## Editorial.

An active and enjoyable cricket season has been spent, in which we have, on the whole, been favoured by the elements. At the commencement cold weather prevailed, and one of the earlier fixtures had to be cancelled through snow, but of late cricket weather of the most approved type has been the rule, and throughout the season no matches have been stopped by rain. Rather fewer have been played than last year, on account of the lengthened holidays at Whitsuntide.

The First Eleven have won six matches, lost three and drawn four; one of the latter, by the way, was a tie, and may be regarded as

only one run short of a win. Though the Second have not done so well as the First, they have a balance of wins in their favour, and have won seven, drawn one and lost six. A number of junior matches have been played, of which seven have been won and one lost. These matches are excellent things for the lower games, and it is a good sign that, instead of dropping off, the Third and Fourth Games have shown increased activity and keenness as the season went on. The Form Championship has been fought for with much spirit, and if no hidden talent has been brought to light during the competition, it is not because every boy does not get his chance.



## School Notes and News.

Mr. C. H. Crombie, B.A., of Worcester College, Oxford, has succeeded Mr. Shorrocks as science and mathematical master.

J. McP. Miller has obtained a Second Class in the Victoria University Honours School of Chemistry, and has taken the degree of B.Sc.

H. M. Sheaves has passed the first and second examinations in the Faculty of Music of the same University. He has also won the prize in the second year harmony class at Owens College.

F. R. Sawdon has passed Part I. (Chemistry and Physics) of the first examination of the Victoria University in Medicine.

F. G. P. Ilderton has passed the Victoria Entrance Examination in Arts (Faculty of Medicine).

A. Payne has been successful in the Intermediate Examination of the Incorporated Law Society, held last April.

In the examination for the Baker Chemical Scholarship at Owens College, G. P. Varley, B.Sc., was awarded a prize of £10.

J. Allner has obtained an entrance scholarship of the value of £40 a year for three years at Weymouth College.

The award of the Lancashire County Council scholarships and exhibitions, the examinations for which were held in April last, has not yet been made.

Second Eleven caps have been given to E. C. Allen, H. C. Swindells, F. G. P. Ilderton, O. J. Wilkinson, F. Barrett, and T. G. M. Hobdey.

A cricket bat has been presented to A. E. A. Searle, Captain of Cricket, for his score of 77, made for the First Eleven against Park Hurst School, and a pair of pads to R. E. van der Veen for his score of 58 (not out) in the same match.

O. J. Wilkinson has also been awarded a pair of pads for making the score of 72 in the Second Eleven match against Grafton House School.

A. G. Baker has been scoring in fine style for the Manchester club of late. He made 108 (not out) against Urmston, and (not out) 154 against Chorlton-cum-Hardy. On Saturdays he generally represents Whalley Range, and another old boy, H. J. Amos, has joined the same club.

Old Hulmeians are getting scattered over the globe. H. R. Classen has gone to Para in Brazil, A. C. Crighton to Shanghai, and H. B. L. Muth to Milan.

## The Sports.

The Athletic Sports will be held after the Distribution of Prizes on Thursday, July 29th. As usual there is a splendid entry, showing the popularity of this our great open-air function. Not fewer than 237 boys have entered their names, so that practically the whole school is in for something. This is a larger entry than ever before, and to mention separate events there are 184 competitors for the 300 yards handicap, 66 for the 600 yards, 57 for the 100 yards under 15, and 72 for the three-legged race. No change has been made in the list of events, except that the 100 yards race under 13 is abolished, and a 100 yards under 12 substituted for it.



Prizes for various events have been very kindly given by the following ladies and gentlemen:—Miss Hall (Half Mile), Mrs. Tristram (100 yards under 15), Mrs. F. E. Brown (100 yards under 12), Mrs. C. E. Kelsey (100 yards open), The Old Hulmeians (600 yards), W. Norquoy, Esq. (dressing case, for the 300 yards), and The Head Master (Consolation Race).

Boys in for the cricket and lacrosse ball throwing should note that these will be held on Wednesday, July 28th, at five o'clock sharp.

On the afternoon of the Sports boys should keep off the course except when actually competing for an event. Most of the races will of necessity be run in heats, and boys should be careful to get in the heat for which they are down on the programme. A boy who runs in the wrong heat not only disqualifies himself but frequently spoils some one else's chance.

The Old Hulmeians Race, which this year is 220 yards, is placed as late as possible in the programme, for the convenience of competitors coming out from town, and will not be started before 5-30.

## Swimming.

The Swimming Class has attended the Leaf Street Baths on Mondays and Thursdays throughout the term; fifty-two boys have been receiving instruction from the professional, and all those who have attended regularly are now able to swim.

The School Races will take place within the first fortnight of next term, and every member of the swimming class should practice during the holidays in order to be able to take part in at least one event. For the Beginners' Race it is only necessary to be able to swim one length (twenty yards).

There are probably a number of boys who will spend a portion of their holidays at the sea-side; we hope these fortunate individuals will bathe regularly and become efficient swimmers before next term.

We regret to see that some good swimmers in the school are still unable to dive from the surface of the water. We would remind them that they cannot be considered efficient till this difficulty is overcome.

Two years ago special arrangements were made for boys to receive swimming lessons at the Leaf Street Baths during the summer holidays. We have no doubt that similar arrangements could be made this year, provided sufficient names were handed in. This is a good opportunity for our keen cricketers; by-the-bye we hear rumours of several members of the First Eleven having

had a good time in the bath at Sandbach; we hope that on similar occasions in the future every member of the team will be able to receive that enjoyment from a plunge which can only be obtained by possessing a knowledge of swimming.

The baths have been so crowded by beginners this term that there has been no opportunity of holding the tests of efficiency in swimming and diving. This will be done after the holidays, and our next number will, we hope, contain a goodly list of efficient.

## School Concert.

The seventh School Concert was held this term on June 3rd in the evening. There was a very good attendance, though the Central Hall was not uncomfortably crowded. As was the case last year a charge was made for the tickets, and a net profit was realised of over £6, which was devoted to the School Field Fund. The chief novelty in the programme was in the performances of the School Orchestral Society, which has only come into existence during the past year, and which made its bow for the first time at this concert. The task of conducting was very kindly undertaken by Mr. C. L. Barnes, whom we were very glad to see again at the School, and we may say at once that the Society fully came up to the expectations which had been formed as to its success. Dolmetsch's quaint old-fashioned suite was given with much appreciation, but perhaps the best performance was that of Schubert's charming Ballet Music, of which after a somewhat unsteady opening an enjoyable rendering was given. Our thanks are due to Mr. A. G. Baker for his very kind assistance in the orchestra. Davies gave an excellent performance of Handel's delightful Allegretto, and Dehn played a lively tarantella by David.

In the part songs we had the kind assistance of Messrs. Bally, A. L. Hewlett, Dennis and Joseland; and of these "Ye spotted snakes," "Pack, clouds, away," and "The merry dwarfs" all went very well. The sopranos include a large number of small boys of whom we expect more in the future; they were heard to advantage in the three-and-two-part songs in the second part, both of which were very prettily sung. Allen and Barrs sang their duet



nicely, and Pownall gave a most enjoyable rendering of "Nymphs and Shepherds," and in the second part sang the "Cradle Song" of Somervell's with great feeling. His voice has naturally lost some of its range but gained in richness since last year. Mr. Payne's deep bass was an effective contrast in the programme, and his songs were much appreciated.

Mr. Joseland has sung at all the School Concerts which have been given up to the present, and as he is about to leave Manchester to take the headmastership of Burnley Grammar School, we take this opportunity of thanking him once more for all his kind and able services, and wishing him every success in his new work.

## CRICKET NOTES.

The weather at the beginning of the season was not all that could be desired for cricket, for the first part of May was exceedingly cold, and cricket correspondingly unpleasant. It is not often that a cricket match has to be cancelled owing to the ground being covered with snow, but such was the case this year, the match with Park Hurst School, at Buxton, which should have been played on May 12th, being prevented on that account. With the warmer weather came increased enthusiasm, and more regular practice throughout the school.

Although the weather has interfered with only one of our matches, four others have for various reasons not been played, namely, the two matches with Bury and the returns with Bowdon College and Lymm. The record of both the first and second elevens, although satisfactory, is not so good as last year. The first team last season won 8 matches, and lost 2 only; this season they have won 6, lost 3, and drawn 3. One match, that against Warrington Grammar School, on their ground, resulted in a tie. Both of our games with the Old Hulmeians have been drawn, one of them considerably in our favour. In former years we have been invariably beaten by the Old Boys, and it is some satisfaction that we have this year at least escaped defeat. Who knows but what we may win next year? It will, of course, depend very much on the team the Old Boys get together. We find, for instance, that we can do very much better against them when A. G. Baker and Amos are absent from their team. In future years we shall probably meet them once only during the season, as they find it difficult to get a team together. The other drawn match was with Sandbach on our own ground. In the



return match with them at Sandbach we were beaten very easily. The annual defeat by Bowdon College, on their ground, took place as usual this year. One would like to know if we are ever going to win a match on the Bowdon College Ground. It is a matter of rare occurrence for the first team to be beaten on the School Field. Last year it did not happen at all, but this year St. Bede's College lowered our colours, making 95 runs, and dismissing us for the small total of 33. In the return match, on their ground, however, we had the pleasure of wiping out this defeat by scoring 90 to their 34. The five other matches won were those against Warrington Grammar School, Lymm Grammar School, Park Hurst School, Macclesfield Grammar School, and Stand Grammar School.

We are glad to record the steady improvement of the team from the beginning of the season. There was certainly room for it in one respect at least, for in the earlier matches it was painfully evident that our fielding was not all it should be, and we failed to win two of these owing to catches being dropped. This improvement has been due chiefly to the regular practice of the majority of the team. The minority took some little time to grasp the fact that they needed any practice beyond what they got in matches. It is a pity we have to be defeated, as we were by St. Bede's in the first match, before all members of the team will realise one of the first laws of cricket—that it cannot be played, even decently, without practice. The season has, on the whole, been very favourable for batting, and the team have given a good account of themselves in this branch of the game. They have made over 100 runs on five occasions, and the average for each wicket is about 10 runs. Our highest score was against Park Hurst, where we made 159 for two wickets, Searle making 77, and van der Veen 58 (not out)—the two best individual scores for the season. We have dismissed our opponents at the cost of a little over 6 runs a wicket. Searle and van der Veen have done the greater part of the bowling, the former securing the best average, whilst Baker and Tyrer have proved very useful in several matches.

Of the 13 matches played by the second team, 7 have been won, 6 lost, and one drawn. This is not equal to last year's record, when 11 were won and 3 lost. All the matches arranged have been played with the exception of the return with Bowdon College 2nd XI. The team has been changed considerably from time to time so that a fair number of boys have been given a trial. Those who have not succeeded in winning their

caps should look forward to doing so next year, always bearing in mind the fundamental law of cricket mentioned above. The eleven has improved considerably, and contains some promising cricketers who should prove invaluable to the first team next season.

Searle has proved himself an excellent captain of the first team in every way, and both captain and vice-captain have set a good example to the rest of the eleven by their constant attendance at the practice games. Ilderton has captained the second team well, but we should like to have seen more of him at practice.

In addition to the first and second eleven fixtures, ten other matches were arranged for Junior Elevens. Eight of these have already been played, and have resulted in seven wins and one loss. Our "under 14" team beat Chetham's Hospital and Oaklands School twice, and Nicholls Hospital once, but were beaten by the last named in the return match. The "under 13" team beat Fallowfield High School twice. Besides these, we have matches with Westfield for an "under 12" team, and with Field House College 2nd XI for our third team.

The Form matches in both divisions have resulted in some very good games. The best of these was the last in the First Division—between Science V. and IV. and Modern V. and IV.—and on this depended the championship. Both teams played up splendidly, and the result was doubtful until the very end of the match. Whilst we congratulate Science V. and IV. on their winning the Form Championship, we also congratulate Modern V. and IV. on the plucky fight they made for it. In the Junior Division French II. have again proved too strong for either Latin I. or French I., who are bracketed equal with one win and three losses each.

With the large stretch of level ground and with the great improvement which has taken place in the arrangement of the nets, for which we are indebted to the Head Master, the conditions under which cricket can now be played have approached almost as near perfection as seems possible. We wonder that every boy does not avail himself of the opportunities offered him of playing cricket, for there are few schools like ours which have so many advantages.

The First and Second Games have amalgamated, and consequently we have not to chronicle the usual disappearance of the Second Game after the first few weeks of its existence. The Third Game have had side games nearly every day, and lately have mustered in considerable numbers both at twelve o'clock and at four. The most



satisfactory feature of the Fourth Game are the matches which have been played on most of the available half-holidays. These games have been arranged by Mr. Fison and have been thoroughly enjoyed by all those who took part in them. We hope to see the same system of half-holiday matches adopted by the Third Game next year. It should be remembered that cricketers are not made in a season, and if we are to have year by year teams which shall not disgrace the cricket traditions of the school, it is to the lower games that we must look for the supply.

### CHARACTERS OF THE FIRST ELEVEN.

SEARLE, A. E. A., captain.—Has made a very good captain, and has been the most successful bowler. A careful bat, and has shown considerable punishing power.

VAN DER VEEN, R. E., vice-captain.—The best bat on the team, hits brilliantly, and has bowled consistently well.

BAKER, C. S.—Has been most unlucky this season in batting. Plays in capital style, and fields and bowls well.

BROWN, H. P.—A vigorous hitter when set; fields well at point.

WILKINS, A. K.—A brilliant field in any position, and a good bat.

HOBBINS, W. A.—With practice should turn out a really good batsman; has made a good stumper.

JEFFERIS, P. J.—At the beginning of the season a slow bat, but of late has been successful as a hard hitter.

BRADSHAW, W. P.—Plays a pretty game when batting; bowls slowly, but has been unfortunate.

GREEN, F. E.—Has been most unfortunate, both in batting and bowling, but has fielded excellently at cover point.

TYRER, P. F. S.—The fast bowler, is very effective when on the wicket, and makes a few runs now and then.

HAWKINS, C. H.—A steady bat, making runs frequently, and has improved in fielding.

ILDERTON, F. G. P., captain.—Has shown some hitting power, and has been efficient as captain and behind the sticks.

SWINDELLS, H. C., vice-captain.—The best all-round man on the team, has bowled and fielded well, and is a steady bat.

ALLEN, E. C.—A careful and very useful bat, the most consistent scorer on the team, and well deserves his place at the head of the averages. Has bowled well at times.

WILKINSON, O. J.—Has batted and bowled well, and a reliable field.

BARRETT, F.—A good bowler and strong bat. Fields well at point, and has been invaluable to the team.

HOBDEY, T. G. M.—Has made useful scores on several occasions, and is a fair long-stop.

SMITH, W.—Has made runs when badly wanted; a safe catch in the long field.

SHELMERDINE, E. D. S.—A very promising bat, and a fair field.

TYSON, J. E.—A good bowler at times, but needs more practice in batting.

ROBINSON, B.—A fair change bowler, but an indifferent field. Needs practice in batting.
