Sadly the performance and progress of the Under-14 rugby team was very disappointing this year. Though it is easy to find some excuses for the poor results — in particular injuries to Hunt, one of the stronger players, and to McFarland, a potentially fine captain, who broke his collar-bone after the first game — the side basically lacked talented players, had several problem positions and suffered from an inability or unwillingness to tackle. These weaknesses were unfortunately common to both forwards and backs.

In many respects the result followed the pattern of previous seasons. A close opening game against Stockport Grammar School, which hinged on whether Wilson could score more tries than the fast strong Stockport lock-forward (the latter won by four tries to three) was followed by the customary tough set of fixtures and heavy defeats, culminating in the side's worst crash, just before half-term, away at King's School, Macclesfield.

After half-term the main difficulty was predictably motivation and how to restore the team's eroded confidence. The diffidence and lack of competitive spirit which too many of the team had shown in the early minutes of most games, as they waited to see how good their opponents were, had become widespread. The team clearly had their eyes on Manchester Grammar School as a likely first win. Encouraged by the return of McFarland, who provided the leadership on the field the side so badly needed, the team played with great determination and won. Unfortunately the first win had come at the wrong end of the season and, though interest in the game had been rekindled, the much fancied second victory against Cheadle Hulme School never materialised as the game was cancelled.

Whilst, at this age, one individual's physical strength and size will inevitably have a telling effect on a game, a team must learn to live with this and at least seek to combat this advantage with a little thought to tactics. Far too often one opponent was allowed to destroy the team's overall effort and performance. In more than half the games one player scored three tries or more against us. Against De La Salle, although the team played well, scoring 18 points, one opponent scored seven times and so we lost 36-18.

All is not despair, however. Some comfort and satisfaction can be had from several pleasing individual performances. Wilson, at centre, accepted the responsibility of team-star and in addition to scoring nine tries, he covered and tackled well throughout the season. Thornton, at fly-half, displayed his running ability in fits and starts: I'm sure that he will mature into a fine player. For the present he must work hard to make his kicking more consistent. McMillan filled the problem scrum-half position quite well, continually setting an example to the rest of the side with his fighting spirit.

Finally, I would like to thank Messrs. Daniels and Peek for accompanying the team in my absence, Mr. Langford for refereeing and Messrs. Murray and Percival for their help and advice.



This was the best season that the School 1st X have had for some years, and this was in no small part owing to the willingness of the whole of the Senior Squad to practise, train, and most important of all, learn, in order to improve their lacrosse. A measure of the ability and performance of the side was that M.J. Sandy, perhaps one of the most improved players, could not win back a regular first team place after an early season injury.

The attack averaged fifteen goals per game, and T.J. Jones, O.C.D. Cooper and H.S. Davies all scored memorable goals, particularly in the Cup Final of the Lancashire Junior Cup, when Rochdale narrowly defeated the School despite the fact that the team played some of its best lacrosse of the season. In many of the games it was the midfield who were to be the key factors in our success. At the highest level playing mid-field demands superior fitness, sound technique, and a quick tactical eye, to enable a side to maximise its own possession and deny the opposition. As the season progressed, M.R. Hawkins, J.C. Dale and P. Collins showed an increasing ability to fulfil all these requirements. Dale's dominance at centre was never matched throughout the season, and with so many outstanding performances he fully deserved his Lacrosse Colours.

Defence was perhaps the weakest aspect of play. and a record of nine goals per game conceded reveals some room for improvement. Faults were really only twofold. All three defence-men, N.W. Hewitt, P.R.H. Wilson and G.H. Mills sometimes lacked the aggression and positive attitude necessary to dominate and press the opposing attacks, and, along with the midfield, they sometimes allowed themselves to be drawn away from the critical area of defence, instead of remaining a tight, supporting unit, never more than twelve yards away from the front of goal. However, as the season wore on they began to learn from mistakes and even in adversity remained a real team, taking a pride in their work on the field, and even through some periods of errors and adversity, never being critical of each other (until after the game). They also showed how and why handling skills should form a vital part of a defence player's armoury. Indeed, if a team is only as strong as its weakest link, then our 'weak' link was to ensure a strong team and a successful season.

Meanwhile, R.K. Cox, in goal, was playing his part in the team's success. Despite some suicidal attempts to score at least one goal himself, at some stage in the season, his certainty, dependability, saves and clearing, all gave the team a confidence which was to be an important factor in their performance.

The season's results are a fair reflection of the team's performances and their development. Against experienced opposition, fitness and organisation usually saw them through, and only against Rochdale, Old Hulmeians and Oxford University was there a

strong combination of experience, fitness and ability to defeat them. And in defeat, much as it was difficult after fighting so hard to lose so narrowly with dignity (especially in the Cup Final), the team showed its character. In this respect, particularly Hewitt led his team by example, and they played hard to win attractively and fairly. Hewitt, Jones and Dale were awarded School Colours and Collins, Cox and Wilson, Half-Colours.

In a term when other demands are made on boys' time, the following, after exhaustive trials and practices, were rewarded with a place in the County Under-18 side, representing Lancashire against Cheshire: Hewitt (Capt.), Cox, Mills, Hawkins,, Jones and Cooper; and Wilson and Watmough, reserves.

School Lacrosse at first team level seems to be in the ascendant and has the potential to remain so for some years. My only worry is that there is a tendency in lower and upper School alike to forsake the gentle art of the lunch-time throw about, where all sorts of handling skills are learnt, practised and reinforced, for soccer. I would, in all seriousness, advise any lacrosse enthusiast to spend his recreation time with his lacrosse stick in his hand. There is no substitute for stick-handling practice and I should be loth to see the degree of skill shown by our players, at all levels, deteriorate through lack of it.

Though there was ultimately no glory in the season, there might have been some, as the team was within inches of overhauling the excellent and unbeaten Wilmslow side in both home and away matches.

Bad weather prevented the early-season practices and the competitive games that are vital in the formation of a good Under-12 team. The only two games that were possible before half term were both against experienced sides, when the Under-12's were rather overwhelmed. The team was generally chosen from fifteen regular players, all of whom worked hard and played with great enthusiasm. 

Three wins, three draws and three defeats and one game abandoned owing to tropical downpour was the result of three weeks in the islands of St. Lucia and Grenada. The schedule was busy—fourteen days of cricket and only six rest days—but as each player wanted to play in every game it was good that we had so much cricket. The main benefit to each player came not through the opportunity to improve his technique on hard and fast wickets but in his confidence. In the months since our return the tour players have looked much more mature as cricketers.

We journeyed out to the Caribbean somewhat apprehensive about the standard of play we would encounter. Many of the players we met had tremendous natural ability—Heywood and Francis in St. Lucia and Andrew and Clarke in Grenada were all excellent cricketers—and the athleticism of the fielding and throwing was remarkable. But the lack of coaching and facilities clearly handicaps their development and we found ourselves far superior in match play and in our knowledge of the game. In eleven innings, for example, we took fifteen wickets with run outs, and twice in two day games escaped from what should have been certain defeat as a direct result of lack of strategy on their part.

Our cricket was marked by the extraordinary performances of fast bowler A.M. Mills who took 35 wickets at less than ten apiece. Twice he took seven wickets on the good pitch at Tanteen, St. George's and his stamina was exemplary. J. Beesley, our captain, scored nearly three hundred runs at an average of thirty, including two half centuries, but by his own high standards he was disappointed that he never quite hit top form. The honour of highest score when to C.M. Thorpe with 67 not out against Morne Colleges at Victoria Park, an innings which we had been waiting for for some time and which brought all the more pleasure. Other players such as P. Barron and A. Wilde came on noticeably as batsman whilst J.F. Morton and N.J. Lord showed their value as allrounders. Each player had his moment and all contributed greatly to a team spirit which is a vital ingredient of a wearing tour in a strange land.

The idea of acclimatisation is a false one. After eighteen days away we fielded in scorching sunshine at midday at Grenville and felt the skin practically burning off our faces and hands. Sun cream, salt tablets, floppy hats, drinks, neckerchiefs, were constantly needed and those players not selected on any particular day were kept busy behind the scenes giving support to those on the field. Wicket-keepers P.G. Turner and C.S. Manning had a bad time diving around on bruising ground, particularly at Micoud and Grenville where everything except the wicket was dusty and stony. Goats on the field were commonplace, frenzied appeals, "Umpire, Umpire",

were largely ignored and encouraging shouts of "Hit him in de ribcage" from the spectators stoically accepted, particularly by imperturbable opener J.M. Boyle. The memory of all these events is indelible, none more so than the very first game at Victoria Park when we played an incredible finish amidst a bedlam of noise, a far cry from a damp May day in Manchester playing against unenterprising opposition. Both experiences go to make better cricketers.

SCHOOL CRICKET 1978

A total of 105 games involving boys and staff were played during a season of 93 days. Of those 41 were won, 31 lost, 28 drawn, 3 tied and only 2 abandoned. This last statistic is remarkable since the weather was consistently cloudy and cool and, during the post-A level period, wet. Only in the last three days of term did the sun shine warmly. The ground-staff worked wonders, particularly since half the front square had been damaged by wormkiller. The co-operation of Mr. Gregson and the ladies in the dining hall enabled us to entertain visitors well.

Our reputation preceded us in many fixtures and the form of the 1st XI and Dickinson in particular gained consistent coverage from the Daily Telegraph. It quickly emerged too that we had an excellent Under-12 team with Fairfax, Marsden and Shelston to the fore and they defeated Manchester Boys Under-12 XI and tied with Manchester Grammar School as well as gaining 6 other victories. The Under-13 side played without much application, a direct contrast to the Under-15 where, Cotterill, all arms and legs, bowled and captained well, and Ashfield and Robinson improved greatly.

One of the best moments of the season was the century by the 2nd XI captain Ogden, who has contributed enormously to School cricket: his team did well but none of the three leading players, Wrigley, Chantler and Odum, quite reproduced their form for the 1st XI when the chance came. From the Under-14 team Thornton and Smythe toured with Manchester Boys U-15 team, but the best player was the strongly built Brown who played competently for the 1st XI at Didsbury and Woodhouse Grove. Thompson and Thorpe played for Manchester Boys Under-13 and the Under-13 captain Sealy must soon be in contention for representative sides as a determined batsman.

Thus a strong vein of talent runs through the School in alternate years at present. We worked hard on the pavilion, dressing rooms and equipment to justify the reputation we are building. The presence of photographs, posters, flowers, carpets and names on the score board is cosmetic rather than central, but pleasant nevertheless. The promise of new netting, matting and three improved squares will help or advance still further. My thanks to all colleagues and parents who helped with transport and umpiring and to the boys who played hard, often in unpleasant conditions, and mostly very successfully.

The 1978 season can be divided into three sections. In the first five weeks we gained victories over Rydal and Wakefield, but generally played below our best. In June we had a productive run, especially on tour in the North, crushed Bury G.S., and were disappointed to be robbed by the weather of an attack on Manchester G.S. Finally we suffered three defeats, two rather unexpected, in a final fortnight dogged by lamentably damp weather. Some players had been on the field for over 40 days out of 126 since the Caribbean Tour began — more than Boycott, someone said — and weariness was understandable.

During the season we moved from worry about the quality of the opposition to a realisation that others were worrying about us. This was one positive result of the television and press coverage of the Caribbean Tour. Hewitt's captaincy improved steadily and his sober assessments of strengths and weaknerness of his own side and opposition were nearly always accurate. He defended our score of 104 at Wakefield most astutely to lead us to a remarkable win and at Bury he cared nought for the reputation of Farrar (who was alleged to be similar to Mike Proctor and probably in "Charlie's Angels" as well). We rarely had a fine leg or third man which horrified the pundits but not me. Richards, the vice-captain, did well on the

occasions he captained the side, but sometimes less well when he might have proffered useful advice to Hewitt but allowed his personal feelings to rule his normally shrewd cricketing brain. Generally, however, the team spirit and good humour was always near the surface, though I was pleased to see that Hewitt always placed excellence and winning the game before other considerations, yet within the spirit of the game. At Wakefield he recalled a batsman wrongly given out by me and he was not afraid to savage bad bowling and fielding by his own side, or poor conduct ("You can go off if you're going to swear").

Initial team selection was difficult. Wilde, sadly, was ill, Hope working on Saturdays, Thorpe, Patton and Richards all suffering from strains. It is probably easier to get on to the first team than to get off it and the only real change of the season was the omission of Wright. He will be a good batsman and several times seemed to be set for an innings when dismissed, sometimes through indecisive footwork.

Amongst the batsmen only Dickinson was consistent. In his first season he amassed over 500 runs by a care-. ful concentration and studied technique. Boyle against Lancashire, Thorpe against Ellesmere, Barron against Woodhouse Grove and Hewitt against Macclesfield all played beautiful innings but rarely did we really dominate the opposition bowling. Davies began the season promisingly, but then fell away badly as his introspective nature compounded his difficulties. His magnificent close catching, mostly at short-leg, prevented any serious thought of his being omitted. If it moved Davies caught it. Richards won the game for us at Carlisle with his powerful hitting and his approach, though inevitably, unsuccessful at times, is often invaluable. He learned to keep his head still when heaving at the ball, thus combining science with art. All the other batsmen played well at least once, confidence, Rainford recovering suggesting with bat and voice that he should be further up the order and Lord opening in some games.

The bowling was usually steady, rarely venomous. When any bowler struck form we won the game. Rainford's best performance was 7 for 20 (including 13 no-balls) against Bury and he rarely bowled off line. His tally of 46 wickets can be increased by attention to his run-up and delivery stride and a slightly fuller length. Richards picked up wickets off what appeared to be loose bowling but nevertheless finished the season with more victims than many an opening bowler of previous years. Above all he needs more rhythm in his arm action to prevent a distinct tendency to bowl down the leg-side. Lord was almost impossible at Birkenhead on a difficult pitch and at Wakefield against nervous batsmen: his left arm angle of delivery, especially on the "edge of the crease" ball, was too much for many good players and he deserved more than 31 wickets. Morton, a fine team man, had a poor second half to the season with his left arm spin and his confidence, line and length suffered accordingly. These four regular bowlers were supported by Hewitt who took four wickets at Durham and Thorpe who spins and flights but does not practise a good offbreak.

I was particularly pleased with the out cricket.

Lightning quick changes between overs, careful polishing and preservation of the new ball, efficient and speedy field placing, watchful allowing and preventing of the single became second nature to us yet entirely alien to many opposition sides. The wicket keeper is the focus of polish and here Turner recovered from a low patch in mid May to provide some highly competent displays. He worked very hard on his technique, particularly to the slower bowlers, and never suffered shoddy play by himself or the fielders gladly. He was rightly commended by the opposition in June and July.

When injury, work or holiday depleted the team others had a chance. Wrigley from the 2nd XI and Brown from the Under-14 XI had the confidence to play well, Chantler and Patton did not. Odum and Ogden came on the northern tour where again confidence helped Ogden to look more the part. The stolid Laker batted soundly against Stockport, Tittle bowled neatly at Woodhouse Grove and Allen is not far short of the tight control a first team spinner must possess. Thus next year we shall have at least 15 players with first team experience available. The fielding of the newcomers sometimes let then down, as did that of Dickinson and Barron. Thorpe at gully, Boyle at mid-off and Davies anywhere set the standards to which all must aspire.

We benefited from a variety of evening fixtures against Didsbury, Ashley, Whalley Range, The Parents, Alderley Edge which provided excellent hospitality, often very strong opposition and a chance for such as Brown, Smythe and Thornton to gain experience with first and second team players. We benefited too from the interest of our two contrasting scorers, the irrepressible Whittell and the silent and fasting Emmott, both of whom could accurately say whether we should have won or not. The photography of Bedford was again excellent and many of his best shots are now framed in the pavilion. His photographs captured some fine moments but many are stored in the memory. Some are comic, some tragic, the best worth a brief mention to conclude a report on a happy and enjoyable season: Barry Wood, who had played in the first test against Pakistan, wearing a helmet to face Morton; Turner's fury at being run out by Dickinson after an unlikely partnership of 35 at Wakefield; a stunning caught and bowled by Rainford at Bury; a wonderful display of hitting by Orwin of Macclesfield to win a match of 400 runs; barracking from the School for our fielders against Wood and Pilling and an unpleasant afternoon at Lytham; a quiet triumph for the coach in the Staff Match; a match winning slow full toss from Richards at Wakefield; a cover field of John Travoltas led by the coolest captain we have seen for many a year.

Second eleven games, this season seem to have conformed to a set pattern in many ways. Invariably the match days were wet, though not wet enough to cause cancellations, invariably Ogden won the toss, elected to bat and saw his side make well over a hundred runs for the loss of few wickets, and invariably the opposition made no attempt to make the runs set by the School's sporting and often generous declarations. The bowling often presented the variety in this pattern. On some days our opening attack was irresistible and, as at Stockport, ensured victory; on other days it was to be the change bowlers who turned the match in our favour, for example against Batley and Bury; while other occasions saw our spin bowlers claiming the successes. However, as the results show, the more usual occurrence was for initial bowling successes to tail off, and the opposition escape with a draw.

Of the seven drawn games, five of them have seen the School take eight or nine wickets and then narrowly fail to press home their advantage. In the game against Merchant Taylors' School, when the School batted second, the scores were levelled with two balls left and two wickets in hand, and the batsmen could not get the one vital run off the last two balls!

All in all the team batted extremely well, so much so that numbers five to eleven in the batting order could never be certain to get a bat. The number eleven was only called upon twice to go to the wicket, but perhaps that was just as well. J. Odum proved virtually impossible to get out. He was dismissed only three times in the season, scored four half centuries, and finished with the remarkable average for the season of 103. Other batsmen achieved more mortal results, which in most years would have seemed outstanding. On the second team, A. Laker, S. Ogden and I. Wood were the mainstays of the batting and they, with Odum, rarely failed the team, each making excellent scores at some stage. I think that only the lack of match practice, due to the success of those above them in the order, inhibited the development of the others into a very strong "tail". J. Patton, P. Tittle, C. Wrigley, J. Allen and S. Chantler all showed that they can bat, with varying degrees of success, given adequate opportunity.

The School having batted first on ten occasions, it was up to the bowlers, ultimately, to win most matches by bowling the opposition out. On only three of these occasions did they succeed. (The other two victories were when they batted second). Despite

the fact that negative and defeatist attitudes in the face of the School's high scores often meant that the bowlers had to try to get out batsmen whose sole ambitions were to stay at the crease, right from the beginning of the innings, and that they were usually on top in every game, they were all guilty of a cardinal error, at some stage of the season, especially when bowling at tail-enders. Too often they did not make the batsmen play the ball, nor bowl to hit the wickets.

Only on one occasion did the team bowl badly as a whole, and then they were deservedly beaten by King Edward's, Lytham. That match apart, there always seemed to be one, more often two, bowlers who made match-winning or near match-winning contributions. Wrigley bowled consistently well and averaged over three wickets per game, while Patton, his usual opening partner, bowled erratically until the last few games. He has a very fine action, bowls within himself, and swings the ball prodigiously. Early in the season many of his deliveries were unplayable - some were too good for the batsmen, but some too wide! However, when he controlled direction and length, particularly against Macclesfield, it was only a lack of luck which stopped him from getting a larger haul of wickets.

To have Tittle and Chantler as change bowlers was a luxury indeed. Both could have successfully opened the bowling, and both produced their own matchwinning performances, (notably against Bury). Chantler topped the averages and took 24 wickets at 6 runs each, a fair reflection of his consistency of line and length and his ability to move the ball either way, off the seam. Allen promised much early in the season, and bowled extremely well against Bolton, giving a classic display of off-spin bowling. He varied his pace, flight, and angle of delivery, bowled some excellent leg-cutters and never let himself be bothered by the 'treatment' given to the occasional bad ball. It was disappointing that he never fully recaptured this form.

The faults in the bowling of any individual or team can only be eradicated by practice, and it is on this score that I would offer my only major criticism of the Second Team. Net practices are always a little false, more so for bowlers than batsmen, but bowlers who have room for improvement must bowl extremely seriously in the nets if they are to improve. Too often there was a tendency this season to see bowling in the nets as a necessary chore to provide batsmen with some practice. Also regular practice is necessary, and bowlers on the senior teams ought to have been able to organise a half-hour or twenty-minute session for themselves two or three times a week, in order to correct the lack of consistency which particular players displayed.

Behind the stumps this year P. Sargent performed more than capably. His abilities were perhaps highlighted when he did not play and the team realised how much they took for granted his idiosyncratic "double-take", tidy keeping generally, and athletic leg-side stops against errant bowlers.

The Second XI report would not be complete without mention of the captain S.G. Ogden, Known to all the team as "Stan", (I imagine that some of them will be surprised to find out that his name is Simon) he led the side in a manner better than any Master-

in-charge could expect. Apart from his cheerful manner and enthusiasm for every game, sometimes not easy to summon after a long coach journey or on a damp and dismal Saturday but nevertheless a great spur to all the team, he has shown a willingness to take on real responsibility in the running of the side. It is easy for a School team captain, at any level, simply to carry out instructions both during the game and off the field, but rarely does any individual apply himself to the job of captaincy in such a way as to earn the real respect of team and Staff alike, to foresee problems and solve them without assistance, to listen and learn from others without losing his independence of thought, to develop a perceptive tactical awareness, and to make the job of Master-incharge that of umpire only. The success of the team this year has been due, in no small part to the players' attitude. They have played the game to win, keenly, and seriously, but have always played to enjoy themselves. Their cricket knowledge, interest in each game, sportsmanship and good manners (so evident in cricket) have been apparent at all times. Their outcricket has been of the very high standard now expected of School teams. All of these things reflect directly on the skipper, and on behalf of myself and the whole squad I should like to thank him for his endeavours which were so justly rewarded at Macclesfield in his last game when he scored a superb century in two hours.

My final thanks go to all members of the squad who made my task a most rewarding one, to those already mentioned in the report and also to D. Bishop, J. Holden, S. McDermott, D. Lee and S. Smith who like all the others, always gave of their best whenever they played.

In spite of a lot of defeats, some a lot narrower than they appear in the summary above, the season was full of enjoyment. Most of the side had to accept almost from the outset that they were not going to burst suddenly into the 'superstar' category. They had to accept their own limitations along with those of their team-mates, and make the best of things; the game's the thing, after all, and cricket above all games, as I remarked publicly late in the season, is a game which provides great enjoyment at all levels of attainment.

There were individual performances of real class, of course, though not as many as in some seasons. Cotterill largely carried the team with his sensible captaincy and consistent left-arm medium-pace bowling. The presentation of a bat to him at the end of the term, as the team's outstanding cricketer, was quite appropriate, as he can certainly use a bat with great determination. He received splendid support from Robinson, who batted and fielded very well throughout the season. He was also pressed into service as an opening bowler and performed with a maximum of effort, but simply had too much to do to succeed in everything. Equally promising as a batsman and fielder was Ashfield, who has made a great deal of progress in a short time and provides a good example to those who find batting difficult but are prepared to work at it. Wade also showed determination with the bat and played well within his limitations.

Other players enjoyed brief moments of glory and deserve credit for their cheerful acceptance of the inevitable defeats, their continued interest in the game and their pleasure in representing the School.

The side was fortunate in having only one match lost to bad weather, and the remaining fixtures were both varied and exciting. There was a good blend of ability and enthusiasm in the team and, as the fielding improved, they developed into a very strong unit the members of which, despite differing team selections, always played for each other and produced determined and entertaining cricket.

The policy of batting first proved successful on the whole, and only one match was lost when we did so. It is also worth mentioning that the School always scored 100 or more when batting first, which augurs well for the future, and were nearly always in a position to declare at tea. The standard of games ranged from a 9 wicket win at Sandbach when the School bowled the opposition out for 10, to a win against Stockport on the last ball of the game.

On the negative side, the School suffered an ignominious defeat at the hands of Arnold School's Under-13 side, but were unlucky to lose by 7 runs in a limited over match at Bury G.S.

The most satisfactory result for the boys was perhaps the second game against North Manchester High School. The latter had narrowly defeated us in the Harold Bailey Competition at the beginning of the season, but in the second game at School we won with 7 wickets to spare.

Smythe and Thornton proved reliable openers and took it in turns to make good scores. Similarly Brown and Roberts were both capable of runs, if a little more erratically, whilst Crossley and Ingham ran well together and provided a useful blend of style and power respectively. In the second half of the season, Stubbs added strength to the middle-order.

The rest of the side could all put bat to ball when required as shown at M.G.S. when 58 runs were put on for the last 3 wickets, which essentially saved the match for us.

Of the bowlers Brown bowled consistently well, though did not always receive just reward. McLaren was more erratic, but when he concentrated on length and line instead of speed, he looked very useful. Thornton's medium pace proved a valuable addition in the latter part of the season, whilst Powell will be a very good seam bowler in years to come. We also had variety in spin with Smythe, Roberts and McMillan all turning the ball, though Smythe occasionally bowled too flat.

I have already briefly remarked on the fielding, which improved noticeably as the season went on, with Powell and Thornton outstanding in the outfield.

They were well served by Crossley, our wicketkeeper, who gained in skill and experience as the season progressed.

Finally, a word of praise for D.K. Smythe who shouldered the task of captaincy sensibly, pleasantly and, above all, thoughtfully. It is a mark of his ability that the team showed great respect for him and responded to his requests and decisions with effort and enthusiasm.

Both D.K. Smythe and R.P. Thornton represented Manchester Schools at cricket and I wish them every success in the future.

Competition for places on the team was always strong and the boys who represented the School should provide a good squad in future years. A tribute to their ability came from the coach of Manchester Boys' who invited six boys to winter nets.

This was a disappointing year for the Swimming Club in terms of results against other Schools compared to the previous year, 1977. The major reason why these performances were below the School's normal standards was the structure of the Year Teams. The majority of the stronger swimmers were representing the Year Team above their age group and consequently, next year should produce better Team results.

Having stated that the 1977-78 season was disappointing for School swimming matches, it must be said that the School had its most successful year at the Manchester Schools Swimming Association Championships. The School was represented in seven out of twelve possible individual finals, and competed in every relay final.

On Finals Day of these Championships, 6th July 1978, the School captured three shields — two for relays and one individual. The relay teams were from the U.15 age group, and they defeated Wright Robinson on both occasions winning the U.15 Medley Relay, 3 x 50 yds. (S. Brown, P. Stanley and S. Leadbeater) and the U.15 Squadron Relay, 4 x 50 yds.

(S. Brown, G. McDonough, M. Harris, P. Stanley, with K.P. McDonnell competing in the heats).

The individual winner was P. Stanley, who is a year young for the U.15 age group, swimming magnificently to win the U.15 Freestyle event. This is the second year running that P. Stanley has won an individual race — an achievement not matched in the history of School swimming.

School swimming has developed significantly throughout the last four years, but I feel that the majority of club swimmers are no longer attending training sessions with the consistency required to produce a capable and well-organised School team. The boys must realise that swimming standards among the Schools that we compete against every year are greatly improved, and each member of the team must make every effort to attend Club Training evenings on a regular basis. Failure to do so will lead to poor performances!

I would like to thank all the members of Staff who attended the swimming matches and gave up their valuable time to help organise and officiate at interschool matches. My special thanks go to Mr. Bonnick, Mr. Chudleigh, Mr. Murray and Mr. Simpson.

For a second year, an established and experienced team and a very full fixture card have contributed towards an exciting and successful season. In spite of being unable to meet the ever-elusive King's, Macclesfield, we played some thirteen matches, including those against the Masters' and the Parents' Teams, and we won all but two of them.

The first four fixtures presented the team with very few moments of anxiety, but then we faced the excellent Bolton Six in our first match at home. Their first pair took all their sets, despite a dogged recovery to 5-7 by O.C.D. Cooper and N.J. Grunfeld after going down 2-6 in the first set. We were beaten ultimately (and narrowly) by the sheer strength of Bolton's first pair who were quite merciless in their forcing and disposing of weak returns.

This hard-fought match provided invaluable experience for our next fixture, a new one against Arnold School, Blackpool, for which we were anxious to be at our very best. Unfortunately, however, Grunfeld could not take part and the consequence of the disrupted and weakened pairings was a defeat

which we did not deserve to suffer.

The remaining five matches were all well won, but perhaps the most enjoyable was the last of the season, played away at Birkenhead. The team was without its Captain, O.C.D. Cooper, and so I.W. Keating was drafted in to produce an encouragingly reliable and controlled partnership with T.S. Ryman. Meanwhile M.J. Sandy and Grunfeld, as first pair, were busy achieving the most inexplicable result of the season when, having raced through to a 6-0 victory in their first set against Birkenhead's first pair, they proceeded to hand the second set to their bemused, yet grateful opponents, taking only one token game in the process; and during the course of this unusual and entertaining match Grunfeld almost succeeded in exhausting the First Team's apparently endless supply of rackets. A. Keddy and A.H.G. Dannatt, having beaten Birkenhead's two lower pairs, immediately went five games down in the first set against their determined first pair. Yet, in a display of the most dramatic and resourceful tennis of the entire season, they fought back to take that set 7-5, and the second 6-4, thus emerging as the only pair to win all three of their events.

This, then, was a truly rousing end to a fine season, during which there was a significant contribution from each and every member of the Six, but especially from O.C.D. Cooper. He proved to be an extremely competent Captain, both on and off court, and on occasion he and Grunfeld were able to produce tennis of the highest order.

For the first time for some years an Under Thirteen side was selected this year after a lengthy and wellattended trial. A series of interesting fixtures was arranged for the latter part of the Summer Term largely in response to the enthusiasm and talent displayed by Junior School tennis players over the past two years. A totally inexperienced yet equally keen Six played its first match under indifferent conditions against a North Cestrian Grammar School team with five matches already played this season. The result was a defeat which was in no sense a true reflection of the competitiveness and closeness of the games. Because of last-minute cancellations, only one other match could be played, and this at Under Fourteen level. Nevertheless four Under Thirteen players took part and acquitted themselves well. Meadowcroft we have the nucleus of some very promising teams. Furthermore, the Junior School Inter-Form Tournament provides more than twenty boys with an excellent opportunity to develop their skills and tactics in a series of strongly contested matches. The Annual Christmas Party and Dance was as usual a very successful evening attended by both parents and staff.


We would like to thank them for the hard work and support they have given to the Association over the years.
