7s. 6d. The subscription of any member elected after the latter date shall be 7s. 6d., and be due on election.

"That the subscription for all Old Boys joining the Club as playing members after September 14th, 1904, shall be 5s. for the first two seasons after leaving school, the same to be due on the 1st of October in each year; if elected after that date, to be due on election.

"That the subscription for non-playing members be 2s, 6d."

The meeting concluded with a hearty vote of thanks to Dr. Hall for presiding.
