



Editorial.

IN common with most public institutions in Manchester, the School has suffered a great loss by the death of Mr. OLIVER HEYWOOD. As one of the representatives of the Hulme Trustees on the Governing Body of the School, he took a keen and continuous interest in our welfare, of which probably few among us can know the extent and value. To feel the worth of a character like his many of us are perhaps too young. But we can all follow his example, the memory of which will last, we may be sure, long after we have grown old.

The School life of the past term has been marked by signs of keen vitality. It will be remembered for the establishment of the Hulme Grammar School Society, and for the revival of the Chess Club. The movement which has brought about the formation of these clubs for association in pleasures of the mind is one of the results of the extension by one year

of our School time, which was probably not contemplated when that change was made. The Society, safeguarded by its provisions for literary study as well as the discussion of debatable topics, will, we are convinced, steer clear of the evils with which school debating societies are sometimes reproached, and will do much good in bringing home to boys the truth that pleasures as well as prizes and places are to be had from the cultivation of "the things of the spirit."

In our last number we referred to the unprecedented success which had attended our First Football Team. Since then, they have had an unbroken run of victory, and have closed the season with the brilliant record of eleven wins to one defeat, eighty-six goals having been scored for them, and against them only twelve. This result, of which we may be proud, we have to ascribe to the admirable combination of SHORROCKS' team, the perfect working together of its members, each of whom seems to have relied not on himself alone, but on everyone

else in the team. We hope this spirit will form a tradition to be bequeathed to all our teams in the future.

The Lacrosse season has not been brilliant, but has been seriously interfered with by the weather. For some unfathomable reason it seems always to be raining or snowing on Wednesday afternoons. The game is, however, becoming more and more popular, and some day, perhaps, we shall be able to put a really representative team into the field.

Of our Cricket prospects we can as yet say nothing certain. Only about one half of our last year's eleven will be available. We have an extensive card of fixtures, and, to carry out our programme successfully, hard work, and diligent practice at the nets and in fielding will be necessary.

It is with pleasure that we announce the acquisition of a field in a central position for the Old Hulmeians Cricket and Football Club. We believe that the advantage this will offer to a large proportion of Old Boys will put new life into the Club. May every success attend them in the coming cricket season!

A long programme was arranged at the commencement of the season, but through various causes, chief of which was bad weather, a large proportion of the fixtures had to be cancelled. Of the matches played in this our second season, the result has hardly been as favourable as we could have desired. Scarcely on any occasion were we able to get together the full strength of our team, our best players frequently being unavailable. As a consequence we have an unenviable number of losses to contrast with our wins. Though the total number of goals for and against shows a balance on the wrong side, on two or three occasions we have had the best of the play, even when the figures at the end of the game have stood against us. Instances of this are to be found in our matches with Stamford and Old Trafford, and in our first

encounter with Edge Hill. In each of these matches we had the best of the game, but our opponents unfortunately succeeded in scoring just before the blow of the whistle, and in so doing either equalised or won the game. The Old Hulmeians Cricket Club.

THE Annual General Meeting of this Club was held at the School on March 5th, at which the following members were present:—The Head Master, Mr. Franklin, Mr. Hewlett, A. R. Lowe, E. E. Wright, A. T. Ward-Jones, L. Barrett, G. Youatt, A. G. Baker, F. M. Saxelby, J. van der Veen, A. G. Adshead, F. W. Shorrocks, W. C. Barrett, O. Hague, and P. Williams. After a few remarks from the Head Master, who was in the chair, the prospects of the coming season were discussed. The chief difficulty which presented itself was that of obtaining a suitable field at a moderate rental. So great did this difficulty appear at first sight, that there was serious thought of dissolving the Club. It was, however, decided that before abandoning an enterprise on which so much energy had already been expended, a further effort should be made to find a field which would meet the requirements, and Hague, Wright, and Lowe were appointed to the work. A liberal offer from the Chairman went a long way towards diminishing financial difficulties, which had been discussed at an earlier stage of the meeting. The final statement of accounts, which will be found printed elsewhere, was read and passed, and the meeting adjourned.

Since this date no formal meeting has been held, but we are glad to inform our readers that a field has been engaged for twelve months for both cricket and football. It is situated close to the Princess Road gate of Alexandra Park, and a more desirable field, so far as central position is concerned, could not have been obtained.

At the invitation of the Head Master a social gathering of Old Hulmeians was held at the School on the evening of April 7th. A large number of Old Boys responded to the invitation. At the close of a pleasant evening the Head Master addressed a few remarks to his guests. After expressing his pleasure at meeting them, he referred to the large

and necessarily ever increasing number of Old Hulmeians, and hoped they would ever remain a body united with each other and with the School. For the furtherance of this object, he asked for their support to the Cricket and Football Clubs. It was proposed that the two Clubs should be amalgamated, and he trusted that every Old Hulmeian would become either a playing or non-playing member of the united Club. After the singing of "Auld Lang Syne," Mr. Oldham, who we are glad to say is again in Manchester, though not at the School, made an inspiring speech. It was finally arranged to hold a General Meeting of the Club on Saturday, April 9th, the outcome of which we hope to publish in our next number.

FIRST TEAM MATCHES.

Saturday, December 5, *v.* St. Bede's College. Played on our ground. Before the commencement, which had to be delayed through the late arrival of some of our men, we were not very sanguine about the result; but by splendid combination and helped on by the cheers of the spectators, we managed to hold our own. In spite of the advantage of having the wind slightly in our favour, our back-division at the start found themselves with plenty of work on their hands. They were however equal to the occasion, and stopped several dangerous rushes. On the left, where most of the play now settled, our forwards and halves made several brilliant rushes, in one of which the first goal was scored by Shorrocks from a pass by Booth. This success greatly encouraged the School team, who now redoubled their efforts. Just before half-time Whitworth rushed the ball through again, but was off-side when he received it. In the second half the loss of the wind was greatly felt, and we had simply to defend our own goal, especially from their right-wings and centre forward. Several shots would have taken effect but for the excellent goal-keeping of Price, and ten minutes before time they succeeded in getting past him. A few minutes after the ball went through again, but after some discussion it was disallowed as having crossed the goal-line before being put through. We played a better game all round than ever before in the season; among the forwards Shorrocks was prominent, and Ellis, his recent promotion being considered, played excellently. Saturday, January 23, *v.* Broughton School. Played on their ground. Broughton School started the ball, but it was almost immediately returned and play settled in our opponents' half. The first point, however, was in their favour, being the result of a series of miskicks. For the rest of the match our goal was never in danger. Spencer was the first to score for us, and he followed soon after with a fine run down resulting in a second goal. Before half-time two more goals were added, both by Ellis, the first from a centre by Shorrocks. The second half was as much in our favour as the first, and two more points were added, one by Spencer, and the other by Shorrocks. A slight dispute also arose as to the legality of another goal, which was disallowed. Spencer was conspicuous among the forwards, and Fielding did well what little he had to do at back. Saturday, January 30, *v.* Heaton Moor College Old Boys. Played on their ground. The Old Boys, who were unable to raise a full team, played four School boys, after an objection had been raised to their playing a master. Two goals were scored for us in the first half, the first, shot by Ellis, being the subject of much discussion, as a claim had been made against Whitworth when he passed to Ellis. The other point was from a high shot by Whitworth, which the goal-keeper, in endeavouring to save, helped through. After the interval our forwards at once took up the offensive, but were not able to get round one of the opposing full-backs, who showed far the best form on his side. One of their left-wing forwards, however, succeeded in putting a goal to their credit. The one goal which we got in this half, which was more in our favour than the first, was by a good piece of play on Ellis's part, who, after a good dribble

sent in a successful shot from a difficult position. There was a considerable falling-off from the previous Saturday in the combination of the forwards, but this was greatly due to their altered positions, owing to the absence of Shorrocks. Saturday, February 13, v. Bowdon College. Played on our ground. After the decisive defeat inflicted upon them on their own ground, we expected an easy task in the return match at home. They had, however, somewhat altered their team, apparently for the better, as our score was less by four goals than on the previous occasion. During the first half we had the sun in our eyes, the wind blowing right across the ground and giving no advantage to either side. From the kick-off the ball remained most of the time in the enemy's half, though they placed our goal in jeopardy now and then and once at least had very hard lines in not scoring. Five goals were placed to our credit, two each by Shorrocks and Ellis and one by Whitworth, Shorrocks's second being particularly noticeable for its cleverness. In the second half four more goals were added, Shorrocks again being credited with two, while Whitworth and Spencer got one each. Spencer's shot gave their goal-keeper no time to do anything. Although the game could not be said to be hard fought, it was an eminently pleasant one, the College players taking their defeat in a very friendly way. As regards the play of the School team, its combination was seen at its best, though individual play was scarcely so good as usual. Saturday, February 27, v. Lymm Grammar School. Played on our ground. As we had not met this team before, we had no idea of their prowess, but although we were without the services of Saxelby, Booth and Price, we had not so very much trouble in adding another to our list of victories. During the first half the game was fairly even, in the earlier part the School pressing, and just before half-time our opponents doing the same. At the interval, however, the School was one point to the good. In the second half the play was similar, both goals being visited in turn. The home team were again more successful than their opponents as they registered two goals to their one; our points being made by Shorrocks, who had shot the goal in the first half, and Ellis. The play of the home team gave anything but satisfaction, the combination of the forwards and their shooting being especially poor; the whole team, indeed, was not in its usual form. Saturday, March 5, v. Old Hulmeians. Played on our ground. Special interest was attached to this match as the previous one had ended in a draw, and as the ground and the weather were all that could be desired we expected to have a pleasant game, nor were we disappointed. Both teams were playing their whole available strength, the Old Boys having the strongest team they have ever put into the field this season. In the first half the play was pretty even, but the combination among the School forwards was not so prominent as it sometimes is. The School goal was never dangerously threatened this

half, and Price had nothing much to do except in goal-kicking. The Old Boys' goal was once at Spencer's mercy, who unfortunately shot wide. The second half was mostly in favour of the Old Boys, who made strenuous efforts to prove their superiority but failed, owing partly to bad combination and partly to good defence play. They however had hard lines once or twice, Lowe and Shorrocks being almost successful. The School forwards made one or two good runs, but Baker was always ready for them, and when time was called neither side had scored. Our opponents had previously beaten us on their own ground—the only defeat we had sustained so far—and we naturally expected a hard game. Our task however proved a light one, and we had our revenge by beating them easily. The absence of Spencer and Whitworth caused a disorganisation among the forward division, but otherwise we were well represented. Our opponents, on the other hand, turned up two men short, for whom Classen, G. and Simpson served as substitutes. Bury kicked off with a strong wind but having the sun in their eyes. Matters at once became lively and Classen, G., who was playing in goal for them, saved two dangerous shots. We scored twice, by Shorrocks and Ellis, and succeeded in thwarting the opposing forwards in spite of their having the wind. The second half was much less evenly contested. Our goal was only twice approached within any dangerous distance. We scored three times only, the wind making accurate shooting a difficult matter. Shorrocks shot two goals, Ellis one, and these two players put in most work among the forwards. Price in goal cleared well the few times he was called

Saturday, March 26, v. St. Bede's College. Played at Whalley Range. Great interest was taken in this match, which was the last of the season, and many of the School supporters turned up at the College ground to see the game. We were not quite so well represented as we could have wished, for Spencer and Price had to be replaced by Green, C. J. and Ford, yet judging from the result their absence was not greatly felt. The first half was very much in favour of the home team, who had hard lines once or twice. The ball was once actually on the goal-line, but Ford cleared with difficulty. On the other hand Whitworth just missed scoring, and not long after Classen put in a beautiful corner, which Shorrocks had not much difficulty in converting. This greatly encouraged the School team, and although their opponents redoubled their efforts, the score remained unaltered at half-time. On changing over, the School forwards at once took up the offensive and Shorrocks soon scored another goal. This was shortly followed by a good piece of combined play which resulted in a magnificent shot of Booth's taking effect. The game was now fairly even, but St. Bede's managed to obtain a solitary goal just before the end of a very enjoyable game. Characters of the First Team.

SHORROCKS, E., forward. A model captain and a very consistent player. The backbone of the forward division. By his unflagging zeal he has been in a great measure responsible for this season's successes.

WHITWORTH, G. L., forward. Plays well and steadily; shoots well, but has a tendency to off-side play.

SPENCER, R. B., forward. A neat forward showing at times a remarkable brilliancy. Slightly given to insubordination, especially on practice nights.

BOOTH, V. S., forward. Has not been practising sufficiently this season, and accordingly has not, on the whole, done himself justice. He has however in some matches displayed much agility, while his shooting and centring have varied considerably.

ELLIS, W., forward. Has been a great success. Plays very pluckily, is quick on the ball and centres well.

CLASSEN, H. R., half-back. Makes an excellent half-back, is very safe, but is sometimes inclined to keep the ball too long.

FIELDING, H. M., half-back. Has certainly been an acquisition to the team, is a good kick and plays with much dash. He has also done good service at full-back.

NORBURY, L., half-back. A safe half-back. Has played well throughout the season.

SAXELBY, S. W., back. Has played remarkably well this season and has become much safer in his kicking.

The Hulme Grammar School Society.

THE establishment of a Society for the study and discussion of literary and other edifying subjects has been the chief event in the School life of the past term. The origin of the movement which brought about its formation may be traced to a letter by W. B. Smith, which appeared in the last number of the *Hulmeian*. At a meeting of the three senior forms, held on December 7th, it was agreed that a society, such as Smith's letter described, was a desirable thing, and a provisional committee of eight was elected to approach the Head Master on the subject. This Committee, which consisted of Shorrocks, Varley, Saxelby, and Rowbotham of the Science Form, Sclater and Smith of Latin III., and Batey and L. E. Vlies of Upper Modern IV., elected eight other boys—Classen, H. R., Lowe, F. H., Norbury L., Youatt, Clarke, L. C., Tyson, Guest, L. H., and Miller, J. M., to form the nucleus of the Society, and with them elected the following as officers for the season of 1892:—

Hon. President, the Head Master; *Hon. Vice-Presidents*, the Assistant Masters; *President*, E. Shorrocks; *Vice-President*, S. W. Saxelby; *Treasurer*, G. P. Varley; *Secretary*, J. R. P. Sclater; *Reporting Secretary*, W. B. Smith; *Committee*, A. E. Rowbotham, L. E. Vlies, H. C. Batey, H. R. Classen, and F. H. Lowe.

A code of rules was drawn up, setting forth the Society's object as the improvement of the general knowledge of its members, and containing the necessary provisions for the conduct of the Society. Boys in the senior forms, and those over fourteen in the junior forms are eligible for membership. Meetings are held once a fortnight, on Mondays at four o'clock, and two out of every three are to be devoted to the reading of essays, while the third is set apart for a discussion. A School term forms a session, and no meetings are held in the Midsummer term. A syllabus was drawn up for the Lent Session, which has been gone through as far as is reported below.

The first meeting of the Society was held on February 1st, the President in the chair. The following were elected members:—W. Ellis, F. E.

Gough, S. A. Guest, J. G. Jeans, T. Mawdsley, A. E. Parker, H. van der Veen, G. L. Whitworth, F. Collier, H. P. Pearson, and J. Hague. Rowbotham then read a paper on "Ivanhoe," a discussion on which was carried on by Jeans, L. H. Guest, S. A. Guest, Sclater, and the Chairman. Twenty members present.

On February 22nd, at the second meeting, the Vice-President in the chair, the following were elected members:—A. Payne, J. D. Bell, and C. J. Green. Twenty members present. Shorrocks then read his paper on "Benjamin Franklin's Autobiography," in the discussion of which Rowbotham, L. H. Guest, Sclater, Payne, Varley, and W. B. Smith took part. A vote of thanks to Shorrocks was passed.

The third meeting was held on March 7th, the President in the chair. Twenty-two members present. After H. Buckingham and S. A. Smith had been elected members, Saxelby read a paper on "Cambridge University," followed by one by Sclater on "Oxford University." A rather lengthy discussion took place, in which Rowbotham, Varley, L. H. Guest, Lowe, S. A. Guest, Tyson, Miller, W. B. Smith, S. A. Smith, and the Chairman took part. After the essayists had replied a division was taken, eight voting for Oxford, and twelve for Cambridge.

The Society now numbers 33 members, and the average attendance is 19. An improvement in the quality of the speaking has already shown itself; a larger proportion of members is taking part in the discussions, and longer speeches are made, those who at first were contented with one sentence only have now passed that stage.
