### Captain Charles b. Fox.

We record with deep regret the death on April 14th, after an operation, of Charles H. Fox, well known as goalkeeper to the Old Hulmeians Lacrosse Team. He came to the School in September, 1899, and left at the end of 1903. Joining the Old Hulmeians Lacrosse Club, he came on to the First team from the "A" in the season of 1906-7, and was regarded as a very good discovery. Since then he had played regularly for the Club, and besides assisting them to secure the Senior Flags of three occasions, he was a member of the team which won the Championship of the First Division in two successive years (1912-14) His last game was played on March 24th when the Old Hulmeians met Stockport in the Final for the Flags, and his brilliant defence had a large share in their victory Many of us saw and will remember his play that afternoon, as well as the simple, man! words he spoke to the School a few days later when the Flags were hung in the Assembly Hall.

He joined the army at the outbreak of the war, and like both his brothers rose to the rank of Captain in the 6th Manchesters afterwards doing valuable staff work for the 66th Division.

He leaves many friends and his early death will be widely regretted. Loyal to his School and Club, as he was to his country when the call came, Charlie Fox was one of whom we may well be proud.
