K. G. Moore (1938), Lieutenant, Border Regiment, attached Nigeria Regiment, has been awarded the Military Cross. We give here the official citation:—

Licutement Krewern Georges Moore (258272), The Border Regiment.

On the 10th February, 1944, Lieut. Moore's platoon was ordered to relieve a company of infantry who were acting as escort to a battery of artillery in position on the river bank opposite Kaladan.

At the moment of his arrival, the battery position came under heavy fire from a medium machine-gun, and Capt. Burgess of the relieved company was badly wounded. Without any hesitation or regard for his own safety. Lieut. Moore crawled across the bullet-swept area to Capt. Burgess and, with the assistance of two battery signaliers, dragged him to safety. Between 29th February and 1st March, 1944, Lieut. Moore's platoon carried out a night compass march over very hilly platoon carried out a night compass march over very hilly and difficult country and reached its objective. Next day his and difficult country and reached its objective. Next day his applatoon was attacked but the attack was repulsed. This was platoon was attacked but the attack was repulsed. This was platoon who to the personal courage and leadership of Lieut. One of the chiefly to the personal courage and leadership of Lieut. Moore, who took a Bren light machine-gun and led his platoon moore, who took a Bren light machine-gun and led his platoon which had been set ablaze by the enemy. Having cleared the which had been set ablaze by the enemy. Having cleared the hill he very coolly organised his platoon and put out the fire, although under fire from an enemy machine-gun on a nearby hill.

Although wounded himself he did not leave his platoon until all his casualties had been safely evacuated. In the fighting in the Kvauktan area on the 2nd and 3rd April, 1944, Lieut. Moore's platoon attacked the enemy on a hill feature and drove them from it. In order to get to grips with the enemy the platoon had to cross open paddy under light machine-gun fire, and having done this, had to pass through an area of burning scrub. Lieut. Moore again led his platoon in a charge through the flames and, although many of his men suffered severe burns, the attack went on.

Throughout this action he was an inspiration to his men, and his complete disregard for his personal safety and his excellent leadership resulted in the enemy being driven out of their positions.

On Wednesday, March 21st, just before the end of last term, our Annual Inspection was carried out by Colonel A. A. E. Chitty, D.S.O. Though cloudy and threatening, the rain kept off, enabling us to go through with our comprehensive programme as arranged. In his remarks at the end of the proceedings Col. Chitty expressed his pleasure at the bearing of the Cadets on parade, and at the work that had been done. We give here some extracts from his report :-

Drill: "A smart Unit. Cadets stood very steadily on parade and marched past well. Arms drill, foot drill and saluting good. The Unit has a good band,"

Tactical Training: "Very satisfactory, A patrol exercise was well carried out. The Contingent has done very well at P.T., and Cadet N.C.O.'s have done well at Aldershot and on Command Courses. The standard of Cadet N.C.O. leadership is very satisfactory; N.C.O., instructors were good and worked with confidence,"

Technical Training: "Very satisfactory."

Discipline ("Very good,"

General Remarks: "A smart Unit which has taken a great deal of trouble over its training, N.C.O.'s are keen and smart."

Three field days were arranged for this term, but the first at Yarwood Heath on April 25th was unfortunately, rained off. On May 2nd we operated on new ground at Millington, when the afternoon was spent mainly in routine training, while the Signals section, acting independently, carried out useful exercises. On the third of our expeditions into the country, on May 16th, the Travelling Wing provided the instruction and enlivened the proceedings with blanks and thunder flashes. Since Whitsuntide the "Wing" has visited us on three successive Fridays, when two officers and three warrant officers attended to help with the work, dealing chiefly with tactics and weapon training.

Early this term Mr. Jeeny, with the help of Sergt. C. G. Gregory, L/Cpl. A. Wilkinson, Cadets P. W. Howard, A. Salmon, M. J. Delany did a really good service. service to the Corps when they spent two long and dusty afternoons refitting the target end of the rifle

The Empire classification tests are being carried through rapidly, and, by the end of the term, every senior Cadet will have had an opportunity of undergoing this test without which he cannot be regarded as efficient. Sergeants D. W. Bowett and C. G. Gregory have been in charge of the shooting, At the time of writing much work still remains to be done before the end of term. The Certificate "A" examination, a Signals classification test, the competitions for the Watkins Shield and the Ratcliffe Cup make up a full bill of fare,

The training march in Derbyshire, which took place during the Whitsuntide holidays, proved a great help to Certificate "A" candidates, and enabled these Cadets to take part in useful tactical exercises and platoen work not possible on our School grounds.

Excellent use is being made by the Signals section of the equipment which continues to arrive, and every Cadet who can possibly do so should join this section and take the qualifying tests; the work is interesting, and a pass in the tests is a valuable aid to those joining the Forces,

Full advantage was taken of the various courses offered by the War Office during the Easter holidays and Cadets underwent training in P.T. at Oswestry, Weapon Training at Aintree, and Signals at Catteriek, while a detachment of six N.C.O.'s and senior Cadets attended a Tank course with the Royal Armoured Corps at Barnard Castle,

At the end of last term we lost the services of three of our senior N.C.O.'s, who left to take up short courses for the R.N.V.R., Company S.M. G. A. Anderson going to Glasgow University, Company O.M.S. J. R. Hooley and Sergeant G. Wilkinson going to Oxford. All three did valuable work and served with great keenness and efficiency. Sergeant Wilkinson is the first of the new Signals section to pass the qualifying test. A word of commendation is due to Sergeant D, M, Surry for his work in supervising the issue of equipment and manuals from the Armoury.

We are grateful to Manchester University S.T.C. for the loan of 60 service rifles and a Bren gun.

It was announced at the end of the meeting that the collection had produced the highly gratifying amount of £20 7s. 10d.

The Chairman, the Rev. S. G. Paine, reviewed the past year's work, and thanked the members and the Committee for their loyal support.

The ordinary business of the meeting was adjourned at this point, and the chair was taken by the Head Master for his talk to us on how the new Education Act will affect the School when the new term starts in September. The Head Master stated that they had applied to the Minister of Education for continued recognition of the School as a direct grant school. He further pointed out that the Burnham scales had been raised, books had to be provided free and only the cost of the food charged for dinners; the office and kitchen staffs would have to be increased. To meet all these demands the fees would have to be raised, but a remission would be granted according to a scale. After his talk the Head Master answered many questions put to him by the parents, and before leaving, was thanked by the meeting for his informative talk.

The meeting then proceeded with its agenda, and Mr. W. H. Grantham and Mr. L. H. Nesbitt were appointed Secretary and Treasurer respectively for the ensuing year, while, to replace those who are retiring, Mr. Clare, Mr. Macguire, Mr. Price, Mr. Timmins, Mr. Timperley and Mr. Walters were elected to the Committee.

The Rev. S. G. Paine will continue as Chairman, and Mr. E. H. Tredwell becomes Vice-Chairman on the resignation of Mr. W. Watkins.

The Association expressed its thanks to the Head Master for placing the School Hall at their disposal for the meeting.
